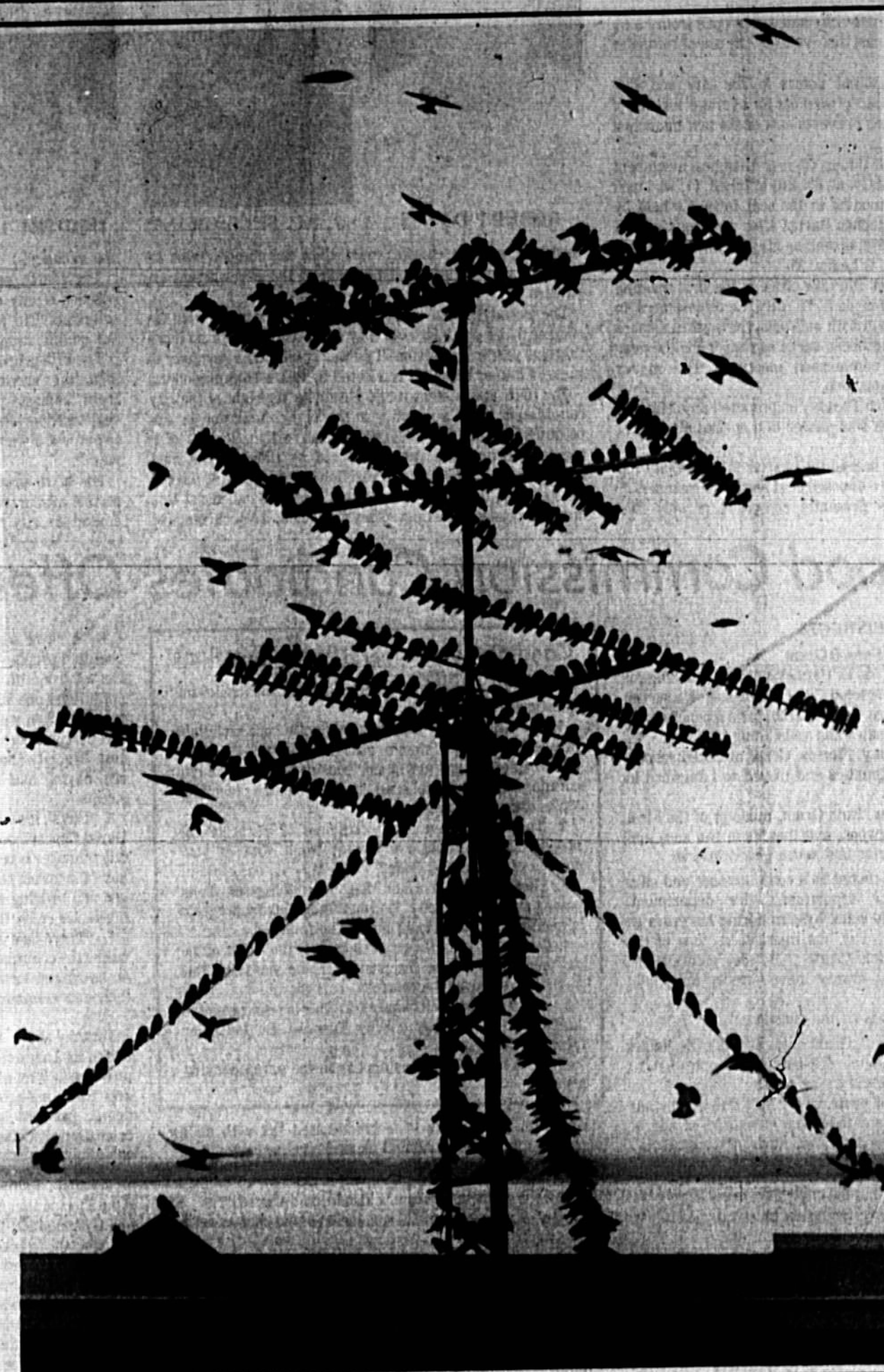

# More Woes At Migrant Health Center

Pay for 28 employees of the Seminole County Migrant Health Clinic, due before Thanksgiving, is expected to arrive this week, center Director Anita Montgomery said today.

But while Ms. Montgomery blamed the federal government for the delay in delivering the funds, her regional supervisor said Ms. Montgomery could have taken action to prevent the problem.

"That may be why the federal government is having problems with the center's management," said Joy Lovett, assistant director of the Health Systems Agency of East-Central Florida, the federally funded state agency overseeing the Sanford-based clinic.

Federal officials have said the Seminole County clinic, which provides aid to more than 4,000 migrant workers, may lose its \$700,000-a-year grant if management problems are not resolved.

Ms. Montgomery said this morning that clinic employees were not paid last week because the federal treasury had failed to send the quarterly share of the grant in time to meet the account.

She said there had been a problem in the mail, which apparently delayed delivery of the clinic's quarterly report to the federal treasury.

But Ms. Lovett said this is not exactly the case. She said she has not seen the clinic's books, but cannot understand why there was not sufficient money from Medicare, Medicaid and patient payments to meet the payroll.

If those accounts were exhausted and the quarterly grant overdrawn, Ms. Montgomery should have contacted the program's overseer at the state level, but no phone call was made, she said.

Supervisors at the state agency are very upset over the situation and are waiting for answers, but get nothing but conflicting stories from Ms. Montgomery, Ms. Lovett said.

The federal Division of Health Services is demanding the clinic provide "assurance of competent and capable management," and that Ms. Montgomery be fired, said an administrator for the federal agency.

According to Ms. Lovett, the demands stem from "personnel practices" and other problems which were investigated by Department of Health and Human Services division's Atlanta regional office.

While Ms. Montgomery said she has yet to see an official report on the investigation, she does not know of any major problems, nor does she believe she is doing a poor job of running the facility which provides emergency and preventive medical care to migrant workers throughout the county.

Ms. Montgomery said she blames some of the problems during the past few months on the failure of the National Health Corp. to appoint two doctors.

The doctors were supposed to arrive in July but never arrived due to a licensing problem, she said.

But Ms. Lovett said this is another example of problems with management. Ms. Montgomery picked the doctors, Ms. Lovett said, choosing two who were fresh out of medical school and who would not be licensed to practice for many months.

It is the program manager's job to interview physicians and make sure they are fully qualified to practice, not the government's, she said.

## Now They Know Treaty Is Dead

# Sen. Percy Thinks His SALT Talk With Soviets Helpful

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Charles Percy, R-Ill., says he may have saved months of needless discussions by explaining to Soviet leaders that SALT II is dead, and by urging both sides to begin new treaty negotiations.

Percy, incoming chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, met with Soviet President Leonid Brezhnev, Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko and other Russian leaders in three days of talks last week in Moscow.

On his return, Percy told reporters Sunday he telephoned President-elect Ronald Reagan Saturday from Brussels to tell him of the discussions and urge he move ahead with new negotiations.

"I gave him a rundown about the mood, feelings and personalities," Percy said, "and I strongly recommended that we begin at the earliest time discussions" about a new strategic arms limitation treaty.

Percy also confirmed he is opposed to lifting the embargo on grain shipments to the Soviet Union and said Reagan is reassessing his intention of lifting the embargo.

In meeting with the Soviets, Percy said, "I hope I have saved many many weeks and perhaps months of needless discussion" by explaining "that the Senate of the United States feels SALT II is dead and it would be fruitless to talk about that."

Percy said he tried to convince the Russians that "they need to be ready to start talks for a new treaty and a better treaty."

Stressing he made the Kremlin visit as a senator and not a Reagan emissary, Percy said, "I do see as really wanting to reach out and work with us."

He said the Soviet leaders were curious about Reagan and "wanted to know as much about him as possible."

Percy said, "I assured them that despite campaign rhetoric that he is not a warmonger and is a man who deeply wants peace."

The senator was to meet today with Richard Allen, Reagan's foreign affairs adviser, and said he is willing to see President Carter to tell him about his trip if the president desired.

Percy said there was no mention during his visit of the grain

embargo imposed by the United States in retaliation for the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan but said the measure was apparently taking its toll.

"They did not bring it up," he said. "It is evident it has had a deep impact. They're going to have to slaughter livestock because they can't feed them."

Percy said although Reagan during his campaign favored lifting the embargo, the president-elect told him he was reassessing his position and that "reconsideration will be done carefully."

In an interview with Newsweek magazine published Sunday, Percy said the embargo has had a "severe effect" on the Soviets and it should be used as a "bargaining chip."

## 49 Polish Miners Die In Blast

BEIGRADE, Yugoslavia (UPI)—Forty-nine miners were killed and 28 injured in a methane gas explosion that ripped through a coal mine in south-central Romania Saturday, reports reaching the Yugoslav capital from Bucharest said today.

"The blast occurred in the Livorno pit in the Valea Jiului coal mine field near the town of Petroani at the foot of the Transylvanian Alps where there have been a number of strikes over poor working conditions in the past several years."

## Supreme Court To Mull Draft

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Supreme Court said today it will consider whether the all-male military draft is constitutional.

The government appealed from a lower court ruling overturning male-only draft registration on grounds its exclusion of women is unconstitutional discrimination.

The case is likely to be the most visible case on the court's docket this term. Oral arguments will be heard early next year with the court then deciding whether it has jurisdiction in the case. If it does, a written ruling will be handed down no later than June or early July.

Draft registration was declared unconstitutional last July by a three-judge federal court panel in Philadelphia, which ruled the Military Selective Service Act illegally discriminated against men, and enjoined the administration from reinstating draft registration.

Less than 24 hours after that ruling, Supreme Court Justice William Brennan blocked it from going into effect and allowed the government to go forward with a two-week registration period for about 4 million 18-and 19-year-old men.

President Carter last January proposed reviving registration — ended after the Vietnam War — as a response to the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan. He called for registering women as well as men, but Congress refused to go along and approved only registration of men.

## Agencies Seek County Funding

The Seminole County Commission will be asked Tuesday to approve funding contracts with 11 community service agencies totaling \$28,076.

The commission will meet at 9:30 a.m. in the Seminole County Courthouse in Sanford.

The contracts will formalize funding approved at the county's final budget hearing Oct. 21.

The following amounts were approved: \$21,000 for Community Coordinated Child Care from county funds; \$9,125 for Community Coordinated Child Care from Community Service Trust Fund money; \$11,700 for the Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP); \$10,000 for the Legal Aid Society; \$8,000 for the Grove Counseling Center; \$17,000 for Seminole Community Action; \$20,000 for the Federation of Senior Citizens Club; \$4,000 for the Seminole Youth Services System; \$62,000 for the Seminole Community Mental Health Center; \$6,745 for the Community Mental Health Board; \$80,000 for patient care under the Baker Act; \$6,000 for Youth Programs, Inc.; and \$4,000 for We Care.

We Care, a 24-hour crisis intervention hotline, will also receive housing as available from the county.

The contracts will stipulate each agency must report to the county once a month on its progress toward reaching goals and objectives for service to Seminole County. — DIANE PETRYK

## Deltona Homes Lose Gas Power

As many as 600 homes in northeast Deltona were left without gas power this morning following a Sunday evening plant malfunction, said Doug Lovell, utility project manager for Deltona Utilities.

Lovell estimated 500 to 600 homes were affected by the interruption of propane gas transmission through underground pipes.

After working all night, the company was able to restore service to about 100 homes, Lovell said.

The privately owned utility, a subsidiary of The Deltona Corporation, serves about 3,000 customers in the area, Lovell said.

The malfunction occurred at approximately 7 p.m. Sunday, but Lovell declined to explain the cause of the malfunction or what was necessary to restore power.

Earlier reports said about 1,000 homes lost power.

The gas is used for heating, cooking and to provide hot water, Lovell said.

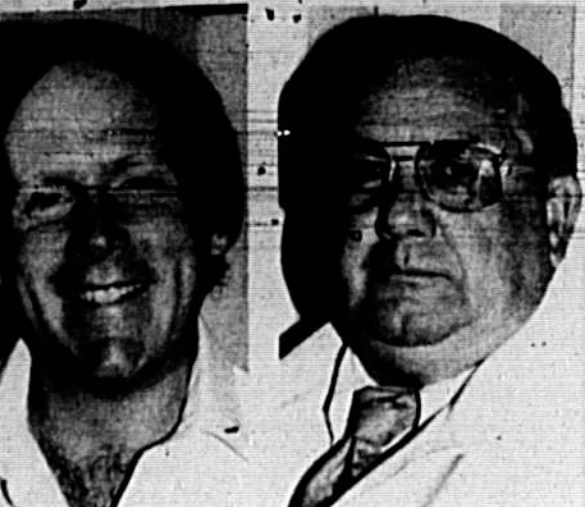
There are 3,675 registered voters in the city and City Administrator David Chacey predicts an average turnout of 60-800 voters. There were 640 votes cast in the last municipal election.

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Late Tampa Rally Stings Green Bay 20-17

MILWAUKEE (UPI) — Johnny Davis scored on a 1-yard run with 1:54 left Sunday to lift the Tampa Bay Buccaneers to a 20-17 victory over the Green Bay Packers in a key NFC Central Division game.

However, Tampa Bay marched 80 yards just before the two-minute warning — with the key play a 44-yard pass from Doug Williams to Kevin House, who juggled the ball several times before being dropped on the one. Davis scored on the next play.

Tampa Bay took a 3-0 lead on Gary Yepremian's 39-yard field goal with 4:49 left in the first quarter. It was Yepremian's seventh straight, a Tampa Bay record.

Recovered on the two. Tampa Bay also drove to the Green Bay 27 in the second quarter when the drive stalled, Yepremian was short on a 44-yard field goal attempt.

Steelers of Old Rip Miami 23-10

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Franco Harris rushed for 116 yards, including a 9-yard burst that capped a 99-yard fourth quarter scoring drive Sunday, to lift the Pittsburgh Steelers to a 23-10 victory over the Miami Dolphins.

The victory pushed the Steelers' record to 8-4 and kept alive the playoff hopes of the struggling, two-time defending Super Bowl champions. The Dolphins fell to 6-7 and virtually were eliminated from the AFC playoff picture.

Pittsburgh also scored on a 35-yard pass from Terry Bradshaw to Lynn Swann and Matt Bahr's field goal of 27 and 30 yards.

Miami's touchdown came on a 31-yard pass from rookie David Woodley to Nat Moore and Uwe von Schamann's 43-yard field goal.

The Steelers, rebounding from last weekend's loss to Buffalo, next face a crucial game with AFC Central Division rival Houston in the AstroTurf Thursday night.

Pittsburgh's ability to take advantage of Miami's mistakes meant the difference in the game.

The biggest misplay by the Dolphins came in the fourth period when Miami, trailing 16-10, got the ball on the Pittsburgh 17 on a fumble and a 16-yard unorthodox conduct penalty against the Steelers' bench failed to score.

Instead, an second-and-goal from the Pittsburgh one, Tony Nathan fumbled and Pittsburgh linebacker Jack Ham recovered. The Steelers then began their 15-play, 99-yard TD drive, their longest of the season, to put the game out of reach.

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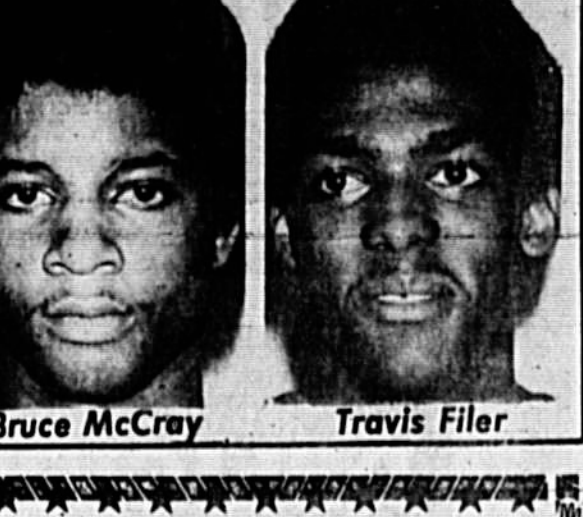

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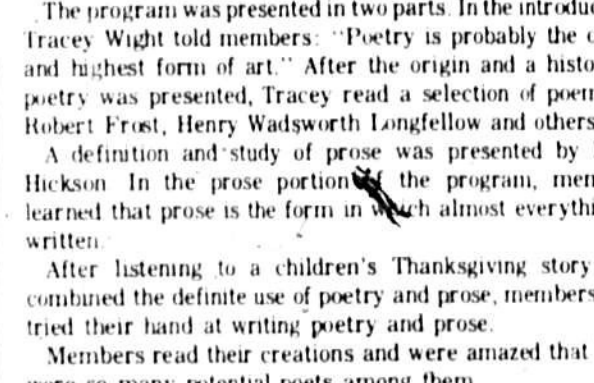

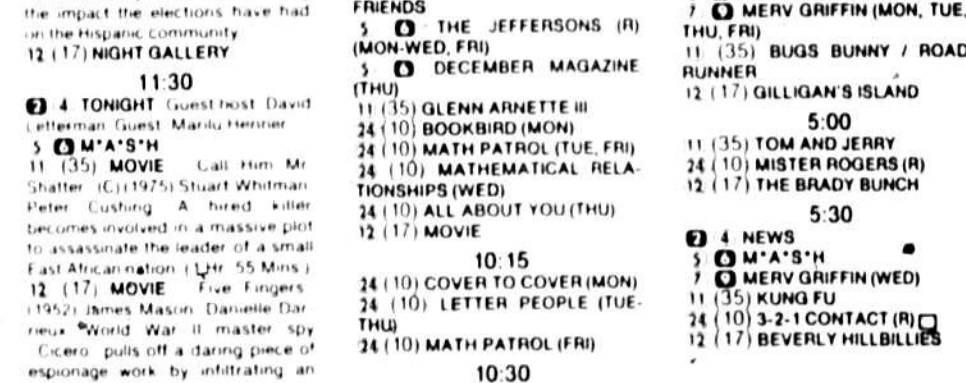
