

Through County

The theft of color televisions and radios at the Sanford Firestone Store and the opening of a safe at the Sanford Sears catalog office highlighted a series of break-ins and robberies occuring in Sanford and Seminole County during the weekend,

Detectives Ralph Russell and Tom Deppen are investigating the theft of \$1,000 in televisions and radios taken during the night from the Firestone Store, First Street and French Avenue.

Russell reported two color televisions, a portable television and four 715x14 tires were taken after intruders entered the store after tossing a rock through a window.

Police said the safe at the Sears store was opened by the combination and no forcible entry was used. Sears employes reported the robbery of an undeter mined amount of money upon arriving to open the
