Dangling 'Trooper Feared Cold

GOLDSBORO, N. C. (UPI)—A teenage paratrooper, whose parachute line snapped and left him dangling from an airplane, said he was "mostly worried about the cold" as he was pulled through the air at two miles a minute.
"I was afraid I would freeze," Pfc. Michael A. McDonald, 17, of Missouri, Mont., said in a news conference. McDonald was making a training jump with units of the 101st Airborne Division when the static line, which pulls parachutes open in mass jumps, failed to part from McDonald's chute. He dangled 1,500 feet above the ground as crewmen of the C-119 vainly tried to haul him back aboard. The force of the wind knocked the paratrooper unconscious for five to 10 seconds. He was pulled some 23 miles.
Then the shroud lines on his chute broke, freeing him, and McDonald opened his reserve chute and drifted to safety in a tree top.
His reaction to the incident: "It was a sunny feeling."

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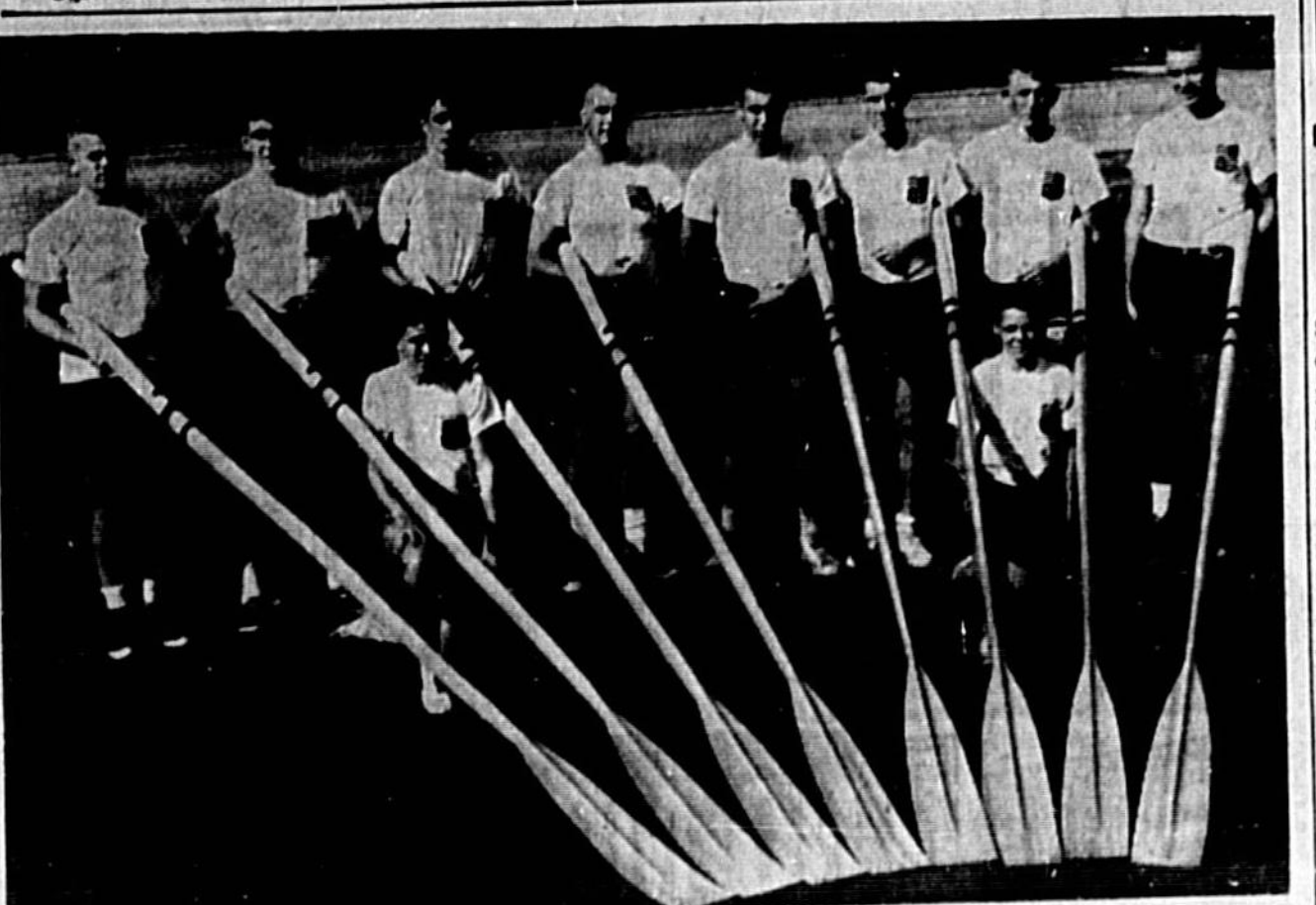
Academy Rowers Vie Here

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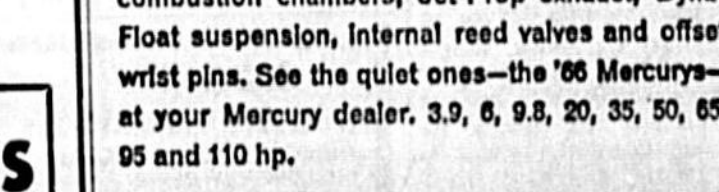

Medical News

When parents set clear rules of conduct which they expect their children to obey, and when they enforce these rules with respect and affection, they are likely to rear successful and happy children. This is one conclusion from a seven-year study conducted by the National Institute of Mental Health.

The most successful youngsters in school and at play, the study showed, were those who were highest self-esteem. They came from homes with the strictest parents. The parents of these children were likely to feel it more important that their children meet high standards than that they enjoy themselves. They were also apt to regard "achievement" as more important than "sociability."

Strict parents, the study shows, granted their children more responsibility, listened to them more closely, gave them a say in making family plans, knew virtually all their friends, and tolerated sharp disagreements more than permissive parents.

Although the stricter parents did not necessarily spend more time with their children, they were deeply interested in them and enjoyed being with them.

The firm parents, the study indicates, respect themselves, are independent and less conforming, and are interested in community affairs.

The mother frequently had worked for a long time, had enjoyed her work, and had drawn self-confidence from it. She welcomed child-rearing and did not let it cut her off from her other interests. Such women were satisfied with their marriages, husbands and the way the latter helped to raise the children. The strict father was usually successful, self-confident and the family disciplinarian.

Both parents were direct and realistic and expected and usually got the best out of life. They were able to instill in their children a sense of high self-esteem and the idea that they could and would succeed in life.

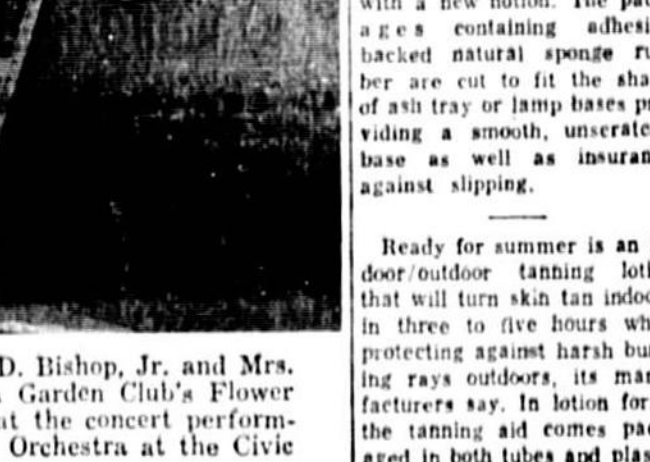

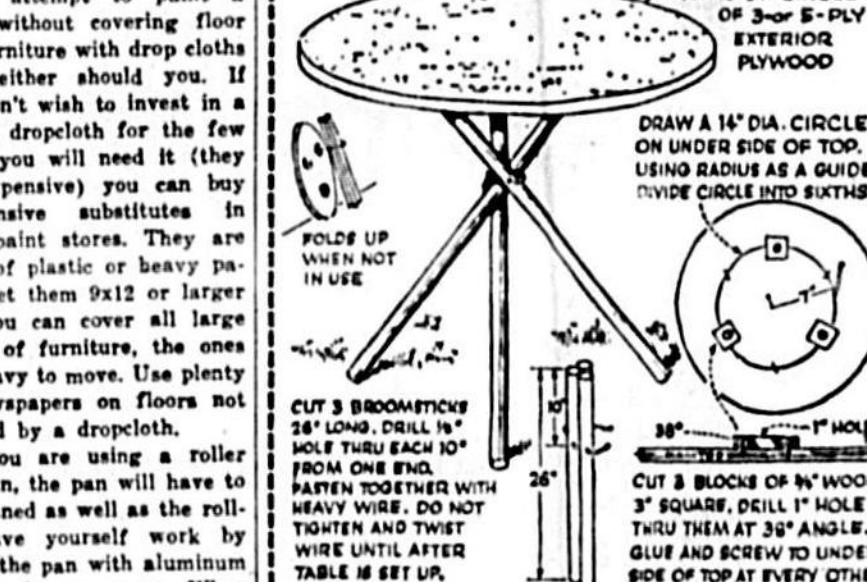

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Striking Rail Firemen Defy Court Order

United Press International
 Locomotive firemen spurned a personal appeal from Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz and defied a federal court order today to continue a strike against eight major railroads.

Freight and passenger service was crippled in 26 states.

In two cities, Boston and Chicago, thousands of commuters were forced to find alternate ways of getting to work for the second straight day.

H. E. Gilbert, president of the striking AFL-CIO Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, emerged from a long meeting with Wirtz in the nation's capital shortly before midnight Thursday and said he did not give a "firm answer" to Wirtz's plea.

Wirtz told newsmen he had asked Gilbert to meet at 8:00 a.m. today and was expected to appeal it in court today. Wirtz, who said he was informed of developments, indicated he would meet again with the union leaders.

The strike began at 12:01 a.m. local time Thursday and closed hundreds of trains from Maine to California.

The Pennsylvania, Union Pacific, Missouri Pacific and Central railroads were the biggest lines affected.

VC Terrorists Slay 3 U. S. MPs

SAIGON (UPI)—Viet Cong terrorists slaying three U. S. MPs to death and a fourth in a battle with dynamite today in the bloodiest anti-American terrorism of the Vietnamese war.

Four Vietnamese were killed and 113 American officers and soldiers wounded.

The pre-dawn blast ripped the face of the 10-story steel and concrete Victoria Hotel in the suburbs and reduced the bottom four floors to rubble.

200 sleeping Americans got a brief warning from the small arms chatter and a Communist incendiary bomb and all escaped death. Many leaped from their beds and flattened themselves against the floor.

On the troubled political front, anti-government demonstrators in the northern university city of Hue held U. S. Gen. Pham Xuan Thieu, third ranking member of the government, hostage. They demanded for an apology for U. S. "interference in Vietnam's political affairs but this could not be couched. Chieu was escorted by student leaders from the 17 to headquarters of a Communist weapons factory and Viet Cong training camp.

Bitter Facts Of Life

By Phil Newsum

In the fall of 1961, Finnish President Urho Kekkonen returned to Helsinki from a visit to the United States and was widely demanded: "It the republic still standing?"

It was a reflection of one of two bitter facts of life which the Finns have had to live with since 1918. One is the absolute necessity for getting along with her huge neighbor, the Soviet Union, and the other is that whatever may happen the Finns must depend upon themselves.

Together they form the keystone of Finland's foreign policy.

Internationally, as well, the proximity of the Soviet Union exercises a profound influence.

For this reason also this week's Finnish elections take on special importance. For the first time since 1918 the Finns see some hope of political stability.

Largely because of their special relationship with the Soviet Union and the result: sharp political divisions within their own boundaries. Finnish history since 1918 has been one of a succession of weak coalition governments and dismal failures.

The single unifying factor has been Kekkonen, the president and seemingly the only politician the Russians trust. Among the approximately 4.5 million Finns, approximately 23 per cent vote Communist.

The other two largest parties have been the Agrarians, recently demoted Center, and the Social Democratic party.

In 1961, Kekkonen was forced to break off his American visit because of Russian fears that a Social Democratic-backed candidate might take over the Finnish presidency in elections scheduled for 1962.

The Russians feared a change in Finnish foreign policy and on their side the Finns feared Russian demand for bases on Finnish territory.

Kekkonen's diplomatic foresight was to form a government of moderate, a newspaper editor named Rafael Paasio and a move to bring the party back from its political exile.

In this week's parliamentary elections, the Social Democrats emerged the big winners. As Socialists, the Social Democrats long since have abandoned Marx but in combination with the Agrarians they could bring to Finland the political stability it needs.

But the final outcome may depend upon the Russians.

The weakness of organized labor in its feudal demands that the Johnson administration promise the fact that there is not much public sympathy for amendment of the Taft-Hartley Act.

Another weakness in the labor position, of course, is that politicians are accustomed to violating their campaign promises whenever it seems to be desirable to do so.

If the standards of common honesty expected of American businessmen were imposed on politicians, some of the politicians could be jailed on charges of dishonesty in the pursuit of votes. In fact, it would be a felony to put a copy of a presidential platform in the mail if the politicians were held to the standards required of stockbrokers and the usual high securities to the public.

The Johnson administration went through the motions of seeking repeal of Taft-Hartley Section 11B as demanded by the Democratic party's labor allies. But the heat was not there. It was quite evident that the President did not regard repeal as a matter to top urgency.

So it is that the labor groups are muttering threats of this and that, such as rejection of the Democratic party. Such is not likely because big labor has no place to go.

Individual Republicans, congressional candidates would welcome labor support, of course. But the national party scarcely could accommodate itself to the policies big labor exacts in payment for its support.
