# Nazis Lose Many Men And Tanks In Effort To Flank Kharkov Foe

## Reds Report Steady Advance; Germans Claim Encircling Action Continues

(By Associated Press) German armies are meeting heavy counter thrusts by the Russians in attempts to flank the Russians at Kharkov and are losing many tanks and men. The Red army today claimed the repulsing of the Germans and are steadily advancing. The Nazis' report of their encirclement of the city continued.

In London, General Arnold and Admiral Trenchard, chief of the Army and Navy air forces, today arrived on a military mission believed to be the planning of a strategic blow against Germany. The battle of the Ukraine, the Spring's first grand test, appeared last night to be rising to another crisis, with the Russians clinging to the initiative on the main Kharkov front but being hard hit on the southern flank.

The general picture drawn by all available advice was of a mighty and generally inconclusive struggle hourly increasing in a violence approaching the ultimate peak.

Marshal Timoshenko's slow advance on Kharkov were reported only in military dispatches for the mid-day Soviet communiqué took a restrained tone in reporting a continuation of "offensive operations" and in these it was stated that the German offensive was being met by the Red army with a view to its complete annihilation.

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## 336 Votes Were Cast In City By 11 This Morning

Turnout Is Light As Only One Race Appears On Ballot

Up to 11:00 o'clock this morning, 336 voters had cast ballots in the two Sanford precincts on the lone race between Edward J. Nelson, Jr. and W. B. (T. Bone) Smith. The representative from Group 2. Nelson led Smith in the first primary by 1,022 to 633, while E. B. Brady was third with 624. The Nelson-Smith victory will mean that J. B. Mann, newly announced candidate for Group 2, will provide the county with a new representative when legislative convenes at Tallahassee in 1943.

## Sanford - Tampa Pipeline Plan Is Still In Kunning

"We Have Chance", Higgins Reveals; Graham Backs Idea

Despite recent releases in Washington regarding the transportation of fuel to eastern states in which the proposed Tampa-Sanford pipeline has been mentioned only vaguely, the Sanford plan is "still in the running," Edward Higgins, chairman of the Commerce committee, stated today.

"We will have to take several steps immediately," he said, "mainly in regard to tankers in the Gulf and contacting oil company officials in Texas, but we still have a chance of having the Tampa-Sanford pipeline plan go through."

Meanwhile, additional backing has been given the plan in Washington, according to a letter received by The Sanford Herald yesterday. The communication was sent from Senator Ernest R. Graham, Washington representative of the Miami-Dade County Emergency Coordinating Board, and a portion of it follows:

"It seems to me that Florida is one of the most strategic points in the United States. And while we have been and will be hurt by the loss of the tourist business, personally, I think that by pulling together we can offset a great deal of this by the huge natural gas reserves, advantages, and use of oil timber and waterways."

"Of course, the item that is most in the public eye today is the transportation of oil, but there are many other vital commodities that can and should be transported by the way of Florida."

"The oil situation simmers down to this: The eastern seaboard wants approximately 1,200,000 barrels. They are getting between six and seven hundred barrels by rail. They hope to get 150,000 barrels to the east by the way of the Ohio River, a couple of hundred thousand by the way of a pipeline now constructed, and then whatever few tankers are getting through."

"In my opinion, no tanker should be sent to the East Coast until the submarine menace is completely eliminated."

"Rail transportation is bound to become more congested, and the movement of oil by tank cars should be relieved if it can be done by another method. I believe that close to half of the oil that is needed can be moved through and across Florida mostly by pipeline with material that can be produced in Florida."

"First, the Fort Myers-Stuart Canal should be immediately used—and to capacity. Second, the pipeline should be built from Tampa to Sanford and the St. Johns waterway cut. Third, a pipeline should be built from Port St. Joe to Jacksonville. These three sources should put into Jacksonville between 3,000 to 6,000 barrels of oil per day."

"The pipeline should be built of concrete, and the barges and tow boats should be made of wood. The barges should be designed to use Florida material which is available on the ground. The amount of steel that goes into a barge of this type is not large when you consider the job that it is to do."

## Hapless France Is Caught In Squeeze Play As Italy Demands Territory

The danger of the French fleet's transfer to Germany mounted today as London heard that Vichy's pro-Nazi Pierre Laval has consented to the training of German sailors at French bases in the use of French warships.

Laval is reported to be pressing its territorial demands on the Axis powers play against England's France.

Britain's Admiral Cunningham predicted a complete victory in the Mediterranean if Britain can meet Axis fleets in equal combat, but he acknowledged the transfer of the French fleet would be grave.

Meanwhile, the RAF punted the French coast in a succession of sweeps that lasted from dawn to dusk yesterday, while Spitfires, Mustangs, Messerschmitts and Junkers whirled about the coast, dropping bombs and strafing the coast.

The British planes were reported to have been successful in sinking a French transport ship and a French merchant ship.

## Japs Bomb China; Report Recovery Of Loot In Burma

(By Associated Press) Reversing downward Japan's losses in the Coral Sea, the imperial government today revived upward Allied losses. Japan also claimed heavy aerial blows on China and the recovery of much loot in Burma.

In Chungking, China reported the Japanese have been halted in their attempt to take Kinfu and were thrown back with many casualties.

The high command said Kinfu was being attacked from all sides except the southeast, but declared the town still was in Chinese hands, and that a Japanese column which had seized Kinfu, 25 miles to the north, had failed in an attempt to reach the Chien River.

Destroying the Japanese had left 5,000 troops on Chien River banks in 10 days, the high command said. It was employing "magnetic" warfare and that the Japanese had been driven back with the Japanese lines far drawn out.

It told of spreading guerrilla warfare which raged along the border area of northern border.

In one stunning offensive, it said, Chinese troops captured the town of Kinfu, 25 miles from Kinfu, from which the Japanese started their offensive May 15.

## Allies Plaster Bombs On New Britain Airport

(By Associated Press) Allied bombers returned to New Britain, New Guinea, and plastered the airport for the second time in 24 hours, while other bombers were raiding the Japanese-held airfield at Lae in New Guinea, Gen. MacArthur's headquarters announced today.

In both raids, the Allied fleet met strong resistance, but only one Allied plane was lost. Two Japanese planes of a strong intercepting force were shot down and two more in New Britain.

The communiqué reported that large fires were started among the airfield buildings at New Britain.

Army Minister Forde announced yesterday the arrest of 10 men and women, believed to have been associated with the so-called Australia First front, on charges of treasonable conspiracy to aid the Japanese if they invade Australia.

Forde said documents which were seized gave plans for the examination of leading Australians and for sabotaging vulnerable points.

"These documents indicate fifth column activity of the worst kind," he said. "The plan was to hand a band of people," Forde said.

The arrests were made by military authorities. Forde said other men and women were arrested on charges of conspiring to assist the Japanese.

## Legislation On Labor Unions Is Approved

## Canal Can Be Built In Fifteen Months

WASHINGTON, May 26, (AP)—An estimate that the proposed large canal across Florida could be completed in 15 months was made Monday by the House Rivers and Harbors Committee in a favorable report on a bill to authorize the channel.

The report described the projected 12-foot deep, 125-foot-wide channel as "the only proposal that will be capable of supplying all the oil and gasoline needs of the Atlantic seaboard."

It further said a petroleum pipeline across Florida also authorized in the bill could be constructed in 120 days to six months, and added this was the only proposal which could afford partial relief for the east's oil shortage in that time.
