

Iran May Wait For Reagan Before Releasing Hostages

Iranian officials say the release of the 52 American hostages may have to be deferred until Ronald Reagan s president because he may be more able to make the oncessions to gain their freedom, CBS News reported. CBS correspondent Mike Wallace, reporting from Tehran, said the general mood was that the crisis would not be resolved soon. The hostages spent their 394th day in captivity today with no official word on whether they have been transferred to the custody of

the Iranian government. Wallace quoted the speaker of Iran's Parliament, Hojatoleslam Hagerni Rafsanjani, saying it was up to the United States to make concessions for the release of the hostages.

Grenade Kills 8 Children

COTABATO, Philippines (UPI) - Suspected Moslem rebels tossed a grenade into an elementary school compound crowded with people watching a movie during a town fiesta, killing eight children and wounding 28 others, police said today.
"There was pandemonium and we bodies of the children hit were mangled in the stampede," said Angel Avellano, audio visual technician of the government national media production center. He said it was dark in the school yard and the fatalities obviously were not seen by the panicked crowd. The attack occurred Sunday evening while 300 people, mostly children, were watching a government documentary on the history of the Philippines just outside the industrial town of Cotabato, 550 miles south of Manila, police said.

NAPLES, Italy (UPI) - Fresh after shocks rocked Italy's earthquake-striken area today, but two elderly women and a 60-year-old man were pulled alive from the rubble a week after the disaster. One of the women survived by eating biscuits and tomato sauce. With temperatures hovering around freezing and snow blanketing the area, the rescue chief of the 1976 quake, began implementing an urgent plan to evacuate tens of thousands from tent cities called, "antechambers to the tomb." In a study, the group said NBC is the No. 1 network for prime time violence this year, averaging 7.5 violent acts per hour. ABC was second with 5.1 violent acts per hour and CBS was third with 4.9. 





Selma Transformed 15 Years After Bloody Sunday

SELMA, Ala, (UP1) - It has been more than 15 years now but no one who was on the Edmund Pettus Bridge on "Bloody Sühday" could walk across it without hearing again the screams and the thud of clubs striking flesh and bone. "The mind's eye could see again the stark terror on the faces of defenseless black men, women and children desperately fleeing state troopers swinging billy clubs and firing tear gas and a mounted posse of segregationists assaulting them with staves, bullwhips and electric cattle prods.

Those who were there can remember - or cannot forget the ugly sight of clusters of whites standing on street corners to cheer attackers who assaulted relentlessly, showing no mercy, spurring their horses across the bridge into the fleeing blacks. Tear gas billowed but it could not obscure the brutality of the attack. When the yellowish clouds had wafted away, blood stained the bridge and nearby streets. .

eventy-eight blacks among the 500 or so who had attempted to march 50 miles east to the state capital at Montgomery to petition for voting rights were treated in hospitals. The horror on the bridge, and the often violent voting registration marches that preceded it, linked forever Selma with Little Rock, Ark., Oxford, Miss., and Birmingham, Ala. - the great battlegrounds of the civil rights movement.



Rogers Likely

NEW YORK (UPI) — No player from South Carolina has ever won the Heisman Trophy. No defensive player has ever won it. No freshman has been the recipient of college football's most prized individual honor. One of those streaks should be broken at approximately 1 p.m. EST today when the Downtown Athletic Club names he winner of this year's Heisman Trophy.

Senior running back George Rogers of South Carolina senior defensive end Hugh Green of Pittsburgh and fresh man running back Herschel Walker of Georgia are the leading candidates for the trophy which will be presented at

Ballots were sent out earlier this month by the DAC to more than 1,000 sports writers and broadcasters from across the nation and each voter was asked to pick three players in order of preference.

Rogers is the favorite simply because he is a senior an the nation's leading rusher. The 6-foot-2, 220-pound running back concluded his regular season last Saturday with 1,781 yards, an average of 161.9 yards per game for 11 games. He inished his NCAA record with 4,958 yards rushing, good for fourth place on the NCAA's all-time list. His total trails only Archie Griffin (5,177 at Ohio State), Charles White (5,598 at Southern California) and Tony Dorsett (6,082 at Pittsburgh), all former Heisman winners, on the career list. Rogers' consistency also is a mark in his favor. He has gone over the 100-yard rushing mark in 21 straight games and is South Carolina's all-time total offense leader without

ever having thrown a pass. Many believe Green could sneak in as the winner of the Heisman Trophy. No interior lineman — offense or defense - has ever won the trophy but Green is considered the best defensive end to come into the college game in many years. A standout since his freshman year, the 6-foot-2, 222 pounder has cat-like quickness and was credited with 73 solo tackles, 45 assists and 17 quarterback sacks this

Walker made headlines from his opening game of th season when he came off the bench to score two touchdowns. The 6-2, 220-pound running back led Georgia to a perfect 11-0 record and finished the season with 1,616 yards rushing (an NCAA freshman single-season record) and 15 touchdowns despite missing most of two games with an ankle injury. His chances for winning the trophy are regarded as slim, however, since only six underclassmen all juniors - have ever captured the award. 


