Remembering lost loved ones

Relative shares the gentle spirits of Geneva victims

GENEVA - He stood in an undercover walkway outside Geneva Elementary school, and read from two typewritten sheets of paper. At times Danny Razor trembled, and at times he teared up.

Less than a week after his 31-year-old sister Robin Razor, 35-year-old Daniel Privett and the couple's 11-year-old daughter, Christine, had been brutally murdered at the trailer home just west of Geneva, Razor wanted to share some memories of them.

His words were a moving testimony for the love he and

Signs approved, but not without controversy

SANFORD - Two separate requests involving the erection of signs in the city of Sanford drew considerable opposition from the Sanford City Commission Monday. Two points of view were aired during both the commission work session and formal meeting.

Resolving the matter was difficult as

there were only four commissioners on hand. Mayor Larry Dale was not able to attend the meeting, which increased the possibility of a split vote.

One request was from the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission (GFC), which has established a new rule for black crappie (fish) in Lake Monroe. The rule, which took effect on July 1, requires that no person kill or possess any black crappie on Lake Monroe less than 12

inches in length. The GFC had asked permission to erect signs warning of the restriction at local boat ramps and every 500 feet along the shore of Lake Monroe.

The second request was from Buckholz Traffic of Jacksonville, consultant for the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) requesting installation of signs identifying various historical areas such as the St. James A.M.E. Church, the Sanford

After D.C. shootings, a moment of fear for Sanford officials

SANFORD - The Friday shooting deaths in the nation's capitol are bringing about changes in many other government facilities. The concern for officials as well as for general public safety is once again in the forefront.

The Florida Capitol in Tallahassee is already undergoing changes, including installation of additional metal detection devices. The windows on the capitol building are being

coated with materials designed to prevent glass shattering in case of an explosion, and portable detection devices are being supplied to various security personnel to detect firearms.

At the Sanford City Hall, no safety changes have been made, but the tension brought about by the Washington D.C. shootings was very apparent during Monday night's city commission meeting.

It was near the conclusion of the meeting, during the reports from the commissioners.

Grant program benefits chambers of commerce

The tea party

SANFORD - The Grove Counseling Center asked the Sanford City Commission to waive the rental fee for the use of the Bettye D. Smith Cultural Arts Center. The purpose was to hold a tea party on Sept. 19, "to expose some at risk girls to cultural enrichment opportunities."

Commissioner Velma Williams suggested the matter be approved, but when other members of the commission explained that the \$88 fee recommended by City Manager Bill Simmons was necessary to pay for city personnel who would have to be on hand, Williams questioned if other facilities might be available for no charge.

When the response was that there were no other suitable facilities, Commissioner Brady Lessard personally volunteered to pay \$44, half of the reduced rate for the cultural arts center, if the Grove would pay the rest. The Grove however, will not be required to pay the additional amount, as City Manager Simmons volunteered to personally pay the remaining \$44.

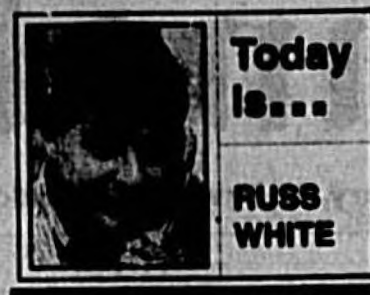

DeBary man wins

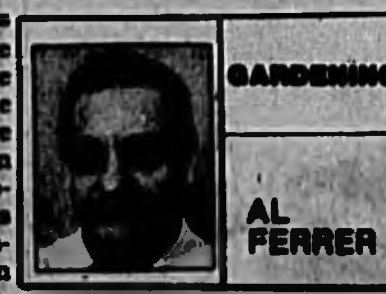

A weed is a weed when it displaces a native plant

Weeds are undesirable plants and non-native invasive plants are weeds of natural areas. Non-native plants are those that exist outside of their natural ranges. Non-native invasive plants are those that form self-sustaining and expanding populations within plant communities with which they were not previously associated. They are weeds in natural areas because they displace native plants and associated wildlife, including endangered species, and can alter natural processes such as fire and water flow. Non-native plants have been introduced as landscape ornamentals, aquarium plantings, agricultural crops, and by accident. They now exist in our landscapes, and some are still sold commercially. Invasive non-native plants growing in proximity to natural areas are a source of invasion because seeds and spores can be propagated by birds, animals, wind, and yard trimmings. Here is a list of the most invasive and dangerous plants to our ecological environments.

forest, and lake margins in Broward, Palm Beach, Martin, St. Lucie, and Highlands counties.

Melaleuca: Also known as Australian paperbark, once widely planted in Florida, now forms dense thickets and displaces native vegetation of 391,000 acres of wet pine flatwoods, sawgrass marshes, and cypress swamps in the southern part of the state.

Chinese tallow: Sometimes called popcorn tree, has been considered an invasive pest plant in the Carolinas since the 1970s and is expanding its range on the US Gulf Coast through Florida. It is widely dispersed by birds and thrives in undisturbed areas such as closed canopy forests, bottomland hardwood forests, shores of water bodies, and sometimes on floating islands.

Bastard cane: A messy tree in landscapes, invades disturbed areas as well as pineclands, scrub, hammocks, and pine rocklands in south Florida.

Old world climbing fern: Aggressively invades cypress swamps and tree islands in south Florida and carries both wildfires and prescribed burns through natural barriers.

Casahuate: A popular landscape tree throughout southern Florida. It produces large crops of seeds, which are eaten and transported by birds. It is now naturalized on sand islands and in typical hammocks, pineclands, mangrove swamps, cypress domes, scrub, and coastal strand communities.

Air potato: Can climb high into tree canopies and engulf surrounding vegetation.

Bleedbill: Is a woody tree in landscapes. It is common in old fields and disturbed wetland sites and also invades intact cypress domes and tropical hardwood hammocks of south Florida.

What to do: Learn to identify them, do not use them when landscaping, remove them from your property, and share this information with your neighbors.

Extracted from the University of Florida's Circular 1204 by K.A. Langeland, Help Protect Florida's Natural Areas from Non-native Invasive Plants.

Cogon grass: Has invaded many habitats such as sandhills, flatwoods, grasslands, swamps, river margins, and dry sand dunes throughout Florida and other southeastern states.

Brazilian pepper tree: Was introduced to Florida in the 1840s as a cultivated ornamental. It is an extremely invasive plant that invades pine, scrubland, pineclands, and hardwood hammocks of north and central Florida, and mangrove forests as far north as Levy and St. Johns counties.

Australian plant: Was introduced to Florida in the late 1800s and planted extensively in the southern half of the state. It is salt-tolerant and invades pineclands, sandy shores, and front-line dunes where it produces dense shade, litter accumulation and displaces native vegetation.

Tropical soda apple: First collected from Florida in 1969, is now a common weed on 500,000 acres of pastures, roadsides, ditchbanks, cultivated land and natural areas.

Catahoula mimosa: is a sprawling, prickly shrub that was first identified in Florida in 1953 and now occurs on 1,000 acres of river floodplain, swamp

Historic District and Florida Heritage.
"I'm completely against both requests," said Commissioner Kerry Lyons during the work session discussion. "We have entirely too many signs on our streets now. We don't need more."

"As for the signs for fishermen," said Commissioner Brady Lessard. "If our people could be fined for having a crappie under 12-inches long, I think they should be warned that it's now against the law."
"But they'll detract from the appearance in our city," Lyons responded. "Other groups want signs put up too. I understand Sanford Main Street wants some type of signs. When is it going to stop?"

"I agree," Lessard said. "I don't want to put up more signs either, but we would be remiss if we didn't warn our citizens who sit and fish along the shoreline. I don't see any alternative to those signs."

Planning and Development Director Jay Marder told the commission that the latest contact with the GFC had indicated they would be willing to place the signs along the wa-

terfront 1,000 feet apart rather than 500 feet.

During the regular commission meeting, Deputy Mayor Whitey Eckstein asked a member of the audience, Carma Davis, recognized as an avid fisherman, to comment on the restrictions on the black crappie fish. "It's absolutely ridiculous," he responded. "I've watched people sit on the shore and fish for years," he said. "It is very rare to see any black crappie 12 inches or longer. This is going to really hurt folks, especially those who fish for food."

Deputy Fire Chief Ron Neal also commented. "As I understand it," he said, "the Fish Commission is only looking at this rule for Lake Monroe. There are a lot of other areas in the state where there are restrictions on the crappie, (also known as the speckled perch) where the limit is 10 inches. That seems to work, but I agree, having a 12-inch restriction is ridiculous."

Deputy Mayor Eckstein questioned what ramifications may come if the city attempted to challenge the GFC over this matter.

"I'd be concerned what may

happen if we attempt to defy this law," observed Commissioner Velma Williams. She moved to table the request pending more research.

Her motion did not receive a second however, as Commissioner Lessard stood his ground regarding what he said was the responsibility of the city to inform fishermen of this restriction.

Lessard then moved to approve the request, with the 1,000-foot distance requirement between signs, but only for one year, after which the request would be reviewed. The motion passed by a 3 to 1 vote, with Lyons in opposition.

Regarding the placement of the historical signs, Lyons reiterated his stand against what

he said were too many signs in the city, but when Lessard later moved to approve that request, he said, "I'll go along with Commissioner Lessard on this, but only if he tours the city and personally removes a similar number of other signs which probably don't belong where they are in the first place."

Marder spoke on the matter telling the commission that the Historic Preservation Board had already reviewed the request for the historical signs and thought the proposal was good.

The request from the FDOT for the use of right-of-way areas for the historical signs was eventually approved by a unanimous vote.

tomers and diminishes our ability to provide the best possible service for the lowest possible price."

TWC is pursuing different avenues that will make it easier to prosecute cable crime offenders. They are trying to get more law enforcement agencies like the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, the State Attorney General's Office and others interested in this crime. "Cable theft is more frequent than we all realize," said Diane Pickett, vice president of public affairs for

TWC. "Theft is becoming more sophisticated."

Recently, an area college student was convicted of tampering with cable service equipment. Mitch Jaffe now faces a \$25,000 fine, five years probation and 200 hours of community service. Jaffe was apprehended by Time Warner security representatives, campus police and the Orange County Sheriff's Department. Jaffe pled guilty to altering three pieces of equipment and pirating programming. This conviction is the third in as many months.

Mayor Larry Dale was absent from the meeting, which was presided over by Deputy Mayor Whitey Eckstein. Commissioner Velma Williams was addressing the audience regarding her concerns over the plight of the homeless and poor in the city.

There were approximately 35 persons in the audience. The doors to the hallway behind the commission chambers were open.

Suddenly, what sounded like a gunshot was heard coming from the direction of the hallway. Williams stopped speaking and absolute silence gripped the chambers.

Within seconds, which seemed like minutes, Public Works Director Jerry Herman, Personnel Director Tim McCauley and others left their

seats in the chambers to investigate.

McCauley returned almost immediately and nodded to the commissioners indicating nothing was seriously wrong. The meeting continued.

After the meeting, McCauley explained. "It was really nothing. A man out in the hallway dropped his clip board and it fell flat on the tile floor," he said. "But it did sound like a gunshot."

To make light of the situation, Commissioner Brady Lessard pretended to check the back of Mayor Dale's empty chair. "No holes here," he commented.

While the loud bang was an accident, spectators and city officials left the room commenting that, considering what had happened in Washington, the sound nonetheless gave them a brief jolt of fear.

other members had for those who were lost. At no point did he express anger at those who were responsible for the ugly crime. The precious memory of those he loved outweighed all other emotions.

"Unless you personally experienced the loss of not one but three family members to a violent crime, you cannot understand what we are going through at this time," said Razor, a thin man with a long, narrow face. He wore a green, short-sleeved shirt and blue jeans.

"With the loss of almost an entire family so unexpectedly," he said, "we are facing many emotions difficult to express....words cannot begin to express what is missing in our lives or the emotions directly related to this loss."

Razor tried to look up after reading what he had on the papers, especially the heartfelt thoughts he had for his sister, his "brother-in-love" and young Christine whom he called Chrissier.

"Robin," he said, "came into this world anemic and never passed 100 pounds in her life. But no matter how tiny she was physically, she had a heart bigger than anyone that I have ever known. Although she was small in size she has left a large place in the hearts of all that knew her."

Razor said that his sister "loved Danny Ray, loved her children and is loved by her family." He said that Danny Ray and Robin were never married but that they loved one another from the time they were very young. He was fun-loving and lighthearted. He was

better than a brother-in-law, he was a brother-in-love."

It was even more difficult for Razor to talk about Chrissier. "She was so young, so full of life and had so much to offer," he said. "Yet she is still a victim of what appears to be the most senseless of acts. We as a family can not imagine, why a family, but most of all why such a precious child was taken."

"Chrissier had her dreams of becoming a veterinarian, and those of us who knew her, she was off to a good start. An honor student at school and a true lover of animals, she was beginning to make her childhood dream come true."

Lovingly, Razor recalled a goat named "Cinderella" that Chrissier fed from birth and that had to be tied if she left the yard. The goat would cry until she was out of sight and on the school bus. The girl also had a pet rooster she named "Henry."

Razor said that one day his son, Daniel, wanted a wild kitten but was too young to catch

it, Chrissier, he said, crawled and crossed many obstacles to catch the kitten and in only two weeks had tamed it and given it to Daniel. "Tiny is still a constant reminder of her gentle spirit," Razor said.

The family was thankful, Razor said, that Chrissier's 14-year-old sister, Danielle, was spared. She was with friends the night of the killings but at 14, her mother, father and sister were gone. The family would care and love her. "We respectfully request that you use compassion in dealing with this situation, keeping in mind she has a life to rebuild."

With another relative standing to his side and frequently lending support, Razor said that his sister Robin and Danny Ray Privett were the "happiest couple" he knew. "I keep saying that this just couldn't happen, but it can."

"Whenever you leave your family each day, be sure to hug them, kiss them and say how much you love them," Razor said, looking upward, "because they may not be there when

you get home."

Funeral services will be conducted noon Wednesday at First Baptist Church of Geneva. There will be a graveside service at the Geneva Cemetery. There is a Razor/Privett Trust Fund established to help the family. Donations can be made at any Barnett Bank.

Don't give up your childhood too soon, Matt

SANFORD There are several million reasons for Matt Kuchar to turn pro. And there are only a few reasons why he shouldn't.

But he shouldn't. If Kuchar, a Heathrow resident and recent Seminole High School graduate, turns pro, he'll immediately walk into endorsement deals worth millions of dollars. His smile and his play in two of the three majors this year had the golf world forgetting Tigermania for awhile and he was, and still is, a breath of fresh air on the stodgy PGA Tour.

There's also millions more in appearance fees once the "silly season" begins after the end of the regular season. He can make himself a very rich 20-year-old.

But let's forget about the money, or at least, try to forget about the money for a moment.

Kuchar is a sophomore at Georgia Tech and that education isn't something to sneeze at. Also, remember, it's not like Kuchar has dominated the junior golf scene his whole life. Sure, he had an outstanding career at Seminole, and his finish at the Masters and U.S. Open were spectacular indeed. His win at the U.S. Amateur last year proved he has the toughness and he played well at the Bell South in Atlanta early this year.

But he hasn't been through qualifying school, golf's toughest tournament, even once. In fact, his high school teammate, Jeremy Anderson, a star now at UNLV, may be even better than Kuchar.

It's one thing to play three or four big-time events each year. It's another thing to travel to 25 tournaments each year, all of which contain different layouts and problems.

Remember last year when Tiger took the Tour by storm?

This year, one tournament win, ironically at the Bell South.

Tiger is learning that it takes a lot more than just raw talent to win on the tour. What works at Augusta doesn't work at the U.S. Open.

A perfectly smashed 350-yard tee-shot may be great at Hartford, but it may be in a blind pot bunker at Royal Troon.

The tour takes experience and the more well-rounded a player's game is, the more zeroes he'll see on his check at the end of Sunday.

Kuchar has plenty of time to cash in. For now, how about some experience out of the pressure cooker and constant national attention.

So here's advice from someone who has never broken 88.

Stay in school, go grab another U.S. Amateur, give the majors another shot and play in a few Tour events. Get some experience.

Tiger came out with three U.S. Amateur wins and was used to the media crush since the day he turned two and appeared on national television. How many other amateurs can just walk onto the Tour before turning 21 and make a living?

The endorsements will always be there. Kuchar is something different than anyone else on the Tour and he'll always have the big companies lining up at the driving range to bend his car.

What's another year in college? Also, how many players fall on their first year of the tour? For everyone who goes through qualifying school, few never have to go back again.

Kuchar has earned the right to bypass Q-school, but the point is, rookies rarely make an impact.

So Kuchar can either get at least one more year of education at one of the nation's best universities, continue to play competitive golf on a national level and get the experience he needs to play with the big boys, or he can take a crap shoot at the PGA Tour.

It's his decision, and it's a tough one for anyone, let alone a college sophomore, but here's hoping he enjoys his childhood a little while longer.

The money will still be there next year.

The 6-foot-7, hard-throwing righthander will join former Seminole High School star on the Orioles' Sarasota entry in the Gulf Coast League.

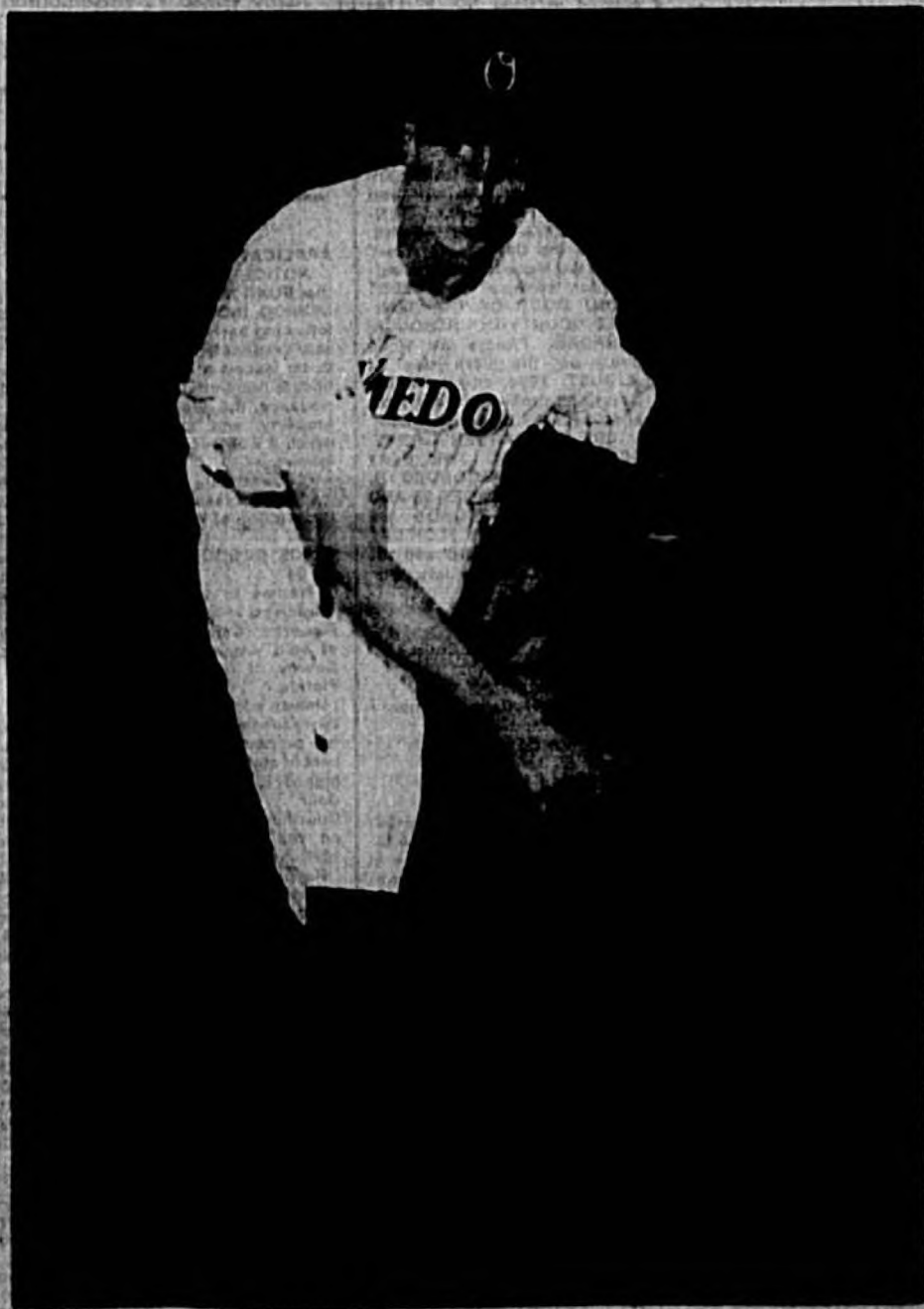

DEAR DR. GOTT: My 48-year-old brother has asthma for which he was prescribed an inhaler to be used four times a day when necessary.

He is way overdoing it and sometimes uses his inhaler every two hours. I think that he has a secret addiction to inhalers that his doctors don't know about, and I wonder if such overuse could harm him.

DEAR READER: Asthma, a breathing disorder marked by bronchial spasm, can often be relieved by inhaling drugs that reverse the spasm, wheezing and difficulty breathing. Such inhalers are often combined with other medicine, such as steroids, in pills or sprays.

These inhalers should not be overused because they can be dangerous. Complications include palpitations, tremor, nausea, dizziness, hypertension, angina, vomiting, headache and paradoxical bronchospasm.

The usual dose is two inhalations every four to six hours.

The fact that your brother is abusing this prescription drug is not an indication of addiction in the usual sense. Rather, the inhaler is not an effective antidote and he is risking several serious health consequences by using it excessively.

It would be more appropriate for him to return to his physician for re-evaluation and modification of the therapy. There are several safer strategies for your brother to employ. The doctor can guide him or, if necessary, refer him to a pulmonary specialist for additional advice. The habit of using an inhaler every two hours is dangerous and ineffective.

Garlic is safe and generally devoid of side effects. Those consumers who object to the acerbic taste of garlic can purchase de-odorized garlic or allicin extract. Garlic is a beneficial and delicious natural remedy.

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Leading with one's right

By Phillip Alder

Left-handers are sometimes called southpaws (particularly in baseball and boxing). Where did the expression come from? Why aren't right-handed people known as northpaws?

I haven't carried out a study of leading bridge players to find the best southpaw. But the person with the opening lead sits to declarer's left. Covering the other three hands, see if you can find the killing initial blow against three no-trumps on this deal.

Normally, against a no-trump contract, you lead from your longest suit. And if that suit is headed by three honors, of which at least two are touching, ordinarily you select the top of those touching honors. So, usually you would

select the diamond king as the opening suit. You hope to establish five tricks, get back in with the spade ace, and finish off declarer with the remaining diamonds.

Here, though, South opened one diamond. If you are leading from a long suit that has been bid by an opponent, it is often better to lead your fourth highest, not from your honor sequence.

Note that if you lead the diamond king, declarer will get home. Probably he will duck the first trick. Then what will you do? If you continue with the diamond jack (or queen), the appearance of East's 10 permits South to win the trick and drive out your spade ace. If instead you lead a low diamond at trick two, declarer ducks again. After a low-diamond lead at trick one, though, South has no chance.

It has been discovered that cats are either left- or right-handed. So, presumably they may be called southpaws or northpaws.

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Animal population is growing at the zoo

SANFORD - The latest publication ZOOViews, the official Member Publication of the Central Florida Zoological Society in Sanford, indicates the continued growth in population at the zoo. Some new arrivals were born (or hatched) at the zoo, while others have been acquired from various outside sources.

Recent new births at the zoo include a Black Handed Spider Monkey, South African Crested Porcupine, Wreathed Hornbill, Green-winged Macaw, Red-fronted Macaw, and a Helmeted Iguana.

All of the above however, being newborns, are not to be put on immediate exhibit. The zoo practices an extensive care process to assure health for the young, prior to being put on display.

Other new arrivals at the zoo

from other sources include an Amur Leopard in the animal kingdom. Reptile additions include the Sri Lankan Tree Viper, Eastern Diamondback Rattlesnake, Southern Copperhead, Eastern Cottonmouth, Shingle-back Skink, and Crocodile Skink. Again, none of these are on public exhibit at this time, while zoo specialists keep track of their progress to assure a healthy condition.

A Caracal and Dwarf Zebu have been obtained, as have an East African Crowned Crane, Red-billed Hornbill, Prehensile-tailed Skink and Leaf-tailed Gecko. All of these are now on display to the general public.

Many of the newest members of the lizard species will be open to a members-only sneak preview set from 8 to 9 a.m. on Friday, Sept. 4. The event, called "Lizards of the

Islands" will feature Grand Cayman Island rock iguanas, and the New Guinea crocodile monitor.

Zoo members wishing to attend this special function are asked to contact the zoo by Aug. 31 (extension 110).

For persons wishing to become a member of the Central Florida Zoological Society, memberships are now available for \$20 per year for one adult, \$25 for a senior plus one guest, \$30 for an adult and one guest, \$40 for a family, or grandparents with their grandchildren under age \$18, and \$75 for full family/grandparent memberships with voting privileges.

around the Clifton Springs Run, a tributary which feeds into Lake Jesup at what used to be Hiley's Fish Camp. The company also owns two lots, in the name of Moore, adjacent to Thomas' three, on the west side of the run. The company will not divulge its plans for the land, but has donated right-of-way to the county for road improvements.

Clifton Springs claims to

own a strip of land between the run and Thomas' cottage. Thomas, who bought the property in 1984, has always had access to the springs, from her back yard, and has built a canoe launch on her property.

Thomas alleges that Wood and Moore have tried to intimidate her by verbally assaulting a friend of hers, making derogatory and inflammatory remarks to third parties, damaged her property, fired guns at

the rear of her property, and had her watched and photographed without her permission. She also claims that a tiki torch, unlit, but filled with flammable liquid, was thrown onto her porch.

The tiki torch incident occurred the day Thomas tore down a fence the company had erected between her home and the shoreline.

Wood said the fence will be replaced. "She has acted very,

very badly as a neighbor. She put up the first No Trespassing sign." Wood also claims Thomas built her canoe launch without a permit, for which she was cited.

"After the tiki torch was thrown on my cottage I became very afraid for my life," Thomas said in a written statement.

Thomas and her attorneys are appealing a ruling made by Circuit Court Judge O.H. Eaton, regarding the legal ownership of the property along the shoreline.

Clifton Springs is a warm water spring system which pumps 1 million gallons of purified water into Lake Jesup each day. A sensitive ecosystem, the area is home to two endangered species, the Sulphur Spring Apphastrocon, a snail, and the Great Leather Fern.

Thomas said the state of Florida has not intervened on the question of protecting the water source, but The Sierra Club, through Lake Jesup chairwoman Cecilia Height, has established a legal defense fund, to help Thomas cover the costs of the suits. Thomas put a second mortgage on her cottage, but those funds have run out and her attorneys are currently working for free.

In the jury trial, Thomas will have to prove that the intentional acts allegedly committed by Clifton Springs Corp. and Wood and Moore, are "beyond the bounds of decency and atrocious behavior."

Relatives and neighbors of the victims are trying to contribute to the investigations but admit they are afraid of what might happen if authorities don't have the right suspect.

Becky Privett, Robin Razor's sister, says she has been getting no more than an hour or two of sleep the last week since the murders.

"Is it over?" Privett said, "or

if they don't have the right guy, they might not be done. We're afraid someone else is lurking out there."

Authorities have told the Privett and Razor families to keep their children "under wraps" if the man they took in custody - Michael Reynolds - is not the killer. (This was before Reynolds was named a suspect).

In the most difficult hours of her life, Becky Privett and the other survivors bury their lost loved ones today. There is a noon service at First Baptist Church in Geneva and burial in the Geneva Cemetery.

Becky Privett is 10 years older than her sister, Robin Razor. She said they grew up in central Indiana and came here

17 years ago. "She was a wonderful girl, very thoughtful and giving to others," Privett said. "I cannot understand how this could have happened."

Privett said Tuesday that to her knowledge Reynolds had lived only a short time on Clekk Circle and did not think he knew her relatives. "I don't think they ever socialized," she said.

Now, some of those in the Clekk Circle neighborhood would like the sheriff to check out just who is living in the scattered camp of trailers. Are they any others who have outstanding warrants?

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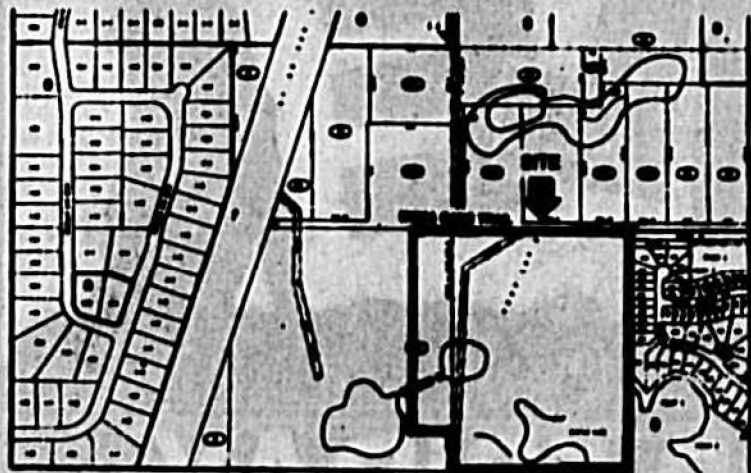

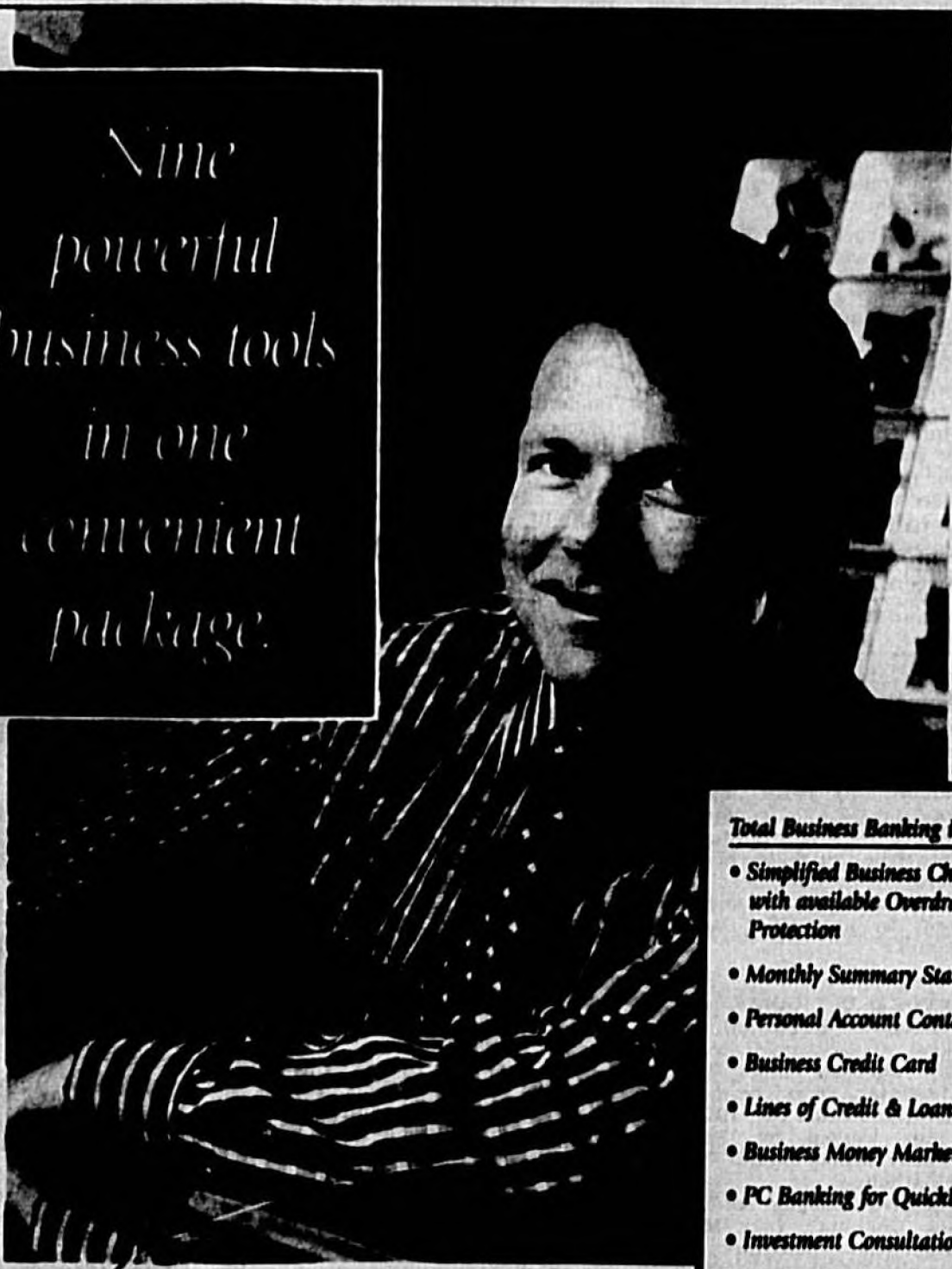

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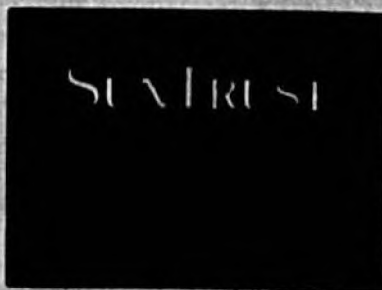

Rod Laver - the best of champs

SANFORD - His left arm was bigger than Popeye's, his legs short but sturdy and his reflexes lightning quick. He was Crocodile Dundee in short pants, an awesome Aussie who twice won the Grand Slam of Tennis.

Rod Laver epitomized class in a sport that allowed itself to deteriorate soon after he was off the grand prix circuit tour. The whiny, foul-mouthed racket throwing brats that succeeded Laver paled in comparison to him.

He was called the Rocket because of his explosive serve and deft net game. He could blast away from the base line, especially when challenged on the backhand side. This was and may always rank as the best shot in tennis history - Rocket Laver's backhand.

Unlike many of those in came in his footsteps, Laver was a gentleman's player. He did not curse or scream or blame a referee for a call he didn't like. More than likely he got the benefit of a call because of his decorum - and then declined it.

It was the custom 30 years ago for even the world's best tennis players to call their own lines in tournaments.

So it was late one afternoon in steamy Washington D.C., for a match between Laver and his Australian countryman Ken Rosewall. They played on a sidecourt without a ref.

Rosewall was a marvelous player with an abundance of strokes and a handog look as if he were losing each match he ever played.

The other pros were beginning to carry handsome tote bags with their extra rackets and equipment but Rosewall choose to stick several rackets under his arm and use a plain paper bag for some other items.

Playing without a ref was no problem for Laver or Rosewall. They laughed about some calls that were close and smiled as they changed courts.

I do not remember who won that particular day. These guys were both winners as far as I'm concerned, and it'll be a cold day in Hades that the likes of them come along again.

Laver, 59, was in Los Angeles on Monday doing an interview for ESPN-TV when he suffered a major stroke. He was rushed to the hospital and a report Tuesday morning said that his condition was critical. The Rocket's toughest match yet.

Seemingly indestructible legends of sport sooner or later are challenged in life-threatening situations. Baseball's best hitter, Ted Williams, has had a series of debilitating strokes that have caused him to lose much of his once superior eye sight and to walk with a cane.

Before the strokes, Williams enjoyed playing tennis right into his 70s. He played Rosewall in a celebrity event and he probably met or played Laver somewhere, sometime. That would have been a sight, indeed, two left-handed sluggers belting away at each other.

Now we can only pray that these champions do their best to rehab from strokes. When you think about it, Rod Laver and Ted Williams represent a much more enchanting era in sports. They were the best. The very best.

Editor's note - Late Tuesday night it was reported that Laver had suffered a moderate stroke and his condition had been upgraded from critical to serious. He was conscious, but was having some trouble with speaking and his right arm and leg.

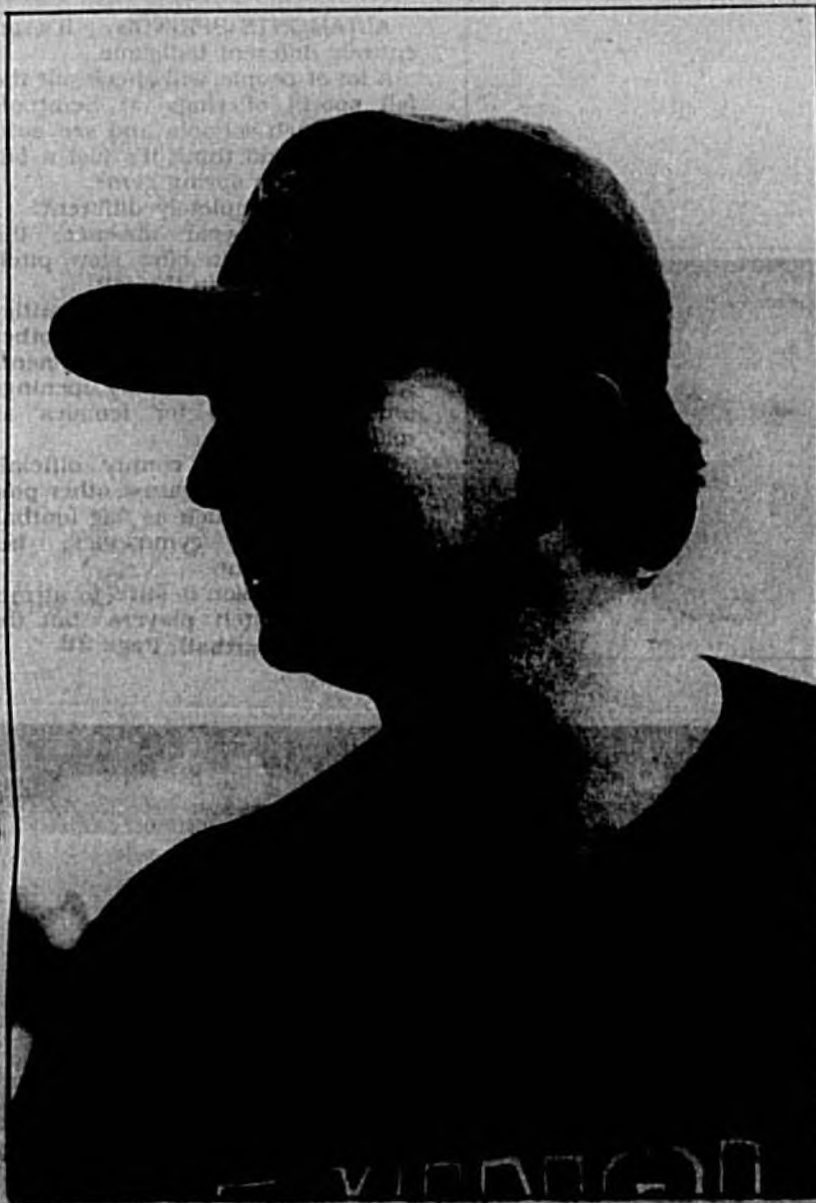

game is completely different. For example, a team with a good pitcher in fast pitch can dominate. Lake Mary won the state championship in the spring with an overwhelming three-person pitching staff.

A solid pitcher gives up few hits and batters are trying to make contact, slapping at the pitch rather than taking the ball swing in slow pitch.

Also, in slow pitch, once most pitches look the same, runs will be plentiful instead of the 1-0 games often seen in the spring game.

"They are two completely different types of games," Ferrell said. "There will be a whole lot more hitting and running."

When Seminole County switched to fast pitch, it did so mostly out of concern for college scholarships.

With college teams playing predominantly fast pitch, Seminole County athletes were being overlooked, but that has changed and each year several girls have signed college scholarships since the change.

The game will, at least originally, be treated much like boys volleyball in Seminole County, which is a club sport. In volleyball, each school participates in VolleyFest, a tournament at Lake Mary to crown an unofficial state champion.

This year, Lake Brantley will host a similar softball event at the end of the regular season and Ferrell said he has been in contact with coaches from all over Central Florida asking them to compete.

He said about half of the

schools in Orange County will play slow pitch with others kicking off rhythmic gymnastics.

Ferrell said Lake Brantley is still looking to add some week-day games, but the seven county teams that comprise the Seminole Athletic Conference and will crown a champion will meet every Saturday at a different county site.

The first of the weekly jamborees will kick off at Altamonte Springs' Merrill Park, where the Patriots will play until Lake Brantley South, a campus extension being constructed at the old Teague Middle School site is completed next year.

The season will open Saturday, September 12th at 9 a.m.

The format will be the home team taking on an opponent at 9 a.m. with that visiting team staying on the field for another game after its first.

Saying 'no' to a child's behavior

DEAR DR. GOTT: My 6-year-old son will often pull down his pants in public and dance around naked. He has now taken to fondling himself until he has an erection, then announcing to all in attendance: "Look what I've got here!" His father is amused and dismisses this behavior as "kid stuff." Should I be concerned?

the practitioners failed miserably. The authors concluded that this failure "is unrefuted evidence that the claims of therapeutic touch are groundless and that further professional use is unjustified." Case closed.

DEAR READER: A large part of raising a child is to indicate what is acceptable behavior and what isn't. Dropping your drawers in public is not acceptable. True, little boys often want to show off and express pride in their anatomy, but there has to be a time and a place for such exhibitionism.

First of all, you and your husband have to get your act together. You must approach the problem in agreement, much as you would if your son urinated on the street or consistently abused other children. The youngster must be taught that his inappropriate behavior in public will not be tolerated. If he wants to dance around naked and fondle himself, fine — as long as he does it in the privacy of the home.

You do not have to justify your position. Simply tell him that, although you love him, this behavior has to stop — and be willing to back up your decision. The child needs to know who's boss. If you take a gentle but firm stand now, you will have a much easier time disciplining him (and teaching him) as he gets older. Permissive parents often regret having been too liberal, when their children grow into adolescence without respecting reasonable rules — or the adults themselves.

Of course, you don't want to make a big deal out of this, because of the risk of undermining your son's spontaneity and exuberance. In my mind, the whole issue can be dealt with successfully and succinctly by just saying "No!" and meaning it.

DEAR DR. GOTT: You are wrong to pan therapeutic touch. It really works. I know because I am a therapeutic touch practitioner.

DEAR READER: Those who believe in this nonsense claim to cure disease by manual manipulation of a "human energy field." Touch practice guides describe three basic steps, none of which actually requires touching the patient's body. The list of derived benefits is long and includes pain relief and bringing the dead back to life. This is pure fantasy.

You and other believers might be interested in reading an article in the April 1, 1998 issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association in which several researchers (including a sixth-grade student) scientifically tested the skills of 21 therapeutic-

touch practitioners.

The practitioners were blindfolded and asked to determine whether the investigator's hand hovered above the practitioners' left or right hands. The responses were correct in 44 percent of the encounters, less than the 50-percent figure that would have been obtained by chance alone. In short,

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Take in the whole picture

If you have ever taken photographs using a flash gun but with the shutter speed set too high, you will have noticed that you don't get a full shot. Part of the picture is in the dark.

It can be the same at the bridge table. If you don't take the deal as a whole into consideration, you might do the right thing in isolation, but end up going down when you could have succeeded.

How would you normally play today's heart suit for no losers? How would you play in six hearts after a spade lead from West?

Yes, West was cautious in passing on the first round. With such good dis-

tribution, it is worth bidding. North's four-diamond response was a splinter bid. It showed game values in hearts — which is what that hand is worth — with at most a singleton diamond.

Taken in isolation, the percentage play — by two percent — for no heart losers is to cash the ace. Yet that is the wrong play here. The right line is to take both spade tricks and the diamond ace before ruffing the diamond four in the dummy. Then declarer calls for the heart queen and finessees (unless East plays the king, of course). Here, the finesse wins, and South is playing for an overtrick. But suppose West could scoop up the trick with a singleton heart king. What could he do next? If he switches to a club, it is into declarer's tenace. Alternatively, if he returns a spade or diamond, declarer ruffs in the dummy and discards his low club. Either way, declarer loses no club trick and is home free.
