WASHINGTON (UPI) — Most Americans will turn the clock ahead one hour next Sunday, April 26, but not until the middle of daylight saving time. The "fast time" becomes effective officially at 3 a.m. EDT on April 26, but the Department of Transportation, which regulates time zones across the country, suggests setting the clock ahead before retiring Saturday night, April 25.

Water Line Authority OK Delay Could Cost Cities \$

Delay in passing legislation creating a "South Seminole-North Orange water transmission authority" during the current session of the legislature could cost the cities of Casselberry, Winter Springs, Maitland and Winter Park \$400,000 in engineering costs and \$1.1 million in construction costs, city advisers and elected officials told the Seminole County Legislative Delegation Friday.

The delegation approved the legislation, but reserved the right to amend the bill or even open it after further study. The Orange County Legislative Delegation has already introduced the legislation in the state Senate.

The proposed 15-page legislative act provides for creation of an authority to own and operate the transmission line, lift stations and force mains, connected to sewer lines in the four cities and the unincorporated area of southeast Seminole County to carry sewage to the planned Orlando Area Bridge regional sewer plant. The authority would be composed of representatives of the five governing bodies and would be empowered to receive federal funding for 75 per cent of the project's cost.

FLORIDA IN BRIEF

Budget Battle: Principle, Not Money, Center-Stage

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Some of the hardest fighting among legislators put together a \$6 billion-plus state budget in the coming weeks will be over principle, not money. There are a few big dollar issues — education funding and the formula to distribute it fairly among big and poor counties; and the Senate leadership's insistence on a \$60 million reserve fund for emergencies that could come up.

But there are a host of highly-emotional issues involving relatively insignificant appropriations. The House, for example, is refusing to give \$200,000 to Florida Legal Services for legal help to prison inmates and welfare recipients. The Senate wants the program funded. House members approved \$1.8 million for supplemental welfare payments to poor women pregnant with their first child. Senators did not.

Home Medical \$ For Elderly

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — The state Health and Rehabilitative Services Department has launched a new program designed to help pay for medical care of the elderly in their own homes. Titled "Home Care for the Elderly," a demonstration project was recently begun in HRS' seven-county District IV. The objective of the project is to develop a statewide program that will allow elderly people who would otherwise have to be institutionalized to remain in their homes and receive adequate care, said project director Elizabeth Lee. Home care payments range from a high of \$240 to a low of \$54 depending on the recipient's income.

Aid Pollution Plan?

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — For the first time since 1971, the state's financially-plagued air pollution control program may get needed relief from the Legislature. After the House and Senate Appropriations Committee indicate they will approve money for repairing frequently malfunctioning testing equipment and hiring more technicians to review the data.

the Jews until I saw the program," Penn conceded. "I don't know if it could happen again, but I hope not. I feel sorry for the people who had to go through that..."

"We discussed it in class, but we were not required to watch. My teacher thought it was very biased and as did I. I don't really know if watching this film could happen again," said Cathy.

"I was aware they did a lot of stuff, but didn't think they treated them that bad," said Susanna Jones, Lakeview eighth-grader, who watched part of the series.

"I think the Germans had something against their religion, but I don't think they really had a good motive for what they did."

"Our teacher discussed the program with us some and said we would be studying it later on. Could this happen again? 'Sure, anything could happen someday,' she responded."

"I couldn't say why they were that cruel and mean," said Lakeview eighth-grader Robbie Slavens, who watched part of "The Holocaust."

"There must have been some other way other than that for them to try and kill all the Jews."

"Before I watched 'Holocaust,' I didn't know they were killed off, I thought they were put in concentration camps and killed."

Only students disagreed on the later.

I don't think it will change the beliefs of the non-Jewish people. They will say they don't like what happened, but they won't change their beliefs."

"Yes, it is a definite possibility. Any time an insane man like Hitler comes to power with his armies and all, anything is possible if you can back it up," said Bob Rock, the fifth.

"If people don't care enough about their government and want to go on, and if people don't have their own morals instead of depending on others, it could happen again," said Stacey Coulter.

"I don't see how human beings can be so mean to each other," said Glenn Beaman, Lyman High fifth grader, who watched the entire film.

"The feeling I got was that the Germans needed a scapegoat," said Scott Andrews, 888 senior, "and the Jews were theirs."

"In the first place Hitler despised them and needed someone to blame all their troubles on."

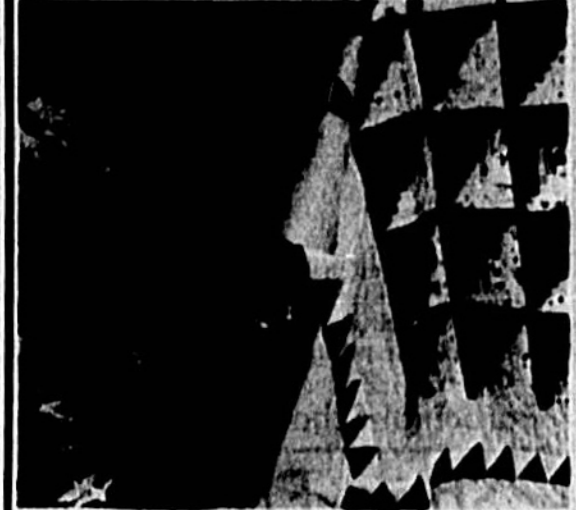

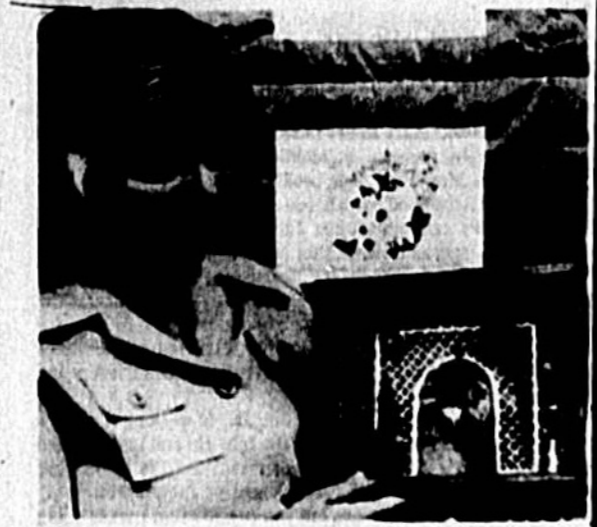

Heathrow Hassle: What's It All About?

If Seminole County commissioners stick with a straw ballot taken recently, they will officially turn down a proposal from Lake Mary to settle the nine-month-old lawsuit challenging the annexation by Lake Mary of a 1,600-acre tract, including the Heathrow Planned Unit Development owned by Jeno Paulucci Enterprises.

The decision is to be made Tuesday, but commissioners Dick Williams, Bill Kirchhoff and Harry Kwasnikowski in the straw ballot indicated they are not interested in compromising on the issue.

The city, at the urging of Paulucci Enterprises

Attorney Joe Davis, offered to return county jurisdiction through de-annexation 40 acres of the parcel west of Banana Lake. The de-annexation would eliminate what the county claimed is an enclave narrowing access to county residents in the Banana Lake area.

The Lake Mary annexation, including the word "enclave" which the commission would like to have officially defined by the courts.

"The court would probably look first for some cases in the United States in which the word enclave is defined," said Davis, who has been Attorney Springs city attorney for more than 20 years and is Orlando city attorney, in addition to representing Paulucci Enterprises.

"If no precedent or case decision on the word exists, the court will then look to the most common

definition, probably in the dictionary," said Davis.

"Enclave: a territorial or culturally distinct unit enclosed within foreign territory," is the definition in the Merriam-Webster dictionary. In addition, the dictionary defines the word "enclosed" as "to shut up, or in, to surround with a fence."

"Presumably the legislature by not including a

definition of enclave in the statute knew what the word meant of assumed others would understand the English language," said Davis, a former legislator.

Lake Mary has taken the position, the same as other cities in the county, that an enclave is a county area completely surrounded by city territory. The county's position has been that an enclave is a county area wholly or partially surrounded by city territory.

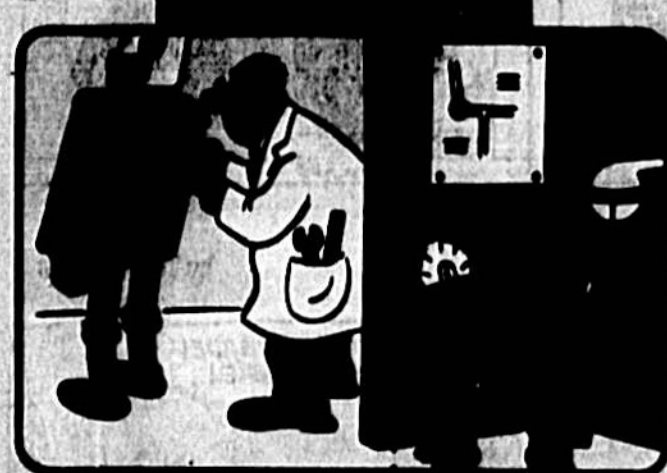
The city annexed the tract on July 21, 1977 on petition of Paulucci Enterprises and others for not only Heathrow but also a proposed industrial park area on the west side of I-4.

Immediately after adoption of the annexation ordinance, the county commission filed a lawsuit against Lake Mary insisting the annexation did not comply with state law because an enclave was created and the property was not contiguous to other city land.

Davis and City Attorney Gary Messer contended that neither of the county charges was true, that the property was plainly contiguous and that the word "enclave" is not defined in the law and has not been defined by the courts.

After the litigation was in the circuit court in Seminole County, Davis, on behalf of Paulucci Enterprises, was permitted by the circuit court to enter the suit as another defendant on Lake Mary's

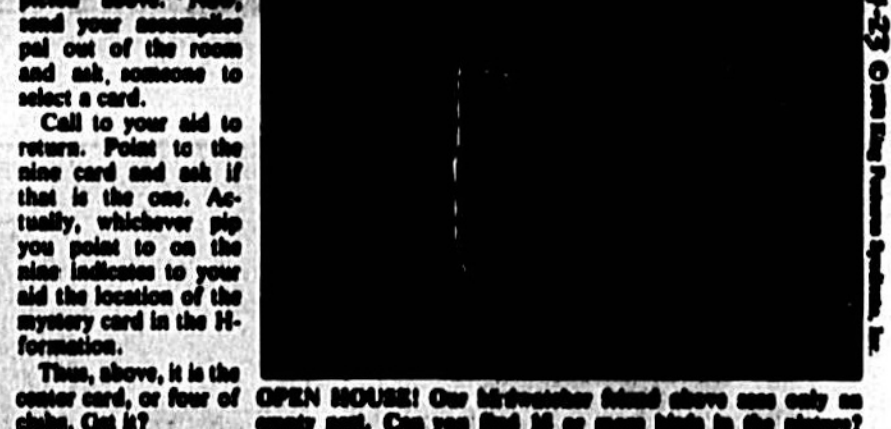

Soviet Rocket Falls

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (UPI) — A Soviet rocket shortly after liftoff Sunday and either burned up or fell into the ocean south of Africa, scientists said today.

A spokesman for the North American Air Defense Command's Space Defense Center said the satellite, one of 1,000 orbiting the earth, re-entered the earth's atmosphere about 5:30 p.m. MST Sunday.

"There were no visual sightings so we don't know if any pieces of it came down in the ocean or not," said Capt. Tom Koch. "It is quite possible it burned up in the atmosphere."

Koch said the satellite re-entered the atmosphere at a point 53 degrees north and 18 degrees west, which would be south of Africa and east of the southern tip of South America.

The estimate of where the satellite would have re-entered could be off by as much as 4,000 miles, he said. "With current technology, you can't get much more accurate than that," Koch said.

Officials originally estimated the satellite would have crashed somewhere north of Australia.

"We're very sure that if any piece did not burn up it fell into the ocean," he said.

"Even after the final predictions are completed, we won't know for certain if the satellite reached the earth unless we get a sighting or someone finds it," Koch said.

"We can't predict where it will hit or if it will," said Lt. Col. William Bertine of NORAD. "We can predict when it will re-enter, but we never know until after the fact if it will hit the earth."

Funding Drive Pushed Youth Programs Faces Extinction

Youth Programs Inc. needs to raise \$2,000 by July 1 or face possible extinction.

The program, begun in 1972, has committed more than 800 youths in Seminole County, according to Cathy Jackson, supervisor. At that time the program was started with funds from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA).

Court Nixes Patty

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court today opened the way for Patricia Hearst's return to prison for robbing a California bank in 1974.

The 23-year-old newspaper heiress contended that her 1976 trial had been marred by many errors of the trial judge and unfair prosecution tactics, but the justices rejected her appeal without comment.

When formal notification of the Supreme Court action reaches the lower courts, Miss Hearst will be called to continue serving the seven-year sentence imposed by U.S. District Judge William Orrick of San Francisco.

She would be eligible for parole in 18 months. She was convicted of participating with a group of terrorists in the robbery on April 13, 1974, of the Sunset branch of the Liberator Bank in San Francisco.
