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Sanford Will Play St. Cloud Sunday In Exhibition Contest

Tuberculosis Group To Sponsor Game On Monday Night With Eric Sailors

The Sanford Giants will play St. Cloud, Minn., of the Class C Northern League Sunday afternoon at the Municipal Park, it was announced last night by Manager Hal Gruber.

Monday night the Sanfordites will go under the lights for their first game of the 1949 season in a benefit contest to be played for the Seminole County Tuberculosis Association. Sanford will meet the Eric Sailors of the Class C Middle Atlantic League.

Sunday's contest which will start at 2:00 o'clock, will be open to the public, and an admission will be charged. This will give the fans of Sanford and Seminole County their first opportunity to see the team in action under actual game conditions.

"Monday night's tilt will be opened by Carl Hubbell, director of the New York Giants farm system, who will throw the first ball to Mayor Andrew Carraway," Mrs. Helen Bartschell, who completed arrangements for the benefit game, announced this morning.

Manager Gruber plans to use two or three pitchers in each of the games and will use every man listed on the Sanford roster in order to fully determine the starting lineup for the opening Florida State League game to be played here with Orlando on Thursday night.

"I have not decided who will be the opening pitcher against Orlando," Gruber declared this morning. "It will probably be Monday night or Tuesday before I fully decide."

The Sanford club will move into the Municipal Park at 10:00 o'clock tomorrow morning and will hold their first drill of the year in their home park, which has been occupied by the Minneapolis Millers of the American Association and the Jersey City Giants of the International League.

"We will probably have an intra-squad game tomorrow morning in order to get the fellows used to being in a park instead of in a wide open field," Gruber asserted.

Yesterday afternoon the Sanfordites topped the Ft. Smith Giants of the Class C Western League by a 6 to 1 count. Rose, Schultz and Barry tossed the contest while Matte and Barga shared the catching duties.

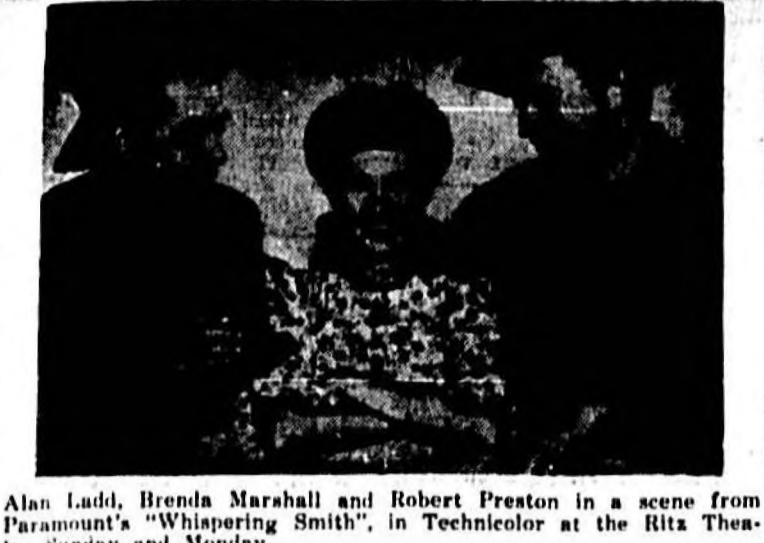
