We are hearing so much these days about the "next depression" that some of us are beginning to wonder what is the matter with the one we're in now.

May be the reason all these anti-German speeches are being made in this country all of a sudden is just to show that we really didn't mean it when we passed the neutrality act.

The President says the Supreme Court has been packed before. It's an old American custom. Well, Adams packed the court and Jefferson unpacked it, and the net effect of that was that we got the Madison-Marbury case which first gave the Supreme Court the powers Roosevelt is now kicking about. Jackson packed Roger B. Taney into the Supreme Court as a great liberal. And he's the fellow who handed down the Dred Scott decision that we're hearing so much about these days.—Dorothy Thompson.

So having made the mistake at least twice before, the proper thing to do is to make it again.

One of the cleverest remarks we have read in the supreme-court revision controversy came from a Danian man writing to the Miami News. He said that the new belief that 15 Supreme Court judges can read through a given number of cases much faster than nine is the same as thinking 15 men could run a mile more quickly than nine could, or that 15 could eat their breakfast more quickly than could nine. But no one believes that speeding up justice is the idea back of the proposed change. What is wanted is a court favorable to the New Deal; a court that will disregard the constitution of the United States at the request of the President.—Melbourne Times.

Keeping Out Of War
The date of May 12th has been selected by the foreign experts as the occasion for another of Hitler's spectacular surprises, and this time, according to the experts, the next European war will begin. May 12th is "coronation day" in London and most of the leading statesmen of the world will be in London attending the ceremonies surrounding the crowning of King George VI. Hitler will suddenly move his troops into Czechoslovakia hoping to establish a "fait accompli" there exactly as he did in the Rhineland, and to get away with it in exactly the same way.

But probably because most of the experts agree that this will happen on May 12th, it won't. The Bible tells us in effect that no one will know when Judgment Day is to come. If everyone knows, Judgment Day will likely be deferred. It would hardly be in keeping with Hitler's famous "Saturday surprises" if this time everyone should be prepared for it in advance even though they appeared to be carelessly and unsuspectingly attending the coronation ceremonies.

But to say that Hitler will not move against Czechoslovakia on May 12th is not to say that he won't do it at all. He is certain to sooner or later. He is only awaiting the opportune time to strike. Probably the opportune time will not come until victory for the rebel cause, upon which Hitler and Mussolini have staked so much, is assured in Spain. Probably, too, Hitler will hope that revolution or civil strife of some kind will be taking place in Central Europe.

But whether everything is exactly to his liking or not, Hitler's power over the German people depends upon his coming to the aid of the two and a half million Germans already living in Czechoslovakia and in securing possession of this broad highway to the Russian Ukraine, the rich farmlands which form another of his promises to the Nazis. Germany may not yet be fully prepared for such wars of conquest, but she is nearer the peak of her power than those countries now arming to forestall her ambitions.

And so war looms on the European horizon, and the United States Congress passes a Neutrality Act designed to keep us out of it. This law would prevent American munition factories from selling guns or other armaments of war to any foreign power engaged in hostilities. It may also be used to prevent us from selling anything at all to any other nation engaged in war. It may mean that when war breaks out in Europe, practically all the foreign trade of our cotton and tobacco farmers, our wheat and beef growers, as well as our munition makers, will be destroyed.

But all the Neutrality Acts in the world will not keep us out of war if prominent Americans persist in openly abusing foreign powers in the manner we have seen during the past few days. Germany today presumably, is a friendly power, but that did not prevent Mayor LaGuardia of New York from publicly denouncing the German government, or John Lewis and Gen. Johnson from ridiculing German leaders. If they would say these things now, what would they say after the guns start booming?

And if the people themselves are not going to remain neutral, what chance has the government of being neutral, or keeping us out of war?

Tenant Farmers
Florida has 20,399 tenant farmers comprising 25 percent of all farm operators in the state, according to a release from the Department of Agriculture. Tenancy in the nation is increasing at the rate of about 40,000 farmers per year, due largely to the recent agricultural depression, mortgages based on inflated land values, crop failure, drought, and floods.

"Lack of opportunities for farm ownership and evils resulting from instability of land tenure can only result in a rapidly increasing depletion of soil resources and growing farm poverty," the Agricultural Department says. Farmers in temporary occupancy, knowing that any improvements they may make will automatically revert to the landlord on termination of tenure, have little interest in the future of the land.

An important beginning in halting increasing farm tenancy and in laying the basis for increased farm ownership has been made through the rural rehabilitation program. More than 6,000 farmers in the state, the majority in the tenant class, are being assisted through loans, supervised farm and home plans, co-operative services, and farm debt adjustment, laying the basis for future farm ownership.

Electrocution To Solve Problem Of Apple Moths
ORLEANS, Ind., Mar. 17.—(AP)—Electrocution may solve the growing problem of controlling codling moths, no longer checked by sprays. The moths are the cause of most wormy apples.

Some experts believe the moth which lays the egg which hatches the worm which bores into the apple has developed an immunity to a large number of sprays.

Another contends it has become smart and "learned to spit out the first bite of apple skin, then eat its way merrily into the apple."

Agricultural engineers think light traps with which they have been experimenting on farms near here may be the answer. The traps resemble Japanese lanterns. Each contains an elec-

Position Plan Is Halted Locally By Rail Workers
TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Mar. 17.—(AP)—A plan to reduce the number of railroad employees in Florida by 10,000 has been halted locally by the Florida Railway Employees' Association.

The plan, which was being administered by the railroad retirement board, called for the elimination of 10,000 positions by the end of 1937.

"TOO LATE TO CLIMB"

Floridians who would like to "see themselves in other clothes" will find it both interesting and instructive to read "This is Florida," last article in the Mar. 13 issue of the Saturday Evening Post.

I've reviewed many articles on Florida, appearing from time to time in national magazines, but this one from the pen of Gene Garrett, in my opinion is one of the best. It reveals the true personality of our State as reflected in the everyday action and activities of our citizens.

Some folks won't like it, others will gloat over part of it and condemn the rest—but nevertheless I consider it a pretty accurate survey. Every Floridian ought to read it and then re-read it, for as Garrett states: "Floridians are themselves strangers in Florida."

Local pride is a wonderful thing and necessary for the advancement of any community, but it should never be permitted to so dominate us that it warps our vision of the State as a whole. The greatest glory of Florida is not centered at any one spot. Pensacola is as much Florida as Key West, Miami, Jacksonville, Orlando, Tampa and a score of other centers each possessing distinctive and individual charms and advantages, but they are not Florida. Florida is the whole and the section that appeals to anyone may not appeal to another, yet the welfare and progress of us all is found in the single package wrapped and labeled "FLORIDA."

Sectionalism and party jealousy, between cities and sections serve only to annoy and disgrace the visitor. Just as the guest in your home can be made uncomfortable by eternal family bickering and backbiting, so can the tourist and prospective investor become distracted by the stunts and sneers cast by Floridians against Floridians.

Keenly interesting was Gene Garrett's comment on the cross state canal, a subject difficult for Floridians to discuss and one on which very few have any intelligent unbiased information, due to its controversial nature and the vast amount of propaganda that has been spread by both sides.

As a disinterested commentator who, on occasion, carries some of the situation by pointing out the idea is not now the French thought of it when they proposed Florida.

Strikes Threaten France's Popular Front Government
PARIS, Mar. 17.—(AP)—The Popular Front Government has announced that it will continue to maintain its policy of non-intervention in the workers' strike in Italy in which five persons were killed and at least 200 wounded in a bloody struggle between Communists, mobile guards and rightists that brought a one-hour strike of workers at the grounds of the forthcoming Paris International Exposition and at several commercial establishments, protest against deaths and arrests of the Communists.

Other strikes, possibly general, are threatened tomorrow. Members of Parliament filed notice they would question Premier Leon Blum's administration for the handling of the riots, most sanguinary in Paris in three years.

Loyalist Planes In Mass Attack On Rebel Units
Returning Airmen Report Demolition Of 2 Entire Cities

MADRID, Mar. 17.—(AP)—A Government report today said its planes had demolished the important towns of Sigüenza, Brihuega and Triunfo behind insurgent front lines in the Guadalajara sector.

Outlining the success of its campaign of terror to demoralize what was described as Italian peasant soldiers, the Government declared eight tons of bombs were dropped and a 1,000,000 machine gun bullets fired into the retreating ranks of the disorganized insurgents on the northeastern front.

25 bi-motored bombers and 50 pursuit planes were reported to have been massed into one gigantic fleet for the raid.

Returning airmen said they could see from the sky the towns of Sigüenza and Brihuega were only wastes and smoking ruins after the terrific bombardment.

Two Million French Hold 'Kick' Strike

Protest Death Of 5 In Recent Rioting; Activities In Paris Stopped

Minor Clashes Mark First Day

Bitter Attack Are Expected Against Blum Government

PARIS, Mar. 18.—(AP)—A general strike of 2,000,000 workers in protest against "Fascist assassins" they accused of killing five leftists in a bloody street battle in Paris today.

For half the day, marked by numerous minor clashes in the City's streets but no serious disorders, workers demonstrated their power to enforce demands for the destruction of "Fascism" in France.

All factories, most shops, restaurants and offices were closed until noon by a general strike, called by the General Confederation of Workers in protest over the "massacre of Clémence" Tuesday night and early yesterday when armed police charged Communist street barricades in the workers' suburb, outside a rightist mass meeting.

In the capital itself, about 1,000,000 persons joined the strike which, until the deadline at 11 A. M., stopped traffic.

So complete was the paralysis that the morning session of the Chamber of Deputies, where a bitter attack is expected on Premier Blum's government over the Clémence case, was reported.

Communism Is Condemned By Pope Pius

Holy Father Asserts Doctrine Is Ruin Of Family, Shakes Bases Of Society

VATICAN CITY, Mar. 18.—(AP)—Pope Pius XI condemned Communism as "the ruin of the family and society" in a lengthy encyclical issued today.

The Holy Father, in a vigorous attack on the forces he has fought over throughout his recent serious illness, declared only the Catholic can effectively oppose what he termed the "ravages of an anti-God campaign which shakes society to its very foundation."

He devoted several paragraphs to demonstrating how the Catholic Religion in the family and the state was the best equipped agent to combat Communism which, he asserted, "will precipitate one and all to ruin and catastrophe."

The Holy Father called upon Christian employers to combat Communism by recognizing "the inalienable rights of the working man."

Loyal Forces Lose Heavily Near Madrid

Mine Explosions Signal Inauguration Of Huge Assault Under Artillery

MADRID, Mar. 18.—(AP)—Government infantrymen, charging insurgent positions after exploding five mines under a clinical hospital, suffered heavy casualties today in bitter fighting in the University City Sector.

The blasts, by which the Government sought to drive barricaded insurgents from the fortified outposts, signalled a general assault under cover of an artillery barrage.

As fighting progressed, Madrid commanders received word of a new insurgent drive in Cordoba Province near Pozoblanco.

Government troops were seeking to prevent insurgent columns from reaching the rich mercury mines near Almaden, advisers reported.

Government planes raked insurgent lines with machine gun fire and opposing columns clashed in hand-to-hand fighting, commanders declared.

Negroes Rescue White Man After Plunge In Lake

Walter Russell, Sanford cigar maker, was rescued from Lake Monroe late yesterday afternoon after being awakened from a nap on the bulkhead and plunging into the water.

Fire Chief Mack Cleveland, whose department was summoned to the scene, said Russell had been aroused from his slumber by an associate of the cigar business.

Negro women on the bulkhead said Russell apparently had been asleep, lying near the water. He was awakened by his associate, then rolled over and dived into the lake.

A negro man who was passing dived into the water and fished out Russell, boosting him high enough to be reached and pulled to safety by his own land.

A second negro ran to the Fire Department with a flare, but the white man was being hauled onto dry land just as firemen arrived.

Early today the Department answered an alarm from a residence near Eighth Street and Elm Avenue where a leaking burner on an oil stove caused the kitchen to catch fire.

Chief Cleveland said approximately \$25 in damage was sustained.

An inspection disclosed that the burner had been dripping kerosene for probably several days and the kitchen floor beneath the stove was well saturated with the fuel.

The fire chief reported that flames ate their way through the ceiling and into a room on the second story, although the damage here was confined principally to smoked walls.

Florida Boom Is Under Way, Says Former Resident

T. V. Lewis, field representative of Chimney Rock Camp, North Carolina, was in Sanford today, calling on boys who have previously attended the camp, and their parents, and predicted an unusually successful season for the camp this summer.

"This has been a great season for Florida," Mr. Lewis said. "There have been more tourists here than ever before. Transportation agencies, hotels, apartments, places of amusement have been crowded to capacity. In some parts of the State a veritable building boom is under way. The future looks bright for Florida."

Mr. Lewis said that the Chimney Rock Camp is located on Lake Ruck 19 miles from Hendersonville, and is the property of Beese Combs of Miami, a former resident of Apopka and Sanford, who directs its many activities. Last year 125 boys between the ages of 8 and 16 availed themselves of its privileges.

Among the more popular sports engaged in at Chimney Rock are swimming, boating, archery, baseball, basketball, riding, tennis, golf, basketball, and camping. The camp staff consists of experienced executives and counselors who are also teachers of the boys and a doctor, nurse and camp mother who look after the boys' physical well-being.

"There is no better place in the world than Chimney Rock Camp for boys to develop into the right type of manhood," Mr. Lewis said.

Globe-Girdling Flier Averages 150 MPH On All-Night Hop Ending In Honolulu

HONOLULU, Mar. 18.—(AP)—Amelia Earhart landed her globe-girdling "flying laboratory" at Wheeler Field at 8:29 A. M. Pacific standard time today (11:29 AEST) completing the 2,400-mile overwater hop from Oakland, Calif., in less than 16 hours.

The aviatrix and her crew of three thus averaged better than 150 miles an hour on the night flight which began in Oakland at 4:37 P. M. T. yesterday.

A time of 15 hours, 51 1-2 minutes was made through the cloudy skies and occasional showers without mishap.

Miss Earhart's \$80,000 craft arrived over the city at an altitude of 1,500 feet at 8:17 A. M. P. S. T.

The Earhart plane left Oakland after the departure of two Pan-American clippers but it passed the slower, heavier ships enroute.

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Poultrymen's Unit May Be Formed In Seminole County

Seminole County poultrymen were called today to meet in Seminole High School Mar. 25 for further discussions on methods to improve prices on meats and eggs.

Preliminary steps toward the formation of a poultrymen's association were taken recently. It is contemplated to organize the unit at the forthcoming meeting.

Beyond efforts to improve prices, the association would be a medium for distributing important information to poultrymen.

It was estimated that approximately 150 poultry businesses are in operation in Seminole County or near enough to show an effect here.

Alex R. Johnson, one of the leaders in the project, is seeking to include the small volume dealer as much as the larger business.

Florida Potatoes Seized; Mistagged; Says U. S. Bureau

The Florida State Marketing Bureau in Sanford reported today that several shipments of Florida potatoes had been seized in the north because they were misbranded.

Provisions in the Food and Drug Act make it possible to confiscate such vegetables tagged U. S. No. 1 if each unit is found to contain as high as 30 percent defective stock.

A suggestion was made by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics that receivers point out incorrect grade statements on sacks, remove misleading tags, or transfer potatoes to plain bags if necessary. When such action is necessary, there appears to be no good reason for not charging the expense to the shipper.

The Bureau said that flagrant or repeated violation of the Food and Drug Act may result in the confiscation of entire carloads and the citation of the shipper or handler for criminal prosecution.

100 Local Teachers Attend Convention Opening In Orlando

More than 100 teachers in Seminole County public schools were attending the annual convention of the Florida Educational Association in Orlando today. T. W. Lawton, County superintendent, announced this morning.

Eight instructors from educational institutions in this section have prominent parts on the three-day program.

Classroom work was suspended yesterday to enable teachers to attend the conclave. School will be resumed Monday morning.

Only whites present at the convention, Mr. Lawton said, explaining that negro instructors have an association of their own.

Woodmen Will Plan To Participate In Lakeland Ceremony

It is expected that several applications for membership will be accepted. Twelve have been taken since the Sanford unit inaugurated a membership drive a week ago. A goal of 20 is set.

Florida Husbands May Get Alimony

FORT LAUDERDALE, Mar. 18.—(AP)—Representative Dwight L. Rogers said today he would offer a bill in the Legislature next month to make husbands eligible for alimony from their wives.

Seminole County Citrus Industry Aids Record Crop

Seminole County citrus growers are contributing their share to the record grapefruit yield of 17,500,000 boxes of fruit which the State is expected to produce this year, the Crop Reporting Board said yesterday in Orlando.

The Florida crop was the chief factor in swelling total grapefruit production for the country to an estimated 26,413,000 boxes—far more than the national record mark of 21,357,000 boxes in 1921.

The Bureau of Agricultural Economics reported prospective production for all Florida oranges, including tangerines, 21,500,000 boxes, a record compared with the 19,000,000 boxes in 1935 and with the five-year average of 15,910,000 boxes.

Florida's five-year average grapefruit yield was 11,257,000 boxes and last season only 11,500,000 boxes were grown.

Gatchel To Attend Association Meet In Tampa Tonight

Forrest Gatchel, director of the Florida Better Business Association, was slated to leave here this afternoon for Tampa where he will attend a directors' meeting of the organization tonight.

The house contained six or eight rooms.

Take Final Steps To Remove Barrier To Wallie's Decree

LONDON, Mar. 18.—(AP)—The King's procer, in what was interpreted by legal authorities as a step to remove the last legal barrier from Mrs. Wallie Simpson's final decree divorce, applied today for instructions on procedure to the president of the divorce court, Sir Boyd Merriam. No details were disclosed.

Tomorrow's official court case list contained a listing of the case for 10:30 A. M.

The step was considered unusual, because the routine method of handing unfunded cases, such as that of Simpson's is automatic with the announcement of a final decree six months after the intermediary decree is handed down. In Mrs. Simpson's case, this would be Apr. 27.

Fifty WPA Workmen Are Employed For High School Field

More than 50 WPA workmen were employed today on the High School Athletic Field improvement project. W. S. Earle, work director for Seminole County, announced this morning.

A crew of laborers yesterday afternoon began turning over ground preparatory to grading and leveling for the construction of three new tennis courts. One is in existence already.

Mr. Earle said other workers are occupied with grading a football field and a diamond-shaped field.

'Phonies' Are Object Of Security Board Warning

The Regional Social Security Board from Birmingham issued a warning today urging Seminole County to beware of "social security correspondence schools."

Henry C. McGill, field representative of the Social Security Board in Jacksonville, reported the conviction of two men in the western part of the United States.

The pair was attempting to escape and defraud by misrepresenting themselves as Government officials. Each of the couple was sentenced to 15 months in the penitentiary.

Such courses are being offered by mail and personal solicitation—in some cases by salesmen posing as Government officials. It is said Mr. McGill continued.

"Cases have been reported that money has been paid for 'training courses' for Social Security jobs. Apparently this is a sort of racket and is being investigated by Federal authorities. These salesmen neglect to tell their prospects that completion of such private courses of instruction does not remove the necessity for meeting civil service requirements."

Attention also is called to the fact that the Social Security Board does not make appointments in State agencies which administer Federal-State programs under the Social Security Act. These appointments are made directly through the State agency itself.

"The Civil Service Commission joins the Board in condemning the fraudulent activities of these training course salesmen because sales efforts are being directed chiefly to unemployed and persons with limited incomes."

"Incidentally," Mr. McGill concluded, "the Board now has on file more than 35,000 applications for positions, including several thousand from this State."

Railroad Pension Assessment Seen As Insufficient

Railroad circles here learned today that the U. S. Treasury Department considered that "issues proposed to finance the railroad pension system are too low."

From Washington the Associated Press reported Acting Secretary Roswell Magill as saying that studies indicated the levies (five percent) "would fall considerably short of meeting the required payments."

He added that Congress may find it necessary to modify the rates somewhat, a proposition to which management and labor chiefs registered dissent.

Rail executives and labor interests only this week hit upon an agreement for the retirement of railway employees after they reach 60 years of age, or have had 30 years service.
