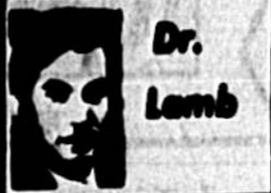

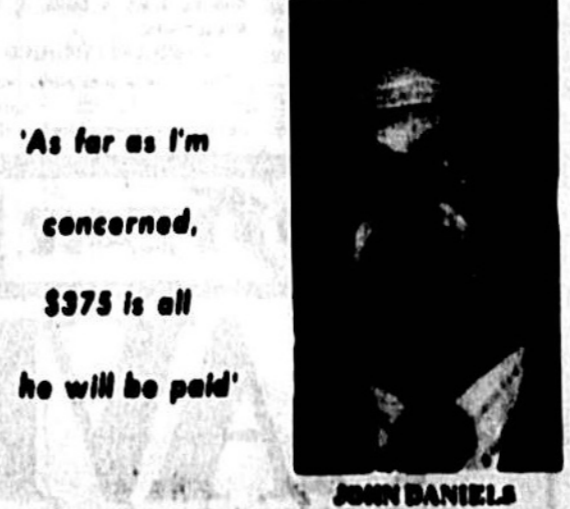

### 'Gay Rights' Law KO'd

By Voters in St. Paul

ST. PAUL, Minn. (UPI) — Voters here repealed St. Paul's "gay rights" law by nearly a 2-1 margin in the first major election test since passage of the Civil Rights Act, they threw out a similar ordinance last June.

"For this we thank God," the Rev. Richard A. Angwin, pastor of the Episcopal Church and leader of the repeal drive, said Tuesday night. He said the repeal shows that, North or South, the majority of people are against homosexuality.

Homosexual leaders said they were "outraged," "won't go back into the closet" and predicted a "new coming out nationwide." Democratic Mayor George Latimer said he still favors the ordinance, but being "deserving equal protection under law."

### Carter: Close 85 Bases

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congress is on notice that the administration wants to close or otherwise "realign" 85 military bases across the country, eliminating several thousand civilian jobs in an effort to save \$800 million a year for other defense programs.

A formal announcement listing the affected bases was expected from the administration today, but defense officials were trying to contain expected opposition by giving advance notice Tuesday to congressmen and senators whose areas will be involved.

### Leukemia Cure Suggested

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (UPI) — A combination of drugs and chemotherapy may hold the key to a cure for leukemia, the director of St. Jude Children's Research Hospital said Tuesday.

Dr. Alvin Maurer revealed that 80 percent of 300 children who participated in the two and a half year treatment program no longer exhibit symptoms of leukemia and are able to resume normal lives.

### Florida Sought to Repeal

ATLANTA (UPI) — The Atlanta Constitution said today the Securities and Exchange Commission and the Committee of Currency will seek formal legislation that former budget director Bert Lance will refrain from certain banking practices.

The Constitution said it learned the SEC and the controller would file in U.S. District Court here papers seeking a consent decree from Lance and officers of two banks he once headed.

### Ford Sued in 'Kickbacks'

NEW YORK (UPI) — Four Ford Motor Co. stockholders filed a \$60 million lawsuit charging board chairman Henry Ford II with accepting \$750,000 in "kickbacks" from the Canadian Corp. vending machine firm.

The suit, filed Tuesday in state Supreme Court in New York City by attorney Ray M. Cain, demanded the return of the \$750,000 salary Ford drew in 1977 because of mismanagement.

### Boyd Now Amtrak Head

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Former Transportation Secretary Alan Boyd has been named president of Amtrak, the national passenger train network.

## Farmers' Group: Out With Dissenters

OKLAHOMA CITY (UPI) — A Florida delegate to the American Agriculture movement's national conference made it clear what he thought about dissent within the movement.

"I say that anybody that doesn't represent the goals of American Agriculture — that they should be re-examined just like the Chicanos," said Don Adams of Lake City, Fla.

Adams' remarks there were seen as dissent but movement leaders Tuesday adopted a form of Adams' position, voting for a motion to remove dissenters from

no committees of the farm strike organization. An ally reported, the motion said any delegate could be removed without a reason being stated.

The resolution said the movement still supported the 100 percent parity pricing concept of increased returns for farmers' goods and "anyone lobbying for anything else is not representing the American Agriculture Movement."

It also said any new policies must be supported by 51 percent of the delegates in the National Delegate Body before the AAM will support them.

"We're trying to set up a little dictatorship," protested Alan Humphreys of Huntington, Mo. "I think we're off track. We're going to lose American Agriculture by making a dictatorship out of this."

Sherry Karpman, the conference secretary, almost began crying.

"I've taken notes for this organization for three months, and I've been proud of what you've done," she said. "But I'm not proud of this."

Once the issue was decided, delegates promptly ousted a Utah delegate from the legislative lobbying committee. Utah delegate Randy Marlowe, who was not present, was removed on grounds he failed to represent the movement adequately in Washington.

Adams said Marlowe was "walking around in Washington wearing an American Agriculture hat and not even representing us."

There were threats to remove K.B. Brown of Illinois and Benny Farnham of Arkansas, but delegates decided instead to appoint an additional delegate to each of the committees they serve on.

### Orange County Resort Tax OK'd in Large Voter Turnout

ORLANDO (UPI) — A big turnout pushed the resort tax referendum in Orange County over the top Tuesday by a 6-4 margin and backers say it will raise \$2.1 million a year to pay off bonds for a proposed civic center.

The 2 percent surcharge will be tacked onto Orange County hotel and motel bills, exempting fees and some short-term vacation leases. About 55 percent of the county's registered voters went to the polls Tuesday. Election officials had forecast a 45 percent response. The vote was 36,173, or 62.5 percent, for the tax, and 21,727, or 37.5 percent, against.

### Court Says Surcharge Illegal

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Attorney General Robert Shevin says the state is serving a needed public purpose when it requires criminals to pay a special fine to raise money to compensate innocent victims of street crime.

The Victims Crime Compensation Law should be upheld, Shevin said Tuesday in a brief filed with the State Supreme Court. He is appealing from a Martin County Court decision which threw out the five percent surcharge levied against two local men involved in incidents of shoplifting and resisting arrest with violence.

### Tax Incentives Unresolved

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The issue of tax incentives to lure new business to Florida remains unresolved, despite the approval of a \$6.040 billion spending package by the House Appropriations Committee.

The committee, while passing its record budget Tuesday, said it will wait for recommendations from a subcommittee before deciding which sales tax reductions are needed to attract new business to Florida and giving incentives for those in the state to expand.

### Damages Fight Continues

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The Senate today rejected a bill that would allow Florida's state employees to sue their government employer for property damage in their homes.

A proposal by Eustis Sen. Jim Gleason making the state liable for drops in property value caused by environmental protection regulations was bottled up on the Senate floor Tuesday.

### Council Opposes Commission

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The 1st District Court of Appeal Tuesday upheld an order of the Public Employees Relations Commission validating a 1976 union election among city employees of Punta Gorda.

The DCA found no merit in the city's challenge of limited voting hours, inclusion of employees not within any bargaining unit and pre-judicial pre-election campaign tactics.

The election involved the International Brotherhood of Painters and Allied Trades in which 87 city employees voted, 44 voting for union representation and 43 against.

### Ordinance Brings 'Catty' Questions

CORAL GABLES (UPI) — Cycles in the Miami suburb are asking the meaning of a new ordinance outlawing owners of more than four "corvidae quadrupeds belonging to the feline family."

"Does it mean you can own five three-legged cats, or any combination up to 10?" they ask. "Or can you own four lions or four tigers or two of each?"

City Attorney John Little replies "no" in each instance. He said the ordinance would be interpreted to limit threatened as well as four-legged cats.

And, he said, lions, tigers, panthers and the like are already banned by an ordinance forbidding ownership of "wild animals of the flesh eating order." He said the law does not exclude tortois.

The new ordinance against owning more than four cats was passed 5-4 by the city commission Tuesday and followed the city's decision, already considered among the most restrictive in the state. Cats already are required to wear bells when venturing outdoors.

Among the other things banned by city ordinance are ownership of more than four dogs, or one chihuahua, dachshund or dalmatian; building a tannery; leaving a garbage can overnight; or parking a pickup truck, camper or boat trailer in a driveway overnight.

The old law had passed 9-1 in first reading earlier this month, and the city report, Commissioner William Chapman, was joined Tuesday by Mayor Jimmy Dunn. Chapman said the ordinance was patterned after one in Manhattan and officials there were unhappy with it.

"They said, 'Don't bring us a Rottweiler. It's bad and even if it's black and white,'" Chapman recalled. "I wish we had that statute."

But Carol Gelles, Commissioner Robert Brink said the new ordinance was "intended for strict enforcement."

"It would be there for all if necessary. It's primarily to injure people they should not do this," Brink said.

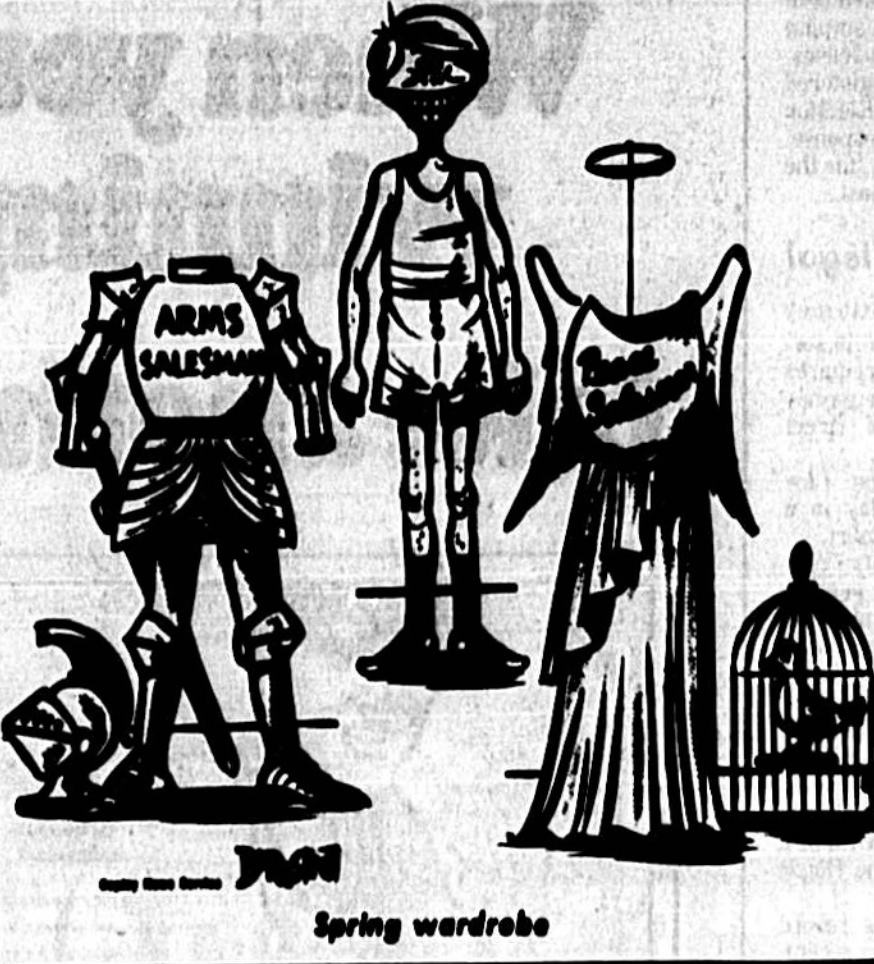

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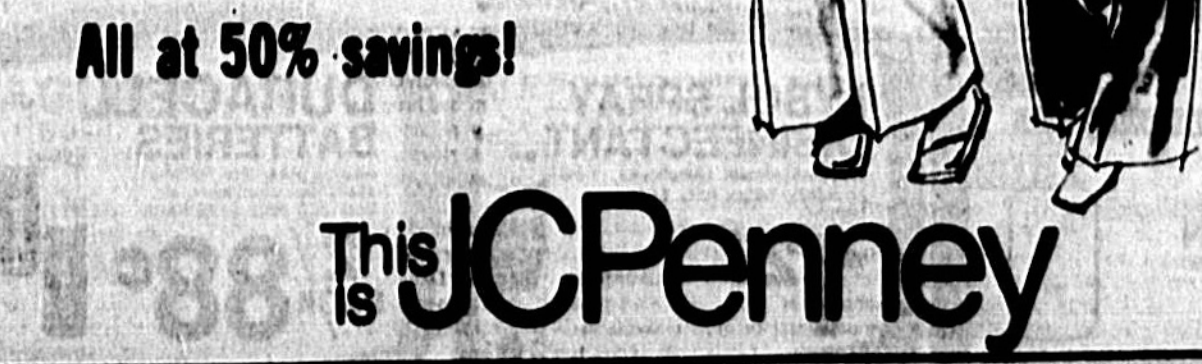

The Altamonte Springs City Commission Tuesday evening turned down by a 5-3 vote the rezoning from residential to professional office district of seven parcels on the east side of Highland Avenue, south of Highland.

made far-reaching rail improvements, but they are yet to be deployed.

The builder, Pullman Standard, has been in the business of building rail cars for years, but the railroad now has more cars in the shop than it has in the field.

Then too there is still a division of railroad management that hinders modernization.

Most conductors and railroads continue to belong to private companies, for example, an Amtrak can do little about train leadership and road repair, which, along with car condition, are the most important risks of the passenger.

But the greatest obstacle to Amtrak progress is lack of money. Though Amtrak has been given \$2.3 billion in tax funds, spokesman Joe Vranich says "we are suffering from capital starvation."

Vranich says just the retraining of the passenger divisions would cost many times the public money already spent.

Amtrak's search for capital has been difficult and in vain. On its own, the company is generally losing about \$60 million a year, because it must pay more than \$2.50 in costs for every \$1 in revenue. And Congress is in no mood to commit ever more additional funds for what many lawmakers believe is a losing cause.

And so here's the rub. Tom Cribbair of the National Association of Railroad Passengers, says that Amtrak was born in a "vicious circle. Congress doesn't want to give any more money until it sees improvements in the system, and Amtrak can't make the improvements until it gets more money."

Meanwhile, the passenger service continues to be "Vranich's nightmare." It's like that old joke, he adds: "A passenger calls a conductor when the train is going to be improved. The conductor replies that they already have."

"You know that old joke to the letter that always stinks? We took it out."

Amtrak has improved more than the toilet door in seven years. The agency's safety record, based on deaths per million passenger miles, is the best in the transportation industry. And the trains have become the most-efficient transit mode, one-fourth as costly as a long-haul airplane.

Also, there is some cost-cutting rail service today that is promising.

## Lake Mary Clerk: A 'Forgotten' Item

Why doesn't Lake Mary have a permanent city clerk?

Mayor Walter Swanson has selected a person to fill the spot and announced 10 days ago he would submit his appointment to the city council for confirmation at a special meeting this past Monday night.

But, the appointment was not on the agenda and was not mentioned at the business meeting.

"I forgot," said Swanson explaining to the press during a news conference Monday. "I forgot to place the item on the agenda." He said the item will be placed on the agenda for the May 4 meeting and will not be discussed at this week's Thursday night workshop session.

Swanson declined to reveal his choice for \$11,000 annually salary position, but he did say the appointee will be a woman.

After Mrs. Kay Swanson left the city's employ in late February, Council Major, a Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA) clerk-typist with the city was named city clerk to serve in that position until a permanent clerk could be appointed.

She resumed her duties as clerk-typist, however, after CETA warned that Mrs. Major would be dropped from the federally funded program if she remained city clerk. Swanson then named city bookkeeper and treasurer, Myra DeVlin, interim city clerk in addition to her other offices.

However, although she doesn't hold the title, Mrs. Major has continued to take the minutes at city council meetings and to perform the other functions of city clerk.

During the business meeting, an attempt by Councilman Cliff Nelson to amend the procedures under which citizens can make complaints against individual police officers failed.

## 'Zodiac Killer' Letter Taunts Police After Absence Of 4 Years In S.F.

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The phantom "Zodiac Killer," who taunted police and claimed a list of 37 victims for the first time in four years Tuesday by writing a letter taunting police and saying when a movie would be made about him.

"I am back with you," said the author of the letter to the San Francisco Chronicle. It was addressed simply, "Dear Zodiac."

"Well (Chronicle columnist Herb Caen) I am here, I have always been here. That city pig Police homicide Inspector (Dave) Trench is gone but I am smarter and better. You will get tired and leave me alone."

Trench, present at a police news conference called to discuss receipt of the letter postmarked Monday in San Francisco, said, "I have always felt that he was alive and out there, somewhere. I still don't know where he is, but at least now I know that all our work these years definitely has not been in vain."

Trench said that by a conservative estimate he has talked to at least 5,000 people in the course of the investigation. In words indicating he had no fear the police were anywhere near picking up his trail, the Zodiac said in his letter he was wondering when a movie would be made about him and added, "I am in control of the all things."

He signed the note "Years" and before was drawn the customary sign of a cross through it and the notation "SFD-2," indicating that the San Francisco Police Department had not caught him.

It was the first word from the slayer since his last chilling, monosyllabic communication in 1974 about the movie "The Exorcist." In a series of letters and cryptograms to police and newspapers between 1969 and 1974, Zodiac taunted of killing 37 people.

## Must Return \$4,029 This Year Teacher Rebuffed In Repayment Bid

A Lake Orienta Elementary School teacher will have to make do with a 36-cent paycheck every two weeks until she has paid back the school district the rest of the money she owes in overpayments.

Beverly Boothie, the first-grade teacher who had been overpaid more than \$4,000 over a four-month period because of a computer error was turned down by the school board on her request to repay the money the rest of this school year and next.

She began repaying the overpayment in mid-January at a rate of \$402.94 each two-week pay period. That leaves a two-week take home salary of 56 cents. She still owes the school district \$1,200.

The Seminole County Board of Education refused to grant her grievance. Mrs. Boothie wanted to have the payment to the school district made at a rate of \$700 per month until the end of the 1978-79 year.

School officials argued the money had to be paid back this school year or the school would be subject to criticism in the auditor general's annual audit.

"There is no provision in the law for that sort of request," said Roger Harris, assistant

superintendent. "Loans and accommodations from public funds are illegal."

Gene Grooms, who heads the Seminole Education Association, argued the case for Mrs. Boothie. She sat in the audience with her husband and did not address the school board.

"All through this it has been made out to be her fault," Grooms told the board. "One thing I'd like to make clear is that this was not her fault."

School officials agreed. "The fact that we admit we made the error would be an indication that the blame is not Mrs. Boothie's," Harris said.

From the beginning of school in September to mid-January Mrs. Boothie was paid \$978.52 every two weeks. Her take

home pay amounted to \$643.29. However, she was only supposed to have made \$311.16 and taken home \$432.13.

"When she received the check in September," Grooms told the school board, "she just looked at the net amount. She

did not look at the gross. There was a difference of about \$127 in what she was paid and what she should have been paid in the net

amount. She knew she was getting some sort of raise and she just didn't notice that there was anything wrong.

Grooms noted Mrs. Boothie had kept records of her pay last school year. However, she did not continue the record keeping this school year.

"It is hard for me to realize a person wouldn't realize the difference if they were overpaid this amount, especially if she kept records the year before," said Ernest Cowley, the school board's chief negotiator.

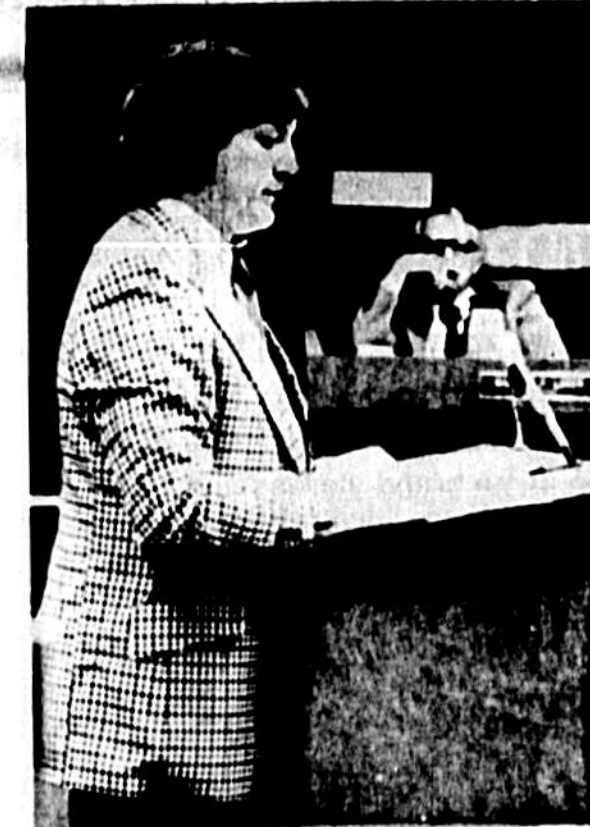
Cowley noted there are three pay periods left in this school year and that Mrs. Boothie now owes the school district \$1,200. That sum will be paid by the end of May, he said.

The checks are issued through a computer, according to Harris. Cowley noted 6,000 checks are issued each month through the computer. Each check bears the signature of Superintendent William (Bud) Layer. However, his signature is placed on the checks by computer.

Mrs. Boothie and her husband have to live on his income since the repayments have been made, according to Grooms.

"I think the board should protect its employees," Grooms said.

"I think the board should do something to protect its employees," said the woman's husband.

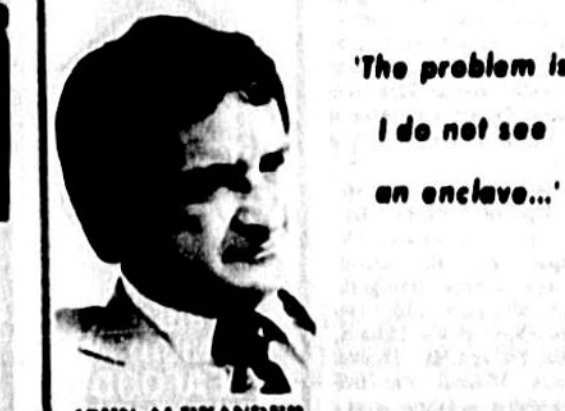

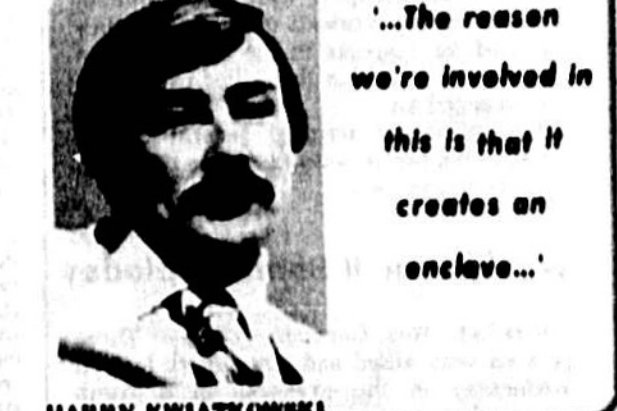

## Osteen (Stenstrom) Bridge: House OK

Despite opposition expressed by the majority of the Seminole County Commission, a bill calling for the resumption of the new Osteen Bridge in honor of Sanford attorney Douglas Stenstrom has passed the House of Representatives, according to State Rep. Robert Hattaway, D-Altamonte Springs.

Hattaway, who sponsored the legislation, said the bill passed the House easily and is now being sponsored in the Florida Senate by Sen. John Vogt, D-Cocoa.

Vogt's office said today a companion bill has been filed in the Senate, but has not yet been introduced. But, said Vogt's aide, the Hattaway bill certifying its passage by the House, was received in the Senate Wednesday and referred to the Senate transportation committee.

The senator's aide said Vogt will pick up the Hattaway House bill and work it through the Senate and "hopefully he'll have an problem in getting it passed."

Vogt, 33 at his apartment with gastroenteritis, was not available for comment. Hattaway, before the current session of the Legislature opened, found that the county commission had adopted a resolution some months earlier opposing any change in the name of the Oosten Bridge.

Commissioners said at the time their opposition was based on a Volusia County plan to name the bridge after a person killed in an automobile accident.
