JAPANESE PAY FINAL TRIBUTE TO DEAD RULER

Funeral Services For Late Emperor Yoshihito Started At 6 O'Clock This Evening With Mammuth Procession

Thousands Are In The Funeral Procession

Huge Cart Drawn By Oxen Bears Casket; New Ruler Is Represented By Brother

TOKIO, Feb. 7.—(INS)—With more than 1,600 priests and Ritualists participating in the ceremonies, Ochibito, late emperor of Japan, who died Christmas morning, was buried tonight, with the most impressive and resplendent ceremonies the empire of the rising sun has seen in nearly two decades.

With the glow of thousands of lanterns and torches the ceremonies began at 6 A. M., when the funeral procession left the palace in the heart of Tokio. They will end at dawn tomorrow at Higashiyasaka, a country village on the Musashi plain, about 30 miles from Tokio, when the mortal remains of the one hundred and twenty-third occupant of the world's most ancient throne, will be laid to rest in the mausoleum especially built to receive it.

E. M. ELLIOTT IS FREED ON CHARGE OF SLAYING WIFE

Millionaire Developer Of St. Petersburg Released When State's Star Witness Fails To Show For Session Today

CLEARWATER, Fla., Feb. 7.—(INS)—E. M. Elliott, millionaire-developer and promoter, charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of his wife, Mrs. Eunice Foster Elliott, last June, went free in Pinellas county circuit court here today when State's Attorney E. P. Wilson requested that the case be nolle prossed because the principal prosecution witness, Annie Gladstone, formerly a negro servant in the Elliott home could not be located.

The defense refused to consent to the adjournment, evidence to be taken at a subsequent stenographic hearing which resulted in Elliott's release at the time in \$20,000 bonds.

Elliott's counsel said they believed no attempt would be made to re-indict him.

After consulting with an attorney on June 26 preparatory to filing a divorce suit, it was alleged, Mrs. Elliott returned to her home and Elliott barred her entrance. She then went to the rear, it was stated, and while attempting to enter the house here she fell to the concrete walk and fractured her skull.

Evidence submitted in the coroner's inquest caused Judge Tammie to hold Elliott on a first-degree murder charge but it was changed to manslaughter when State's Attorney E. P. Wilson contended the evidence did not warrant the murder charge.

Witnesses—Mrs. Elliott's fatal fall included her daughter, Madeline, 17, and Munson, 24, a son.

In giving his version of the affair at the time, Elliott said he learned his wife was going to sue for divorce and that at the same time he heard that a bank in which he had a large deposit had closed its doors. He was worried and when Mrs. Elliott drove out to the home he visited her admittance, he said, and the rear to the back of the house here reached there just in time to see her fall to her death.

Complaint Is Filed Against Gainesville Heads By Ice Concern

GAINESVILLE, Fla., Feb. 7.—(INS) Hearing on a bill of complaint in which the Florida West Coast Ice Company is seeking a temporary injunction against the City of Gainesville will be held here today before Judge A. V. Long, of the Eighth Judicial circuit.

This suit is the outgrowth of action by the city of Gainesville last week in which streets were opened up, surrounding the site of the ice company's proposed new plant in order to prevent them from having a connection run with the power lines of the Florida Power Corporation.

Fred Hampton, Gainesville attorney representing the ice company, is basing the bill of complaint upon the fact that the city is opening up streets marked on a plat of 1924 which was drawn in 1902 and that the city is trespassing upon land which is leased to the ice company until 1938.

Floridian On Trial For Murder In N. Y.

MINEOLA, N. Y., Feb. 7.—(INS)—Harold F. Webster, young Florida real estate salesman, went on trial here today charged with the first degree murder of his mother-in-law, Mrs. Catherine Gallaway, at Mineola, last January 1.

Animals Of Florida Farms And Ranges Show Decrease Over Last Year, Is Report

ORLANDO, Fla., Feb. 7.—(INS)—The total number of animals on Florida farms and ranges shows a slight decrease over last year, the estimated number, on Jan. 1 of this year being one per cent less than Jan. 1, 1926, according to a Florida livestock report issued by H. A. Marks, agricultural statistician of the United States Department of Agriculture here today.

Horses and cattle show a increase of four per cent while mules and mule colts continue to hold their own," the review stated. "The number of all cattle is on the decrease due to a large number of range cattle being marketed. Cows and heifers kept for milk, however, are on the increase, the estimated number being about

one per cent greater than a year ago. The number of sheep remains the same. All swine increased about six per cent over last year. Gated prices for pork and the tendency of farmers to economize on labor in harvesting crops by hogs, believe responsible.

Although total number of livestock has decreased by one per cent, total farm value shows a 1.1 per cent decrease. Harness and mules show a lower value, due probably to less demand in staple farming sections. All cattle have decreased in value per head as well as in numbers, making a decrease in farm value of 22 per cent. Sheep and swine are the only kinds of livestock to show increases in value.

Thirteen more automobiles were entered this morning for the Chamber of Commerce's motorcade tour which is to leave Sanford at 10:45 o'clock Tuesday morning to participate with the delegation from Lake County for the celebration of the opening of the Sanford-Mt. My indictment is against the citizens who have permitted this dismoralizing institution to come into our country, and also against those who are permitting it to remain in the country and blemish the names of not only some of our girls but many of our older citizens."

"Do any of you mothers want your girl to become a gambler? If so, please stand up." Do any of you want to deposit your money in a bank whose president, or whose cashier is a gambler? If you, any of you, are willing to put your money in the care of a gambler, please stand up." Fellow Members, what would you think of a deacon of your church, a trustee, or a teacher of your Sunday school going down to Langwood and betting on the dog-racing?"

"If any of you young men would be willing to marry a girl who is a gambler, please stand up." If any of you girls would be willing (Continued on page six)

SOLONS SPEED WORK TO AVOID EXTRA SESSION

Efforts Are Concentrated On Six Appropriation Bills Although Big Calendars Are Facing Both Chambers

McNary-Haugen Bill Slated For Passage

Radio Legislation And Banking Bill Also Seem Likely To Receive Favorable Votes

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—(INS)—A dispute from Lisbon today said the Portuguese rebels at Oporto have surrendered.

Many of the rebels were killed and hundreds were wounded in the battle between the rebels and the government forces which continued from Friday to Sunday, according to a Lisbon dispatch to the Daily Express.

Following a parley between representatives of the rebels and the minister of war, at which the minister demanded unconditional surrender, which the rebels refused, the minister of war, warned all foreign residents and the civil population of Oporto to leave the city. The government troops brought up artillery and bombarded the rebels' trenches, especially in the vicinity of their headquarters at place Batata.

Hundreds of casualties and great damage to buildings of the vicinity were reported.

Communications between Northern and southern Portugal were still interrupted today and it was difficult to gauge the full results of the revolution. The uprising is headed by General Sousa Diaz, chief military commander of north Portugal. The chief object of the revolt is the abolition of the dictatorship of Gen. Carmona.

A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Vigo said the insurgents were in complete control of the northern banks of the River Douro, while the government troops were drawn up in the south bank. The two factions waged a sharp duel with machine guns and artillery while both maneuvered for a position for decisive action.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—The British Cabinet met today to consider a report from Owen O'Malley, British chargé d'affaires in China, who has recommended that the demands of Eugene Chen, Nationalist leader, be met and that large force of British troops now enroute to Shanghai be diverted.

Official advice to the foreign office indicates that no immediate military movement against Shanghai is in prospect and that Sun Chuan-fang's forces are holding their own 180 miles south of Chinchow.

SHANGHAI, Feb. 7.—(INS)—Gen. Sun Chuan-fang's armies are making a determined stand before Hangchow, according to dispatches received here. The reverses which they met at Yenchow are said to have been offset by Mihinghain and the position of the defenders of Shanghai is improved.

Military experts here believe the coming issue of the battle for Hangchow will determine whether the Cantonese armies will march to the gates of Shanghai.

The repeated assurances of Eugene Chen that the Cantonese do not intend to occupy Shanghai, or to cause any disturbances there, are being relied upon here by most of the foreigners and it is generally understood that it is the opinion of the consular body that there is no danger to the international settlement, unless mobs of Chinese get far beyond the control of their leaders.

U. S. Steamer Goes To Aid Atlantic Liner

(INS)—The United States liner President Harding, short of fuel, was anchored today in thirty-one fathoms of water off Jodidore, on the eastern shore of Halifax county, and the government steamer Lady Laurier left here this afternoon to aid the Ocean Greyhound.

The President Harding is from Bremen via Queenstown. She had been proceeding slowly under her own power.

Dynamite Explosion Kills Two Children

PITTSBURGH, Kan., Feb. 7.—(INS)—A dynamite explosion killed two small children as they slept in their homes here today and dangerously injured the mother of the two.

The dynamite, apparently placed directly under the bed in which the three were sleeping, buried them from the bed and demolished the bedroom.

The dead, Earl Robert Mayberry, 2, Florence Marcelline Mayberry, 1, Mrs. Lena Mayberry, the mother, is in a critical condition, according to attending physician.

Suzanne Lenglen Says Mary Browne Is Better Player Than Helen Wills

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—There are two really great women tennis players in the world and the other one is Mary K. Browne, if the writer is to judge the purport of a statement given him today by Suzanne Lenglen.

She said just so many words, that the thought Mary Browne was a better tennis player than Helen Wills. To give Suzanne her due, she didn't even mention herself in this connection. She didn't have to. Everyone knows the lady is good. She may even support it herself.

However, it had been understood that everyone considered Miss Wills as the unofficial runner-up in a world ranking, amateur and professional, but it seems now there is a minority opinion and it appears to consist of Suzanne Lenglen.

"From facing Miss Wills at Cannes and Mary Browne in our series of professional exhibitions, I would be inclined to favor Miss Browne to win," Suzanne declared. "Mary's improvement during the trip has been marvelous. Her backhand once was weak; now, it is strong, oh, so strong."

"After all, she is even so much more aware, her service has become stronger and her court strategy is improved immeasurably. I never know what to expect from her."

DEMPSEY WILL BEGIN TRAINING GRIND SHORTLY

Former Champion To Sojourn At Wheeler Springs, Calif., For 1st Part Conditioning

NEW YORK, Feb. 5—(INS)—Charging the United States Tennis Association with expelling its amateur not stable until they no longer are of value either to tennis or themselves, George Richards today explained his action in turning professional as one of necessity and openly hinted that Henri Cochet and Jacques Brugnon, French stars, were far from amateurs. According to Richards, the tennis association demands three to five months of a star's time out of year and will not even pay half of its expenses. He quoted as an example of the association reimbursed him for only half of it.

With a shout of glad glee, all present break forth in song. They sing in the sheer exuberance of living; they wrestle, shadow box and then start for a long walk over the mountains. Occasionally, for no particular reason, they break into a run.

It is, they explain, all part of the conditioning process whereby Jack Dempsey, former heavy weight champion of the world, hopes to discover whether he is due to return to the life he once knew. Training camp, hours—early to bed, early to rise and you miss a lot of enjoyment people—do prevail throughout their stay. So training camp diet.

Dempsey, lest I forget, is said to weigh 200 pounds, which might be worse, all things considered.

8. The management pledges that all the money received from the sale of Stock less only the cost of selling and certain necessary engineering and incidental expenses, will be held in local banks until a sufficient amount is in sight to insure completion of the first unit.

9. Among the assets of the Company are listed:

A. One of the most liberal charters ever granted by the Florida legislature.

B. Valuable rights-of-way mostly in the form of warranty deeds.

C. A large acreage of land contiguous to the right-of-way which will be greatly enhanced in value by the construction of the road.

D. Timber concessions sufficient to furnish many miles of cross ties.

E. An Orlando terminal storage site value at \$100,000.00.

F. A contract granting exclusive access by rail to the Port Canaveral Terminal Company's docks.


