"It is probable that the federal government will have to spend at

least one billion dollars a year for several years to care for the unemployed," says a committee of labor officials, who wisely propose, as a means of raising this money, not printing presses, but higher taxes especially on estates, corporations, and large incomes. It is disheartening to note that our recovery plans, in the opinion of leading farm and labor associations, will not eliminate unemployment for several years at least, that a billion a year will be necessary to take care of unemployed, but it is encouraging to know that labor leaders recognize the evils of currency inflation.

who have been given the privilege of paying their janitors ten dollars a week instead of seven, are to have the additional pleasure of paying the assessments levied by Code Authorities created for the purpose of reaching sure that the privilege of the NRA are thoroughly enjoyed. One such assessment is for \$81, not for one year, or one month, but only until such time as another assessment may be levied, and the pleasure of paying it is required. Big Business may pay these assessments out of surplus, or governmental loans, without undue inconvenience. Little Business may wonder what to use for money.

Fasting

Fastic fans of a few years ago will remember a tall ebony-hued Senegambian who packed a load of dynamite in both fists and made all heavyweight champions quake in their boots. His name was Harry Wills, the "Black Panther," and though he never won the heavyweight championship himself, there was many a critic to say that he could have won it if the champions had not been so leary of taking him on.

Well, Harry Wills is a New York apartment house landlord these days. He bought two of them out of his savings from pugilistic exhibitions, and spends most of his time during this fifth year of the depression in trying to collect the rents, and in dodging the tax collectors. He should be good at both, as he has the beam at 240 and is still, in spite of his 42 years, as agile as the panther which gave him his nickname.

But what we started out to tell you about Harry Wills is that his regimen of training, includes even at this more or less inactive period of life a one month's fast out of every twelve. During the month of February for the past twenty years, Harry has made it a practice to live on water. "For four weeks I just sip water," he says. "For the next two days I sip orange juice, and for the next week I drink milk; after that I sleep and fried chicken are in order."

That was the program even when he was taking on all comers and generally knocking them cold. "I'd fight right up to the last of January, live on water for a month, and then resume battling better than ever," he explains. "Once when I had just knocked out Kid Norfolk in January, Tex Rickard wanted me for a February show at the Garden. I turned him down. He raised his ante and said 'I'll better make the money while I can.' I told him nothing doing, February was my fasting month."

We wouldn't be surprised if there isn't a good idea in this fasting idea of the "Black Panther." Probably most of us couldn't fast a whole month without getting pretty lean and hungry, but a little fasting would probably do us all good. As a matter of fact many people eat too much anyhow. They eat too much in proportion to the amount of work and exercise they get. That makes them fat, gives them liver trouble, and makes them gouty.

To go a couple of days without food every month or two gives the stomach a much needed rest and helps to get rid of the impurities which sometimes clog up the system and cause headaches and sore necks.

The Crusaders

A nationwide organization known as the Crusaders was perfected a few years ago and attracted considerable attention throughout the country by its energetic campaign against the Eighteenth Amendment prohibiting the sale of intoxicating beverages. It was the contention of the Crusaders that this Amendment was a violation of the constitutional liberties of the American people and they based their fight as much on the preservation of the original conception of Americanism as upon the evils of the bootlegging era.

Recently the Crusaders have turned their big guns against certain experiments of the New Deal, which gave them the prohibition repeal for which they fought for five long years. They contend that some of the bureaucratic trends developing in Washington are as threatening to the Constitution as prohibition was and that individual liberties should no more be sacrificed upon the altar of socialistic reform than upon the altar of moral legislation.

"Governmental laws and acts leading away from the system of representative government and individual liberty, guaranteed by the Constitution of the United States, are taking place at Washington with such rapidity that an unware public must be awakened quickly as to what is happening. Our forefathers, who gave their lives and their energies to make this a land of security, a land of honor and a land of liberty, were dedicated to the principle that eternal vigilance is the price of liberty," say the Crusaders.

The following statement of principles has been issued so that there may be no misunderstanding as to where the Crusaders stand.

- 1. We believe in the Constitution of the United States and in a Democratic form of government.
2. We believe that the first requisite for national prosperity is sound national credit, which can be obtained only if we have sound money—money in which the people may have confidence.
3. We demand a balanced budget.
4. We believe that there is ample room for reform and improvement within the limits of our traditional form of government and economy. We endorse intelligent reform of our banking and investment system. We regard as essential the correction of conditions which have for years placed the agricultural producer at an unfair disadvantage. We endorse necessary emergency relief. On the other hand, we insist that government enterprise must stimulate, and not supplant, private enterprise. That government expenditure must be kept within the limits of bearable taxation, and that the maintenance of government credit is the keystone upon which recovery rests. We believe that government effort should be used to help the employer employ, rather than to make the government the one great employer.
5. We want it plainly understood that we do not stand for reactionary orthodoxy. We stand for intelligent reform based on past experience, carefully worked out by those best qualified to study and understand it.

THE PRESIDENT RETURNS

Now that Dr. Wirt has gone back to Gary and the President is returning to Washington, it is possible to attend to the things that really matter. At the moment nothing compares in importance with the fact that the President is in control of the recovery program.

The heart of that program has been the concentration of financial authority in the hands of the President. Since last March he has possessed powers which formerly were exercised in part by Congress, in part by the Federal Reserve System, in part by private financial interests. Mr. Roosevelt made the master of the government budget and the master of the sources of money and credit. The purpose of this concentration of power was to put an end to deadlock and criss-crossing, and to use the whole financial power of the nation to overcome the crisis.

It is to this policy that we owe all the recovery that we have had if nature had been allowed to take its course. Because he had all the power in his hands, the President has been able to raise public and private credit, to raise prices, and to revive employment, and to carry the country through one of the worst storms in its history. Without this concentration, it could not have been done. The budget could not have been put in order with the Economy Act. Without the budget in order, the dollar could not have been revalued, or the great expenditures for relief financed successfully, or the banks set back on their feet. Without the great powers he has possessed, he could never have acted quickly on many sectors at once, and according to a coherent plan. If every move which has been made had had to be debated in Congress, or worked out by persuading Wall Street, there would have been no recovery program.

It is the President's ability to continue to apply a unified and sensible financial policy, which is our security. The first attack upon the program was the accusation of his veto on the additional compensation to veterans. By this action he control of the budget was impaired. Since that time there has been a series of proposals, all of which have one common characteristic: they would take away from the President some important part of his financial authority.

The stock market bill in its original form was such a measure. Holly To Assist In Selecting Men For CMTC This Summer

R. J. Holly has been appointed County Citizen Aide to the Secretary of War, according to an announcement received here today.

County Aides are given supervision of the procurement program for the Summer Citizen Military Training Camps. These camps are conducted every year by the government and their mission is to bring together for a month's training, under a healthful surroundings, young men from all walks of life on a common basis of equality, and by supervised athletics, military drill, and instruction in citizenship to develop them physically and morally to promote a wholesome respect for discipline, to teach the value of team work, to fit them for leadership in peace or war and to impress upon them their obligations and responsibilities as citizens.

A candidate must be physically fit and of good character, an American citizen or one who has taken and passed papers for naturalization. He must have completed his sixteenth birthday by the day camp opens and not have reached his twentieth birthday. Age requirements are: Camps 17 to 21, White, 18 to 28; Blue, 19 to 29.

It is a good thing to encourage the young men to get together to improve their health. The camp will be held in the city of Sanford, Florida, Camp

Students attending their first camp are enrolled in the Basic Course unless they have had previous service in the R. O. T. C., the Reserve Army, or National Guard. Applicants must be able to read and write English. The government pays all of the necessary expenses.

Camps will be held from July 1 to August 1, 1934, in the County Camp Area, at the following places: Fort Business, Florida Camp

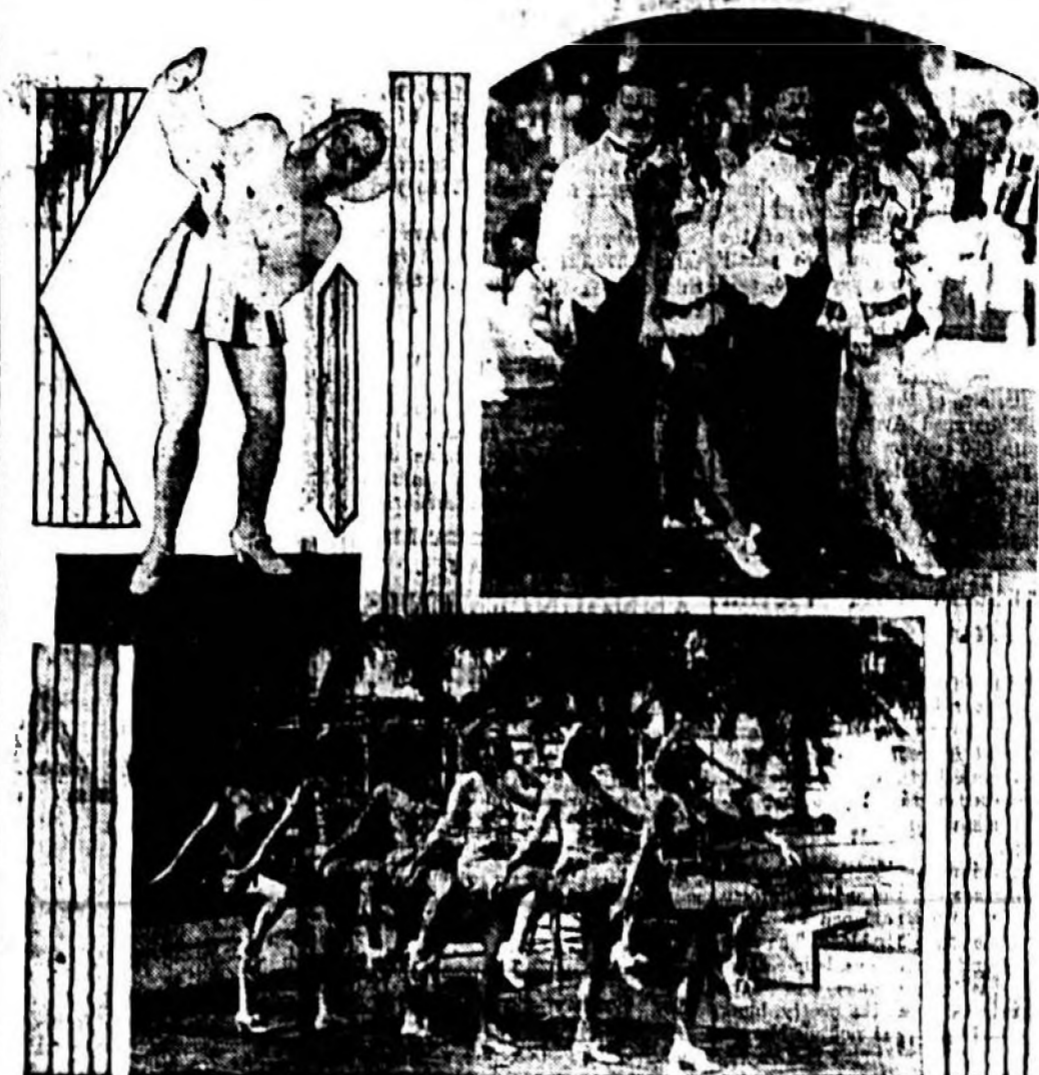
Ohio Bus Line Scored In Report Of Jury

Confident that he has the support of every baseball fan in Sanford and Seminole county, W. Earl Varn, local sportsman and bottling plant owner who was one of the "angels" of the Sanford club of last year, last night telegraphed Buck Weaver of Jacksonville, president of the Northeast Florida League, for immediate entry in that league.

Mr. Varn, who recently visited several nearby cities to "feel out" baseball interest, also suggested to Mr. Weaver that Leesburg is about ready to consider entry in the Northeastern loop, and that it would be an ideal eighth club.

This turn in the local baseball situation came at a time when it appeared that the city would be without baseball for the first time in years.

It also came on the eve of a story, to have been released in today's Herald by Peter Schaal, secretary of the Central Florida Baseball League for the past three years, to the effect that efforts to reorganize the league for 1934 had met with no success.

Less than an hour before Mr. Varn decided to take the lead in behalf of local fans, Mr. Schaal had received letters from fans in Orlando and Kissimmee, stating that both cities were "cold" as far as baseball is concerned.

The letters, added to advice from Winter Park that it had decided to join the Lake-Orange League, served to convince the Central loop secretary that reorganization at this time is out of the question.

### \$200,000 Hotel Being Planned For Daytona

DAYTONA BEACH, Apr. 17.—Plans for building a modern fire-proof hotel here to cost approximately \$200,000 in addition to the value of the site, await only securing outside capital for one-fourth of the cost, Edward P. Woodbury, owner-manager of the Ridgewood hotel that was partly destroyed by fire a year ago, said yesterday.

Woodbury said he was prepared to furnish \$150,000 for the new structure, which would be built on the site of the former hostelry on Ridgewood Avenue. The lot fronts 350 feet on Ridgewood, one of the chief residential thoroughfares of the city and a link of National Highway No. 1. The lot has a depth of 400 feet.

HIGH POINT, N. C., Apr. 17.—(AP)—Funeral services were held here yesterday for Mildred Davis who died Thursday—one day after her fourth birthday—of leukemia. She died at the home of her parents after suffering for some weeks.

### Givens Denies Every Charge Against Him

TAMPA, Apr. 17.—Morris H. Givens, suspended as county solicitor by Governor Sholtz Mar. 31, made a flat and sweeping denial of all charges on which he was ousted from office in a petition filed yesterday in circuit court.

As his first public or legal move in preparing his defense before the governor or the state Senate, Givens reached out for an old law under which he filed a petition or statement alleging that C.
