# State Attorney Hopes To Implement New PIP Program

By BOB LLOYD

State Attorney Abbott Herring hopes to imlement a new program early next year eminole and Brevard Counties that hopefully will eliminate "a great deal" of court time. The program is called a Pretrial Intervention Plan (PIP) and its establishment is optional for states attorneys under a new state law.

Basically, it provides a chance for first offenders in misdemeanor and third degree felony cases, if deemed qualified, to agree to probation without trial. If the probationary period is completed satisfactory to authorities the prosecution of the case is dropped.

Herring has already used a variation of the

plan in a pilot case in which a Sanford youth, accused of stealing an airboat propeller, waived

charge can be filed, however, if the youth breaks the agreement anytime within the statute of limitations pertaining to the offense. The new law provides for use of the Pretrial Intervention Plan where first offenders are

in which the offender is charged, waives a speedy trial and agrees to probation supervised by the state probation and parole authorities. Herring said the plan is being used in Orange, Hillsborough and Leon Counties, but he has not

received full reports on its success or failure. The PIP plan isn't being used in drug cases, he said. Dade County has used a similar type program for several years.

"The statute doesn't detail the exact mechanics of the plan," Herring said. The new law allows the initial appearance judge and the victim of the crime to have a "say so" on the decision to let a first offender join the PIP, but Herring said, "I'm not going to have a victim tell me the defendant can't go on the plan. However I would want the victim's concurrance if the plan

Herring is also concerned that the law makes no provision for the prosecutor to "touch base with the law enforcement officer" involved in the arrest. "I want this," he said.

"The only time I feel it would be necessary to

touch base with the judge," Herring said, "is to keep from docketing the case for trial."

Herring has yet to decide if he alone would

"The court would actually refer the case to probation and parole for a check. Then if the person is okayed for the program he would sign a contract' with us waiving a speedy trial and agreeing to conditions set forth during the probation period."

Higher Education Enrollment Growing Herald Staff Writer

The slow job market for both skilled and unskilled workers and an increased G.I. Bill education benefit have skyrocketed enrollment figures for Central Florida's Universities, as well as colleges throughout the state and country. Termed as a "natural phenomena" by one

local university registrar, the rising enrollment figures made an unexpected big jump this Fall over the fall of 1973, and early indications point towards enrollment for he winter term remaining as high and possibly exceeding those of this fall. Normally, enrollment slacks off for the winter term.

Although registrars cannot put their finger on the exact reason of the upsurge, other than the economic recession, the apparent reason for the increased enrollemt is for a person to become better qualified for seeking good paying employment once the job market "If jobs are hard to find and a family still

has some money, there is some inclination for the student to go to school," said Fredrick Ness, president of the Association of American Colleges. Figures recently released by the United

States Office of Education show a 5.5 per cent increase in college enrollment over 1973. The Office of Education had predicted a conservative 1.3 per cent increase. "Employment is difficult to find right now,

and there are people not wanting to sit idly on their hands, so they turn back to school," said Dan Chapman, registrar at Florida Technoligical University, Chapman also said colleges are not able to





MIAMI (AP) - A 9-year-old Pennsylvania boy has been found dead, stabbed and with his throat slashed, in a motel where his family was vacationing, police say. Arnold Frank Zeleznik of Fort Washington, Pa., screamed and suddenly disappeared Friday afternoon only to be found lying in a pool of blood on a bathroom floor in one of the rooms, police said.





### Statistics Can Be Proven Wrong

Economists have differences of opinion about the widdom of "indexing" - providing that incomes shall increase automatically with increases in prices, so that inflation does not affect the public's buying power. For better or for worse, 50 million Americans now have their incomes indexed to some degree. Under wage escalator clauses in labor contracts or by virtue of automatic adjustments in Social Security or pension benefits, their incomes are pegged to the Consumer Price respond with bloody counterattacks. Department of Labor that it has been working with an erroneous set of figures for the last seven months in calculating changes in the price index Fortunately the error was a minor one, but it points up a pitfall when statistics become the sole basis for automatic economic benefits.

The official unemployment rate is another 'index" that serves as a trigger for government programs, such as extension of unemployment benefits or release of funds for public service employment. The Department of Labor has conreded that its employment statistics are a less than perfect measure of how many Americans at a given time are actually looking for a job and can't

Gathering and analyzing statistics is a highly specialized field. It is also one in which error and interpretation can make figures tell the wrong story. Congress should bear this in mind when it sets up programs that rely on statistical formulas alone to initiate programs.

### Computer Jitters

Computerized data banks are such a handy way to store information that we would expect them to be popular with scholars who like to squirrel away notes for future reference. It's now estimated there are as many as 20 million bibliographical items stored in 150 public data banks around the world - so many that a University of Illinois computer expert says that researchers are losing track of which data are stored in which bank.

So the National Science Foundation is providing a \$100,000 grant to set up a new data bank devoted exclusively to indexing what is in all the other data banks. It sounds like we are assigning a new computer to keep track of what other computers are doing. Maybe we've been reading too much science fiction, but that idea makes us a little







### Venezuela To Restore

### **Relations With Cuba?**

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP) - Eleven years after Venezuela initiated the drive to isolate Communist Cuba from its Latin America neighbors, the center-left government of President Carlos Andres Perez has taken a step toward restoring relations with the Castro regime. Perez ordered Venezuela's ambassador to the United Nations, Simon Albert Consalvi, to meet with Cuban Ambassador Ricardo Alarcon Quesada at U.N. headquarters, Foreign Minister Efrain Schacht said Friday in Caracas. The first Cuba-Venezuela talks on resumption of diplomatic ties began at U.N. headquarters in New York on Friday afternoon.

### **Ethiopoans Make Move**

ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia (AP) - The young military officers running Ethiopia have announced their intention to turn the backward nation of peasants and aristocrats into a one-party socialist state. The anonymous military council, which deposed Emperor Haile Selassie on Sept. 12, issued a policy statement Friday saying: "The exploitation of man by man is completely prohibited." The officers said the government will control all things vital to the national economy-industry, land, natural resources and mining. The statement said private enterprise will continue but with government checks to insure it is serving the nation. Foreign technology and capital may continue as long as the council considers it in the national

### Reprisal Slayings?

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay (AP) — The bodies of five alleged members of the leftist Tupamaro guerrillas, three women and two men, were found tied, blindfolded and riddled with bullets Friday beside a rural highway. There was unofficial speculation that the slayings were in reprisal for the assassination of Col. Ramon Trabal, Uruguay's military attache in Paris, on Thursday. Authorities here declined to link the murders with the shooting in Paris. Police said the bodies of the Uraguayans were found about 60 miles from Montevideo.

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) - A grand jury probing business affairs of the World Football League's Florida Blazers has handed down a sealed indictment, the Orlando Sentinel reported today.

As the grand jury met, the Sentinel article said, Rommie Loudd, Blazers managing general partner, lost control of the franchise in a WFL hearing at Newport Beach, Calif. The Orange County grand jury probe reportedly included a \$13,700 check that allegedly bounced after being

sent to the state for payment of sales taxes on admission tickets, the Sentinel said. Several witnesses testified Friday before the grand jury returned the indictment, which was to remain sealed until

whoever it named was arrested. Robert Egan, the state attorney who took the case to the grand jury, declined immediate comment. Two other sealed indictments also were returned, but were believed to be unrelated to the team.

County officials here said investigators with a search

warrant had seized some team records at the Altamonte Springs home of Rocco Iatesta, Blazers comptroller. Other records had been seized at the Blazers' ticket office. Neither Loudd nor his attorney, Robert Deutsch, attended an appeal hearing at league headquarters in Newport Beach, the Sentinel said. Neither man could be

# County Greets Proposed Tax Cut With Glee, Gloom

The committee also urged Congress to consider enacting a gasoline tax increase to help force a reduction in demand. As an example, it said a tax of 30 cents a gallon would cut gas consumption by 500,000 barrels daily.

tax, Sanford City Manager Pete Knowles said it depends on the way the law is written. "Political subdivisions are exempt from ederal taxes, but they can write the law so it would really hurt," Knowles said.
