

Deltona Buys M Q Ranch

The Deltona community north of Sanford has undertaken a large expansion program with the acquisition of the M Q Ranch recreation area in a three-way deal estimated to cost \$1.6 million.

The ranch is located on the Butler chain of lakes and Deltona officials reported today these will be connected by deeper canals to provide better boating facilities.

They also said 13 lakefront lots have been given to the Germany sales office of Mackle Brothers, Deltona developers, and will be offered to Germans desiring to move here.

Herman Morris, owner of M Q Ranch, traded the "dude ranch" to Mackle Brothers after the latter had acquired the Camphor Farms in Putnam County. Morris said he will continue his ranch program at the new site and using the old brand. He has 90 days to complete the move.

Gaston Bridges, sales director for Deltona, reports the M Q location will be platted and lots will be sold this week.

Mrs. Schultz, Prominent In Sanford, Dies

Cassandra McCartney Schultz, who would have been 100 years of age on Feb. 11, a long time resident of Sanford and Seminole County, died in an Orange City nursing home at 10:10 a.m. Wednesday morning.

Mrs. Schultz was a well-known figure in Seminole County since she was chief clerk in the county judge's office from 1920 until she retired in 1942 at the age of 77. During that period she served under the late Judge Ernest Housholder, her son-in-law; the late Judge James G. Sharon Sr. and Judge R. W. Ware.

Mrs. Schultz was active in the social life of Sanford. She was formerly a member of the Sanford Woman's Club. At the time of her death she was a member of the American Legion Auxiliary. For many years she served as a member of the board of trustees of the Fernald-Laughton Memorial Hospital Association and was the organization's treasurer most of that time. She attended Holy Cross Episcopal Church.



Mrs. Schultz is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Floyd A. Palmer, of Sanford, four grandchildren, Mrs. George Eick and County Judge-elect Kayle Housholder, of Sanford; Mrs. Richard Bate, of Palisades, N. Y.; and Miss Gayle Schultz, of Tampa, and 16 great-grandchildren. She was born Feb. 11, 1863, in Baltimore, Md. Mrs. Schultz lived there and later in Pine Grove, Pa., and Anderson, Ind. She was married to the late Julius Schultz, of Galesburg, Ill., in 1887. She and her husband moved to Sanford in 1914 and Mr. Schultz died in 1916.

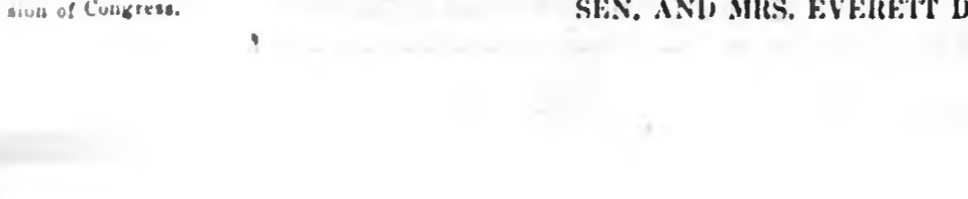
Stores Extend Shopping Hours

Construction Likely To Be Recommended

Jack McCarthy, project engineer with Lockwood Greene Engineers, of Spartanburg, S. C., in charge of the feasibility study for the barge port terminal at Sanford, reported today that he is "very encouraged" with results of his study, so far.

McCarthy, speaking to members of the Seminole County Port Authority and county commissioners at the Mayfair Inn at noon, outlined the findings to date.

The engineer revealed that soil borings will begin in the area in about three days. He did not disclose the sites of the borings.

"We will begin making final layouts for the terminal when the results of these tests are received in our offices," he said.

Results of a survey conducted by the firm show that about 400,000 tons per year of export cargoes exist in the St. Johns River tributary area. He said he felt that 200,000 tons per year of import cargoes would pass through this port.

"We feel at this time that these cargoes alone are sufficient to warrant the construction of a one-berth barge terminal—even without depending on the future construction of the cross state barge canal and the St. Johns-Indian River canal.

"However, the completion of the canal would certainly open a vast gateway of trade with the Mississippi and Ohio River system and the many large cities located on these systems," McCarthy said.

"Aside from the benefits of the actual cargo shipments through the Sanford port, the mere fact that the port terminal was constructed would be a great attraction for industry to locate in the area," McCarthy told the group.

He said three similar port installations constructed in the last five years have found that five large industries located at each, although none of these industries received or shipped a great deal of cargo over the terminal.

"Statistics show that barge traffic in general has increased from 21 billion ton miles in 1946 to 133 billion ton miles in 1962," McCarthy declared.

"Based on our studies to this point, we feel that we certainly will recommend that the barge port terminal be constructed here," he concluded.

Meeting with the Seminole County port authority committee and county commissioners were Sen. Mack Cleveland Jr. and Rep. Joe Davis. They will take up the finalizing of the necessary legislation after the completion of the feasibility report.
