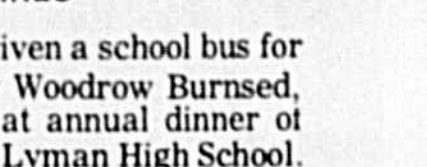
Initially, Touch-Tone calling will be offered as an optional service to subscribers served by the "322" and "323" central offices in Sanford.

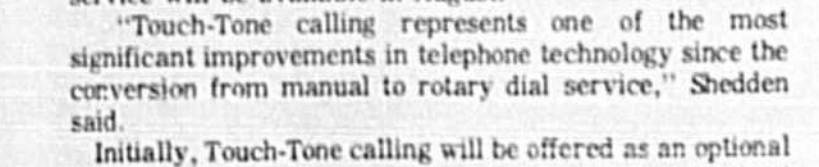

# Herald Readers React To Survey

Commissioners left an "island" unannexed on the north side of S-46A after Seminole County and two private owners protested annexation of their three small tracts.

# According To Sikes 'Kill Canal' Charged

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Florida Congressman has told a House subcommittee that its administration seized upon the device of converting the Oklawaha to the status of a wild and scenic river and went to the subcommittee for backing.

President Nixon halted construction of the canal in 1971. Trial has been scheduled July 16 on a suit challenging the President's right to halt a congressionally authorized project.

The subcommittee is considering two bills involving the Oklawaha, which would be rechanneled by the barge canal.

The administration bill, introduced by Rep. Herbert Burke, R-Fla., would allow study of the entire river from the Debarry Swamp to its confluence with the St. Johns River. A similar bill has been introduced by Rep. William Chappell Jr., D-Fla.

Since a five-year moratorium has been placed on any government-financed study of rivers, the bills would "inhibit completion of the waterway if it should be reactivated," Sikes said.

James G. Watt, director of the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, told the subcommittee he thought Sikes' complaints about the canal were right.

Rexford A. Nlesler, associate chief of the U.S. Forest Service, said the bill would stop development along the river but added that wasn't the purpose of the proposals.

"We are not recommending how the Oklawaha River should be managed or whether plans for the Cross-Florida Barge Canal should be modified. We do believe that a study of the scope and depth of a wild and scenic river is necessary to arrive at recommendations for final consideration by the President and Congress," Nlesler said.

# The Fuel Shortage

## Motorists Face Changing Travel Modes

For American motorists, it is likely to be a long, hot, thirsty summer, one calculated to revamp their travel habits.

The impact of a gasoline drought which could lead to rationing already is being felt across the nation. Most motorists by now have run into time rationing by service stations. It varies from early afternoon closings to padlocked weekends in many regions of the country. Hundreds of stations have closed down altogether.

Service station operators, independents and those with major oil company franchises, say they have been told the gas shortage may reach crisis proportions by midsummer.

The earlier claims of independents that the oil giants are trying to push them out of business by creating a false shortage are discounted by the rationing of gas to franchised dealers along with the independents.

Major companies have said all along they were forced to halt deliveries to many independents or cut back their allocations because the surplus gas of other years has ceased to exist.

Experts point to three prime reasons for the shortage:

1. Lack of refinery capacity to produce enough gas to meet rising demands of industry, government and private autos.
2. Increased use of crude oil last winter to heat American homes and buildings during an unseasonably cold and wet spell in the Midwest, South and East. In other years about 30 per cent of the crude used for heating last winter had been channeled to refineries for processing into auto fuel.
3. Tack onto these reasons the steadily mounting demand of the public for more fuel to operate two or three cars per family and the new army of camper and recreational vehicles chocking the nation's highways, many of them the year-round. The self-contained camper uses from 30 to 50 per cent more gas per mile than conventional passenger cars.

## Indonesia's Development Ignored

JAKARTA — Indonesia's exciting economic progress is being carried out in virtual secrecy.

That is because, in the absence of startling political events and violence, the world news media have turned their backs on this country of 124.9 million, which is growing at an alarming rate of 2.9 per cent each year.

The last flamboyant President Sukarno was good copy. All of the world's major news agencies had staff men here during the Sukarno era to report his dramatics from chartering jets and collecting beautiful women to slang-heavy, sber-rattling attacks on neighbors and heavy flirtation with Peking and Moscow.

While Sukarno ranted and played, Indonesia slipped further down the drain of poverty.

The political turnaround came in 1965 following an abortive uprising aimed at weakening the military and strengthening the Communist hand. But the script, which had heavy Peking influence, it still believed here did not come off and the military emerged holding the reins of power.

Gen Suharto, a quiet and smiling general whose outward calm hides an inner toughness, has been in command ever since and the country is making some progress.

The New York Times, which had a staff man in Jakarta during the Sukarno years, now covers Indonesia from Singapore, the two million population port city one hour's flying time away where living conditions are more comfortable for gentlemen foreign correspondents. The Associated Press has likewise relegated to a local stringer, backed up by periodic visits from its Singapore correspondent.

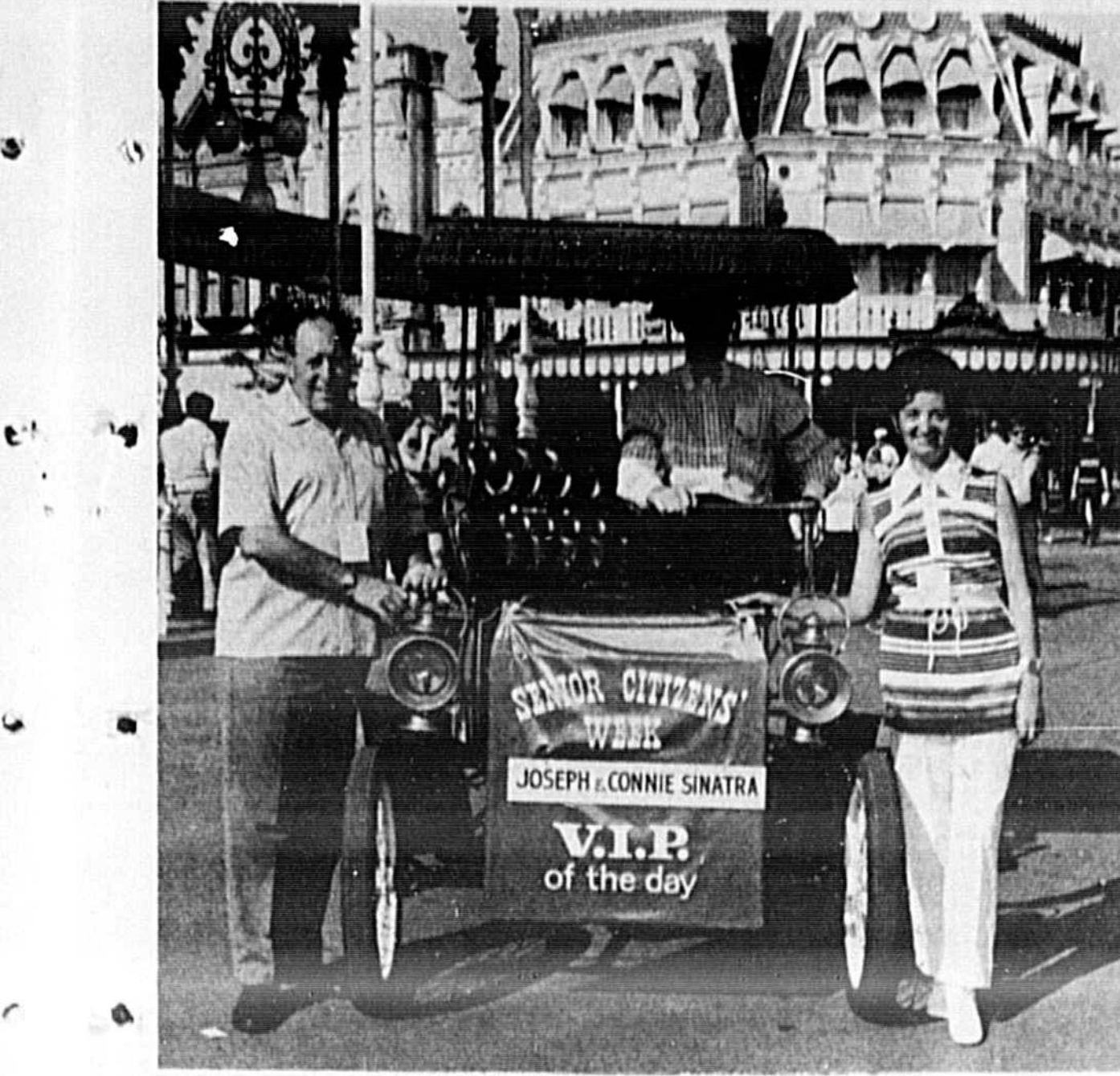

Fort Lauderdale, Fla. (AP) — Brownsies spiked with marijuana were used to aid glaucoma victims in a test on 100 volunteers, an eye surgeon says.

Dr. Frederick Blanton, 62, said Monday he defied federal authorities to make his grass-laced brownsies test on both glaucoma sufferers and a control group of persons not afflicted with the disease.

"This drug that everybody thinks is so horrible is perfect for glaucoma," he said. "It's far better for you than alcohol." Blanton said he fed 100 brownsies, each containing one-and-one-eighth grams of Jamaican marijuana, to 50 volunteers ranging in age from 23 to 35.

He said he measured eye pressure every hour and discovered that it began to drop within an hour-and-a-half hour. It started rising again seven hours later.

Glaucoma, a disease that effects about four per cent of the population, damages the optic nerve when pressure builds up from fluid in the eye. In advanced stages, it causes blindness.

Blanton, who has presented details of his findings at a scientific meeting at Johns Hop-

kins University, said the spiked brownsies reduced the eye pressure of test patients from 25 to 35 per cent.

Fifty per cent of his cases experienced no side effects, 46 per cent felt a mild sensation, two per cent were so disoriented they couldn't function normally and two per cent suffered abnormally low tension.

# Just Add Water...For An Instant Backyard Deathtrap

LOS ANGELES—Take a swimming pool, add water and the heat of summer.

The result can be of relaxation and pleasure.

Or it can be tragedy.

The outcome depends on safety precautions.

As the weather gets warmer, an increasing number of families will be at their backyard swimming pools for gatherings, parties and barbecues.

But a swimming pool isn't a plaything. It's a body of water that can be dangerous.

Robert Hatton, a paramedic with the suburban Torrance Fire Department, says that although relatively few pool drownings occur each year, his department answers three or four swimming pool cases each summer.

The troubles usually arise when someone swims alone.

Hatton says nobody should swim alone.

"The best thing is to swim in some sort of buddy fashion, like they teach in the Boy Scouts," he says.

"And children swimming always should have an adult watching them."

The danger in swimming alone is that a cramp or exhaustion can strike at any time. When it does, that inviting pool can seem to be the Pacific Ocean and the safety of the side a dozen miles away.

Marilee Dunlap, an instructor at the Swim and Play Swim School in nearby Hawthorne, also recommends against swimming alone.

"I'm always fearful of the practice because anyone can

have a stomach cramp," she says. "And if they do, it could be all over."

Capt. Dick West of the suburban Palos Verdes Fire Department points out another danger: Allowing children to swim in unsupervised groups.

Children have been the victims in many near-drowning cases his department has responded to, he says.

Pat Jurisch, manager of the Adli Swim School in Torrance, says children must be watched and kept from horseplay in the pool.

## Consider Tents For Campouts

For a person or a family just getting into camping, there is much to be said in favor of tents.

They are inexpensive. They are comfortable, save during extreme weather conditions. They can be pitched where vehicles can't go.

They rise swiftly. They can be stored when not in use. Besides for camping, they can be used for durable, comfortable summer homes or for children's playhouses.

A tent is said to be the oldest form of man-made shelter, dating back at least to 1000 B.C.

Many campers, even those not operating within the strictures of a budget, prefer it. It does not clash, as do wheeled vehicles, with the woodland greenery about it. And it is sublimely practical in view of the many restrictions arising to curb vehicular traffic in campgrounds.

Recently, on a visit to Shasta Lake, Calif., the perimeter of this giant impoundment was aflame at night with campfires from tent camps. But the crackling fires were the only sound, no generators, no air-conditioners.

The campers had transported their tents by boat into the wilderness. They were no more and no less than voyagers in their ancient canoes, or trappers in their flatboats, or explorers in their various crafts.

It was a pleasant sight, and they did not seem to be intruders. It was almost as if they belonged. That's the value of tent camping.

There is a case to be spoken for "bare bones" camping, just the necessities, nothing more.

What are the values of camping? Coping with primitive conditions, testing muscles beneath the weight of a backpack or on an uphill hike, a child seeing and catching his first pollworm, smelling the sweet fragrance of mountain air through a tent window, the stimulation of an association with the outdoors.

But if camping becomes too easy and luxurious, many of the positive benefits can be lost.

Camping is an intensely personal experience. Some vote for tents.

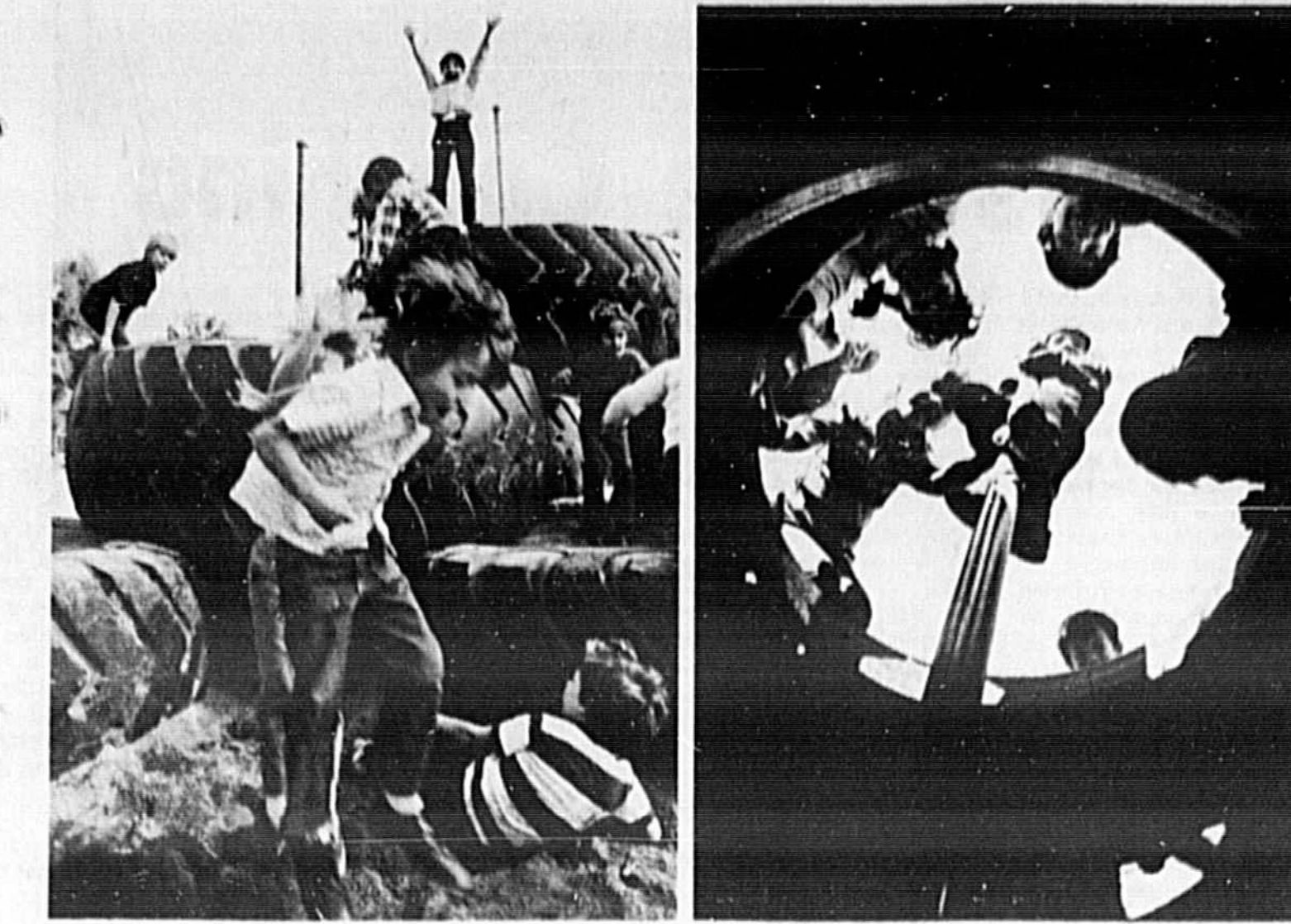

## Sanford Okays Work Start Dirt Road Paving Due

Sanford city commissioners have authorized City Manager Warren Knowles to negotiate with several surveying firms for work approved to start paving 28 miles of dirt streets in the city.

Commissioners tabled until next Monday's work session authorization to retain engineers to prepare construction plans for the 1.5 million street paving program.

The city has committed federal revenue sharing funds for the paving in a stipulated settlement of a federal court suit brought several years ago by citizens to block an assessment paving program for streets in the predominantly black Georgetown section of northeast Sanford.

City attorney Vernon Mize said Monday that special city attorney William Hutchison is redrafting the stipulations in the federal court suit settlement and they have not yet been approved by the court in Orlando.

City consulting engineer Cal Conklin said engineering plans for the massive street paving program can be completed with 90 days from the time surveys start furnishing major portions of needed survey information.

Under the proposed settlement of the federal court suit and planning commission on Monday, the city will be given first priority. Conklin said, in the letter to Knowles, that previous engineering work on the Georgetown streets can be revised to a different design but field survey work must be done first.

Knowles recommended the engineering work be done on a "payroll-cost plan" with the top cost figure not to exceed standard percentage schedule for engineering work.

In other actions Monday night, commissioners overrode recommendations of the zoning and planning commission on Monday and resubmitted a rezoning application for a multi-family district in the southwest quadrant of the Lake Mary Boulevard-U.S. 17-92 intersection commercial to allow a larger shopping center to be developed there.

Earlier only a 300 foot deep strip on U.S. 17-92 was zoned commercial and the back portion of the tract was proposed for an apartment complex.

Winter Park attorney Andy Paulk said now the entire 14 acres will be developed by his unidentified clients as a regional shopping center to serve the booming Hidden Lake and Lake Mary Boulevard area where over 2,000 dwelling units are under construction or on the drawing boards.

Zoning and planning commissioners had recommended the multiple family portion of the quadrant parcel remain in that zoning classification as a buffer between commercial and single family residential adjacent to the location.

## John Dean To Talk At Hearings

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal judge today granted immunity for ousted White House counsel John W. Dean to testify before the Senate Watergate committee, and refused to block live radio and television coverage of his testimony.

U.S. Dist. Judge John J. Sirica also ordered Dean to testify before the Watergate grand jury, but without immunity. Dean's lawyer has said his client would refuse to answer grand jury questions on grounds of possible self-incrimination.

Sirica's rulings were a setback for Dean, who has failed to win a grant of immunity from prosecutors. He now will appear at the grand jury before he appears at the Senate hearings, making it somewhat less difficult for prosecutors to build a case against him.

They have said Dean was at the center of a plot to cover up the Watergate scandal.

Dean's lawyer Monday asked Sirica to quash a summons ordering him to appear before the grand jury.

# Vietnam Truce Pact 24-Hour Ceasefire

SAIGON (AP) — The Vietnamese document being worked out in Paris calls for a realistic cease-fire within 24 hours after signing and includes timetables for other provisions of the original truce, Saigon government sources said today.

The informants said the plan being drawn up by Henry A. Kissinger and Hanoi's Le Duc Tho also calls for implementation of Article 20 of the original pact. If observed, this could mean an end to U.S. bombing in Cambodia.

Kissinger and Tho were to resume discussions today in the French capital.

The document was scheduled to be signed last Saturday, but South Vietnamese President Nguyen Van Thieu balked.

Article 20 of the original pact says the United States, North and South Vietnam, and the Viet Cong shall respect the neutrality of Cambodia and Laos. There are true agreements in Vietnam and Laos, but none in Cambodia.

Timetable provisions affecting the United States and North Vietnam include:

1. An immediate halt of U.S. reconnaissance flights over the North.

2. The United States will re-

sume sweeping mines from the waterways of North Vietnam within five days and will complete the operations within 30 days.

3. A true cease-fire will go into effect 24 hours after the signing of the joint communique.

4. There shall be a delineation of the zones of control by the two opposing parties, the Saigon government and the Viet Cong. The English text uses the word "territory." Thieu wants this changed to read military zones of control. Sources said that if he agrees to sign a document including the word "territory," it would mean there are two territories in South Vietnam and would be tantamount to recognizing the Viet Cong as a legitimate government.

5. Saigon and the Viet Cong shall complete the release of Vietnamese civilian prisoners within 45 days.

6. Within 48 hours, the commanders of the opposing armed forces at those places of direct contact shall meet with a view to reaching an agreement on temporary measures to avert conflict.

7. The two South Vietnamese parties shall agree on points of entry for replacement of war materials.

8. Saigon and the Viet Cong must cooperate with the four-party Joint Military Team, which also includes representatives of the United States and North Vietnam, in accounting for missing Americans and Vietnamese and in repatriating the remains of American dead.

9. Saigon and the Viet Cong shall prohibit all acts of reprisal and discrimination against individuals or organizations that have collaborated with one side or the other and ensure the democratic liberties of the people.

10. The Council of National Reconciliation and Concord shall be established as soon as possible, and Saigon and the Viet Cong shall sign an agreement on the internal political affairs of South Vietnam within 15 days.

11. The two-party Joint Military Commission, made up of the Saigon government and the Viet Cong, shall be provided full protection, assistance and cooperation and shall enjoy privileges and immunities equivalent to those accorded diplomatic missions and diplomatic agents.

## Watergate Legal Fees Are Nearing \$250,000

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon's re-election committee has spent nearly a quarter-million dollars for legal fees in less than a year, most of it to defend top officials in lawsuits arising from the Watergate break-in.

In its quarterly report to the General Accounting Office, the Finance Committee to Re-elect the President said Monday it had spent \$146,639 on legal fees in the past three months alone.

A check of all the committee's reports since last July shows the total spent on legal fees so far at \$237,726.

In a statement put out with the latest financial report, the committee said its budget committee in April approved payment of "legal fees and costs in connection with matters which are not the subject of formal criminal charges in performance of functions by (employees) arising out of their legitimate duties."

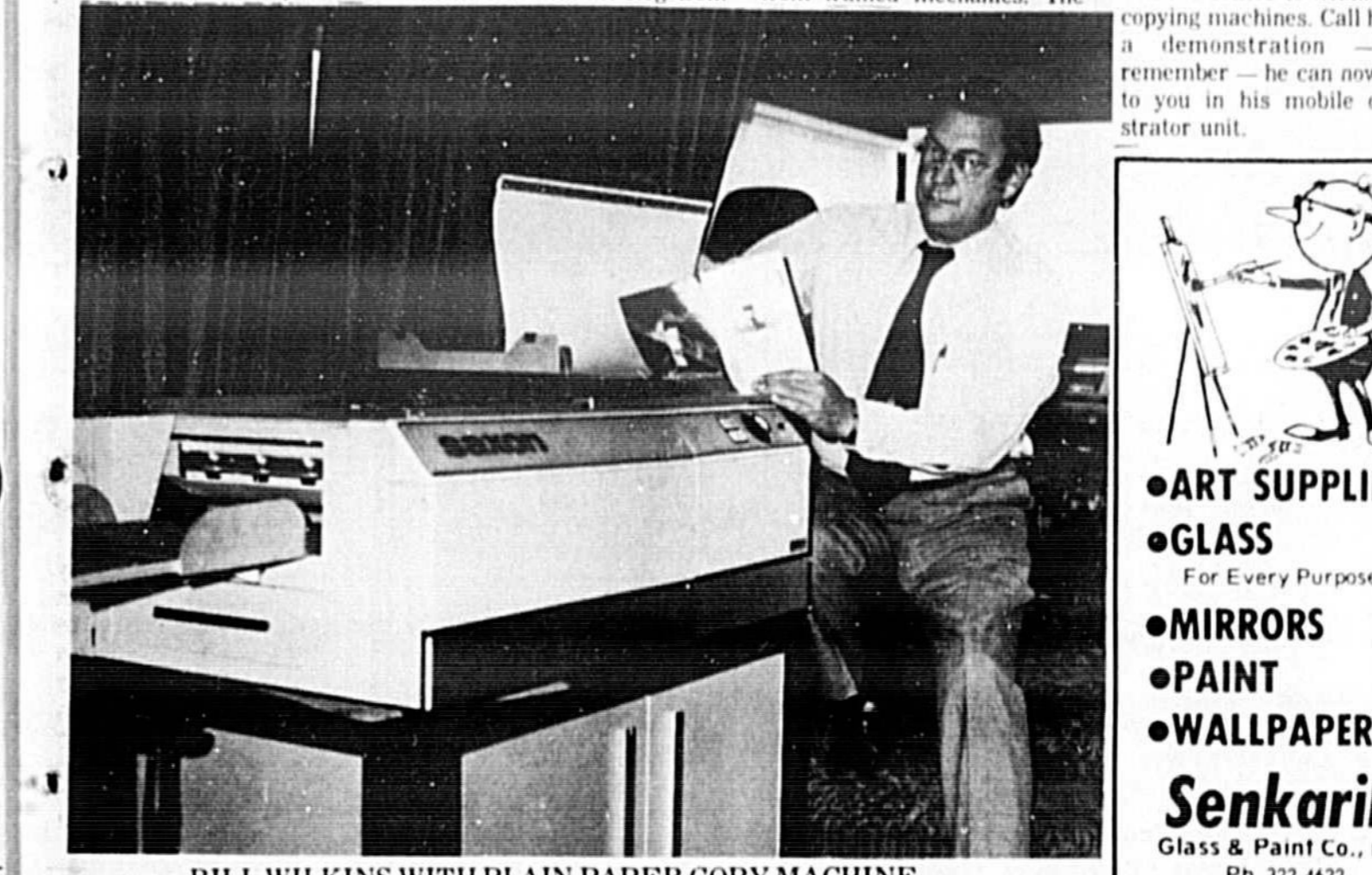
