Whirly Heads West To Take More Money

Wright's Galloping Treasury Is Out To Top Seabiscuit

This is a little note of warning to the three-year-olds in the West—head for the storm cellars, boys.

Whirlyway's on the way.

Having mopped up all the worthwhile east in the East, toppling it off with \$3,975 in the last running of the Dwyer at Aqueduct Saturday, Warren was shipped to Chicago this week for the next stop at his target practice at Seabiscuit's all-time money winning record of \$457,730.

He'll take a crack at the classic at Arlington Park and the American derby at Washington, each worth about \$40,000. And from the way he has walked through the best of the lot at the Kentucky derby, the Preakness, the Belmont Stakes and the Dwyer, it looks like the three-year-old who might beat him either never was born or is now being equipped with a special 12-cylinder airplane motor to turn the trick.

The two Chicago affairs, if he wins them—and who wants to put up a bob or two he doesn't?—would boost the Kentucky cannonball's earnings to some \$225,000. Yesterday's pay envelope, although not as large as usual, raised his two-year racing bankroll to \$344,136. After the Windy City wars, Whirlyway will be sent back east for the Saratoga social and galloping season in August, with the approximately \$71,000 Travers as his No. 1 appointment and the gold cup as a possible added attraction. He'll also take a whirl at Belmont's Fall prizes before wrapping up his three-year-old crown.

If there had been any lingering doubt about his seat at the Lead of the class—and don't forget there still are some folk willing to bet even against death and just about cleared it up, yesterday. This was no record smashing job like he did in the derby, although he did lower the state mark to 2:03 2-5 for the mile-and-a-quarter. And it wasn't any lightning fast move like he made in the Preakness, or a front-running canter as he had in the Belmont.

German Attack Seen As Blow At World

NEW YORK, June 23 —(AP)—Leaders of the Communist Party in the United States described the German assault on Soviet Russia Sunday night as an attack not only upon the Russian people but upon the people of the United States and the entire world.

"It (Russia) is waging a struggle for the cause of the freedom of all nations and peoples of all nations and peoples," said a statement issued by William Z. Foster, party chairman and Robert Minor, acting party secretary.

Turkey Stays Neutral But Leans To Nazis

ANKARA, June 23 —(AP)—Turkey remained officially neutral in the new war between Russia and Germany yesterday, but disclosed new friendship ties with Germany.

(The Rome radio reported Turkey had proclaimed a state of siege.)

Foreign Minister Saracoglu announced a commercial treaty with Germany would be concluded quickly as an aftermath of the non-aggression pact the two countries signed June 18. Turkey already had a friendship treaty with Russia and a non-belligerent alliance with Britain.

JACKSONVILLE, June 23 —(AP)—Florida building permits in May totaled \$7,113,814, an increase over May, 1940, of \$275,028, the Florida Chamber of Commerce reported yesterday.

Permits for the first five months of the year amounted to \$31,861,917, as against \$31,384,708 for the corresponding period of 1940.

House Group Approves Two Strike Bills

Statutory Sanction For Defense Mediation Board Would Be Given By Body

Shipyard Workers Continue Strike

Government's Efforts To Halt Trouble Are Unsuccessful

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—Legislation to give statutory sanction to the National Defense Mediation Board and to empower President Roosevelt to order maintenance of the status quo for 90 days in a defense strike was approved today by the House Naval Committee.

The bill was a substitute for legislation by Chairman Vinson (D-Ga.) to require a 30-day cooling off period before a defense strike could begin.

San Francisco striking machinists remained aloof to the government's efforts to persuade them to enroll under federal civil service and return to the struck shipyards on San Francisco Bay.

Other craftsmen returned to work as usual, in large numbers, but there was no response by the A. F. L. or C. I. O. machinists who have been on strike against 11 shipyards holding huge building and repair contracts.

Defense Secretary Stimson said he would urge the strikers to keep away from the shipyards until tomorrow night when all issues will be discussed.

Reflected in an effort to get strikes in A. F. L. and C. I. O. shipyards, the Navy took steps yesterday to supply the shipyards with a number of yards from government civil service lists.

Meanwhile however, the Bethlehem Shipbuilding Company, one of 11 shipyards, and the dockers affected by the strike, agreed to sign a tentative contract negotiated by the A. F. L. metal trades, and there was speculation that this might bring an end to the strike.

The other strike-bound yards already had accepted the agreement. Bethlehem's failure to sign had been cited by the strikers as one reason for refusing to return to work.

Crashes Feature Model Airplane Meet At Tampa

Despite rainy weather, too much wind and a bumpy field, the Tampa model airplane meet held Sunday under the sponsorship of the Tampa Morning Tribune, was a success. W. D. Hoffmann, one of the competitors, said today.

About 65 planes entered the meet and almost half that many suffered damage. Hoffmann declared two new models came together in a crash that separated and continued on the ground.

Second Selective Service Registration Slated July 1 At Draft Board Office

Local Selective Service officials declared yesterday to hold the second registration, July 1, at the draft board office on Second Street, between Park and Magnolia Avenues, based on the office on the corner of Second Street and Magnolia Avenue as first contemplated, the board secretary announced today.

All men who have reached the age of 21 years since the last registration and those who will be 21 before July 1 are expected to register. The instructions of the board state, "About 150 men are expected to be eligible for the second draft registration to take place between 9 a. m. and 7 p. m. on July 1."

According to the estimate of the board's headquarters, the new registration is expected to amount to about 150 men. The first registration in the first year of the war was held in October of last year over 2,700 men registered, making it probable that 150 men are expected to be eligible for the second registration.

Hess Sought To End War, Benes States

Former Number 3 Nazi Said To Believe That Germany Would Lose

LONDON, June 24 (AP)—Former President Eduard Benes of Czechoslovakia said today in a broadcast to his people that Rudolf Hess' flight to Britain was the result of a six-month dispute among the Nazi leaders over what they should do next since, he said, they knew they could not defeat Britain.

Benes pictured the on-time Number 3 Nazi as believing that continuation of the war would lead to a German defeat, and made the trip to Scotland with the belief that he could persuade the British to stop hostilities.

Benes asserted Hitler's "mistake" in invading Russia removed the specter of a Nazi victory and decided the issue of the war.

The Royal Air Force, taking advantage of Germany's war with Russia, stepped up its cross-channel offensive yesterday with one of its greatest sweeps of the French coastal area.

Heavy explosions rumbled across the Straits of Dover after a four-hour bombardment on Sunday evening. The daylight attack followed the thirteenth consecutive night of heavy raids on northwestern Germany. Observers on the southern coast reported that "exceedingly strong" formations of bombers and fighters swarmed eastward for the long and intense attack.

Eighteen German fighters were shot down, 11 in the evening and seven in the afternoon, with a loss of only four British planes. The claimed bag of enemy planes in eight days of such attacks rose to 116 compared to an admitted loss of 32 R. A. F. planes.

The British airmen said they ran into less German opposition than they had expected. The German air force put a heavy drain on its western front to help the campaign on the eastern front.

The Ministry said Blenheim bombers escorted by squadrons of fighters attacked northern France, bombing among other objectives, and industrial plant at Dunkirk, which is 45 miles inland from the Calais area.

500 Soviet Aircraft Destroyed By Germany's Luftwaffe; Three Towns Taken

'On To Moscow,' Spaniards Shout

U. S. S. R. Is Greeted As Ally By Eden In Commons Speech

ANKARA, Turkey, June 24 (AP)—German Panzer columns drove 120 miles into the Russian Ukraine in the first two days of the Nazi invasion, according to reports received here today by foreign military attaches.

This pivotal Nazi attack launched from southern Poland, designed to cut off the greater part of Russia's rich grainlands, was reported to be moving with astonishing speed. Nazi troops privately asserted 500 Russian airplanes had been destroyed on the ground in the first 36 hours of an extensive Luftwaffe bombardment.

Military attaches envisaged the conquest of Kiev in six weeks. Sweeping drives of the Nazi armored columns into the Russian Ukraine and through the Red Army's defenses to the north were indicated today by diverse reports which accompanied fresh manifestations of Axis sympathy in Japan and Spain.

In the center of the 2,000-mile front, the spearhead has penetrated about 125 miles in a thrust through Kiev-Litovsk toward Minsk, it was asserted at Ankara.

From Berlin came word that German blitzkrieg had driven through a strong line of Soviet bunkers in a thrust which the Red Army's defenses had broken down.

Undoubtedly, it is paraded in Madrid that the German blitzkrieg has driven through the Spanish defenses, according to reports from Tokyo which said Japanese troops had landed in the Philippines.

In London, Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden warmly welcomed the news of the Soviet commitment to the Allies. He said that the British House of Commons would be held in session on Monday to discuss the situation.

Hitler Will Turn On Italy, Mayor States

NEW YORK, June 24. (AP)—Mayor La Guardia predicted Monday that Adolf Hitler sooner or later would turn upon another back-sworder—Italy.

After asserting that the German attack upon Russia was deliberate and preconcerted, the mayor, who is also national director of civilian defense, answered questions on the new European situation with this comment:

"I predict now that there will either be a complete surrender or turning over of complete control of the economy of Italy, or else he (Hitler) is going to do the same thing to Italy. That is just a part of a program to dominate first of all Europe, then set into Asia and Africa."
