Red China Eyes Development Of Nuclear Arms

WASHINGTON (UPI)-Millary experts believe that Red China may be able to develop an intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) force big enough to threaten nuclear attack on the United States by the mid-1970s.

While doubt persists that a worthwhile Nike-X defense could be mounted against the kind of missile attack Russia could make, it is believed a useful system could be devised against the "unsophisticated" sort of threat Red China could pose in about 10 years.

Following the second Chinese Communist nuclear test earlier this month, it became known that some experts believe Peking may be able to produce between 20 and 100 ICBMs with hydrogen warheads in a decade or so.


To attack the United States with such a force " mild be utterly foolhardy, as Moscow could tell the Chinese, because the price would be China's total destruction by U. S. retaliatory missiles.

But Washington regards Peking as far more militant currently than Moscow and may not bank on Chinese caution in the face of immensely superior American power.

The United States, instead, may proceed with a defensive system which would cost beween \$6 billion and \$10 billion over a number of years. This would be a Nike-X defense. 

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

-U. S. astronauta James Mc-Divitt and Edward White, vowing "we are ready," today relaxed their rigorous training in the final hours before their planned departire Thursday on man's boldest venture into space.

Barring a late-hour hitch, the pair of college chumsturned-spacemen will ride a 109-foot-tall space machine into the skies at 9 a.m. (EST) Thursday on a fourday, 1,650,000-mile voyage that will challenge the best that Russia has done.

Hitches seemed unlikely. Doctors gave McDivitt and White a critical medical clearance. Technicians said both the 7,200-pound Gemini-4 capsule and its two-stage Titan-2 rocket booster were in good shape. Meterologists said the weather outlook was sunny.

Special Weather Bureau space flight advisors said today the weather continued to look satisfactory, and probably would be for the entire mission.

The two astronauts planned to meet with Flight Director Christopher C. Kraft and Houston Manned Spacecraft Center Chief Robert R. Gilruth today to go over details of the weather once again.

Otherwise, Kraft said "we couldn't look better," and was scheduled to hop a plane back to Houston today to guide the final countdown and launching via long dis-

Deserted Bride, **Snarled in Red** Tape, Ends Life

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)-Mau-reen Riberdy, 18-year-old deserted bride from North Weymouth, Mass., drowned her-self not knowing authorities planned to give back the Mexican baby she had bought for \$50.

Miss Riberdy's body was found in the ocean Monday night. In her motel room, authorities found a note.

"I am going to try to kill myself," the note read. "I don't know whether I'll successful or not."

The attractive brunette girl's body was identified Tuesday, Deputy Sheriff Frank Pinter said, only a few hours after her attorney learned that the 11-month-old Mexican boy she called "Bino" would be returned to her as his lawful adopted mother.

The baby, whose real name is "Rudolpho," was taken from Miss Riberdy and turned over to the state child welfare agency while authorities checked her story.

She first told Pinter she purchased the baby on June 28, 1964, for \$50 from an attorney in Corpus Christi, Tex. She later said she paid the \$50 as a fee to a midwife and was given the baby by his mother, an unwed Mexican woman.

Corpus Christi police officials verified this story Tuesday, Sheriff Allen Michell said, and Florida authorities notified Miss Riberdy's attorney that his client could have her baby back because the real mother had signed the necessary adoption papers.

When she sought help from the attorney for the return of the boy, Miss Riberdy said, "I still want to adopt Bino and I want to stay in Flor-

The young woman said her husband had deserted her in Corpus Christi after she acquired the baby. She said she went home to North Weymouth where her parents helped her and then came to Florida six weeks ago.
"She did not violate any

laws," Michell said. The name of Miss Riberdy's husband and the circumstances of her marital break up

could not be learned. Her body was found by Evelyn Colgate, of Hamilton, Ohio, who was assisted by her father, Dwight, in bringing it to shore.
