**Florida Awaiting Report On Harrison's Activities**

JACKSONVILLE (UPI)—Florida authorities awaited new reports from Arizona today on the baffling disappearance of an alleged amnesia victim who turned up alive last month after a convict confessed killing him.

The bizarre case took on new aspects Wednesday when a secretary told police in Phoenix, Ariz. that James E. Harrison, 32, had been on a bus from Los Angeles the same day he regained his memory in Phoenix.

Harrison, of Indian River City, disappeared on a business trip to Jacksonville Oct. 7. He turned up Jan. 23 saying he had been suffering from amnesia and had no idea what had happened to him during the three lost months.

However, during that time, a California convict, Roy V. Olson, confessed to murdering Harrison while another man looked on. Olson, who later repudiated his story, said Harrison had picked him up hitchhiking.

In Arizona, Detective L. Herbert Neal said Mrs. Judith Schenid, a secretary for a legal firm, reported Wednesday that she talked to Harrison on a bus en route to Phoenix only a few hours before his memory returned. She

**State Race Tracks To Keep Six-Day Running Program**

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Florida's race tracks will continue to operate on a six-day basis instead of changing to a proposed five-day week.

Racing Commission Chairman John Ring of Miami told legislators Wednesday that knocking off one day of racing a week would stretch the racing period out to compete with Northern tracks, costing Florida tracks heavily.

Rep. W. C. Herrell of Miami Springs, who questioned Ring during hearings on the Commission budget here, said he heartily backed the commissioner's views.

Ring said Miami's mild weather this winter has hurt attendance at Hialeah. The cool weather drives tourists from the beaches to tracks. Ring said he pointed out that in the first days of the Hialeah meet, revenue fell \$37,000 under the same period last winter when Southern Florida experienced unusually cold weather.

Ring added that attendance at the dog tracks, which run at night, is good.

**Murder Charged To Army Private**

SEOUL, Korea (UPI)—The U.S. Army announced it has preferred court-martial charges of premeditated murder and attempted murder against Pfc. Kenneth M. Burke, 21, of Del Rio, Tex.

The Army said Burke is alleged to have shot and killed Pvt. Frank Galgano, 23, of Miami, and to have severely wounded SP-4 Philip B. Mead, 18, of Lancaster, Pa.

The shootings occurred Jan. 23 while Burke was standing guard at 8th Army Headquarters.

According to the Army, Burke fired five bullets from his .45 caliber pistol at point-blank range into the cab of a truck in which Galgano and Mead were riding.

"Burke reportedly shot Mead because of a previous dispute between the two men," the Army said.

## Federal Government Files Suit Against Alabama Vote Officials

### Board Is Charged On Negro Voting

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Justice Department filed suit today charging Macon County, Alabama, registration officials with discriminating against Negro voters and maintaining separate segregated registration facilities.

The civil complaint was filed in federal district court at Montgomery, Ala.

It named as defendants the board of registrars of Macon County and Grady Rogers and E. P. Livingston, the two registrars who resigned after refusing to testify last December before the Civil Rights Commission hearing.

The department said Rogers and Livingston were named as defendants because, under the law, they are required to continue to perform their duties until their successors are appointed.

It is the second voting right suit brought by the department a new civil rights division since it was set up last year. The first suit charged Terrell County, Georgia, registrars with refusal to register "fully qualified" Negroes, four of whom were school teachers. Trial is pending in this case at Columbus, Ga.

In today's action, announced here by Atty. Gen. William P. Rogers, the Justice Department seeks an injunction to bar permanently alleged discrimination in the registration process.

The suit complained that in Macon County while citizens registered to vote numbered 3,016 out of about 3,100 of voting age or approximately 97 per cent. On the other hand, the suit said, the Negro citizens who registered to vote numbered 1,110 out of approximately 14,000 of voting age, or about eight per cent.

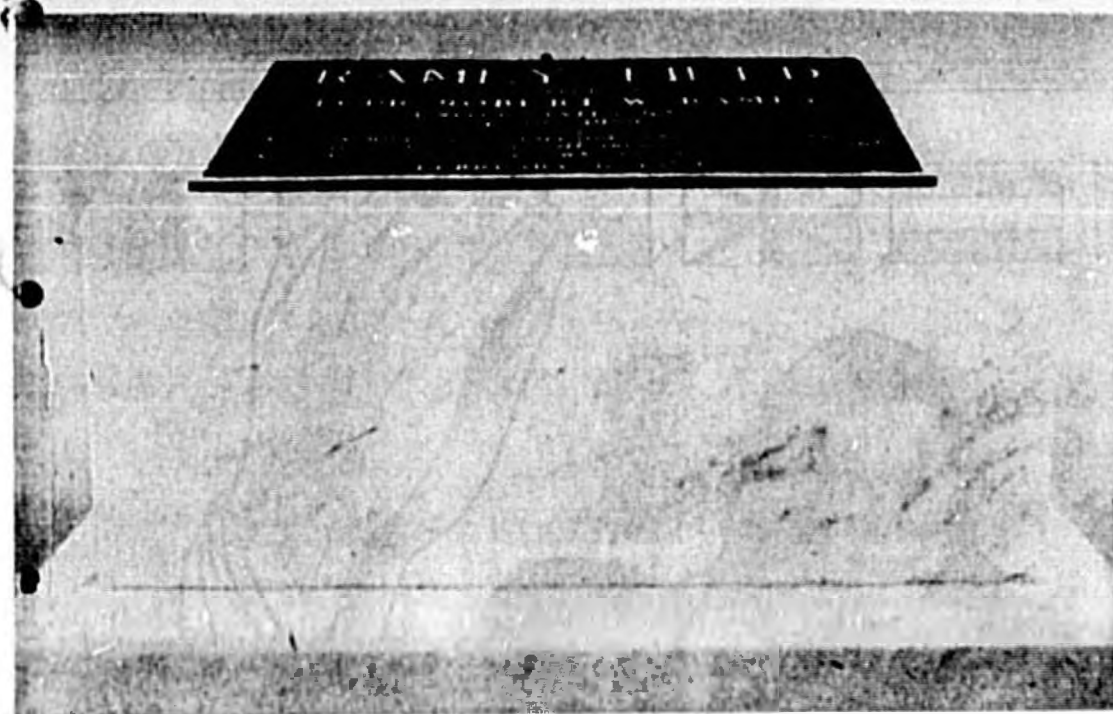

## Seminole Fair Scheduled Here; Exhibits Planned

The Seminole County Fair will open Feb. 16 at the Legion Park grounds on Highway 17-92.

Dedication ceremonies for the permanent commercial exhibit building will be held at 4:30 p. m., officially beginning six days of fun and education.

Twenty of the 22 stalls in the commercial exhibit building have been rented to local and Central Florida manufacturers and dealers. ## Southerners Irked By 'Rights' Planks

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Some parts of President Eisenhower's seven-point civil rights program drew intense fire today from southern critics.

But there were increasing signs in both houses that Congress probably would pass some form of civil rights legislation this year.

Foes apparently were ready to center their fire on two proposals to encourage communities to desegregate schools. One called for legislation to make "force" or threats of force to obstruct court orders in school desegregation cases a federal offense.

The other proposed a "temporary" program of federal financial and technical aid to state and local agencies to assist them in making the necessary adjustment "required" by school desegregation decisions.

Secretary Arthur S. Flemming of the Health, Education and Welfare Department emphasized at a news conference that there was nothing "coercive" about the aid

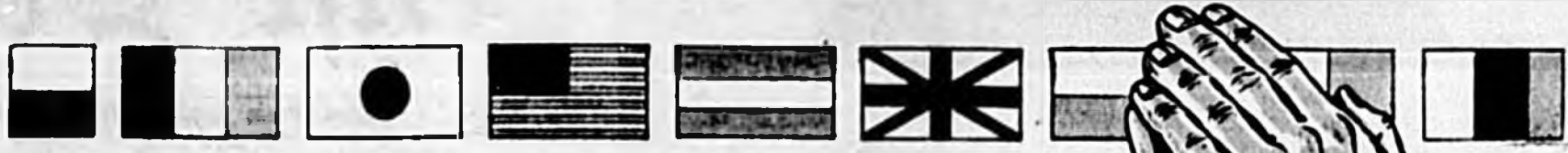

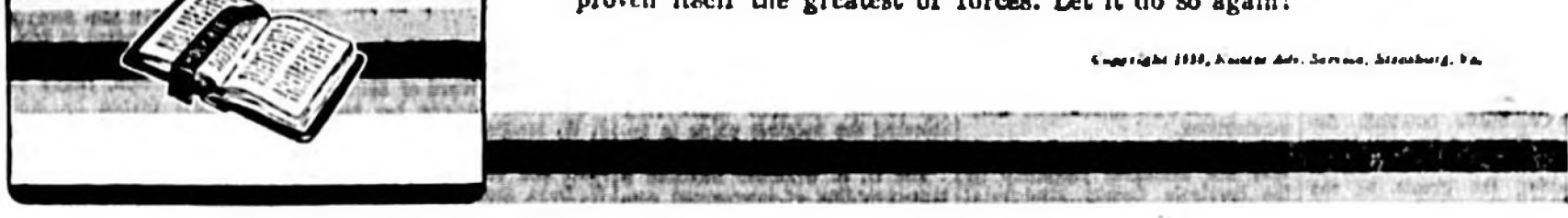

## Equipment Sold, \$350,000 Saved

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Ralph Siller, director of the state Purchasing Commission, reports his agency has recovered \$350,000 for the state by disposing of obsolete and excess supplies and equipment. Siller told a House-Senate subcommittee on appropriations Wednesday that some agencies overbuy or have equipment on hand which is obsolete for their use but still have considerable value. Bradley started fast against Seattle, opening an 8-0 bulge in the first three minutes. The visiting Chieftains bounced back later

in the first half to take the lead but the Braves went ahead to stay on a basket by Bobby Joe Mason minutes later.

Mason contributed 17 points to the Bradley cause while Charlie Brown had 23 for Seattle.

St. John's, another strong NIT hopeful, regained its winning form by turning back Richmond, 45-78. Sophomore Tony Jackson scored 22 points and added 18 rebounds for the Redmen, who lost three straight games during a recent road trip.

Richmond put up a good fight and led 61-55 with 11:35 to go. However, the Spiders then got caught in a St. John's web, failing to score another basket for almost nine minutes. This enabled the Redmen to shoot ahead, 68-63, as Jackson bagged 11 of their neat 13 points.

Utah remained unbeaten in the Skyline Conference by downing Colorado State University, 64-48. The Redskins were unable to open a commanding lead until scoring star Chuck Newscomb of State fouled out with 10 minutes remaining. Then Utah really went in town and easily breezed to its 13th straight conference victory over the last two seasons.

# Selvy Finds Home, Gives Knicks Push

Frank Selvy, the Furman College hotshot who failed to make the grade with four professional clubs, appears to have finally found a "home" with the New York Knicks.

The 26-year-old backcourt star, who came to New York after the season started, rapidly is proving that maybe "it's true what they say about Dixie." Here he gained collegiate fame as one of the South's all-time high scorers.

Last Sunday, for instance, he scored 21 points—many of them key ones—and was about the only New York player to hit consistently in a losing cause. Again on Wednesday night, even though he wound up with only nine points, Selvy countered when it meant the most in a nip-and-tuck, 129-126 victory over the Boston Celtics, who lead the Eastern Division race in the National Basketball Association.

Thursday night, Selvy wound up

as the Knicks' top scorer in a 111-96 triumph over Syracuse, the team's ninth straight over the upstate New York club.

The Knicks-Nationals game was the first of two at Philadelphia. The Warriors, behind Tom Gola's brilliant all-around play and Paul Arizin's sharpshooting, defeated the St. Louis Hawks, 106-95. No other games were scheduled.

Selvy, a 6-foot-3, 180-pounder, broke into the NBA with the old Baltimore Bullets. He later played with the Milwaukee Hawks and then moved on for short stints with St. Louis and Minneapolis with time out for a service hitch. His best season was his first in which he scored 1,344 points, but he never again came close to matching that record.

Given a chance for more steady work with New York this season, he already has scored more than twice as many points as he did in the two previous seasons with St. Louis and Minneapolis.

"We already have an agreement with the Giants in which they will receive one-third of the gross receipts," said Estrich, who added that similar arrangements probably will be worked out with the Dodgers.

Estrich also revealed that Skiatron hopes to add college football games to its year-round programs of sports and regular pay-TV shows in California later this year.

Maybe the White Sox made some kind of clerical error and had sent him the wrong contract.

But no, there was his name—**"James H. Landis"**—neatly typed in the proper place.

The 24-year-old outfielder took another look at the salary figure the club offered. Wow! It seemed almost too good to be true.

Landis quickly got hold of a pen and signed the contract which called for an estimated \$5,000 raise. Then he wrote a letter to Vice President Charles Comiskey.

In the letter, he said the raise was so "substantial" that he sim-

ply couldn't express his appreciation on paper.

Brother, they just don't write letters like that any more. And the White Sox were so proud of this one that they told the press about it.

Landis was instrumental in helping the White Sox finish second last season after they got off to a horrible start. Bating a sickly 184 in early June, Landis went on a batting spree that carried him to .300 by the middle of July. He finished with 277, driving in 61 runs and hitting 13 homers.

Along with Landis, rookie pitcher Slover McIlwain also agreed to terms with the White Sox. That makes it 25 down and 14 more to go for the club.

The Cubs accomplished the task by getting pitcher Dave Hillman to agree to terms. Hillman had a 4.8 record last year, but his 3.11 earned run average was the lowest among Cub starters.

Detroit reported half of its players signed with the receipt of contracts from catcher Lou Berberet and pitcher Herm Wehmeier. Berberet was obtained from Boston in a December deal. Wehmeier, who had a 1-0 record with

There was no word from either Mickey Mantle or Whitey Ford, but the Yankees did sign catchers Darrell Johnson and John Blanchard. So far, the world champs have signed only 10 players.

# Storm Drops Snow In South; Numbing Cold Grips North

A snow storm swung southward out of Colorado today, depositing two to three inches of snow across northern Arkansas and southern Missouri and into Tennessee and southern Kentucky.

In the north, a numbing cold front sent the mercury to near 30 below zero in northern Minnesota and to 20 below in the Dakotas.

The storm swept out of Colorado after piling up snow depths of more than two feet in the Rockies, 14 inches at Steamboat Springs, 8 inches at Denver and a half-foot across the eastern plains.

At Little Rock, Ark., a B-52 bomber crashed during a steel storm Thursday night while coming in for a landing, killing one of five crew members.

Three to four inches of snow hit Collinsville, Okla., as the storm pushed eastward and three inches were recorded at Jay, Okla., and Fayetteville, Ark.

Temperatures tumbled along the storm front, dropping to five degrees above zero early today at Fayetteville. Below freezing temperatures occurred southward into Texas and the Gulf states.

Snow flurries also occurred during the night in the Appalachians, the Great Lakes region from northern Indiana through Michigan and in the northern Rockies.

The cold weather was expected to press eastward today through the Ohio valley and Middle Atlantic states into New England.

# Prophecy Of Death By Child Is True

NOTTINGHAM, England (UPI) — Mr. and Mrs. Ray Jennings grieved today for their little adopted daughter who predicted her own death.

The girl, 10-year-old Madeline, was a talented poet. Some of her poems, which she started writing when she was six, were broadcast by the BBC.

Madeline usually wrote poems about the sea, the countryside and fairies. An early sample:

"At night when I got to bed fairies flutter round by head. In the morning when I wake up, I might find the fairies cup. To me it seemed that I had dreamed."

But the Jennings, who adopted Madeline as a baby, said her mood changed three weeks ago. She shocked them by writing and talking about her death—although she seemed healthy and normal at the time.

Wednesday she walked into her parents' bedroom and said calmly: "Mummy, I can't get my breath back. I think I am going to die."

She died an hour later.

A doctor ruled Madeline died of a rare throat infection.

# Tax Take Is High, Troubles Remain

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Sales tax collections reached an all-time high in Florida last December. But Comptroller Ray Green said the state isn't over the financial hurdles yet.

Green reported Thursday that the gains will have no significant effect on Florida's financial picture. But he said collections were evidence of a pickup in over-all economic activity.

He said there was an over-all 7.05 per cent increase in sales taxes and a 4.41 per cent jump in gasoline taxes for the fiscal year.

January sales tax collections for December sales amounted to \$15,115,591, an increase of \$590,350 over collections during the same month last year, and a 32.8 per cent jump over December collections.

The January gasoline tax collections of \$10,369,813 represented an increase of \$920,014 over January, 1958, and 20.46 per cent more than December.

### Curse Or Prophecy, Her Prediction Came True

During the last hours before she entered the gas chamber at San Quentin, Barbara Graham, condemned murderer, declares with quiet emphasis— "They'll all die violently. All the liars. All the ones who want me dead." The picture based on her trial and execution "I Want To Live!" starring Susan Hayward, opens Sunday at the Ritz Theatre. The words were spoken with out heart or animosity. She seemed rather to prophesy than to invoke a curse.

Yet curse or prophecy the young woman's prediction has been grimly fulfilled!

To date six men actively concerned in the conviction of Barbara Graham for the brutal slaying of Mrs. Mabel Monahan in the latter's Hurbank home on March 9, 1933, have died. The first to go were Jack Santo and Emmet Perkins convicted as her accomplices. Next to fall under the spell of the "curse" was John Lawson True, one of the gang implicated in the murder, who turned state's evidence.

Violent death came to True on the Mississippi River January 22, 1938. He was one of four men who perished when the 100-foot boat India Prince collided with a freighter.

The last of the "liars" to meet an untimely end was William Uphaw, crushed to death in a collision between his automobile and a bus near Indio, Cal.

It was Uphaw who detailed to police the inception of the plot that resulted in the Monahan murder.

One other of "the liars," Baxter Shorter, might be said to have fallen victim of the curse while it was as yet unvoiced. He is assumed by the police to be dead—killed by Santo, Perkins and Barbara for giving detectives the information that led to their arrest.

As for those "who wanted me dead," well— Superior Judge Charles W. Fricke who sentenced Barbara to death died of cancer. District Attorney S. Ernest

Wednesday night, Miss Davis joined Wagon Train and that NBC-TV Western really strapp'd her to a juicy rack. A widder rather suddenly — "one night he had a stomach ache and the next he was dead" — she was set adrift on the plains Wednesday night with seven children, several horses and Ward Bond.  
This presented a handful of problems complicated to some extent by the fact that her eldest daughter was being pursued by a young man on the train and her youngest son was a deaf-mute. And as if this wasn't enough, Miss Davis was informed midway in the plot that she had an incurable disease which would pop her off the planet before the end commercial.

## Agreement Signed On Baseball

### Rogers Is Chosen Manager of Team

A working agreement has been signed between the Washington Senators of the American League and the Sanford Baseball Club.

W. K. McRoberts, local tire dealer who is backing Sanford's return to the Class D Florida State League, today announced that Sanford will get

the manager of the Sanford team will be S. P. (Paddy) Rogers, a 45-year-old baseball veteran. Rogers will come to Sanford from Elmira, where he has managed the Senators' Class A team.

In announcing that the agreement had been signed, and that Rogers had been employed as manager, McRoberts said that the Sanford team would be the "very best of the Senators' Class D League entries."

A corporation will be formed for the baseball club later this month. Officers for the non-profit organization will be elected at that meeting.

Rogers has had an interesting career. He was third baseman for the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1935-38. After two years in service, he played with the Portland, Ore., Pacific Coast League. He has had five years of experience managing Class A ball teams.

McRoberts said, "We feel fortunate that Washington is sending such an able man to handle our team."

Rogers and Sanford players will report to Ferdinand Heach Mar. 9 for spring training. He will move his wife and five children to Sanford as soon as school is out in Elmira. The new manager will not be an active participant. As non-playing manager, the ball team is his sole responsibility.

In announcing the employment of Rogers, McRoberts also said that a business manager has been obtained. Ward Goodrich, of Deland, will report for work, Feb. 16. Goodrich will be in complete charge of all promotions and general business management.

With eight years in commercial radio, Goodrich comes to Sanford directly from WJHS, Deland. For two years he was with Sports Services, Inc., a firm with concessions in ball parks all over the country. He has been connected with WJCF, Dade City, and WMOF, Ocala.

Goodrich is 38, he is married and has one child.

City and County Commissioners' in a "get it off your chest" session Friday night, pledged harmony and cooperation between the two governing bodies in the future.

Members of the two bodies served up "indictments" for non-cooperation in the past, but agreed that "barriers" which had existed between the two groups were dissolved in the joint session.

Although no vote was taken on the matter, the city apparently will allow non-city residents to use city facilities without charge for the remainder of this fiscal year, which ends Sept. 30. The city had planned to issue recreation cards, at \$5 each, for non-city residents.

The Commissioners pledged cooperation in projects where mutual responsibility exists and county officials said that Sanford should receive more attention.

Officials agreed that there should be an end to the system of the county attending to rural affairs, while the City Commission is viewed as responsible for the city.

## Roads Used As 'Tracks,' Dunn Denounces Action

County Commissioner Vernon W. Dunn today angrily denounced what he termed "irresponsible drivers" who have been using newly-scraped county roads for a "hot rod race track."

Dunn said automobiles had "cut to pieces" many of the dirt roads in his district. Cited as suffering the greatest damage were the strip between Highway 431 and the intersection of the Dodd Road and Lake Drive.

"You can see where the cars aimed at telephone poles along the road and cut wheels sharply to avoid hitting the poles at the last minute," Dunn said. "Deep trenches have been cut in the freshly-scraped roads. In some places, the roads have been cut to pieces."

Dunn said he had notified the sheriff, but pointed out that officers "can't be stationed along each dirt road in the county just to wait for these people."

He urged residents along the roads to "keep an eye out" for these drivers, get auto license plate numbers and report them to the sheriff's office.

"People along these roads have a great deal at stake in this matter," Dunn said. "They should report such persons. My district does not have sufficient money to provide maintenance for all of the roads. If the people don't cooperate, I have a good method of preventing the roads from being cut up: I'll send the scraper in about once a year."

He challenged parents to find out what their youngsters are doing, pointing out that "I'm almost sure that youngsters are responsible for this. He added that "parents should be more interested in the safety of their children" than to allow such.

If adults are responsible for the auto gymnastics, Dunn added, "they have about enough intelligence to drive a goat cart."

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## Comparisons Asked After Salary Plea Of Four In County

The requests of four Seminole County officials for \$200 per month raise in salaries have brought numerous requests for information about what similar jobs pay in other Florida counties.

Requesting annual salaries of \$11,400 are the sheriff, tax collector, tax assessor and clerk of court. Each now makes \$9,000 per year.

Annual salaries for these offices in other counties: Volusia, \$10,500 each for the sheriff, clerk of court, tax assessor and collector; Orange, \$10,000 for the sheriff, \$11,250 for the other three offices.

Marion, \$8,500 for all four offices; Lake, \$10,000 for the sheriff, \$11,400 for the clerk of court, \$10,000 each for the assessor and collector, plus \$1,600 in back commissions for the latter two offices.

In Gadsden County, the sheriff, tax assessor and collector each draw \$8,500. The clerk of court, in 1957, drew \$7,500. A figure for the clerk's salary for 1958 is not available.

In Jackson, each of the four officers drew \$9,000, as did the county judge. The same was true in St. Johns in Brevard, the sheriff, clerk of court and tax collector each drew \$10,000 in 1958. A figure was not released for the assessor for the past year, although \$10,000 was listed as the 1957 salary.

In Sarasota County, \$9,500 was the annual salary in 1958 for all four offices.

The four Seminole officials have served notice that they will apply for the \$2,400 raise in the next session of the Legislature, scheduled for April.

The Rev. Fred Kraminger gave the benediction.

The General Sanford Memorial Library will be open three times a week, starting this week, but the hours were not disclosed.

Government Moves Against Alabama

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (UPI)—The government moved on two fronts today to deal with alleged discrimination against Negro voting applicants in Alabama.

State Atty. Gen. Macdonald tonight promised a "vigorous defense" against a Justice Department suit charging the Macon County board of registrars with denying qualified Negroes the right to vote.

The feud between Alabama and the Civil Rights Commission spread to Dallas and Wilcox counties, where grand juries were trying to decide whether impounded voting records would be turned over to the federal agency.

Current Judge James A. Hare of Selma said he had turned over to the jury a letter from the commission's chief investigator, Col. A. H. Rosenfield, demanding that he be allowed to examine the records.

Hare impounded the records Dec. 6 for grand jury investigations, shortly before the commission's first Alabama investigation. The Justice Department filed its suit Friday in U. S. district court here and disclosure of the commission investigation came Saturday.

The suit seeks a permanent injunction to halt alleged denial of registration, purely because of "race and color."

West To Stay In Berlin, Anti-Blockade Plans Set

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles said today the Western Allies have resolved to stay in Berlin and have reached general agreement on a plan of action against the Soviet blockade.

Dulles made the statement on his return from Europe where he conferred with British, French and West German leaders on the German problem and the Russian threat to turn over control of Berlin to the East German Reds on May 7.

Shortly before Dulles' return, the British government announced complete support for his earlier statement that the West will make no concessions to the Russians without counter-concessions. A

spokesman declared that the Russians hold the responsibility for deciding whether there is to be a risk of war over Berlin.

Dulles said he would report to President Eisenhower later today on the results of his conference.

He said they left him encouraged on the "unity, understanding and resolution" in Britain, France and West Germany.

The secretary said the Allies discussed the whole problem of Germany and the prospects for a foreign minister's meeting with Russia on all aspects of the German situation and European security.

"We are willing to talk with the Soviets in a sincere effort to reach agreements," Dulles said.
