

ALL AVAILABLE CWA JOBS NOW ARE TAKEN UP

Mrs. Morse Ordered To Stop Employing Additional Men On City, County Tasks

Under an order issued at Gainesville yesterday where state heads of the Civil Works Administration met with state officials and many local CWA leaders, no additional persons are to be placed on regular jobs in this city and county.

This word was brought to Sanford today by Mrs. Helen T. Morse, CWA worker who attended the meeting along with five women members of the local project committee.

The county's quota has been used up. Mrs. Morse stated, and for the time being persons not unemployed and whose names are listed at the Federal Re-employment Office on Magnolia Avenue must remain idle so far as the local CWA is concerned.

Only those persons who are actually being given work relief or relief on Nov. 16 are to be employed on regular jobs. Mrs. Morse stated, as she indicated that the 754 persons who were handed checks last week may expect to be retained as Federal employees.

In reporting on the organization meeting of the Women's Project Committee of the local CWA, Mrs. Morse stated that Mrs. R. A. Smith was elected as chairman of the committee.

Members of this group approved the setting up of a women's center, and the employment of women for clerical and library assistance.

Accompanying Mrs. Morse to Gainesville were Mrs. Maude Cassin, Mrs. Roder Curtiss, Mrs. J. C. Bille, Jr., Mrs. R. A. Smith, and Mrs. Rex Packard.

TREASURY QUITS BUYING BONDS AS AID TO PROGRAM

Officials Point To Gain In Security Prices As Sign Of Strength

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—(AP)—An abrupt drop in treasury purchases of government bonds was announced yesterday by Acting Secretary Morgenthau while other officials pointed to recent advances in federal security prices as evidence that they could hold their own without support from within.

A total of \$2,545,000 was invested in the bonds last week, Morgenthau said, as compared with \$8,748,000 the week before. Meanwhile, all issues of government bonds except one had plus signs before the figures that showed their net change for the week.

Officials pointed out that during last week, the price of domestic newly mined gold was advanced 25 cents, its largest increase in the last several weeks. This failed to disturb the bond market; commodities prices were soft and the dollar turned strong.

These developments with the related problems of the approaching December financing, involving the refunding of \$127,000,000 of maturing treasury obligations, were gone over in detail yesterday in a conference between President Roosevelt and Morgenthau shortly after the President's return from Warm Springs.

HIGH TRIBUNAL OKEYS SPECIAL BANKING LAW

Supreme Court Upholds Act Allowing Governor To Appoint Bank Conservators

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—(AP)—The first of the emergency banking laws passed by the states during the bank holiday of last Spring received the Supreme Court's approval yesterday when it upheld a South Carolina act permitting the governor to appoint conservator for closed state banks.

The law had been attacked on the ground that it worked against the interest of depositors since in the particular case an officer of the closed bank was appointed as conservator. Hunter A. Gibbs, depositor in the Central Union Bank of Columbia, S. C., contended that since the conservator, Simpson J. Zimmerman, was an officer, director and stockholder of the institution, his interest would coincide with those of depositors.

The court held that the conservator was in the same official capacity as a receiver and would administer the bank just as efficiently.

The decision was watched with interest as the South Carolina law closely parallels the federal law passed to meet the emergency for national banks.

BATON ROUGE, La., Dec. 5.—(AP)—Senator Huey P. Long's political dynasty in Louisiana ran up against open revolution in the sixth congressional district last night as the state administration ordered a proposed district election to proceed today and forces opposing the election obtained court injunctions to prevent the balloting.
