Cost Of Living Woes

It is no news to household heads and marketers that the cost of living reached a new all-time peak in May.

The continuous rise of the cost of living means trouble for the family budget. Whether the budget is formally set down on paper or merely a rough mental plan from payday to payday, it doesn't seem to cover the situation as it is supposed to do.

Besides the solution of getting more money, which is easier said than done, what can the family do about it? One step which is clearly necessary in this period of rising prices is to keep readjusting the budget at frequent intervals.

Tidelands Ownership

Field Ordered To Name Bondsmen Of American Reds

NEW YORK, July 5.—(AP)—Frederick Vanderbilt Field, secretary of the Civil Rights Congress bail fund, was warned today he would be adjudged in contempt of court unless he produced the names of contributors of \$80,000 posted for four missing Communist leaders.

Field is a left-wing descendant of a family long prominent in American financial and social circles. The CRC bail fund posted a total of \$250,000 bail for the 11 convicted Communist leaders.

Field and Almer Green, another bail fund officer, first refused at a bail fund inquiry on Tuesday to give the names. Ryan today asked Field if he kept books showing the names of "leaders who deposited monies or securities" with the bail fund.

Field said he regarded Field's claim of privilege as a subterfuge. Then he granted an adjournment until this afternoon to permit Field to produce the fund's records and books.

Alex R. Johnson, who for 20 years taught vocational agriculture and directed the Future Farmer's Seminole Chapter at Seminole High School, has been named to head Dade County's vocational agricultural training program.

He has taken over the job held for the last three years by Otis Bell, who has resigned to go into business. Mr. Johnson came to Sanford from Winter Haven, where he had taught for three years.

Mr. Johnson co-operated with Fred Burner, C. R. Dawson and others who were instrumental in founding the Sanford State Farmers Market here, the first of its kind in Florida.

During World War II, he headed the vocational training program here in fitting workers for war production work, such as welding, making gun parts, water for gliders and airplanes.

Mr. Johnson holds a B. S. degree in agriculture from the University of Florida, an M. S. degree in education from the same institution, and an honorary diploma as master agricultural teacher from the national office of education in Washington, D. C.

Rightists Win In Finnish Election As Leftists Gain

HELSINKI, Finland, July 5.—(AP)—Right wing and center parties appeared sure of a slim four-seat majority in Finland's new parliament today although Communist and leftist parties gained six seats in the recent general elections.

With an estimated 90 percent of the votes counted, the center and rightist groups held 102 seats to Communist and leftist parties. The elections Monday and Tuesday drew ballots from more than 80 percent of the 2,560,000 eligible voters.

The latest count gave this distribution of seats (1948 representation in parentheses): Center-Agrarians, 52 (41); Swedish Popular Party, 15 (14); Rightist-Conservative, 26 (33); Finnish Popular Party (splitter from Liberals), 9 (11); Leftist-Peoples Democratic Front (Communists and extreme Left Socialists), 53 (64).

24th Division Vets Are Skeptical Of Reds' Intentions

ON THE KOREAN FRONT, July 5.—(AP)—Exactly a year ago today, a tiny band of ill-equipped and vastly outnumbered GIs fired the first American battle—in Korea.

Less than half of the Americans engaged managed to withdraw from that first battle near Osan. It pitted badly outnumbered and poorly equipped GIs against North Korean "Reds" led by Russian tanks. All of the U. S. artillery guns were lost. But the GIs made a new stand to the south.

Today, 44 of the slightly more than 400 infantry and artillerymen of the U. S. 24th division went into that action and still gained it out with the Communists. These men have weathered the dark days of the Pusan perimeter.

Today, there are hints that a cease fire soon may be negotiated. But the veteran battlers of the Arrowhead Division are not excited.

This war has been "almost over" too many times," explained one. "We will believe it when we see it."

In a year of battle the 24th Division has developed into a tough, talented crew that has gained the healthy respect of the Reds.

Two understrength rifle companies—the 31st Infantry Regiment—and battery A of the 62nd Artillery Battalion stood in hastily-prepared positions just north of Osan and nearly 30 miles south of Seoul.

"Everything else seemed to be going south," said Lt. Larry Powers of Tucson, Ariz., communications officer of the battalion. He is one of the two infantrymen still serving in Korea.

"We went to battle in charcoal-burning taxis, old Korean buses, anything we could find," says Cpl. Jack Ruffner, of Three Forts, Mont. He is the other infantry veteran of the Osan battle still in the division.

Now, a year after they started it, the survivors may be in on the finish. How do they feel about it? Sgt. Robert Brown of Wilkes-Barre, Pa., an artilleryman, says flatly, "I don't believe they will ever come to terms."

Cpl. Theodore Pacheco of Wainona, Fla., says he has no doubts. "I don't believe they will ever come to terms," he says.

"And if that means we have to get into the big war that may be all right, too. Some of us may die but the rest of the world will be free."

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### Scientist Experiments With Snails In Attempt To Cure Obscure Disease

PEARL RIVER, N. Y., July 5.—(AP)—Amid 20,000 snails and 25,000 white mice a scientist here is raising worms to try to wipe out a disease afflicting 144,000,000 people.

That is about one out of every fifteen persons alive on this earth. Yet you probably never even heard of the disease. It is called schistosomiasis. It is prevalent in Puerto Rico, South America and the Orient. In some areas of Africa and Egypt 80 percent of the population have it, and in acute cases it is often fatal.

The villain is a tropical worm known as schistosomes. Under a small power microscope a female worm looks like a miniature, over-rimmed banana. The male worm looks like a Brooklyn Dodger baseball fan with his team trailing 8-to-1 in the 9th inning—bent over and pale.

The scientist fighting them is Dr. Redignel Hewitt, at 40 one of the great worm men of the century. Several years ago, after testing more than 1,000 preparations, he perfected the drug hezaran, newest weapon against another age-old tropical worm scourge—elephantiasis.

"So far we've spent \$200,000 in the last three years and tested some 5,000 different compounds looking for something to whip schistosomiasis—and that may be only a drop in the bucket," Hewitt said cheerfully. "All we've got so far are a few interesting leads—but we'll find the answer."

The task is made more difficult by the complicated life cycle of the schistosomes. They are parasites which require two hosts—usually human beings and a certain kind of small water snail.

The cycle: The worm embryos hatch in the snails and escape into the water. Human beings are infected by drinking the water or bathing in it. The worms mature in the body and their eggs pierce blood vessels, often causing internal hemorrhages. After being discharged by the body, the eggs swim through creeks in search of another host, hospitable snail in which to continue their cycle.

Dr. Hewitt's way of short-cutting his attack of the problem has been to use white mice instead of human beings as the primary hosts for the worms. It is easier and safer to test compounds with them.

His 20,000 snails and 25,000 white mice—the mice cost 36 cents each and he wears out 800 a week—are housed in the giant Lederle laboratories here, some 30 miles from Manhattan. They are cared for by two technicians—Ann Greening and Fred Linderman.

Linderman sometimes wonders what he will say when one of his three young children gets around to asking about his job. "How can I explain what a snail farmer does?" he asked.

Miss Greening used to share the average woman's deathly fear of mice. After three years of working with them, she now handles them as fearlessly as if they were baby kittens.

Despite the 25,000 mice stacked in cages around its walls, there is no mouse trap in the laboratory. "If one gets loose we fix it,"

to catch it," said Linderman grimly. "It might be infected."

Dr. Hewitt is mulling over some historic statement to make if and when he discovers a drug to destroy schistosomiasis. Scientists at such special moments are supposed to say something striking—such as "Eureka."

But he is still taking a ribbing from his colleagues for his remark when he first found the drug in 1945 that spells hope for more than 200,000,000 sufferers of limb-swelling elephantiasis.

Looking at the effect of the drug through his microscope, Dr. Hewitt ejaculated:

"Well, I'll be . . ."

Recalling that remark, he said with a grin:

"Next time I hope to have something more quotable ready."

### Synthetic Plant Sugar Is Made By British Scientist

By RENNIE TAYLOR

BERKELEY, Calif., July 5.—(AP)—Production for the first time of plant sugar outside of a plant cell—something which scientists have been trying to do for generations—was announced last night by a University of California researcher.

The scientist, Dr. Daniel I. Aronson, of the College of Agriculture, put together some water, some carbon dioxide, a substance obtained from hog liver, another substance from pigeon liver and a little speck of green coloring matter from a green leaf. He exposed the mixture to light and it turned into sugar.

All this was done in a test tube, without the presence of any living matter.

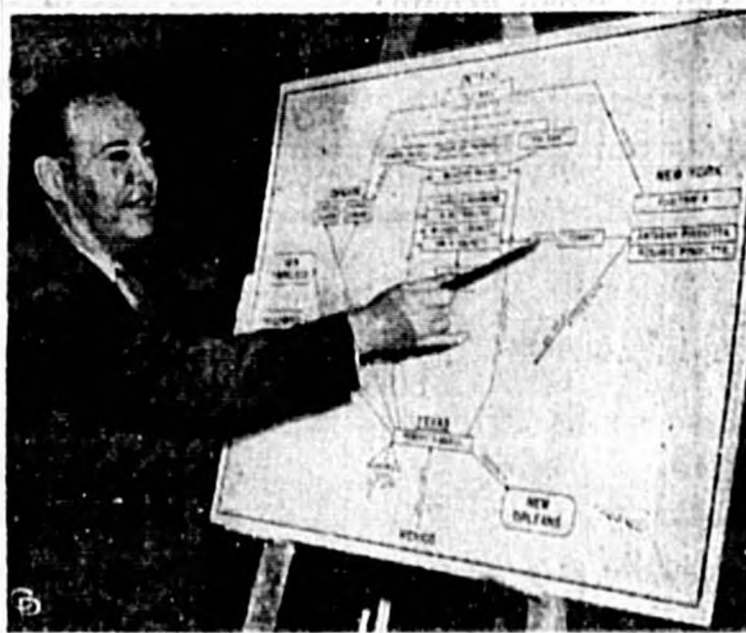
Achievement is the first on record where sugar was made outside a living cell from the basic materials, carbon dioxide and water. He reported the work in the British scientific publication *Nature*.

The only thing Aronson borrowed from plants was chlorophyll, the green stuff in leaves.

The implications are startling—synthetic sugar, a major item of the world's food coming from water and carbon dioxide without the work and waiting on plant life.

But before man can come anywhere near realization of this dream he must first produce chlorophyll, the green stuff of leaves, in his test tubes.

Scientists are working on that now, but they have a long way to go.

GAINESVILLE, July 5.—(AP)—Florida dairymen will be brought up to date on research developments, tour University of Florida dairy units and see farm machinery exhibits and demonstrations at the 16th annual field day, July 12-13.

Sponsored by the Florida Dairy Industry Association and the University's Agricultural Divisions, the two-day session will also include the annual banquet Thursday night in the university cafeteria. Dairy awards and honor roll diplomas will be presented at that time.

Other meetings will be held at the dairy research unit at Hague, except for a tour of the dairy products laboratory. Dairymen will hear of new developments on production of high-quality butter, milk, pasture and herd research, home-grown feeds, the mastitis problem and the marketing of milk.

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### King Of Hoboes To Sell Life Story For Motion Picture

HOLLYWOOD, July 5.—(AP)—Jeff Davis, King Of the Hoboes, may abandon the open road long enough to try his hand at film acting.

Davis says he has been given special dispensation by the board of directors of Hoboes of America, Inc., to depart from such approved pursuits as selling razor blades to take up a tentative offer he has from a movie studio.

The Hobo veteran said that previously, because of rules of his organization, "I didn't dare write a book, give testimonials or do anything like that."

He is now writing episodes of a career that began 12 years ago when, he recalls, he started the Hobo organization with 32 members at Kid Riley's saloon in Cincinnati.

Stephen Aust, an associate film producer, said he has signed a contract with Davis acquiring movie, television and magazine rights to the story of his life. Aust said he is considering either a film or a series of television shorts based on his life.

Davis hopes the deal clicks. "If I don't have to sell razor blades again I'll be happy," he said.

### Unions Say Reds Are Success At Fomenting Unrest

MILAN, Italy, July 5.—(AP)—Communism already has achieved a great part of its aim in the world by creating permanent unrest, non-Communist labor unions warned today.

Belgium's Paul Finet, president of the International Confederation of Free Trade Unions, told the Confederation's Congress that "we are today in the most difficult situation known to the trade union movement throughout its history."

"The riches and resources of the democratic nations have been diverted from the humanitarian ends to which they were destined. The rearmament effort imposed on the countries threatened by Communist aggression has undoubtedly an obstacle to social progress."

He said the shadow of organized labor was to support this rearmament effort, but "we must" that "this does impose urgent duties on us that if growing again the democratic nations' efforts being used as a pretext for social reaction."

Finet spoke in the opening session of the Congress, which since the ICFEU was organized in England in 1949. The meeting is being attended by some 300 delegates from 55 countries outside the iron curtain. Membership represents some \$2,000,000 trade unionists, 200,000 in the U. S.
