

DAVIDSON SAYS DEBT PAYMENT WASNT READY

Hoover Partner Testifies Before House Group That Funds Were Not Deposited

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—(A.P.)—An international banker told the House Ways and Means Committee today that the Hoover partner, Edwin Franco, and Italy didn't have on deposit with their fiscal agents funds with which to meet their debt payments due this country on Dec. 15. Henry Davidson, of J. P. Morgan and Company, fiscal agent for those countries, was called to testify regarding press reports that the countries had had funds on deposit. "They didn't have funds with us and didn't have any," he said. Opponents of ratification of the President's plan to suspend debt payments for a year cited press reports that funds were on deposit as evidence the suspension was unnecessary.

"I prefer to let my statement stand," McFadden replied, after predicting a debt revision conference within three months.

"And I will let the implication of my statement stand," was Treadway's rejoinder.

McFadden launched upon a severe criticism of the activities of international bankers. They have loaded the small banks of America with foreign securities, he said, and this has been the cause of many bank failures.

"The present administration has permitted the reparation bonds to be placed on sale in this country," he continued. "The proposal of President Hoover on June 20 (the more or less proposal) would interfere with the French foreign financial policy."

"These are only a few of the facts which confirm the assertion that the executive branch of the government, with the exception of few periods since the war, has been committed in the European policy of commercialization of the German reparation bonds in the United States."

"A moratorium on allied debts ought not to be granted at this time, or until much information not yet disclosed has been made available to Congress. The Franco-American accord ought not to be ratified under any circumstances."

McFadden was preceded before the committee by Representative Rankin, Mississippi Democrat, another opponent of the moratorium.

During the day, Secretary Stimson and Undersecretary Mills of the treasury, who stood at President Hoover's elbow during the period in which the moratorium was negotiated, pleaded its cause.
