More than 600 poverty-stricken families in Seminole County will be able to enjoy a happy Christmas this year thanks to the generosity of dozens of organizations and hundreds of individuals, working through the Salvation Army.

Capt. Sharon Owens said today many civic groups, church and school groups, Scouts and fraternal organizations, labor unions, clubs, Navy men and officers and kind-hearted individuals have donated food, clothing, toys, money and many other items to help provide a measure of Christmas joy for the unfortunate.

In addition to poor families who will be supplied with food, clothing and gifts to help them get through the holidays, the Salvation Army workers and other groups have prepared "sunshine bags" for patients at Seminole Memorial Hospital and nursing and rest homes throughout the area.

The "sunshine bags" will also be distributed to prisoners in the city jail.

Others include Future Farmers, Anchor Club, Central Florida Council of Labor Unions, Fleet Reserve, Navy Wives Club, Seminole High School sophomore class officers, Kiwanis Club, Rotary Club, Lions Club and many others.

Sunday at 7:00 p.m. the Salvation Army young people's group will present a Christmas Pageant, "Stranger In Bethlehem."

Peebles' Promise To Seminole

Improvements of State Road 426 between Geneva and Goldenrod, via Oviedo, is the No. 1 item on the Seminole County road agenda for 1967.

This was the promise this morning to The Sanford Herald from Willard Peebles, Wildwood, after his reappointment to the State Road Board by Gov.-elect Claude Kirk. He is the first state official named by Republican Kirk to remain in his present job.

Peebles, named to the board two years ago by Gov. Haydon Burns, was appointed by Kirk for a three-year term, reappointing the 13-county Central Florida district, including Seminole County.

"I'm a Democrat," said Peebles. "I haven't given any thought to changing." He said he was hopeful that the present interstate program would be expanded and that a "natural enlargement" in Florida would be extension of I-75 from Tampa to Miami.

Kirk, in announcing Peebles' appointment, said: "This appointment is in line with my pledge to the citizens of Florida that people holding key positions in my administration would hold them on the basis of merit rather than political expediency."

Douglas Stanstrom, chairman of the long range planning committee of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, issued the following statement: "This is a splendid Christmas present for our entire road district, and especially Seminole County. Governor-elect Kirk's appointment is in line with my pledge to the citizens of Florida that people holding key positions in my administration would hold them on the basis of merit rather than political expediency."

"The public also should know that state approval by the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads was finally secured through the efforts of Alan S. Boyd, a Floridian, who was just appointed by the President to his cabinet as secretary of the department of transportation. Mr. Boyd was under-secretary of commerce, and he deserves our gratitude."

'We're Sorry'

Four tearful and repentant boys begged "forgiveness of the people for being bad" from the county jail this morning where they are awaiting transport to a juvenile correction home.

The 15 and 16 year old youths were sentenced to the correction institution by Juvenile Judge Karllye Housholder for having shot with slingshots and BBs, Santa Claus, a clown, motorcycle driver and the horses in the Sanford Christmas parade.

The teenagers were most concerned about the embarrassment which had been brought to their mothers by their names being published in the papers. "Momma is so good and now because of what I have done, she's even been able to hold her head up in church," one boy remarked. "If the people will only forgive me, I'll never be bad again."

The boys said they hadn't meant to harm anyone. We just bought the slingshot and went to the parade to be doing something nice.

Three of the boys, according to their account, had never been in a place like this before. One of the four just recently returned from a boys' reformatory where he had been sentenced for breaking and entering.

"My mother will be so lonely for Christmas, I am her only child," one youth stated.

Following the boys' sentencing on Thursday, Judge Housholder gave permission to the mothers to have their sons home for Christmas day.

"Then they must come back to jail," Housholder said.

Peace And Goodwill

Peace and goodwill toward men is the wish for Seminole County and its citizens, expressed by county and city officials.

"If you would have one wish for the community as a gift, what would it be?" was the question asked by various elected leaders.

DeWitt Matthews, newly elected president of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce and its citizens, expressed the wish that the community would be a "unity of effort, dedicated to making Seminole County a better place in which to live."

Police Chief Arnold Williams said he did not expect to have "very many" persons in jail over the holidays.

Sheriff Luther Hobby said county prisoners will also have a turkey dinner and gifts of fruit and nuts plus religious services will be conducted by various churches.

During the past week, at both institutions, prisoners have been hearing traditional Christmas songs from bands of carolers.

At the State Division of Correction, (Oviedo prison farm), Capt. W. W. Gore, warden said prisoners will receive packages from relatives, fruit, nuts, cookies and candy, along with the traditional turkey dinner.

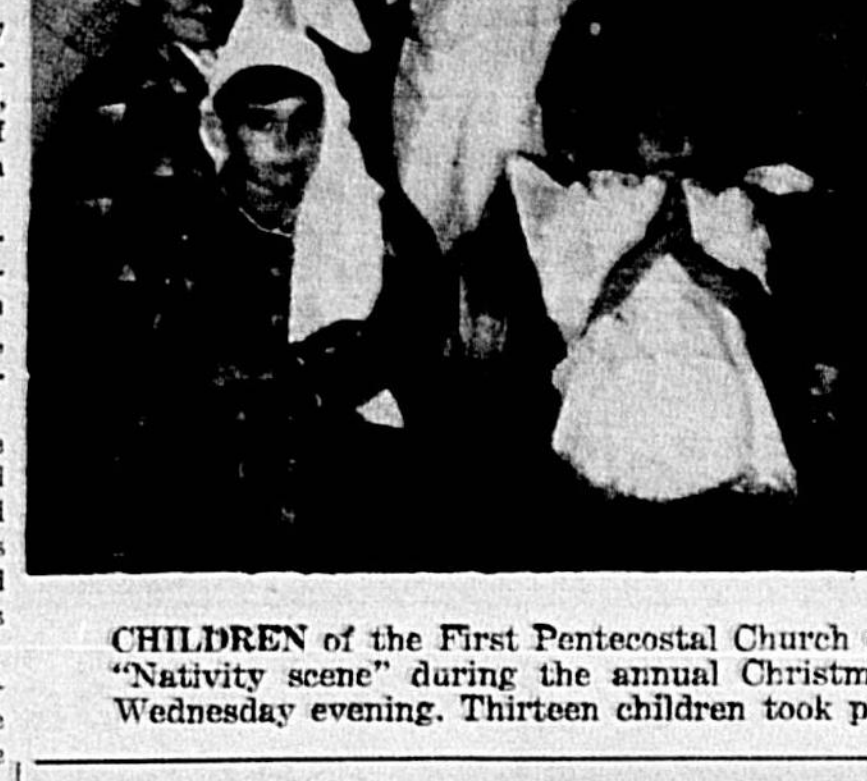

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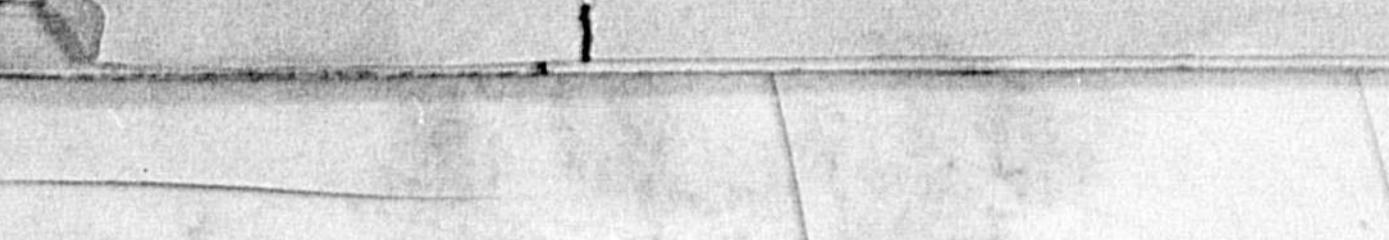

... A Savior Is Born

"Unto you is born — a Savior which is Christ the Lord."

The few words spoken by the angel at Bethlehem represent more than a lovely legend. The quotation from Luke was the greatest news story and the greatest love story of all time.

Now, twenty centuries later, we look back to Bethlehem with full realization that the blazing star and the gift announced by the angel marked history's finest hour.

The angel's pronouncement, the new star and a celestial chorus over the stable served as prelude to a divine new formula for generating brotherhood among men and good will among nations.

The joyful tidings have echoed down through the centuries and revealed to all people that the stern Jehovah is also a God of mercy who is loved mankind that he sent his Son to lift up the rejected world blighted by poverty, cruelty and oppression.

Greater love hath no man than that of a parent for his own beautiful child. Acceptance of the divine birth enables every believer to look upon the infant in swaddling clothes as his own personal savior. It matters little today whether the Bethlehem Babe exists in memory as brown, black or white. Clearly He was sent as a gift to all people.

This day, the anniversary of the miracle as the manger could be the most important day of the year for every human being regardless of age, race or color.

The long awaited Messiah was born into the enslaved Roman world, in humble circumstances in a Judean hamlet, as a rebel to power and to vanity. This miracle is that today a billion people around the world commemorate an event which transpired without the knowledge of the mighty Roman empire.

Yet the Babe in the manger became a symbol to change the world. Grown to manhood, His teachings, His parables and His miracles exemplified humility, compassion and tolerance. His life was dedicated to a concept that it is manly to be kind, to love rather than hate and to hold fast to one's promise of a better life here and into infinity.

Christmas is a day of hope and a day of remembrance and throughout the year there is no other day like it. No other day can fill the hearts of men with such gentleness nor such genuine neighborliness. It is a day for the sinner

as well as for the true believer, because no Christmas has ever passed without making this a better universe at least for a time.

The meaning of Christmas will outlast hatred, war and pestilence and will endure to lift us upward, long after the world has forgotten men who thought they outranked the gentle Nazarene.

From his wealth and dazzled by his achievements, twentieth century man shows signs of forgetting about the sermon on the mount and turning instead to his own mortal resources to improve human relations. It's true that we have moved a long way from the wretched state of Roman-Egyptian enslavement. As we struggle to strengthen the United Nations and our country's military might, let us consider that the Christmas message may be more important than the U.N. or our judicial system, or even our churches and schools. These great institutions are man-made and can be rebuilt on the compassionate love, abiding faith and profound wisdom released into the world by the Messiah. However, without faith in the lesson of human relations learned from the Savior, there would be no real concern for others and no known workable plan on which to build a better world.

Until the first Christmas the average man was little more than an insect to be chattered and sacrificed at the convenience of the rich and powerful. However, the lowly born Lamb of God dedicated his earthly body and divine spirit toward fulfilling the angel's commitment that the tidings of joy are directed to everyone.

It is good that the glory and influence of Christmas extend beyond Christianity and draw together in fellowship people of all faiths. Whatever brings us closer to a brotherhood of man is a wondrous influence. For many, the best thing about Christmas is that it causes people to think first of others.

Perhaps Christmas is the nearest we can come to an earthly Paradise. Whatever our faith or station in life, we should thank God for this week of remembrance, this day of hope and this hour of brotherhood.

WASHINGTON (AP) — It looks new, what's been happening, but then it doesn't because a shift of the past comes through. But underneath it all there is something really new with a deep difference. President Johnson.

I read your column "Around the Clock" when I first open The Sanford Herald and enjoy it a great deal. There are times, though, when I feel like using some of your comments and your paper of December 14 was one of those times. You made another

reference to the number of "77" license tags in the south end of the county, commenting on the distance to downtown Orlando for their purchase rather than driving to Sanford.

Although I agree that Seminole County residents, regardless of their particular geographic location, should use the "17" tags, should use the "17" tags.

There are some reasons that I think you might have overlooked or of which you may not have been aware. (First let me state that the license tags in my family are "17".)

A resident of South Seminole County does not need to drive to downtown Orlando to purchase their license tags. There is a tag office in Winter Park, little over three miles from my home. This is certainly more convenient than driving to either Sanford or Orlando.

It has only been in the past two years that tags have been available from stations located in the Casselberry area. Prior to this Winter Park was a much closer location. But once the tags were purchased in Orange County, it became even easier to continue their use by purchasing the tags in later years by mail.

Perhaps you may not be aware that the Martin Company, as a convenience to their employees, has made arrangements for the tags to be purchased and delivered from the plant. These tags also bear the number "77", and many of their employees are residents of Seminole County.

May I again repeat that automobiles owned by Seminole County residents SHOULD bear the "17" tag, but the purchase of tags in Orange County is not quite so deliberate as you sometimes make it sound.

Research May Improve Onion Flavor

By MRS. H. L. JOHNSON

More flavorful dehydrated onions may result from USDA research that shows processors how to measure the pungency of onions.

Onions differ greatly in flavor strength, and it has been difficult to pick those best suited for dehydrated products without the expense of a taste testing panel.

Now, according to Miss Wilson, Seminole County Extension Home Economics Agent, there is a simple, accurate chemical test. Scientists of USDA's Agricultural Research Service found that a chemical reaction takes place when onion cells are crushed, and that the amount of pyruvic acid produced by this reaction is directly related to pungency.

The test—developed at the Western utilization research laboratory, Albany, Calif.—has been adopted by the dehydration industry, and at least one large user of dehydrated onions specifies purchases according to the test. Plant breeders are also using the test to develop varieties of onions more suitable for processing.

Christmas Is Gay Affair In South America

BUENOS AIRES (UPI) — Birth of Christ. Holding to Spanish tradition, they hold midnight masses and suppers, but the modern influence is evident, especially in Lima: San Francisco, gift exchanges between family and friends and gay decorations. Hot chocolate and fruit cake are sweets of the season.

In Venezuela, corn, wheat and dolls are the elements of Christmas festivity. Wheat goes into a delicious cereal mixture called "La Patria de Bolivar" which is served on Christmas morning, and the corn, freshly ground, is mixed with pork, beef, chicken and a thick sauce to make a difficult dinner dish, "hallaca."

The dolls are carved to resemble the baby Jesus, and are placed beside the beds of children on "Nochebuena," the 24th of December. When the children awaken Christmas day, they find gifts brought by the baby Jesus.

Bolivians love to sing, and so to them Christmas is a time for gay, spirited music as well as the traditional Christmas songs. Streets are adorned with religious symbols and the day centers around a mass, family gatherings and an elaborate dinner with seven different kinds of meats.

The religious significance of Christmas is foremost in Colombia, where the celebration begins Dec. 16 with several masses, family gatherings and for the children, the telling of Biblical stories. Santa Claus and Christmas trees have not caught on, but there are games for the younger set at Christmas time, including one called "el beso robado," (the stolen kiss).



Gambling Spirit Of Spanish Yule

Madrid (UPI) In addition to being a deeply religious pagan, Christmas brings out the gambling spirit in most Spaniards.

It gives them a chance to indulge in one of the Nation's greatest pastimes—the lottery. No sooner does winter descend in the Iberian peninsula than Spaniards begin talking excitedly about the famed annual Christmas lottery, the nation's largest.

This year more than 5,038,000,000 (5) pesetas (more than \$60 million) will be given away following a National drawing. Christmas lottery tickets are on sale not only in official government establishments but in hotels, clubs, and from man-in-the-street itinerant ticket sellers.

There are almost a million ticket numbers, but each ticket

is subdivided into decimals selling for 500 pesetas (\$8.33) each. The subdivided tickets are in turn further subdivided into series.

Traffic in lottery tickets has become more important to Spanish Christmas than the exchange of traditional holiday greeting cards.

Almost every store, factory and business in the Nation has taken up offering shares in a winning number to clients and friends as a public relations gimmick with a Spanish twist.

The Christmas lottery has increasingly gained international fame as a sort of Iberian "Irish Sweepstakes." There are even reports of requests for tickets coming from the Soviet Union.

The drawing of the winning numbers has become a National

ritual; televised live and broadcast nationwide.

An ultra-modern electric system, operated by a group of children from the Saint Isidoro Boys School, picks the winners. The numbers are whirled around by the machine in a large globe from nine in the morning until the afternoon drawing. As the machine selects a number the children sing it out.

Even before the drawing Spanish newspapers mobilize their forces to fan through the nation to find the "gordo"—literally fat one—which is the title given the person holding the most tickets with the winning number.

The winning ticket this year will pay 525 million pesetas (almost \$9 million).

Through the excitement naturally centers on the big winner, even what they call here a "pinch" of the gordo can make it a rich, as well as merry, Christmas for many a Spaniard.

MEXICO CITY (UPI) — Pardon me, Señor Santa Claus, but did you have any marijuana in that sack? How about the winner? They packing any pot?

And where's your import permit for those toys?

Most federal police headquarters have announced a special campaign to battle the traditional rise in smuggling along the U.S.-Mexican border during the Christmas season.

Many Mexicans, unable to buy what they want for Christmas gifts—especially toys and luxury goods—under the tight protectionist Mexican economy, make shopping trips to the United States.

Others save their neighbors the trouble by wholesale smuggling for the Christmas market.

Mexican merchants complain this robs them of their share of the yuletide peso, and have been pressuring the government for tighter controls against competition from the U.S. side of the border.

A spokesman for the federal police said the increased vigilance along the border—where federal agents and army troops will be turned out to join customs officers in the crackdown—also pays off in another front.

The campaign should net a good deal of marijuana grown in Mexico and headed for illicit sale in the United States, he said, since this is the marijuana harvest season in many parts of Mexico.

The campaign is expected to sharply reduce both toy smuggling into Mexico and marijuana smuggling into the United States, he said.

'Julklapper' Are Gifts In Sweden
STOCKHOLM (UPI)—Christmas in Sweden needs an iron stomach but, more important, a knowledge of all the side celebrations.
It really begins Dec. 13 with the festival of Lucia—the saint from Syracuse martyred for her Christian beliefs. It is celebrated all over the country with the crowning of Lucia Queens, blonde young girls dressed in white robes who are crowned with a ring of candles. They serve coffee and special Lucia gingerbread.
Julklapper is a word that sounds strange even to the Swedes. It means the gifts distributed at Christmas and derives from the ancient custom of anonymously presenting joke gifts.
"Klappa" means to rap or knock. Teams of youngsters go from house to house knocking on the door and, when they are opened, throwing in a present. In older days Julklapp meant a person disguised as a goat or a donkey who followed the anonymous gift-distributors and posed as a beggar, or maybe a donkey carrying the gifts. In modern Sweden it has become a figure of boy standing under the Christmas tree which utters every home at yuletide. Prizes frequently are awarded to the family leaving their tree the longest. Some manage to keep them green until Easter.
Throwing out the Christmas tree is a post-Christmas celebration for the children. They invite their friends for cakes and lemonade and sing traditional songs as the tree is stripped of its decorations and thrown out.
Jultomte is a Father Christmas-gnome, the central figure for the children.
The "tomte" was believed to live somewhere in the outbuildings of the farms. Children ceremoniously placed a bowl of porridge in the stable for the tomte, and if it had disappeared by Christmas morning the family was supposed to have good luck. Cats, dogs and pigs usually guaranteed this.
Eating Marks Polish Fete
WARSAW (UPI)—One of the traditions of Christmas in Poland is the strew of ambrosia, known as the "strewing" on their yearly errands.
It's not the Communist regime's substitute for Santa Claus and his sleigh. It's the part of Christmas that residents of Warsaw and other Polish cities take very seriously—eating.
In fact, the streets are lighted in hundreds of cases of indignation and liver ailments on Christmas Day. Thus the ambrosia.
On the whole, Christmas in Poland is about as sentimental as it can get behind the Iron Curtain. The streets are lighted in yuletide colors, carols are heard on the radio and stores are crowded with shoppers from mid-November to Christmas Eve.
Workers are given a few hours off on Christmas Eve and the streets of Warsaw are empty by six in the evening.
Then families gathered for what traditionally has been about 36 hours of constant eating.
Throughout the night and in the early morning the family exchanges well-wishes and eats serving after serving of herring, sauered cabbage with mushrooms and poultry, and drinks many bottles of Polish vodka. This is followed by sweet cakes, a cheese and poppy cake.
A few hours of sleep and then the family is at it again. This time the menu consists of Polish lamb, carp, noodles, pies, sausages and lean bacon all washed down with more vodka and followed up with sweets.

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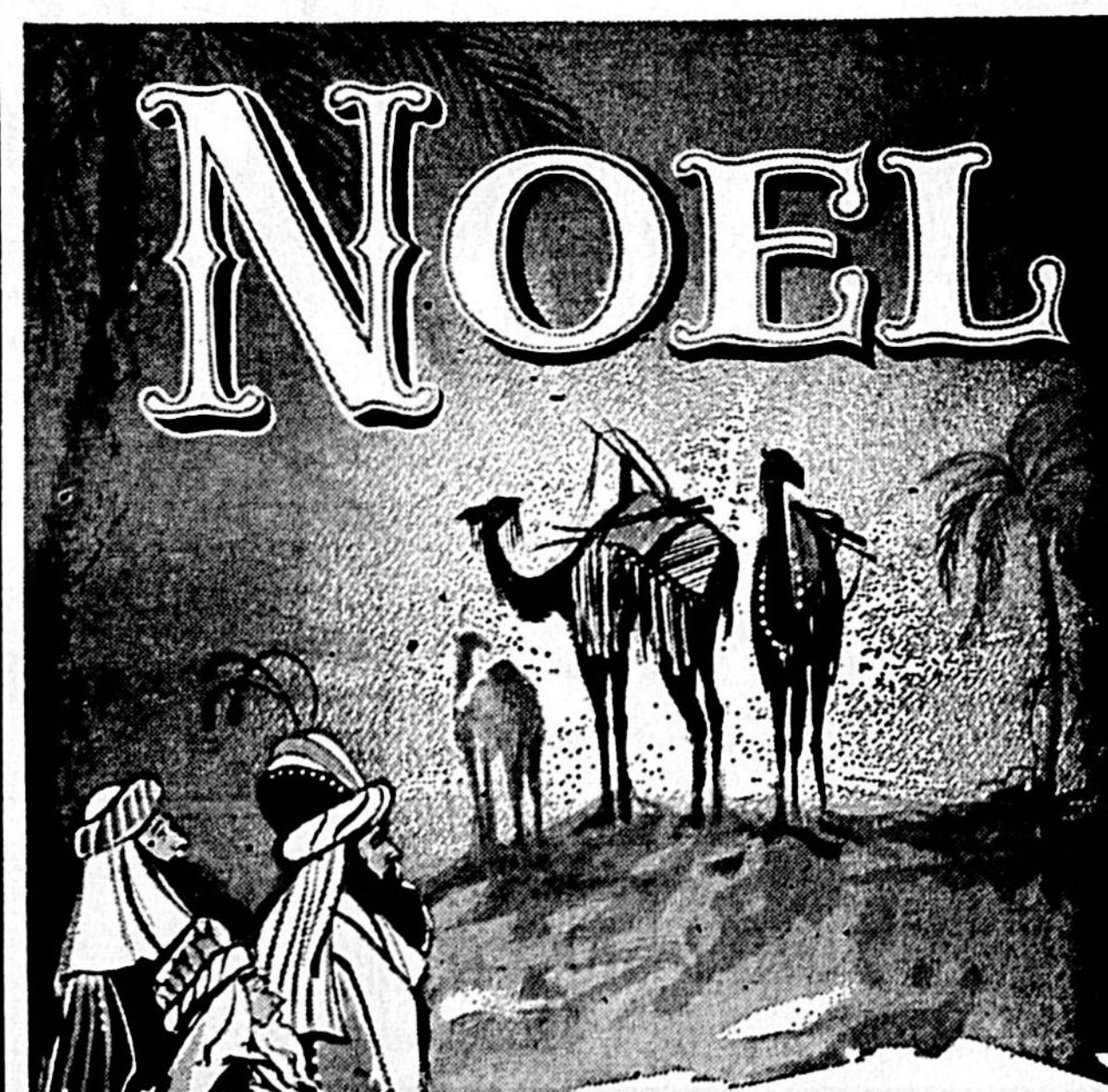

MIAMI (AP) — At least 21 persons have died in holiday weekend accidents in Florida. Two traffic collisions claimed three lives each.

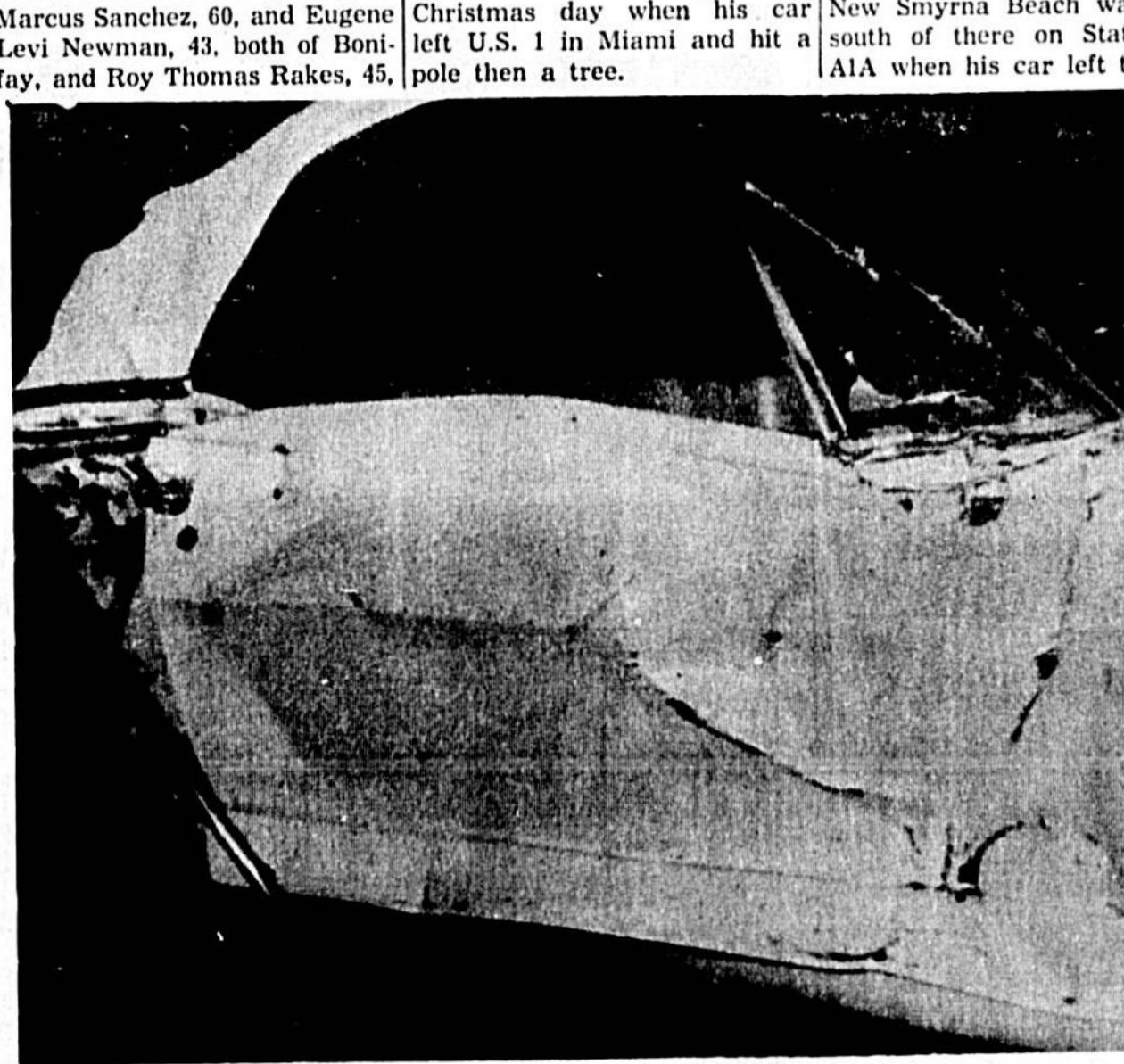
