## Football players refuse to testify at hearing

SANFORD - Four witnesses refused to testify under the Fifth Amendment in a special Seminole County School Board hearing Thursday for the appeal of the suspensions of two Seminole High School football players from the team under the school district's Citizenship Standards Policy. Seminole High School principal Gretchen Schapker and secretary Peggy LeeRoy

both took the Fifth Amendment under questioning from Howard Marks, the attorney for student-athletes Jeremy Taylor and Lee Moore.

Schapker did testify that she suspended the students too soon, but became angry when Marks asked if she had acted with prejudice against the students.

Taylor and Moore also took the Fifth Amendment, under questioning from School Board attorney Ned Julian.

Witnesses such as Ron Pinnell, executive director of

secondary education for Seminole County Schools, testified about the rules and procedures of the policy.

The policy, adopted in 1993, provides for the suspension of students from extracurricular activities for participating in drinking, gambling, smoking, using illicit drugs, or having a fake ID on or off school property. This is the first challenge to the policy.

"I believe in the policy," Pinnell said in testimony. "It's important to teach students the dangers of drinking."

Pinnell said he was the primary author of the policy.

Moore, 16, and Taylor, 18, were suspended from the football team under the good citizenship policy governing the behavior of students who are involved in extracurricular activities.

The students were suspended following an investigation by Schapker into an incident involving football players and friends who gathered at New Smyrna Beach on Labor Day. Moore has

admitted to drinking from a bottle of vodka, and Taylor was present at the beach with the students.

Sally Moore, Lee Moore's mother, said after the hearing that the investigation had been handled improperly. She said her son was punished while admitting to the incident, while students who lied were not punished.

"All we're asking for is fair and equal treatment for all people," Sally Moore said. "If

## Bronson gets pay hike, SPD changing

SANFORD - Acting Sanford Police Chief Ray Bronson is about to get a sizable temporary salary increase for the time he has been pinch hitting for Joe Dillard, who is retiring.

Complying to direction by the City Commission, City Manager Tony VanDerworp has recommended Bronson be placed at the mid-point range for police chief pay - \$63,433.70. His present salary is \$53,877.54.

The commission is expected to approve the pay increase when it meets Monday. The pay will be retroactive and effective from Oct. 26 until the city hires a new police chief. Bronson may be a candidate for that position.

VanDerworp said the city will conduct a national search for its new chief. It has not been advertised as yet. Mayor Larry Dale has said that he expected as many as 200 law enforcement officials to apply.

Bronson submitted a list of proposed changes in the department that is also part of the commission's agenda on Monday. Four of them are:

1. Change the deputy chief position to operations captain.
2. Change one commander position to support/investigation captain.

## Murals on display at airport

SANFORD - The Orlando-Sanford Airport has two murals designed by Seminole Community College students on permanent display in the U.S. customs arrival area.

The murals are the result of two months of work by six students on art scholarships at SCC.

"The students learned more from this project than they ever could in a traditional class setting," SCC art instructor Marianna Ross said, who directed the students during the project. The students formed two teams. They worked together and came up with several mural designs, which were submitted to the airport. Once the designs were selected, the students got right to work.

The murals have been on display at the airport since Nov. 10. Brendan Carmody, President and Marketing Director at OS-I, served on a mural selection committee. The murals are the brainchild of Tom Carpenter, a US customs agent at the airport and an SCC graduate.

Sisters Daniela and Jeneva Cosovic, and Irina Karic, all second-year students from Bosnia, made up one team designing the murals. Joranna Curry, Ruthann Jamnal, and Eric Jones formed the second team. Curry and



Jamnal are second-year students, while Jones is in his first semester.

The Cosovic sisters hope to attend the Boston Art Institute after graduating from SCC, Ross said.

"They draw beautifully," Ross said. "Hopefully, between their drawing ability and the scholarships with us, they'll make it to the Boston Art Institute."

Ross said Curry became the unofficial spokesperson for the group of students. "She's very focused and organized," Ross said of Curry. "She has an excellent art background. She's also married with two children."

Ross said she is amazed at how quickly Jones is picking up on artwork. In just his first semester.

Jamnal also worked on a mural completed at the Rescue Outreach Mission on 13th Street in Sanford.

"We have a very good foundation," Ross said. "The students here have to really work hard."

## Second Street project eases drainage concerns for Sanford residents

SANFORD - Sanford's \$1.8 million project along Second Street to divert storm water into Lake Monroe continues to cause traffic problems, but the city believes the inconvenience will pay off in improved drainage, irrigation and landscaping.

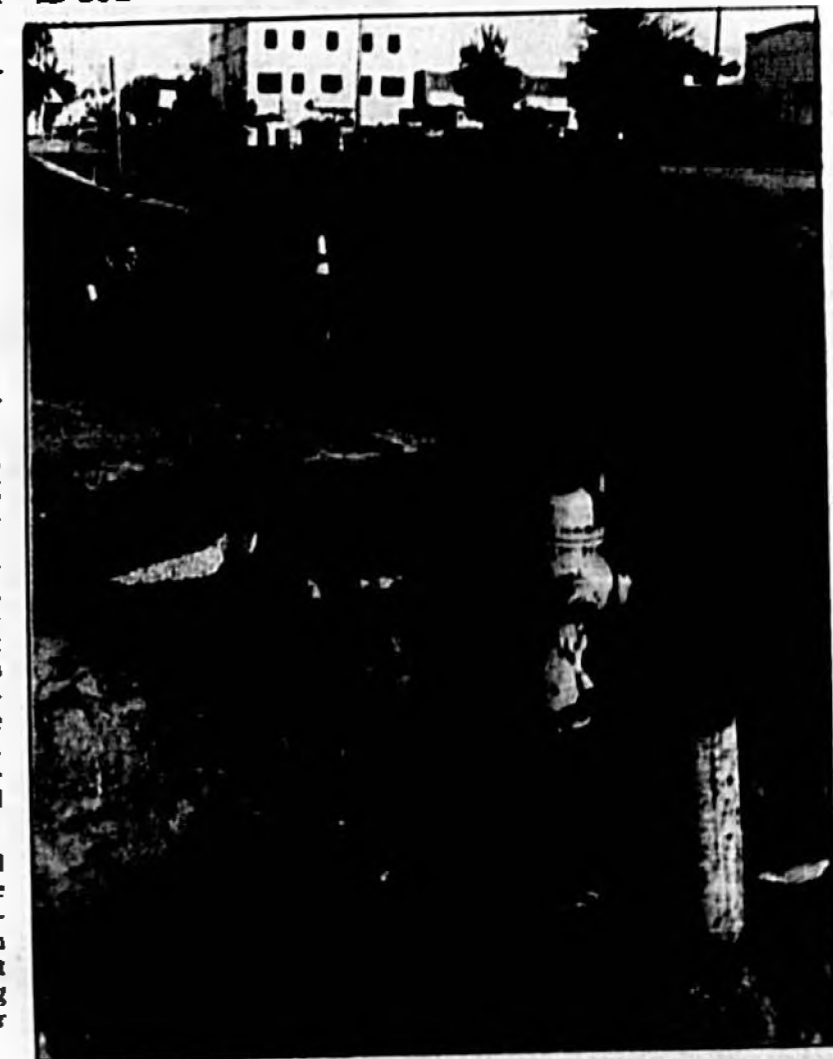
The storm system project began in May, and is expected to be complete by the middle of March, 1999. Compton, Porter, and Holmes Engineers Inc., as well as Maxwell Contracting Corporation is performing work for the city.

"It has caused some hindrance for traffic flow," support services coordinator for Sanford's Public Works Department Charles Hargrove said. "This is going to reduce the risk of future flooding, and relieve the drainage along First Street. Plus, people will see landscaped islands and improved irrigation."

From Oak Street to Sanford Avenue, Hargrove said the sidewalks are going to be repaired. Landscape islands with shrubbery and trees will be put in place. The granite curbing will be preserved, while water and sewer repairs are made.

Work will continue to Pine Avenue, Hargrove said.

### Army benefits increase

SANFORD - Army officials in Sanford have announced that maximum benefits under the Montgomery GI Bill plus the Army College Fund have been increased from \$40,000 to \$50,000 for persons who qualify for this program. The Army College Fund is available to applicants who qualify for selected Army skills.

According to Staff Sgt. Jeffrey J. Foster, station commander of the Sanford Recruiting Station, the Army has also announced revisions to its enlistment bonus program. Effective immediately, qualified applicants are eligible for a \$3,000 sign-up bonus, if they report to training between now and May 31, 1999. In the past, Army bonus incentives were targeted to specific critical specialties. These targeted bonus programs will remain in effect, offering up to \$12,000.

In some cases, applicants may be able to combine this new \$3,000 sign-up bonus with an existing enlistment bonus that targets a specific specialty. However, the total bonus amount cannot exceed \$6,000 for a three-year enlistment or \$12,000 for four or more years.

Thus Chanukah, "Dedication", commemorates the completion of the purification and re-dedication of the Temple in Jerusalem, after its recapture by Jewish rebels led by Judah Maccabee, one of the great warriors of Jewish history.

Antiochus IV, the leader of the occupying Syrian/Greek Seleucids, had demanded that the Jewish people abandon their faith and turn to idolatry. This blasphemy, allied to his desecration of the Temple, ignited the Jewish rebellion. Initially, the revolt took the form of guerrilla warfare but, in 164 B.C.E., Jewish forces were sufficiently powerful to drive the invaders from Jerusalem.

Jewish tradition states that the victors could find only one flask of the pure oil required for the menorah in the Temple and that this quantity was sufficient to keep the menorah alight for one day only. By a miracle, this single flask kept the flame burning throughout the eight days that were required to prepare new pure oil. **DEAR READER:** The basal temperature is a recognized and useful procedure that allows a person to obtain an accurate measurement of the body's temperature before exercise and eating. A woman's basal temperature varies slightly at the time she ovulates.

The diagnosis is easily made by blood tests and the condition is entirely treatable with thyroid supplement pills.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** Last summer my 34-year-old son contracted Legionnaire's disease. What is this?

**DEAR READER:** Legionnaire's disease is a form of pneumonia that begins as a flu-like illness and progresses to significant lung infection. It sometimes causes sharp chest pains (pleurisy) and diarrhea. The causative bacteria are usually killed by antibiotics, nonetheless, the death rate is surprisingly high and may reach 20

# WIN AT BRIDGE

**Different areas, different meanings**

By Phillip Alder

When your weatherperson tells you that it will be mild tonight, what conclusion do you draw?

We have been looking at second hand low. Well, here is a classic example. How should the play go in four spades? What do you think of the auction?

First, the bidding. I would prefer South to respond three hearts, a transfer bid showing at least five spades. That way, the strong hand becomes the declarer.

No doubt you noticed that three no-trump by North has nine top tricks. It is one of the game's imponderables: getting into three no-trump when having a nine-card (or better) fit in a major.

No one knows how to do it scientifically. The defense begins with three rounds of clubs, declarer ruffing the third. After drawing trumps, declarer has to avoid two heart losers. He leads a low heart from his hand. Now comes the key moment: West should play the two without a tremor.

Look at it from South's point of view. If he fineses the nine, he will hold his heart losers to one if West has either the king-10 or the queen-10. Putting in the jack works only when West has the king-queen. Two chances are twice as good as one. So, if West plays low smoothly, South is going down.

The answer to interpreting your weatherperson depends on where you live. In the northern half of the country, it will mean that it is going to be warmer than normal; perhaps above freezing for once. However, if you visit Florida, it means that it will be cooler than normal; perhaps low sixties instead of low seventies.
