County coping with heavy rainfall

SEMINOLE - The water level of the St. Johns River continues to swell, causing Lake Monroe to spill over the seawall in Sanford on a windy day. Other areas along the St. Johns River are also flooding, with the impact of the recent rains affecting area cities in the county.

Government officials are concerned as there is little which can be done to prevent what could become serious flooding problems.

Sanford City Manager Bill Simmons, at Monday afternoon's commission work session, explained that the highest water level for the lake as been 6.24 feet. "And right now it's already up to 6.22," he said. The level is the number of feet above sea level.

Regarding the possibility of more rainfall, Simmons said at this point in time, with the El Nino effect, no one would dare assume that we won't have more rainfall.

If the level of the lake continues to climb, expectations are that water will flood parts of Seminole Boulevard, which would require closure. "Sandbags won't do," Simmons explained. "The problem with this rising water is with the storm drains. They connect to the lake, and if the lake is too high, the back flow would cause flooding in areas not even near the actual lakefront," he said.

The city is contacting the St. Johns River Water Management organization, the Army Corps of Engineers, and the county.

Seminole County Emergency Management Coordinator John Blackwood finds he cannot work on prevention, but must concentrate on handling problems which will be caused by flooding. "We do anticipate more rain," he said, "especially within the next 30 to 60 days. But then we also have the summer rainy season followed by hurricane season, so we have to be prepared to handle as big an emergency as possible."

Blackwood said he has already been in contact with American Red Cross. "In the past," he said, "in times of

flooding problems, they have helped in supplying hotel and motel rooms for some who are forced out of their homes, especially those who may have medical problems or a lack of transportation."

Yesterday afternoon, he visited a home at the south end of Beardall Avenue. "A woman out there has had serious flooding problems many times," Blackwood said. "What I am doing now is trying to determine if she qualifies for help." He explained that the State Emergency Management office and Federal Emergency Management

Boy, 14, charged in elderly lady's murder

OVIEDO - A 68-year old retired librarian was brutally stabbed to death at her home on Tuesday.

Oviedo police took 14-year old Jonathan Arce into custody and charged him with the first degree murder of June Stillman, of 1139 Covington Street in the Alafaya Woods subdivision. Arce, an Oviedo High School freshman, has said that he did commit the act yet claims that he did it in self defense. He said that Stillman threat-

ened him with a knife first.

According to police, the killing is one of the most brutal in Oviedo's history. Stillman was stabbed several times and may have been beaten as well. A large portion of blood was reported in the garage area of Stillman's home and there is the possibility that Stillman violently struggled with her assailant as well. An autopsy is scheduled today to determine a clear cause of death.

Adult clubs to stay put

SEMINOLE - For the time being, Sanford is off the hook. No strip bars or porno shops are expected to be opening in the Friendly City anytime soon.

The Board of Seminole County Commissioners has spared Sanford such a fate at the expense of Fern Park. On Tuesday, the board voted, 3-2, to allow two clubs and three video/bookstores to stay where they are along U.S. Highway 17-92 in unincorporated Seminole County.

By "grandfathering" these licensed adult businesses, the board exempted them from having to change their operations or relocate to designated industrial sites in Sanford by Sept. 30, 1999.

A large group of Fern Park residents pleaded one more time for the commissioners to chase the adult businesses from their neighborhood. "We have to have help," Susan Dummer said at the four-hour public meeting.

Some insisted Sanford "blackmailed" the county. "This is being dictated to you by Sanford," Stan Bessmer of English Estates, told the board.

Sanford and the county are close to finalizing an interlocal agreement to share adult club sites. There would be no agreement, though, unless the county grandfathered the Fern Park businesses.

"Sanford's the only city to work with us on sites," Commissioner Daryl McLain said. "No one city holds the county hostage."

Students, evangelist address school board over religious assembly

SEMINOLE - What started out as an assembly to celebrate Black History Month has turned into a legal battle featuring Christians, rabbis and a host of state officials.

On Feb. 27, Teague Middle School in Altamonte Springs planned an assembly to celebrate Black History Month. Professional golfer Tiger Woods agreed to appear, but backed out at the final minute.

Upon notification, Teague officials contacted the Fellowship of Christian Athletes to make a presentation. Several Bible verses and Christian songs were presented to the student body of about 1,400.

During the performance, several students complained that they were not allowed to leave the auditorium despite their discomfort about the religious theme to the presentation.

"We were told we had to stay until the end," sixth-grader Kristin Lewter said. "We tried to cover our ears but they (Teague administrators) told us we were disruptive."

Many parents objected and school board administrators received phone calls and letters protesting the event and Teague officials apologized to students on the school's closed-circuit broadcast program for the activities that took place.

School administrators also explained in a faculty meeting that the performance was unacceptable.

That's where the firestorm began. Monday, the Liberty Counsel, which specializes in defending freedom of speech, especially in cases regarding religion, filed

SANFORD - Representatives from various Sanford Community groups met Tuesday to form a Community Partnership with the common goal of "a better Sanford."

The luncheon meeting was the inspiration of Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce President Doug Sills and Executive Director Ron Rose. "The chamber should take the lead in bringing the groups together," said Rose.

The partnership brings to-

gether groups with a variety of distinct functions, including Sanford Community Redevelopment Agency, Historic Preservation Board, Waterfront Master Steering Committee, and Scenic Improvement Board, in the hope of finding common ground and combining efforts to continue to improve the community.

Those present recognized that among the citizens of the community and even among themselves there was some confusion about the specific missions of the different committees involved. It was

decided that each group should provide information to be compiled by the chamber into one listing describing the different entities.

Sanford Main Street President Bob Parsell stressed the importance of being able to put the views of each committee on the table, even about controversial issues. The group resolved not to let minor things become issues of egos and feelings.

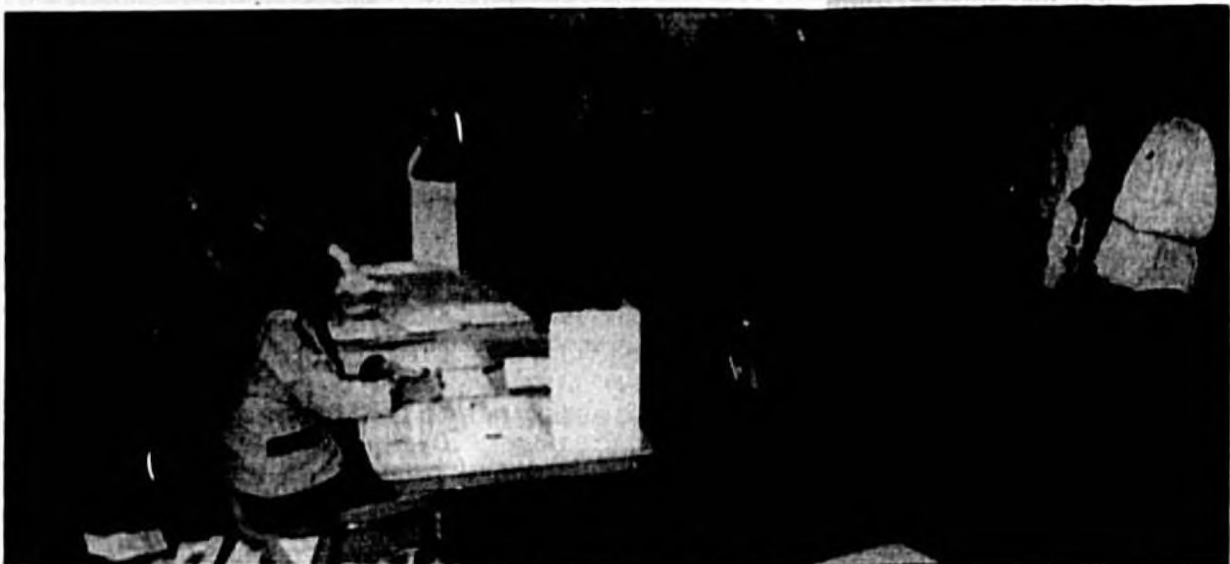

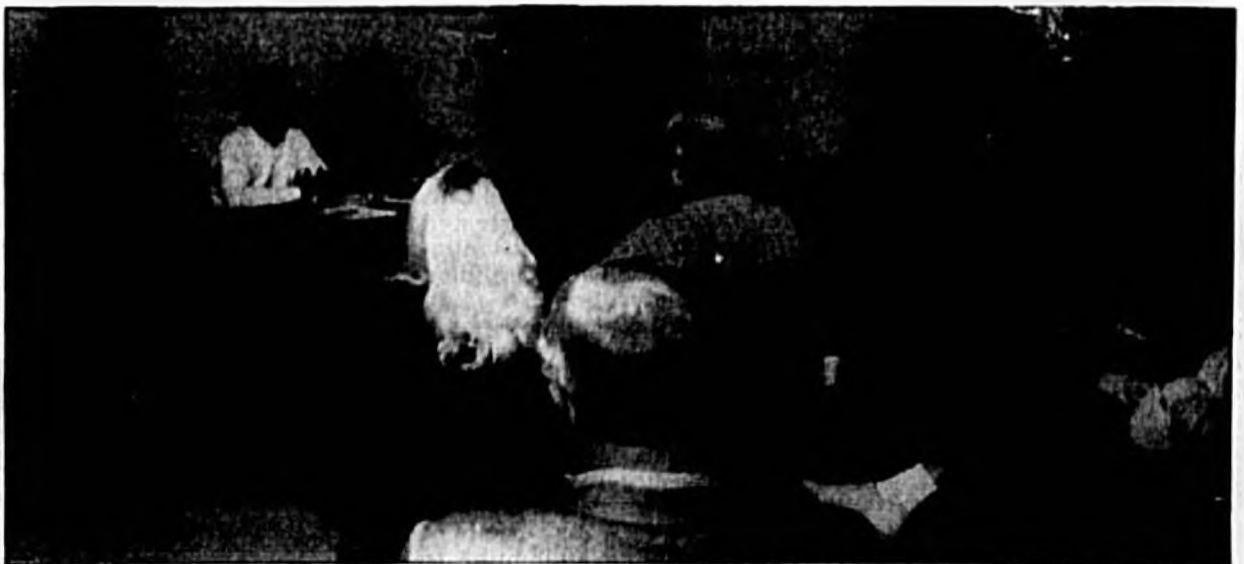

Assistance update for victims, volunteers in storm recovery

SANFORD - It has been over two weeks since the devastating tornadoes struck Central Florida. Most Seminole County residents suffered little or no damage. For a few however, the nightmare continues.

Public as well as private individuals and organizations have gone all-out to provide assistance wherever possible, and even though progress is being made toward cleanup and the start of reconstruction, the problems caused by the circles of wind at over 200 miles per hour continue to come forward.

The following represents just some of the many items pertinent to the storm and subsequent recovery:

Recovery Center

SANFORD - Federal officials have announced the disaster recovery center which was established at the Seminole County Agriculture Extension Center has concluded its assigned mission, and will close as of 6 p.m. this evening (Wednesday).

Recovery centers are temporary facilities that provide information about federal assistance to disaster victims. While a few centers have closed, others will continue in operation for at least a few additional days. The nearest to Sanford are in the Winter Garden and Kissimmee areas.

While the centers do not take applications for assistance, those in need are asked to contact the Florida Division of Emergency Management and Federal Emergency Manage-

ment Agency (FEMA) at 1-800-525-0321 from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily.

Paulucci assistance

SANFORD - The Jeno and Lois Paulucci family has extended immediate and sorely needed help to aid families in Sanford and Seminole County ravaged by recent tornado disasters to rebuild and recapture their lives.

The family foundation yesterday pledged \$50,000 to provide building materials for construction of permanent new homes.

The \$50,000 is in addition to the \$20,000 previously provided by the family for funeral expenses for the four members of the Hall family of Sanford who died in the storm.

Meanwhile, Seminole County Chief Deputy Sheriff Steve Harriett is contacting the Robert McCormick Tribune Foundation to determine whether the Paulucci Foundation pledge qualifies for 50 cents on the dollar contribution from the McCormick Foundation.

At issue is whether the Paulucci gift, earmarked strictly for Sanford and Seminole County relief qualifies for the matching funds offered by the more broadly-based McCormick Foundation, which would increase the benefit to tornado victims to \$75,000.

lady racers

The American Red Cross has announced that Mart Hulman George, chairman of the board of directors of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway is presenting a check for \$100,000 today, for Red Cross Disaster Relief efforts in Central Florida. The check was to be presented on

behalf of the racers at ceremonies this afternoon in Orlando.

Telephone service

The Florida Public Service Commission voted yesterday to approve an emergency recommendation for ALLTEL Florida, Inc. to offer call forwarding free of charge to its primary residential customers who are victims of the recent storms and flooding in its service area. Customers of ALLTEL are required to contact their phone company for arrangements.

Truck stops

To assist in the storm recovery, the American Red Cross is receiving help from the travel plaza and truckstop industry known as NATSO. Over 200 truckstops are participating in the project across the nation, to provide the Red Cross with staging areas.

In the Central Florida area, the truckstops are giving free fuel, truck washes and mechanical service to the fleet of 24 emergency vehicles operating in the recovery process.

told the commissioners that the city "was trying to make the best of a bad situation. We stepped to the plate because we recognize that the courts of the land have said you can not eliminate these places. We don't like it any more than you do."

Not Dale - nor anyone else - can predict what happens four or five years from now. By that time the Supreme Court may no longer allow nude dancing to be a form of expression protected by the First Amendment. County laws may be revised each year.

Still to be resolved is the fate of three strip clubs in the City of Casselberry. The county is working on an interlocal agreement here, also. The clubs are Rachel's, Cabaret and Club Juana. They may be part

of the grandfathering agreement.

Commissioner Chairman Randy Morris said Tuesday he believed the county had "drawn a line - a firm line" - to regulate the adult entertainment industry. "I don't know what more we can do," he said. "This is the first board in 30 years to take action. No one up here today is gutless. This is real life."

The board also voted to drastically hike the license fees of adult businesses by as much as 1,300 percent. Adult clubs that have paid \$750 a year for a license will now pay \$10,000. Bookstores will pay \$1,500 instead of \$750.

Sheriff Don Eslinger said the county pays \$173,290 annually to investigate and enforce the county's adult entertainment code. The higher license fees would help cover these costs.

The county also has negotiated with the adult clubs to tone down their appearances and advertising. As part of the grandfathering agreement, they will not use neon lighting or billboards.

Commissioners Grant Maloy

and Dick Van Der Weide opposed the grandfathering and the approach the board is taking. Both want the county to change the law that permits totally nude dancing at clubs.

"You can throw perfume all over these strip joints and they still stink," Maloy said. "I will not support it."

Van Der Weide said that he expects that 10,000 county residents will soon present a petition requesting totally nude dancing be banned in the county. "This is the reason these clubs operate," he said. "Throw it out and the clubs will go somewhere else."

Once the signatures on this petition were verified, the issue would have to go to the board. If the board failed to approve the petition, it would go to the voters this fall, Van Der Weide said.

Attorney David Wasserman, who represents Circus Circus, a strip club on 17-92, said the decision to grandfather was "the fair thing and right thing to do. This is the solution."

There were many who disagreed.

culties faced by business owners in the historic district. He acknowledged that the first look at Sanford is magnificent, but said that he had encountered "more obstacles to stop a business man from staying here" than he had encountered in his business dealings with any other city.

Mike Skat, with Sanford Main Street and Historic Preservation Board, recognized that the downtown merchants faced unique problems and encouraged the partnership to address the roadblocks they encountered.

"Sanford has wonderful growth, quality growth opportunities," said Historic Preser-

vation Board Chairman Laura Sollien. "We need to iron out any difficulties"

Millard Hunt, Sanford Historical Society, expressed concern that there is "a lot more to life than economics." He felt some people were viewed as "unpatriotic if you don't support the conference center or want to talk about 'green space'." "We need to look at legitimate concerns without killing ideas," said Rose.

Though there were very diverse opinions among the groups on specific issues it was agreed by all that the partnership intended to work together with a spirit of cooperation so that everyone can be heard. It is hoped that through the partnership sharing infor-

mation it can help to put a stop rumors and gossip.

Growth comes with different ideas said Fred Rogers, president of the Sanford Historic Trust. "Some of the best compromises come from disagreements."

It was determined that no organization would be in charge. They will all come together as equal partners with a shared focus of the best interest of the community. The chamber will act as coordinator for the meetings.

The partnership decided to meet every two months. At the next meeting, planned for May, the group will discuss the concept of the waterfront convention center

lawsuits on behalf of several Teague students and their parents.

The suit claimed that school officials humiliated Christian students who participated with their apology.

John Butler Book, a noted Central Florida evangelist, defended the FCA and the performance.

"I am dismayed, disillusioned and disgusted," Book said at the school board meeting Tuesday. "Nowhere in the Bill of Rights says there is a separation of church and state."

Book then presented copies of the Bill of Rights to each of the school board members.

"The right of freedom of speech is being denied," Book said. "The missing ingredient is the word of God."

Book's comments were followed by a succession of Jewish leaders and parents.

Several Teague students disputed that comments, saying they were uncomfortable during the presentation.

"The FCA assured us it would be a positive presentation," sixth-grader Justin Zorn said. "They told us it would be a patriotic show with a patriotic message and nothing offensive. We trusted them."

Another student, sixth-grader Monica McCown said she heard the presentation had been screened by the school administration.

The Teague students claimed that FCA students were sixth- and seventh-graders and were not responsible for the performance.

What they were upset about, the Teague students said, was that they felt forced to stay in their seats despite their discomfort.

Still, before the school board, they supported Teague Principal Gene Brewer

"It wasn't his fault," McCown said. "It had nothing to do with him."

School board members announced before the speakers made their comments that they would not be commenting on the situation.

The FCA is a student organization with chapters at each of the county high schools and many of the middle schools. Members meet on campus during non-school hours and maintain a loose relationship with the schools but is non-government funded and has no official ties with the school system.

ment (FEMA) are offering to purchase certain property which qualifies as a flood disaster area at a fair market value price. That land then becomes property of the county or state.

"Then through Small Business Association (SBA)," he continued, "loans are being offered to help people build at a new location."

As far as the immediate probability of flooding however, Blackwood said it should be the main concern of anyone who has property in an area where flooding due to the heavy rainfall may occur. "People have to make plans now," he said. "They should figure where they may go in case of flooding, such as a friend's home or family member. They should also check into flood insurance and take a good long look at their homeowners insurance policy."

Stimmons and Blackwood agreed that there is nothing that can be done to prevent the rain but individuals as well as governmental bodies must do whatever possible as soon as possible to formulate plans for coping with such problems.

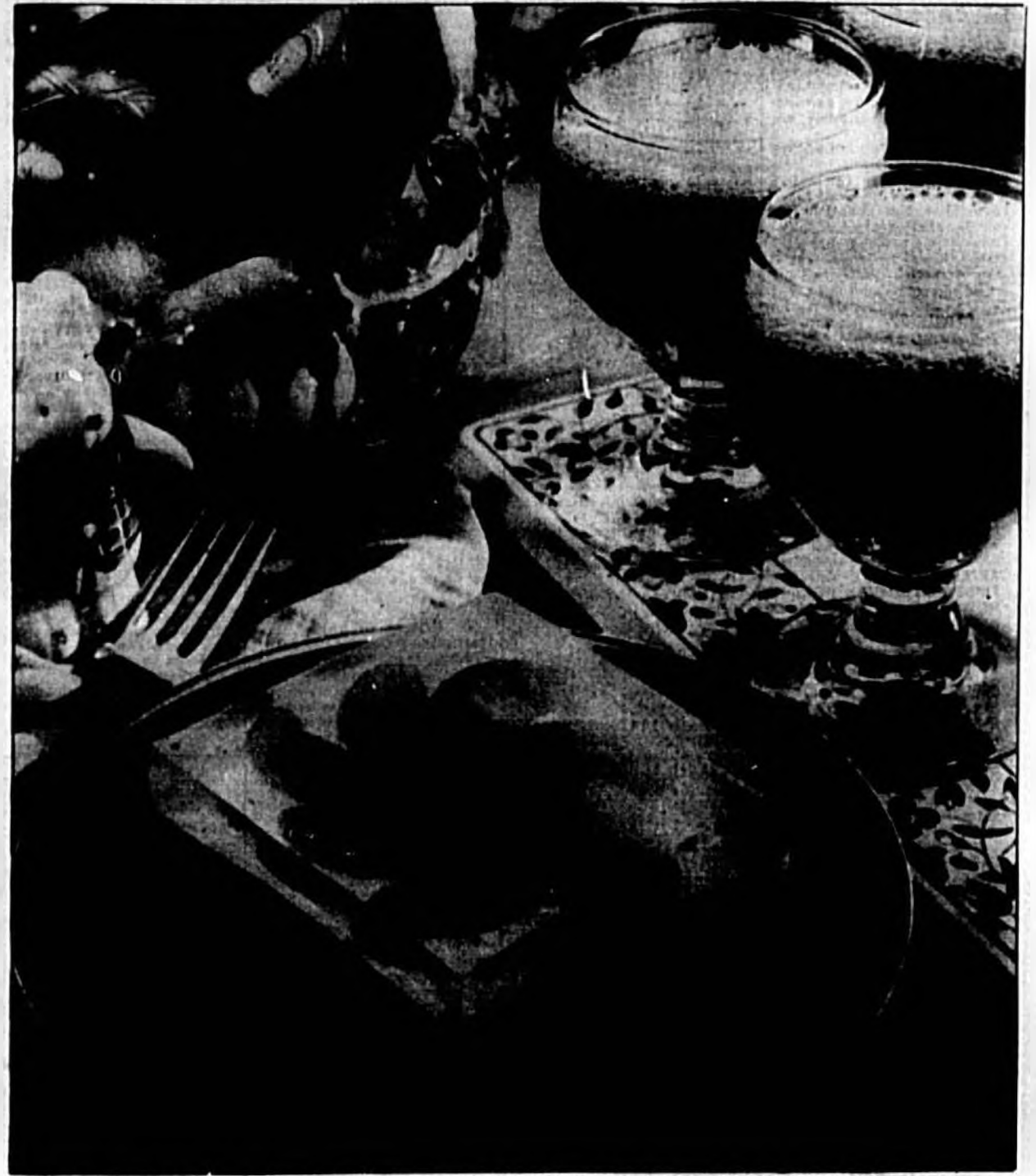

Hypoglycemics must curb sugar intake

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've been diagnosed by a blood test with hypoglycemia. I'm dizzy and tired. Do I need to avoid all sugars completely?

DEAR READER: Hypoglycemia (low blood sugar) is the opposite of diabetes, a serious disease marked by high blood sugar levels.

Hypoglycemia can be caused by tumors in the pancreas, the organ that produces insulin, as well as by at least 40 other afflictions, ranging from liver disease to pregnancy. Thus, the diagnosis of hypoglycemia (a blood sugar level of less than 45 milligrams per deciliter) is merely the starting point for further testing to discover the cause.

The most common cause of low blood sugar is reactive hypoglycemia, which typically follows a meal and is associated with dizziness, weakness and fatigue. Essentially, what happens is that the food causes an insulin release from the pancreas that overshoots and drives the sugar too low. This effect is especially pronounced when the meal contains sweets.

Therefore, patients with this condition are advised to avoid sugar and eat several high protein meals a day. Fruits are OK.

Reactive hypoglycemia is not life-threatening, but it is certainly distressing to its victims. To give you more information, I am sending you a copy of my Health Report "Hypoglycemia." DEAR DR. GOTT: Several of my friends are using an over-the-counter herbal remedy to lose weight. The product contains Ma Huang (ephedra) that is potentially dangerous. However, I've been assured by a company representative that naturally occurring ephedrines lack the health hazards of synthetic ephedrines. Is this correct?

DEAR READER: Wrong. Ephedrines, whether herbal or man-made, act as stimulants and, as such, can harm the body by increasing the heart rate, elevating the blood pressure, causing insomnia, and producing mental changes (including delirium). There have been several reports of deaths from compounds that contain Ma Huang. Moreover, stimulants are not an appropriate therapy for overweight. Stay away from this stuff.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I just got a new set of dentures that don't fit. I'm unable to eat, sleep or play the trumpet. What can I do?

DEAR READER: Put 'em in a box, return them to your dentist for refitting and take piano lessons.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Because of angina, I have to take six nitroglycerine pills under my tongue a day. This is a nuisance. Are there any alternatives?

DEAR READER: Nitroglycerine relieves the chest pain caused by angina, when too little oxygen reaches the heart muscle.

Nitro now comes in several forms, in addition to the traditional sublingual tablets. It can be prescribed in a cream that is applied to the skin, in a spray for the mouth, by injection (for hospital use), and in pill form (both regular and long-acting). Ask your doctor about these various options. Perhaps the long-acting pills would be easier for you to take.

However, remember that nitroglycerine serves only to relieve your symptoms of pain. You should also follow your physician's advice about prudent exercise, a cardiac rehabilitation program, other drugs to assist the heart, and — as a last resort — surgery to clean out your coronary arteries or to bypass the blockages that are causing your angina.

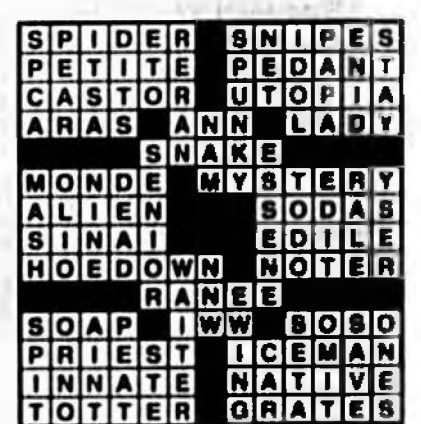

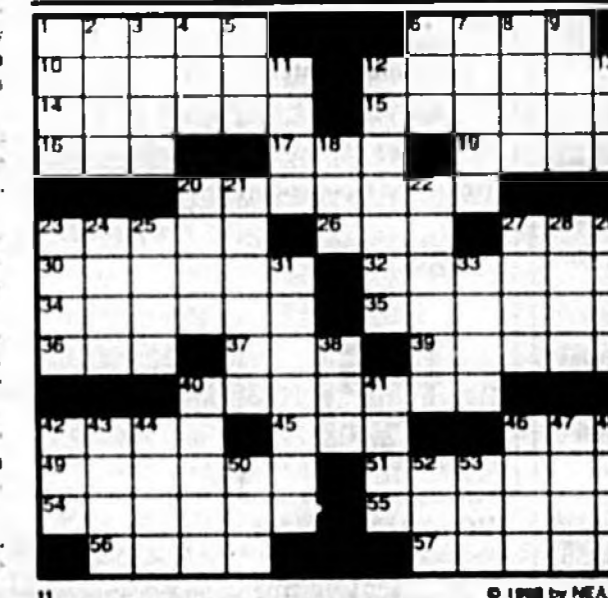

WIN AT BRIDGE

The reliable conclusion

Goethe might have been discussing bridge, instead of knowledge, when he wrote, "The important thing is not to know more than all men, but to know more at each moment than any particular man."

Bridge is basically an easy game if you can think the right thought at the correct moment. Of course, because that is so much easier said than done, the game continues to fascinate millions of people.

East had an awkward decision over two spades. He wanted to keep both hearts and clubs in the picture, but was afraid to overcall two no trump for fear of a misunderstanding. (Do you and your partner know whether it is natural, showing the minors, or al-

lowed with a heart minor two-suiter?)

Against four spades, West led the heart 10. East playing three rounds of the suit. When South ruffed the last one high, West threw a club. After winning trick four with the spade ace, East played another heart, still hoping for a trump promotion. South ruffed high again and cashed his remaining three trumps. Which five cards should West have retained?

Thinking his club holding was important, he kept three clubs and two diamonds. Now, though, declarer's diamond five won the last trick. Which correct thought did West miss?

If East had the club ace, presumably he would have cashed it when in with the spade ace. That assumption leads to the key inference: If South had a club loser (A-x or A-K-x, for example), he would have ruffed it in the dummy before drawing trumps. So, West should have kept his three diamonds and discarded only clubs.

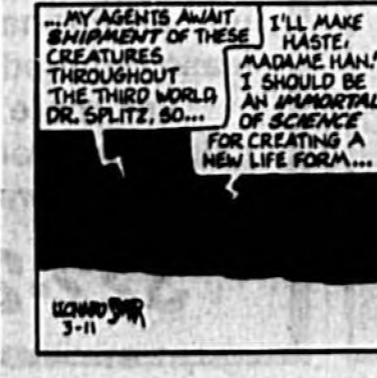
