



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

That is the way it should be with friends and our ties with Britain and our affection for its doughty leader are strong enought to withstand the differences which must develop between two free and independent peoples. WASHINGTON UP President Truman today ordered the dropping of criminal anti-monopoly proceedings against five major oil companies-provided the companies produce records for a civil suit. In a letter to Attorney General McGranery, Truman said he was acting "as a result of factors which have emerged since the institution of the current grand jury investigation of the international activities

of the major oil companies."

Truman's letter did not say what
these "factors" are. There have
been reports, however, that the
National Security Council -- made
up of the government's top policy
planners -- was concerned that a
grand jury investigation would
jeopardize U. S. global interests.

Truman directed that McGranery Truman directed that McGraner confer with representatives of the companies "to ascertain if they will agree to enter into a stipula-tion" to make records available for a civil case.
