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### Unsigned Laws Cause Concern

LONGWOOD—Will the new city council, after its reorganization Jan. 6, have to repeal eight ordinances passed by the present council which are ineffective because Mayor Eugene Jaques neither vetoed nor signed them? Or will a simple vote of ratification be all that is necessary before the new mayor can consider signing them?

Mayor-elect James R. Lorman will ask Acting City Atty. Ned Julian Jr. these questions at city council's regular meeting Monday night.

Julian told The Herald Friday he is not sure what opinion he will give council Monday night.

"We (Julian and City Atty. Joe David) have not decided the best way to resolve this matter or if a problem exists."

"Since I was queried about it on the front steps of city hall last Monday night, I will have an answer or an indication to council this Monday night," Julian said.

He added since Jaques requested that the ordinances be sent to him for study, the council could declare Jaques' non-action—neither vetoing nor signing the documents—"de facto" vetos and vote to override. This course was taken by the council at one point this year.

Julian said, however, that action would leave the subject open to controversy or misunderstanding by anyone who would be affected by the ordinances.

### Seminole County Airport Zoning Commission Sought

The city of Sanford has asked the Seminole County government to establish an "Airport Zoning Commission" to regulate building heights on county land around the Sanford Airport.

The city already has drafted a resolution that provides for a board to regulate potential flight hazards such as building heights, smoke, electrical interference, and lighting glare on city property near the airport.

A county board would increase the safety factor of planes landing and taking off at the airport, Sanford officials say. But, there's another advantage too.

"We need to have both a city and a county body to regulate zoning around the airport in order to be able to qualify for a \$23 million federal airport grant," Sanford City Manager Pete Knowles told county representatives in a work session at the courthouse Friday.

Sanford plans to air its resolution at a public hearing Jan. 16, and hopes to have a commission in operation by March.

Boards governing the zoning on county and city land near the airport must be "in working order" by May if Sanford is to be eligible for the federal money. The federal government's next fiscal year begins in June.

Sanford City Councilman Mack Cleveland said that a county airport commission wouldn't cost the county anything to operate. "The Airport Authority will put up some cash, but the bulk will come from federal, and then state funds," Cleveland said.

Cleveland told the county commissioners at the work session that "if you began right now, it would take four months" before a board could begin operations.

Knowles said that a planning and zoning ordinance affecting the airport wouldn't mean "all the buildings would be restricted to one story," as planes take off on an incline, the buildings along the way could increase in height in relation to the level of flight, he said.

Commissioner Sid Vilhen directed Marsee to research State 333 and issue a written statement to the board as to the county's flexibility within that law. Vilhen requested specifics on "what we can do, and what we should do to meet the demands of the law."

Other necessary information for commissioners would concern the nature of the impact on the county from such an ordinance.

"It's time to bring this to a head," Vilhen said.

Marsee said he would supply his interpretation to the commission on Dec. 30.

### State Attorney Hopes To Implement New PIP Program

State Attorney Abbott Herring hopes to implement a new program early next year in Seminole and Brevard Counties that hopefully will eliminate "a great deal" of court time.

The program is called a Pretrial Intervention Plan (PIP) and its establishment is optional for states attorneys under a new state law.

Basically, it provides a chance for first offenders in misdemeanor and third degree felony cases, if deemed qualified, to agree to probation without trial. If the probationary period is completed satisfactory to authorities the prosecution of the case is dropped.

Herring has already used a variation of the plan in a plea case in which a Sanford youth, accused of stealing an airport propeller, waived a speedy trial and agreed to two years' self-probation (without supervision by authorities).

Herring said the charge in the case wasn't dropped, instead technically a "no-information" charge was filed by the prosecutor's office. The formal charge can be filed, however, if the youth breaks the agreement anytime within the state of limitations pertaining to the offense.

The new law provides for use of the Pretrial Intervention Plan where first offenders are arrested and the state attorney or his designated representatives feel the offender is a "good risk."

The law provides for establishment of a plan in which the offender is charged, waives a speedy trial and agrees to probation supervised by the state probation and parole authorities.

Herring said the plan is being used in Orange, Hillsborough and Leon Counties, but he has not received full reports on its success or failure. The PIP plan isn't being used in drug cases, he said. Dade County has used a similar type program for several years.

"The statute doesn't detail the exact mechanics of the plan," Herring said. The new law allows the initial appearance judge and the decision to let a first offender join the PIP, but, Herring said, "I'm not going to have a victim tell me the defendant can't go on the plan. However I would want the victim's concurrence if the plan is used."

Herring is also concerned that the law makes no provision for the prosecutor to "touch base with the judge," Herring said, "is to keep from docketing the case for trial."

Herring has yet to decide if he alone would make decisions on who would be eligible for the PIP or if he will assign an assistant state attorney on his staff to make the decisions.

He said he hopes to have information needed to decide on implementing the program sometime in January.

"If we establish the program in Seminole and Brevard," he said, "it would be used on a very limited basis. We wouldn't use it in cases of crimes of violence or sex crimes."

First degree misdemeanor offenses, such as shoplifting, may be used in the program.

"The plan's use wouldn't be to cut down on the jail population," Herring said, but would be expedited to accomplish the elimination of "a great deal" of court time.

Use of the program would not cut down very much on the time spent by staffers preparing for trials, he said.

Also yet to be determined by Herring are criteria to see which first offenders would be eligible for the PIP.

"I contemplate that the person would be handled on a trial basis until the probation and parole people can say, after investigation, that he is a first offender and a good risk for PIP," Herring said.

"The court would actually refer the case to probation and parole for a check. Then if the person is okayed for the program he would sign a 'contract' with us waiving a speedy trial and agreeing to conditions set forth during the probation period."

### Higher Education Enrollment Growing

The slow job market for both skilled and unskilled workers and an increased G.I. Bill education benefit have skyrocketed enrollment figures for Central Florida's Universities, as well as colleges throughout the state and country.

Termed as a "natural phenomena" by one local university registrar, the rising enrollment figures made an unexpected big jump this Fall over the fall of 1973, and early indications point towards enrollment for the winter term remaining as high and possibly exceeding those of this fall.

Normally, enrollment slacks off for the winter term.

Although registrars cannot put their finger on the exact reason of the upsurge, other than the economic recession, the apparent reason for the increased enrollment is for a person to become better qualified for seeking good paying employment once the job market eases up.

"If jobs are hard to find and a family still has some money, there is some inclination for the student to go to school," said Fredrick Ness, president of the Association of American Colleges.

Figures recently released by the United States Office of Education show a 5.5 per cent increase in college enrollment over 1973. The Office of Education had predicted a conservative 1.3 per cent increase.

"Employment is difficult to find right now, and there are people not wanting to sit idly on their hands, so they turn back to school," said Dan Chapman, registrar at Florida Technological University.

Chapman also said colleges are not able to make student loans as they once could because of the tight money situation.

"The funds for loans are tighter than they have ever been. Money is not as readily available now as it once was," he said.

Registrar Dick Sewell of Seminole Junior College, said he was "taken back by the surprising increases" in enrollment.

Predictions based on pre-registration figures for SJC's second semester shows the junior college expecting a 30 per cent increase in enrollment over the same time last year.

Sewell said 1,894 students attended SJC during the second semester of 1973, but pre-registration numbers for the second semester beginning in January have already climbed to nearly 2,500.

"We are in a growth area and expected to grow," Sewell said. "But the sudden rate of growth has surprised us."

# WORLD IN BRIEF

## Venezuela To Restore Relations With Cuba?

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP) — Eleven years after Venezuela initiated the drive to isolate Communist Cuba from its Latin American neighbors, the center-left government of President Carlos Andrés Pérez has taken a step toward restoring relations with the Castro regime. Pérez ordered Venezuela's ambassador to the United Nations, Simon Albert Consalvi, to meet with Cuban Ambassador Ricardo Alarcón Quesada at U.N. headquarters, Foreign Minister Efraim Schacht said Friday in Caracas. The first Cuba-Venezuela talks on resumption of diplomatic ties began at U.N. headquarters in New York on Friday afternoon.

## Ethiopians Make Move

ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia (AP) — The young military officers running Ethiopia have announced their intention to turn the backward nation of peasants and aristocrats into a one-party socialist state. The anonymous military council, which deposed Emperor Haile Selassie on Sept. 12, issued a policy statement Friday saying: "The exploitation of man by man is completely prohibited." The officers said the government will control all things vital to the national economy — industry, land, natural resources and mining. The statement said private enterprise will continue but with government checks to insure it is serving the nation. Foreign technology and capital may continue as long as the council considers it in the national interest.

## Reprisal Slayings?

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay (AP) — The bodies of five alleged members of the leftist Tupamaro guerrillas, three women and two men, were found tied, blindfolded and riddled with bullets Friday beside a rural highway. There was unofficial speculation that the slayings were in reprisal for the assassination of Col. Ramon Traba, Uruguay's military attaché in Paris, on Thursday. Authorities here declined to link the murders with the shooting in Paris. Police said the bodies of the Uruguayans were found about 50 miles from Montevideo.

## Disney Extortionist Is Caught

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP) — A 24-year-old man who threatened to set off seven bombs at Disneyland in California and Disney World in Orlando was arrested early today when he tried to claim \$3 million in ransom, authorities said. The alleged plot, which was cut off in a note left in a Greyhound Bus terminal locker in Santa Barbara, included an arrangement for the bombs to be exploded over a 15-day period if the ransom demands were not met.

Booked for investigation of using interstate commerce for extortion was Craig Douglas Hassler, a transient who had been living at a Santa Barbara motel, authorities said. No bail was set after the federal booking, a spokesman said.

Information about the investigation was released today by Capt. Charles Thompson of the Santa Barbara Police Department.

First word of the scheme, he said, came in a telephone bomb threat Wednesday to Disneyland Securities of Anaheim. Investigators said the call led to the discovery by police of the alleged extortion note in the bus locker, which said that after the payment was made, instructions would be issued on how to find the explosive devices and disarm them.

## Higher Education Enrollment Growing

FTU reports a 12.7 per cent increase in student enrollment over 1973; the University of Florida, a 11.5 per cent increase; Florida State University, a 6.6 per cent increase; and the University of South Florida, a 6 per cent increase.

A second determining factor on enrollment is the recent approval of the increased benefits on the G. I. Bill.

The raise was approved Dec. 3 when Congress overruled President Ford's veto. According to Ken Kennedy, coordinator of Veterans Affairs at FTU, more than 300 vets have applied for the winter quarter which begins in January.

"This is unheard of," Kennedy said. "We're way up over last year." If things continue like this, we'll have 1,600 veterans (enrolled) this April."

Last April, Kennedy reported only slightly more than 1,000 vets were going to FTU. The slow job market is turning the vets back to school, according to Kennedy.

Before the current economic situation, veterans in Central Florida "took advantage of good employment in construction work. This has come to a halt," Kennedy said.

Now, Kennedy said, the veterans are coming to school to "better themselves" with an education while at the same time receiving G.I. benefits.

Enrollment in graduate school is also on the upswing.

That entrance was sealed after the last Jubilee Year in 1950, when 1.5 million pilgrims visited the major city of Catholicism.

Before his election as pontiff, Pope Paul was responsible for organizing that Jubilee Year under Pope Pius XII.

Pope Paul has stressed the theme of reconciliation for this Holy Year and has repeatedly called on dissident theologians to accept papal and Church authority.

A Vatican theologian, Raimondo Spiazzi, said the pontiff's main goal is to see whether the ferment in the church can be channeled and purified, 10 years after the Ecumenical Council.

Pope Paul has streamlined the event for the pilgrims. In the past, they had to cover 11 miles to visit four basilicas — the church of St. Peter, St. John Outside the Walls, St. John Lateran and St. Mary Major — to gain plenary indulgences giving remittance of all divine punishment.

## County Proceeds Towards Regional Utility System

Editors note: This is the second of a three-part series dealing with the operation of utility firms in Seminole county. Seminole is one of six counties in the state to have its own Utility Control Board which regulates both the operation and the rates of water and sewer systems that are in service here. There are 21 individual firms in the county range serving anywhere from a few to a several thousand customers. The trend is towards publicly owned "regional systems." As a first step towards that end, the county okayed the \$4 million purchase of Consumer Utilities, and Indian Hills utilities last summer.

At the time of the authorized purchases, county planner Roger Neiswander commented that "this is one of the first steps towards setting up a regional system."

The advantage the county has over a private owner of such systems is huge. When the county gets ready to expand the systems—an immediate reality—they will have access to federal funds that will pay for up to 75 per cent of the costs. The advantage to the customer served by these systems is improved service and reduced future cost.

The county will not affect a complete take-over of the systems until mid-March. Revenue provided by both systems will sponsor bonds used in the purchase of the facilities.

A resolution coming before the commission for approval on Feb. 4 will be another significant mark towards a regional system.

If a housing development is planned outside of an area

the case of calculating a fair rate base. But Southern Gulf, another large firm that asked for big rate hikes, probably won't be as fortunate. "Compliance will be a key issue" in granting the requests, Vihlen said. "I find that they're not subject to rate increases because they're not in compliance—it's as simple as that."

During the work session, the board also discussed the compliance of Eagle Utilities, Matland Utilities, First Florida, and Adventure Camp Utilities, all of which system presented their cases in public hearings. With compliance decisions, commissioners have "a reasonable amount of time" to render a decision. With requested rate increases, they have 90 days from the time they terminate the last hearing on the request.

Rates for water and sewer connections vary in the county, but they generally stabilize around \$3.50 a month for an average use of water, and \$2 to \$4 a month for a minimum of sewage.

Tomorrow, in the last part of the series, Belleville will review the 21 certified utility operations in the county.

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## Fugitive Robert Vesco Creates Own Latin American Stronghold

EDITOR'S NOTE—Is Robert Vesco prepared to defend himself with arms? Apparently so, Senate investigators have concluded from the testimony of witnesses who dealt with Vesco in Costa Rica.

WASHINGTON (AP) — He travels in high-speed yachts, heavily armed and outfitted with the latest electronic gear, or in a private jet plane that files false flight plans. His arsenal is enough for a small army. That's the story pieced together by U.S. government investigators trying to pry Robert L. Vesco from his Costa Rican stronghold and return him to this country for trial on criminal charges stemming from an illegal \$200,000 contribution to former President Nixon's reelection campaign.

By their account, the fugitive financier has created for himself a Latin American stronghold that would fit into a James Bond novel.

Jay Powell Cook, former skipper of Vesco's \$54-foot yacht, told the Senate's permanent subcommittee on investigations recently that he quit when he became convinced that Vesco intended to shoot it out with anyone, including U.S. authorities, who interfered with his movements.

"I was told by Mr. Vesco that the weapons aboard the boat were for the purpose of the protection of his family, him and his family," Cook testified. Vesco didn't spell it out, but Cook said he concluded that what he had in mind was the "chance of this boat... could be seized by either individuals that may be after Mr. Vesco and members of his family, and it could be our government."

Vesco, 39, has told interviewers he fears a kidnapping attempt against one of his four children. On other occasions he has mentioned an unsuccessful attempt on his own person, refusing to provide details because "it's a sensitive subject with me."

Cook said Vesco carries a Smith and Wesson hammerless revolver; that his family is protected by some 30 bodyguards.

Vesco's \$500,000 home, located in an exclusive residential area outside the Costa Rican capital of San Jose, is surrounded by an eight-foot concrete wall.

During his two months aboard the *Joya Poca*, Cook said he was ordered by Vesco to modify the engines to increase their top speed and told not to keep any record of the ship's movements. Vesco also ordered installation of a sophisticated electronic navigation system to permit the boat's operation in the rock-strewn waters of Costa Rica's western coast without fear of pursuit, according to Cook.

Weapons aboard the \$250,000 yacht include a tripod-mounted machine gun plus several types of automatic and semi-automatic rifles, Cook said.

At the hearings before the Senate subcommittee this summer and fall, two U.S. businessmen testified that they met Vesco in April to discuss construction of a factory capable of turning out \$90 machine guns a month.

Stuart F. Graydon of Montgomery, Ala., who has interests in various Latin American countries, said he was told by Marti Figueres, son of a former Costa Rican president, that the weapons factory "would be related to the army of Costa Rica." Young Figueres and Vesco are business associates.

But when Graydon learned that Costa Rica has no standing Army, he said he wondered "where you would sell that many pieces of equipment."

Pressed for details about his meeting with Vesco, Graydon invoked the Constitutional privilege against self-implication.

Gordon D. Ingram, who designed a machine gun to be manufactured in Costa Rica, testified that Vesco had "a fairly good knowledge of weapons," and displayed a 12-gauge riot control shotgun in his guests.

A weapon of the same type had been purchased five days before the meeting in Los Angeles by Thomas P. Richardson, a wealthy stockbroker who describes himself as Vesco's close friend. The shotgun was one of 14 sophisticated firearms purchased by Richardson in April, according to sales receipts subpoenaed by Senate investigators.

## Area Apartment Dwellers Enjoy Rent Reductions

Rampaging inflation is having little impact on apartment rental rates in the Southeast.

Some apartment dwellers are even reaping the rewards of recession-fueled price wars, an Associated Press survey shows. Florida renters, especially those in the Disney World area of the Sunshine State, are enjoying an unparalleled round of rate reductions and special deals while their counterparts from New Orleans to Columbia, S.C., are experiencing relatively stable rates.

Of all the cities surveyed, Atlanta reported the biggest increases, averaging about five per cent over the last year.

James Mahaffey, president of the Florida Apartment Association, calls the Central Florida area "the worst apartment market in the nation" because of overbuilding during the Disney World construction boom which fell apart last year.

Rental rates in the Orlando area are averaging from \$89 a month for an efficiency apartment to as little as \$15 for one and two-bedroom units. Some apartment owners are offering tenants two months free rent, and many are elimi-

nating security deposits and lease requirements.

"At this point, I get the feeling people will do anything to get tenants in," says the owner of one of Orlando's largest apartment complexes. "We're in sort of a funny posture. It is such a weak market. There are no incoming people at all."

In Miami, several apartment landlords have given tenants "inflation reductions" of between \$10 and \$15.

"Having all your tenants paying a little less each month beats the hell out of most of them leaving because they can't afford the rent anymore," says one Miami landlord.

In Miami Beach, where housing ranges from luxurious high-rises to cheap rooming houses for the elderly, the city council recently passed a rent control ordinance which mandates a rent rollback to October 1974 levels.

Rents in New Orleans have remained relatively stable, except for increases in the fashionable French Quarter. They

have decreased in suburban areas.

"In eastern New Orleans, where they've just started developing, they've lowered rents from \$19 to \$20 to attract people out that way," says Julie Smith, office manager of Dwellings Unlimited, a rental agency.

"But in the more established areas, the French Quarter for instance, rents are going up."

Even in booming Atlanta, apartment industry spokesmen say renters can still find a bargain by shopping around outside the expensive downtown area.

Two-bedroom apartments in northeast Atlanta currently are renting for about \$200 a month while a comparable unit in a downtown high-rise goes for about \$215.

Some apartment complexes in suburban Atlanta areas have been offering a month's free rent to new occupants in an effort to fill units.

These are people who always had it filled at \$125," the spokesman says. "But they've recently been having turnovers three or four times a year, with all the expense of cleaning up and renting it. So they come down to \$100 and keep tenants longer."

"It's a reasonable strategy, especially coupled with inflation."

Some apartment executives, however, are warning that rent reductions are going to be short-lived.

"People who lowered rents will find themselves behind the eight ball," says Anthony Nich-

olson, president of the Orlando Apartment Association. "You get bands of rovers who take advantage of the giveaways and their skip and go to another place."

William Campbell of Deerfield Beach, Fla., whose firm supervises the rentals of 3,000 apartment units, says he's run across some families who are "doubling up" with others to save rent.

One-bedroom apartments in Charlotte have been renting for about \$17; a month while rents on two and three-bedroom units range from between \$190 and \$270.

A spokesman for the Central Midlands Regional Planning Council in Columbia, S.C., says there have been no substantial changes in rent in the past six months with a vacancy rate of about 12 per cent.

Rents in Columbia are averaging about \$150 for a one-bedroom unit to \$200 for a two-bedroom apartment to \$230 for a three-bedroom model.

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**County Realtors Ready For MLS**

For sometime we've been predicting that sooner or later the Seminole County Board of Realtors would inaugurate its own multiple listing service. The way things look right now it's a safe wager that the Board serving this area will have its own MLS in operation on or before the first of April, 1975.

Many details still have to be ironed out. But, there's little doubt that Board of Directors of the Realtor organization will be formalizing a recommendation to be presented to the entire Board during its January meeting at the Quality Inn North in Longwood.

The big problem right now is not centered on the initiation of the MLS service. Instead, the problems facing the Board will revolve around how to establish cooperative agreements with the Orlando-Winter Park Board which has been operating a multiple listing service for its own jurisdiction as well as in Seminole County.

The Seminole County Board of Realtors has made numerous overtures to the Orlando-Winter Park Board during the past several years asking for the Orlando-Winter Park Board's cooperation.

For example, the Orlando-Winter Park Board has been operating for quite a few years in Seminole County and actually without the local Board's authority. At the same time, the Orlando-Winter Park Board has insisted that any Seminole Realtor who wants to participate in the Orlando-Winter Park Board's MLS operation must become a dual member of the Orlando-Winter Park Board. Local Realtors have gone along with the prerequisite although they didn't exactly cotton to it.

All of this, of course, leads to the question of what Realtors can submit MLS listings to what Board's operation and what membership requirements be.

Jim Lorman of Casselberry who heads the Seminole Board's MIS committee, and Bart Pilcher of Sanford, newly installed president of the Seminole Board, undoubtedly will have some negotiating to do with the Orlando-Winter Park Board to iron out these problems. It'll be done, of course, and the consensus of opinion among most Seminole Board members is that no matter how it's done a new MLS operation of this county is a must and will be established.

During MLS discussions with firms who produce multiple listing printouts many new innovations were discussed.

For example, right now an MLS Realtor using multiple listing service receives a print out each week which resembles a huge mail order house catalog in size and in the number of pages.

Q.—I am having a house built and have arranged with the contractor to put up framing in the attic, but not to finish it. I hope to finish it myself in a year or two. Will the assessment on my house be increased at that time?

A.—Assessment regulations differ—even in adjacent communities—but all towns and villages that I know make no change in assessments that type of inside home improvement. Incidentally, since the builder is installing framing in the attic, it's a good idea to have him bring all electricity, plumbing and (if necessary) heating lines to the attic at the same time so they can be connected later. It will avoid problems when you get around to finishing the attic and be less expensive if done now.

Q.—One of the rungs on the kitchen chair has come out of one of the holes. I put it back, but it's very loose and I'm afraid someone will put a foot on it and break it. How can I fix it so that the rung will fit tightly?

## County Greetns Proposed Tax Cut With Glee, Gloom

Seminole County officials today reacted with glee or gloom, depending on individual economic philosophy, to a congressional committee's proposal to cut income taxes by 10 per cent and up gasoline taxes by 30 cents a gallon.

Tax cuts of up to \$12 billion a year have been urged by the Congressional Joint Economic Committee to help pump up the economy and head off what the panel called possibly the nation's worst recession in 35 years.

The committee's tax-cut proposal Sunday was joined by other recommendations by Andrew F. Brimmer, dean of the Harvard business school. Brimmer proposed a one-time

10 per cent cut in 1974 federal income taxes on salaries up to \$13,200.

The committee also urged Congress to consider enacting a gasoline tax increase to help force a reduction in demand. As an example, it said a tax of 30 cents a gallon would cut gas consumption by 500,000 barrels daily.

"That would not affect us in any shape, form or fashion," according to Roger Harris, Asst. Supt. of Finance for the Seminole County School Board.

Although Harris felt governmental agencies would not be affected by an increased gasoline tax, Sanford City Manager Pete Knowles said it depends on the way the law is written.

"Political subdivisions are exempt from federal taxes, but they can write the law so it

doesn't exempt political subdivisions. That would really hurt," Knowles said.

"I can tell you it would. It would really hurt us in this year's budget," said Fred Taylor, the school system's director of transportation.

"We'll just hope that it doesn't happen, but if it does, we'll really be in bind," Taylor said. The increase would about double the cost of gasoline to governmental agencies — if it affected them.

The Congressional Joint Committee, warning that unemployment will hit 7.5 per cent by next summer, said a minimum of \$10 billion in tax relief should be enacted immediately.

The relief should be aimed at low and moderate income persons, according to the committee.

"In my estimation if they really want to

dampen inflation, they should apply it to the middle and low income people," Harris said.

"If you want to get money in the economy, you've got to get money to the poor."

Knowles agreed, but with some reservations. "I think 10 per cent at one time is excellent — if they couple it with some inflationary controls," he said.

Casselberry City Manager Harry Hug said, "It has got to give more cash in hand to the majority of the wage earners. I would think it should increase the purchasing power of the country."

A voluntary system of wage-price guidelines also was advocated by the committee's Democratic majority to give President Ford

authority to roll back selected wage and price hikes he found inflationary.

The committee's report argued that the only way to fight both recession and inflation is to use monetary stimulants and intervene in some wage price cases.

It proposed that any tax cuts now could be offset later by elimination of the oil depletion allowance and other tax changes.

Other recommendations include:

- Expansion of federal public service programs and unemployment compensation.
- A rollback of oil prices but an increase in the price of new natural gas.
- A less stringent monetary program than the one being followed by the Federal Reserve Board.

## Thieves Have A Field Day; Police Probe 47 Burglaries

Police in Seminole County today were investigating a rash of holiday weekend thefts and burglaries involving thousands of dollars in gifts and property.

Sanford police detectives were probing 47 burglaries and thefts in which victims listed everything from bicycles, jewelry, firearms, food and small appliances to alcoholic beverages as missing.

Patrolman D. H. Whitmore said a white male made off with eight new bicycles, valued at \$450, from the front of Eagle Family Discount Store, Fairway Plaza Shopping Center, Sunday afternoon.

Manager Charles Eaton saw a man at the bicycle display, noted six bikes were missing and went to call police. Officers said when Eaton returned from making the telephone call the last two bicycles were gone — and so was the man.

Police reports said another unidentified man had kept clerks busy with questions about items in the rear of the store, apparently while the other man

was taking the first six bicycles.

Detectives were busy today compiling lists of thousands of dollars worth of other items taken in Sanford weekend burglaries.

Some of the other thefts included:

- Jewelry, watch and other items, total value more than \$200, from the home of John V. Charron, 2201 Oak Avenue.
- Shotgun, rifle, camera, jewelry and old coins, total value \$843, from home of Mrs. Willie Fisher, 100 Scott Drive.
- Beer, wine, chewing gum and a ham, total value \$188 from Victory Beer Gardens, 302 Sanford Avenue.
- Portable television, valued \$160, from home of Blanche Cunningham, 1320 Myrtle Avenue.
- Walkie-talkie radio and compasses valued at \$125 from Monroe Harbour Marina, Holiday Isle on the lakefront, after smashing a window to gain entry.
- Patrolman John W. Foster reported that burglars after prying open a window, took the time to unwrap presents under the Christmas tree at the home of Terry Tenney, 1513 Summerlin Avenue.

Listed as missing were a cassette recorder, tape player and stereo photograph amplifier and speakers valued at \$195.

Officials were taking inventory at Seminole High School's vocational garage classroom to determine the value of tools taken by thieves, who climbed a fence and entered by a window. Police found some tools scattered over the school campus.

At Sanford Grammar School tools, cookies and crackers were taken after the facility was entered via an unlocked door, police reported.

Longwood police reported weekend burglars took \$150 cash and broke into a cigarette vending machine at Crusty's Pizza on SR 434 west of SR 427 early Sunday.

Sgt. Greg Manning said the thieves entered the restaurant via a rear restroom window.

Seminole County Sheriff's deputies today were also probing a number of weekend burglaries and thefts.

## 'Furloughs' Begin For Stromberg-Carlson Employees

Stromberg-Carlson Corp. furloughed 575 employees today for a two-week period, leaving the telephone equipment manufacturing firm with a 225-man work force to handle only present commitments and emergency service, a company spokesman announced today.

The furloughed employees were primarily production line personnel and will return to work at the Sanford company on Jan. 6, said Joseph Hartwig, industrial relations manager.

Hartwig said the furloughed employees will "all be paid for at least three days of holiday pay and retain company benefits." He also said the majority of the employees will have some basic eligibility for unemployment, depending on the total length of employment time with the company.

"We are in a situation where we are trying to meet customers' commitments we have on hand and any emergency type service that would be required," Hartwig said.

The company laid off 90 employees indefinitely during the first half of December.

Hartwig said that he does not foresee any more layoffs "at

this time," but that future cutbacks will depend on the economic situation.

Hartwig said the furloughs were caused "simply by the lack of orders." The company manufactures telephone equipment for independent telephone companies.

The number of telephone orders are down because of the "extremely high" prime interest rate, low home telephone sales caused by slow construction and low PBX sales, according to Hartwig.

"The telephone companies themselves have been trying to obtain rate improvements to meet rising costs, but they are experiencing delays from the Public Service Commission in getting

rate improvements," Hartwig said.

The company is experiencing its first general layoff since opening operations in 1971. The company normally maintains a 900-man work force.

Hartwig said approximately one half of the furloughed employees live in the Sanford area, while the remaining employees live throughout Seminole County.

Hartwig said the furloughing was a general move for the firm's other three plants located in Rochester, N.Y., Camden, Ark., and Charlottesville, Va. The company is a subsidiary of General Dynamics Corp. of St. Louis (NYSE).

## Time Is Money In Some Cases

State Treasurer and Insurance Commissioner Tom O'Malley's Orlando office recovered \$88,000 in October in refunds of policyholder's money in three counties, including Seminole, an official said today.

"This refund resulted from questions asked by individual citizens who took the time to contact the commissioner's representative," Deputy Commissioner Bill Cecova said.

A representative from O'Malley's Orlando office is in Sanford the second Thursday of each month. Citizens with insurance problems may contact him at the Seminole County Courthouse at 1 p.m.

An O'Malley spokesman urged persons who need insurance policies explained or feel a company is not meeting its obligations under the terms of the contract to contact him.

Cecova said the best way to get in touch is by letter or in person, since absolute need to know absolute details before taking a claim to an insurance company for a refund.

The following services are available to Seminole residents:

- Assistance in receiving payment of valid claims.
- Answers to questions relating to all types of insurance.
- Assistance in complying with compulsory automobile insurance laws and financial responsibility laws.
- Answers to questions concerning insurance agents and insurance companies sales activities.

An Orlando representative said the office doesn't rate companies, but can readily provide consumers with information about which companies are licensed in Florida. The Orlando office is also responsible for answering citizens' question in Lake and Orange Counties.
