



Report: Build it, they will come

SANFORD --- Sanford can support a successful hotel and conference center. along its downtown waterfront, according to a feasibility study performed for the city by a private consulting firm.

The summary said that the Sanford location may provide a "retreat atmosphere with a waterfront environment" that sets itself apart from other hotels.

"Our locational disadvantage is more than compensated by our waterfront amenities and our downtown atmosphere," said Sanford City Manager Tony

A hotel/conference center is feasible along Sanford's waterfront

VanDerworp said. "The product we'relooking at would complement, not compete, with the other hotel facilities in the county."

The executive summary of the study concludes that "a conference center/hotel can be demonstrated to be both market feasible and financially feasible on the city's downtown waterfront site."

The summary said that to succeed, the project would need public financial support for construction, site improvements, and additional waterfront amenities.

In return, Sanford would receive increased employment, tax revenue and commerce for the downtown area, the summary said,

"This is what I've been expecting all along," said Sanford Mayor Larry Dale. "There's certainly a need for that type of facility."

The summary also said that a lack of revitalization in the downtown area "diminishes prospects for the success" of the hotel and conference center. But the summary also indicated that the demographic characteristics indicate that the downtown area will likely experienced continued growth.

State designates Hazardous Weather week to raise awareness

The State of Florida Department of Community Affairs has designated the week of Feb. 20 through 26 as Hazardous Weather Week, to stress the importance of preparing for hazardous weather.

To assist in "getting the word out" the department has distributed an awareness guide to public schools statewide.

The major hazards discussed include lightning, marine hazards such as rip currents, tornadoes, thunderstorms, excessive

rainfall, flooding, temperature extremes and the hurricane season which begins June 1 and runs through November.

Not mentioned in the safety booklet however, are the devastating wild fires such as those which caused massive destruction this past year, including those in the Sanford area. Several thousand acres of land, mostly forest land, were destroyed in the Central Florida area from St. Augustine to Polk County. Also, many homes were destroyed and damaged.

Last year, for the entire state, the department reports 11

injuries and \$14.7 million in damages from tornadoes, one fatality, six injuries and \$6.9 million in damages from other severe weather situations, while lightning caused five deaths, 44 injuries and \$6.9 million in dam-

in the state, 26 percent drowned, 24 percent were caused by wind conditions, and heat and cold accounted for three percent.

SANFORD - Three teenagers arrested Wednesday have confessed to committing nearly 300 vehicle burglaries since November in Seminole, Volusia and Orange counties.

In addition to the arrests, investigators recovered a large amount of stolen property, including compact discs, carstereos, radar detectors and cel-Jular telephones.

"Now we can go through the inventory of stolen property

County." Those arrested include Allan Beiger, 19, of 1195 Braddock Road in Enterprise, and brothers Michael Kennedy, 18, and Patrick Kennedy, 13, of 295 Heronwood Circle in Deltona.

Police got their first break in the case when Beiger's mother called the Volusia County Sheriff's Office Jan. 31 to turn over property that she suspected had been stolen. Investigators seized the property and began looking through open burglary cases.

Honor students

That was the first key piece of information we received, said Gary Davidson, a spokesman for the Volusia County Sheriff's Office.

Investigators later started piecing the cases together after they received information that linked Beiger with the Kennedy brothers.

Acting on a tip, Seminole investigators on Wednesday headed to the Kennedys' home and called Volusia deputies to accompany them.

Volusia investigators have charged the teens in a car break-

in Volusia County, investigators are looking into prior reports of car burglaries in an effort to identify the stolen property and determine how many cases will be closed with the arrests.

In Volusia County alone, lead investigator Todd Blair believes the teens broke into an estimated 100 cars in the past three months. The Orange County Sheriff's Office is also looking into vehicle burglaries in Orlando.

Longwood commissioners scrutinize festival's finances

LONGWOOD — The Founders Day Festival will be held March 11 and 12 in Longwood's historic district.

As the festival approaches, the City Commission is scrutinizing the expense budget of the committee organizing it.

The Founder's Day sub-committee of the Historic Preservation Board is operating within its overall expense budget of \$8,500. However, it has deviated from the budget by purchasing \$1,100 on T-shirts, according to City Administrator John Drago.

Mayor Paul Lovestrand and Commissioner Butch Bundy during Monday's City Commission meeting said they were concerned about the amount being spent on T-shirts.

Drago said that the spending for those items does exceed what was initially approved, but that overall expenses are within the approved amount.

The City Commission by a 5-0 vote passed a resolution Monday that the Founder's Day Sub-Committee will seek approval from the City Administrator for any deviations from its expense budget.


"I'm just concerned that they are binding the city to purchase agreements which clearly are not in line with city purchasing requirements," Bundy said.





There's been much talk recently about the beatification and canonization of saints by the Roman

Catholic Church. There's more to being a saint than enrollment in the Baseball Hall of Fame. Saints need prayers and a number of miracles to be canonized.

Pope John XXIII, who helped promote Christian unity as pope from 1958 to 1963, is about to receive beatification — following a miraculous healing of an

Italian nun who was dying from complications of stomach surgery.

The nun attributed her

healing to the intervention of Pope John, who told her, "Be calm, I am here." Pope John Paul II, is clearing the way for John XXIII on the heels

of a Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. In the meantime, Blessed

> Katharine Drexel from Philadelphia, is about to become the fifth American saint. The others are St. John Neumann, St. Elizabeth Bayley Seton, St. Frances Cabrini and St. **Rose Philippine** Duchesne.

Katherine Drexel was born in Philadelphia in 1858 and died in 1955. Her cause for canonization was opened formally in 1962 and she was declared

Sister Thea made a difference in every life she touched. Her reflections on black spirituality and the richness of all cultures awakened people of all religions. Sister Thea was a miracle in herself. You couldn't come away from being with her without sharing a sense of joy.

The Roman Catholic Church --all churches - would do well to remember Sister Thea Bowman during Black History Month. The elders in Canton, Miss., who taught her that Old Time Religion should be remembered also. They taught how to share life, faith and love. It doesn't take a saint to understand these lessons — and it might help make you one.





Business Park, is the most important market characteristic in support of the project, the summary said.

The Pizzuti Corporation has proposed combining a conference center with a 300-room hotel in Lake Mary's Interstate-4 corridor, near the State Road 46A interchange. However, it has not placed a conference center plan before the Board of Seminole **County Commissioners. Sanford** has been named the county's preferred site.

Sanford officials asked the consultant to look into the feasibility of a 200-room boutique hotel as opposed to a 300-room full-service hotel. The executive summary suggested that a 200room boutique hotel is more feasible because it would require less public assistance, and it may yield higher levels of ground rent revenue to the city. Other conclusions contained

within the executive summary to the feasibility study include: Many area employers take their meetings to facilities out of the area because of the lack of adequate conference and lodging facilities.

 North Orlando hotels prospered during the second half of the 1990's. Several new hotels have entered during the past two years, primarily chain hotels lacking conference facilities.

 The market served by a conference center has been "largely ignored" in the north Orlando and Seminole County area.

In November 1999, the city contracted with Hunter Interests, Inc. of Annapolis, Md. to prepare a market and financial feasibility study for a 300-room hotel and conference center project on the downtown Sanford waterfront. The executive summary of the

study was released Thursday. The full report will be released during a Sanford City

Commission work session to be held 3:30 p.m. Monday at Sanford's City Hall.

The consultant will present the feasibility study during the work session Monday. The commission will then discuss the next steps needed in moving forward with the project.

VanDerworp said he will ask the Commission to approve sending requests for proposals from developers. Once the requests are in, the Commission would then choose the top proposals. When a developer is chosen by the Commission, the city would negotiate a time frame for building the facility,

VanDerworp said. The public assistance currently planned to support the project includes the creation of a special tax district and county tourism development funds. During the work session, the consultant will address the level of public assistance that may be needed.

Dennis, Aug. 24 to Sept. 5, had winds of up to 105 miles per hour. It came close to the state's east coast but didn't hit land until reaching North Carolina.

Floyd, Sept. 7 - 17, had winds of up to 155 miles per hour. It also came close to the east coast, causing evacuation of over 1.3 million residents. While it

Doctor Gott

Enlarged gland may be a goiter

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have enlarged glands at the front of my neck. My old, now-retired family physician had me take medicine. Now my new doctor doesn't seem concerned and stopped the medica-

tion. I'm confused. DEAR READER: I can understand your confusion.

I don't know the cause of your "enlarged glands." If you have swollen lymph nodes, you need further testing, possibly even a biopsy, because such glands could indicate infection or, in some

cases, a tumor. I suspect that your swollen glands may actually be a goiter, an

enlargement of the thyrold gland. Ordinarily, this is not a serious condition, and it can easily be controlled by using thyroid-supplement pills, which usually lead to shrinkage of the gland by suppressing its manufacture of hormone. You raise another question relating to the confusion patients experi-

ence when their doctors fail to agree. Medical disagreement is a healthy sign of a vigorous profession in which new and important findings are literally reported week-

When doctors disagree, they owe their patients the courtesy of resolving the issue without placing the patients in the middle. Here is an instance where a third opinion would be helpful. • • therapy might be in order. DEAR DR. GOTT: Following a shoulder fracture. I developed reflex sympathetic dystrophy. Is there any treatment for this? **DEAR READER: Reflex sympathetic**

dystrophy is a peculiar nerve reac-tion that can follow injuries to bone or soft tissue. The components of the syndrome are pain and shrink-

age of tissue, seen as atrophy (withering) of bone or skin, loss of hair over the involved area, and increased sweating or flushing. The precise cause of RSD appears to be a malfunction of certain autonomic nerves, those that are not under conscious control.

Physical therapy (to maintain muscle function and prevent joint contractures) is usually combined with nerve blocks (medicine to deaden the nerves temporarily). If the nerve blocks are effective, consideration is given to surgery to sever the nerve and give more lasting results. TENS (transcutaneous electrica) nerve stimulation, using low-voltage electric current to block nerve function) and acupuncture are also sometimes helpful. Some drugs, such as cortisone derivatives, are used as well. However, to be most effective, these methods must be employed as early as possible, before permanent damage occurs.
