Football players refuse to testify at hearing

SANFORD - Four witnesses refused to testify under the Fifth Amendment in a special Seminole County School Board hearing Thursday for the appeal of the suspensions of two Seminole High School football players from the team under the school district's Citizenship Standards Policy.

Bronson gets pay hike, SPD changing

SANFORD · Acting Sanford Police Chief Ray Bronson Is about to get a sizable temporary salary increase for the time he has been pinch hitting for Joe Dillard, who is retiring.

Complying to direction by the City Commission, City Manager Tony VanDerworp has recommended Bronson be placed at the mid-point range for police chief pay - \$63,433.76. Ilis present salary is \$53,877.54.

The commission is expected to approve the pay increase when it meets Monday. The pay will be retroactive and effective from Oct. 26 until the city hires a new police chief. Bronson may be a candidate for that position.

VanDerworp said the city will conduct a national search for its new chief. It has not been advertised as yet. Mayor Larry Dale has said that he expected as many as 200 law enforcement officials to apply.

Bronson submitted a list of proposed changes in the department that is also part of the commission's agenda on Monday. Four of them are: 1. Change the deputy chief

position to operations captain. 2. Change one commander position port/investigation captain.

Second Street project eases drainage concerns for Sanford residents

SANFORD - Sanford's \$1.8 million project along Second Street to divert atorm water into Lake Monroe continues to cause traffic problems, but the city believes the inconvenience will pay off in improved drainage, irrigation and landscaping.

The storm system project began in May, and is expected to be complete by the middle of March, 1999. Compton, Porter, and Holmes Engineers Inc., as well as Maxwell Contracting Corporation is performing work for the city.

"It has caused some hindrance for traffic flow," support services coordinator for Sanford's Public Works Department Charles Hargrove said. This is going to reduce the risk of future flooding, and relieve the drainage along First Street. Plus, people will see landscaped Islands and Improved irrigation."

From Oak Street to Sanford Avenue, Hargrove said the sidewalks are going to be repaired. Landscape Islands with shrubbery and trees will be put in place. The granite curbing will be preserved, while water and sewer repairs are made.

Work will continue to Pine Avenue, Hargrove said.

A large box culvert is being placed on Second Street that will divert water flow through Fort Mellon Park, out to take Monroe, David Glerach, vicepresident of CPH engineers, said. The box culvert is a concrete pipe, Geirach said.

The idea is to improve drainage throughout the city." Glerach said. "We're upgrading the entire system. 

The Hawks, defending their title, looked solid at the Winter Park Tip-Off Classic last week despite suffering a loss, but Jamaal White proved that he can fill the basket. Everyone knows about guard Reggie Kohn, but he'll need players to get experience quickly for the Hawks to repeat.

As time wound down in the Bears' 39-33 upset victory over defending Class 6A state champion Lake Mary, Hughes said she kept trying not to look.

"I didn't look at the clock."
Hughes said. "I told the players not to look at it, so I couldn't do it el-

Her advice worked pretty well, but Bev Dedelow said she may have peeked.

"It felt great," Dedelow said. "I looked at the clock, but I knew we could beat them. It makes all the losses worthwhile."

Dedelow is one of the Bears who have been there for both of the school's two years. Last year, Winter Springs went 5:23 despite improving as the season progressed. Since last season, the Bears have been bolstered by transfers Mary Lou Johnston and Danat Hicks, but it was freshman Missy Guadagnino who led the Bears down the stretch.

Guadagnino came up big late in the game and her steal and feed to Kris Dedelow led to the basketball that gave Winter Springs a 33-32 lead. She also hit a 3-pointer from the corner to put the Bears up 31-30. Guadagnino had three steals in the fourth quarter and her five points were all scored at key times.

"She's only a freshman and she isn't a scorer, but she gets us going defensively," Hughes said.

Chanukah-The Festival of Lights begins with the kindling of the Chanukiyah the eight candle lamp on all eight nights of Chanukah.

the activities surrounding Chanukah includes singing related songs, games played with the dreidl-Spin Top, and serving potato latkes. In addition, family members are involved in telling the Story of Chanukah, attend Chanukah parties and exchange of gifts, all in the interest of remembering that which has taken place over 2,100 years

ago in the Land of Israel.

Thus Chanukah, "Dedication", commemorates the completion of the purification and re-dedication of the Temple in Jerusalem, after its recapture by Jewish rebels led by Judah Maccabe, one of the great warriors of Jewish history.

Antiocus IV, the leader of the occupying Syrian/Greek Seleucids, had demanded that the Jewish people abandon their faith and turn to idolatry. This blasphemy, allied to his desecration of the Temple, ignited the Jewish rebellion. Initially, the revolt took the form of guerrilla warfare but, in 164 B.C.E., Jewish forces were sufficiently powerful to drive the invaders from Jerusalem.

Jewish tradition states that the victors could find only one flask of the pure oil required for the menorah in the Temple and that this quantity was sufficient to keep the menorah alight for one day only. By a miracle, this single flask kept the flame burning throughout the eight days that were required to prepare new pure oil. Different areas. different meanings

When your weatherperson tells you that it will be mild tonight, what conclusion do you draw?

We have been looking at second hand low. Well, here is a classic example. How should the play go in four spades? What do you think of the auction?

First, the bidding. I would prefer South to respond three hearts, a transfer bid showing (at least) five spades. That way, the strong hand becomes the declarer.

No doubt you noticed that three nois one of the game's imponderables: ing a nine card (or better) fit in a major. No one knows how to do it scientif-


The defense begins with three rounds of clubs, declarer ruffing the third. After drawing trumps, declarer has to avoid two heart losers. He leads
