



I-4 trail overpass to open Monday

On Monday, the Seminole County Board of County Commissioners will officially open the I-4 Trail Overpass Bridge. This 373-foot long, cable-stayed suspension bridge, located just south of County Road 46A, connects the Seminole-Wediva Trail west of I-4 to the Lake Mary-Rinehart Road Trail east of the Interstate.

Design and construction on the \$3.5 million dollar bridge began in January 2002, and was funded by federal transportation grants and the local Trails Referendum.

Longwood man arrested for too much exposure

A Longwood area man, with a history of exposing himself in public, was arrested during the weekend by Altamonte Springs Police for indecent exposure.

34-year old Ellis Morris is listed as a suspect in the incident which occurred at the Lake Mary Target store at 4155 West Lake Mary Boulevard on May 29, 2003. On that date, store security observed him allegedly exposing himself in the store as he watched 13-year old girls play video games. The girls were not aware of him, but store security was, and they contacted law enforcement. Morris then left the store before law enforcement arrived.

On May 31, 2003, at a Target in Altamonte Springs, the police were called after Morris allegedly exposed himself to a Target employee. When the police officer arrived on the scene, he confronted Morris and observed that Morris was indeed exposing himself in public. Morris was arrested and booked into the Seminole County Jail. He later posted bond and was released.

Since the arrest, Morris has been identified as the suspect in the exposure incident at the Lake Mary Target. He has not been arrested on the Seminole County Sheriff's case, which has been sent to the State Attorney's Office for review.

According to public records, Morris has been arrested for Indecent Exposure in Public in 1999 and 2001. He was suspected of Indecent Exposure in Public in a 1988 case but was not arrested on that charge. He was arrested for Resisting without Violence.

Dixon resigns as city manager

SANFORD — Interim City Manager Roger Dixon plans to resign Monday night following the city commission meeting.

In a June 3 letter to commissioners, Dixon wrote "It would be in the best interests of my family, my career objectives, and the city of Sanford" to resign.

Dixon has been under investigation for a sexual harassment complaint filed by Paula Freytes-Torres, an employee at City Hall. In a May 8 letter released to the public last

week, the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) said there is "reasonable cause to believe" that Freytes-Torres' civil rights were violated.

Dixon has denied the allegations and demanded an apology from Freytes-Torres. As late as Monday, June 2, Dixon indicated he had no plans to resign.

However, the following day, Mayor Brady Lessard said he received a call from

city attorney Lonnie Groot.

"Lonnie told me Roger was in his office and wanted to draw up a letter of resignation," Lessard said.

According to Lessard, Dixon has been meeting with him and commissioners since that Tuesday and presented his letter of resignation to the mayor on Thursday. He will continue to act as interim city manager until the commission votes on Monday in regard

to his resignation letter. If the resignation is approved, it would take effect immediately.

"He wants to explore career opportunities," said Lessard. "I'm not surprised by his resignation. Roger has been thinking about it for quite a while."

Lessard said the city will not tolerate sexual harassment, but stopped short of saying Dixon's resignation was related to the EEOC investigation.

"This is an ongoing investigation, and I wouldn't speculate as to whether the criminal investigation prompted Roger's resignation."

City narrows field of manager candidates

SANFORD — City commissioners narrowed the field of finalists for the city manager position to four Thursday.

After conducting conference calls with the shortlist of six candidates, commissioners unanimously voted to keep the following candidates: James F. Coleman of Lady Lake, Danny Crew of Gastonia, N.C., Al Grieshaber, Jr., of Albany, Ga., and James Ross O'Connor of St. Charles, Mo.

"One of these four will be our next city manager," said Mayor Brady Lessard. "This will be home for him and his family."

Throughout the 30-minute interviews, commissioners asked the six candidates — Terry Dody was scheduled for an interview, but withdrew his name from the race — to tell about themselves, their qualification, professional backgrounds and why they would like to work for the city of Sanford.

Commission rated each candidate on oral communication, sense of priorities, interpersonal sensitivity, composure, leadership/impact and depth of understanding.

During the interviews, the commissioners' clear favorite was Crew, who is in town this week interviewing for the Osceola County manager position.

"We need to call Danny tonight," said Commissioner Kevin Hipes, implying that he didn't want Crew to sign a contract with Osceola County before bringing him in for an interview for the Sanford job.

Although commissioners liked Crew, they were quick to say the slate would be wiped clean and the playing field leveled during the face-to-face interviews.

"My ranking changed from the resume stage to the telephone interview stage," said Hipes. "The ranking could change again after the in-person interviews."

Commission plans to send a representative from the board to visit the hometowns of each of the four finalists sometime in mid-June. While on the site visit, interviews with the chief of police, fire department and business associates will be conducted and an overall feel for the city will be

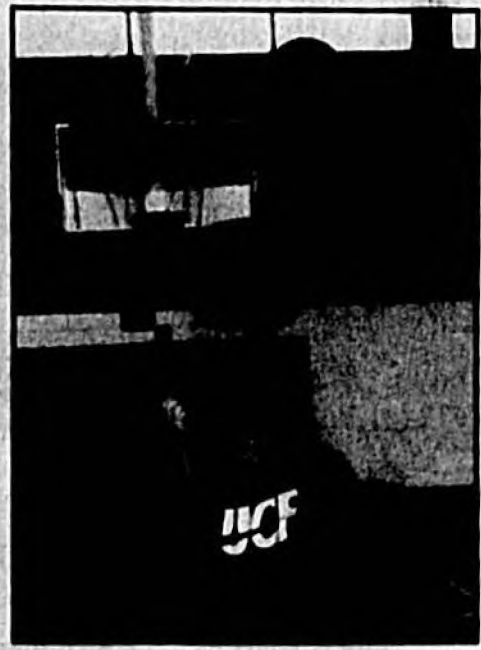

County considers incentives for Sanford company

SANFORD — Seminole County Commissioners will decide Tuesday whether to award a \$150,000 incentive package to Florida Extruders International, Inc., in Sanford.

The company, which manufactures extruded aluminum products for outdoor pool enclosures, screened porches and window frames, has been located

in Sanford for more than 15 years. When the facility recently decided to expand, company executives evaluated sites within Seminole County as well as the rest of the southeast.

The city of Sanford, in hopes of keeping the company local, voted unanimously in mid-May to approve an incentive package also worth \$150,000. However, as part of the deal, in order for the city funds to be distributed, the county must match the

incentive package.

Originally, Florida Extruders didn't plan to make a location decision until August; however, the group is currently in negotiations for 34.5 acres located at Beardall Avenue and State Road 46 in Sanford. In anticipation of a deal, the current property owner, the Leffler Company in Sanford, requested a rezoning from the Sanford Planning and

Citizens protest downtown proposal

LAKE MARY — The city's proposed downtown revitalization is one step closer to becoming a reality, although some residents are not happy with the plans.

City Commission Thursday approved an ordinance revising amendments to the city's comprehensive plan. The changes set the maximum density for the proposed area, along with revising the boundary for the core district. The move demonstrates to companies, who are interested in developing the downtown area, the city intends on moving forward with the project.

"We have to try to reach a point where we can do something with our downtown," Commissioner Gary Brender said. "By creating a downtown district, we are moving Lake Mary into the future."

Not everyone attending Thursday's meeting agreed with Commission's action to move forward with the project. More than a dozen residents living within or near the downtown area voiced concerns about the potential for overcrowding and traffic problems the proposed district could cause.

For more than a decade, city officials have discussed the feasibility of developing the area that surrounds City Hall. The proposed stair-step shaped core district is approximately 40 acres and includes retail, commercial and residential zoning. The project's objective is to encourage revitalization of the town center, maintain and enhance property value and unify the old and new section of the city with a geographic center.

Along with retail and residential

Billy Pierson bringing 'belt buckle' country music to Sanford's The Barn

SANFORD — In a time when most country acts sound more like the Backstreet Boys or Justin Guarini of "American Idol" fame, newcomer Billy Pierson brings cowboy hats and belt buckles back into country music.

"I think country music is slowly going back to where it needs to be," said Pierson, who will perform at The Barn in Sanford Wednesday. "I can see it turning. There has been great music over the past 10 to 15 years, but it was penned away from country music.

"I'm so glad to be in an era when true country is needed again," he added. "We're singing country and the way it should be."

Pierson, who grew up in Panama City, landed in Nashville in 1995 to pursue a singing career. After only six months, he was signed by then-label guru A & M Records. The company decided soon after to mix its country division, leaving Pierson and

artists without jobs.

"We lost our hearts and dreams," said Pierson, who is a pilot in his spare time. "But, that's what happens. It's a roller coaster ride."

After the disappointment in Nashville, Pierson decided to take a break from music and visit his father, Chuck Pierson, in Naples. He enjoyed the area and soon decided to make it his permanent home. He later started a family construction business with his father and brother.

Throughout it all, Pierson never gave up on his dream of making it in the music industry. So, when Oak Records approached

him with a record deal, he leaped at the chance to return to his first love — music.

With his debut single, "I Worship the Woman You Walk On," which he co-wrote with Steve Clark, set to hit airwaves Tuesday, Pierson is on top of the roller coaster ride.

"This is further than I thought I would be," said Pierson, a former DJ for WJKM in Lebanon, Tenn. "It's everything I dreamed it would be — it's definitely what I dreamed of."

Pierson kicked off his national tour last

Paula Ritchey, SAFE KIDS coordinator stated, "Buckling up is still the most effective way to save lives and reduce injuries from motor vehicle crashes on America's roadways. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), Motor Vehicle Crashes are the leading cause of death for children age 4 to 14, and in 2000 more than half of all children under 15 years of age killed in car crashes were completely unrestrained."

Adults who don't buckle up send children a deadly message that it is all right to ride unbuckled when traveling in a motor vehicle, she added. In fact, research shows that when a driver is unbuckled, 70 percent of the time, children riding in that vehicle will be unbuckled, too.

Even when parents use restraints, their child still may be at risk. Community child safety seat check-up events held throughout Florida indicate that more than 96 percent of the child safety seats inspected were incorrectly installed in one or more ways.

Sanford Proud: Last Friday's ceremony for the Vigilante memorial out at the airport was one of Sanford's shining moments. Organizers estimate the crowd at about 1,400 people, one of the largest crowds I've seen for any event in Sanford during my four years in the Celery City.

Many in the crowd had a direct connection to the former Naval Air Station (NAS) Sanford.

One of those was **Dan Rowley**. Rowley is considered "the John Wayne of the Vigilante community," said Patty Mahany, vice chairman of the Sanford Airport Memorial Committee. "He is one of the most respected men among the Sanford Navy veterans."

The esteem in which Rowley is held is well deserved. He is one of only three pilots to log more than 2,000 hours in the Vigilante, and he has more deployments in the aircraft than anyone.

"My whole operation career and most of my project career in the Navy was spent with the Vigilante," said Rowley, who was one of the last to fly the jet out of Sanford. "Basically, I was with the Vigilante from birth to death."

To honor Rowley, the committee selected him as one of four veterans to have his name painted on the memorial jet.

"I'm pleased and proud to have my name on that plane, particularly considering the other names on the plane," Rowley said. "There are some good men I'm honored to be with on that plane."

Rowley said he didn't know the committee intended to put his name on the Vigilante. The honor means as much for his wife, who is from an old Sanford family.

"She's a Hutchinson," Rowley said.

His most vivid memory of the Vigilante is the first day he saw the jet.

"I was a junior officer when I first saw it," Rowley remembered. "It's hard to describe. The Vigilante was the most impressive aircraft I had ever seen. The best way I can describe it is the way those pilots felt when they first saw the SR-71 (Blackbird stealth spy plane)."

Rowley, who lives in Winter Park, has fond memories of his days in Sanford. He said Sanford was "my favorite NAS" because the residents seemed proud to have the Navy base.

"I don't know why they like us so well, but they did," Rowley said. "They made us a part of their town. Heck, our officers' club was essentially Jim Spencer's Restaurant."

"I think at the time it was \$50 a year for the Navy guys to join the Mayfair Country Club," Rowley recalled. "That was a real perk. I remember playing 45 holes a day when I got leave."

It was a pleasure to speak with Rowley, and I'm sure each of the men and women who attend the ceremony could provide equally compelling stories.

Kudos to Jack Dow, Patty Mahany and all of the men and women who worked so hard to make the Vigilante memorial such a success. You're the embodiment of "Sanford Proud."

Not newsworthy?: Speaking of the Vigilante ceremony, the event almost didn't make the pages of the *Orlando Sentinel*.

Zoning Commission Thursday.

"This site meets their needs for now and for future expansions," said Ron Henson of Design Service Group in Longwood, who is representing the Leffler Company. "And, it's an economic opportunity for the city and county to better themselves. You don't get a lot of these type of companies here."

The Commission voted unanimously to recommend to Sanford City Commission that the rezoning of the property from planned development to industrial uses be approved. City Commission will vote on the proposed rezone June 23.

"They [Florida Extruders] are very interested in this site," said Henson. "It is the intent of Florida Extruders to purchase the land in Sanford if the city is able to annex and rezone the property."

If approved, funds for the incentive project would come from the county's Jobs Growth Incentive Fund. According to county analysis, the return investment on the project would be less than a year for all taxes countywide.

The capital investment by the company for this project is an estimated \$11.5 million, including the land purchase, construction of a 224,000 square foot facility and \$2 million in machinery and equipment.

According to Florida Extruders, the group plans to hire 155 new employees at an average annual salary of \$26,387. If the county incentive package is approved, this would equate to \$987 for each new job created.

During Tuesday's meeting, commissioners will also:

- Consider adopting a resolution renaming a portion of State Road 436, between Interstate-4 and U.S. Highway 17-92, to East Altamonte Drive. A duplication of address numbers on east and west State Road 436 was brought to the attention of Commission after a recent emergency response delay to a 9-1-1 call was caused by the confusion of numbers. If approved, this change would only affect the business addresses in unincorporated Seminole County, since Altamonte Springs already uses East Altamonte Drive.

- Receive a briefing on the infrastructure challenges the Road Operations and Stormwater Division of the Public Works Department faces. A summary of operational programs such as sidewalks, landscape maintenance, mosquito control, the surface water quality NPDES Program, and effectiveness of storage and conveyance systems during storm events will be discussed.

- Decide whether to enter into a billboard agreement with Clear Channel Outdoor. The company is proposing the removal of three existing billboards in exchange for the construction of one new billboard in the I-4 Industrial Park located in the northwest part of Seminole County.

areas that include upscale townhouses and condominiums, city planners have proposed various amenities for the district, such as a band shell near the city's community building, numerous "stair step" parks and green areas and a large interactive fountain for children.

Thursday's concerns focused on the approved maximum density for freestanding residential development. The revisions now allow a density of 18 dwelling units per acre — down from 25 — for two blocks in the northern area of the district, which would allow for the construction of townhouses.

"I don't see the possibility of getting that many units on one acre," said Jan Blackwelder.

"Fifteen to 18 units, that's way too many."

Blackwelder's husband, John, added that many residents in the area do not want three-story buildings in their neighborhood.

"Who wants to be in their home looking out their window at a three-story building?" said John Blackwelder. "I don't want to live like that."

Many of the residents at the meeting opposed to the new zoning regulations suggested the city clean up what is already downtown Lake Mary.

"This is a wonderful city as it is now," Debbie Williamson said. "It just needs a little clean up. The city should leave it alone and fix it up."

Several residents attending the meeting, however, voiced their support for the downtown revitalization.

Ginger Hornsby said the proposal would clean up and improve the area.

"I really believe this will be an improvement," Hornsby said. "How many people in the area have improved their homes. It's not for me to judge how the way people live is either wrong or right, but I can't see how this won't improve our property."

Tim Bosley of Broadmoor Road presented Commission with a petition containing more than 100 signatures of Lake Mary residents who favor the new development.

Following the public hearing, Commission voted to move forward with the revised comprehensive plan. Commissioner George Duryea, who had concerns regarding the high density and lack of transitional area, was the

sole "no" vote. Commissioner Mike McLean was absent from the meeting.

"When the Downtown Development Advisory Committee was formed, we tried to come up with a way to make the downtown nicer," Duryea said. "The original committee never envisioned new stand alone residential."

"We have to do something, and I am happy with the core area," he said. "I am not happy with the northern areas and won't be unless the density is significantly reduced."

In response, Lake Mary Mayor Thom Greene said the 18-unit per acre zoning was a maximum number. The number of units could actually be fewer than the proposed 18.

"We could tweak the plan to give a transitional area to the north and east," Greene said. "We just want to have a comfort level for the developers to come in here. It will be a cap of 18, but there probably will never be 18."

Commissioner Brender also added that residents would have the opportunity to voice either their concerns or approval of what happens in the district once developers present their plans to Commission.

"We can't build a wall around the community and say, OK, this is our spot and no one else can come in," Brender said. "We have not created anything in this town that has brought down property values or ruined a segment of the community. We're not about to screw it up now."

tion," Lessard said.

In his letter to commissioners, Dixon did not refer to the EEOC investigation. He did, however, say his resignation is conditional based upon the city commission granting him a three-month's severance package. Dixon's contract binds the city to pay him 90 days salary if the city terminates his employment without cause. Dixon wants the city to honor that clause although he is resigning rather than being terminated.

"The technicalities of his contract, including determining the capacity the city will keep him and severance will be determined on Monday," Lessard said.

Reached Friday, Dixon declined to comment on the resignation. Instead, he said he

would make a statement after commission action on Monday.

Also on Monday's agenda, commissioners will:

- Receive a briefing on the Sanford 1st Street Streetscape project. Design of the project has reached the 60 percent engineering drawings level. Commissioners will also discuss funding for the project, expected to come from the Downtown Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) and a public awareness campaign.

- Discuss amendments to the Land Development Regulations' Schedule S codes which govern the Historic District.

- Consider approval of the preliminary subdivision plan for The Gateway at Riverwalk, the six-story condominium complex proposed to be located just west of City Hall.

Investigation continues in dog killing incident

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is investigating an incident on June 3, where a shot was fired in a residential neighborhood, killing a dog. Around 4:30 p.m. at 144 Grackle Court in the Deer Run subdivision, the dog's caretaker, 30-year old Lawrence Couch, was standing 20-25 feet away from the dog when it was shot. Couch was visiting from Orlando and taking care of the dog for its owner.

Couch says he had just let the dog outside when the shot was fired. Couch noticed the dog jump and then run into the

house. After he let the dog inside, the dog soon died of a shot to the chest. The Seminole County Sheriff's Office and Seminole County Animal Services were called.

The deputy on the scene and the animal services officer believe the dog was shot with a .22 caliber gun, perhaps a rifle. The neighborhood was canvassed, and one resident reported hearing what sounded like a firecracker. Other neighbors were either not home or claimed they did not hear anything. The deputy plans to contact neighbors again to see what develops.

For those who haven't been in Central Florida long however, at various times, we can hear them saying either, "When will this rain stop?" or, "When will we get some rain?"

To them it seems to be feast or famine.

I'm still getting over the heavy rainfall we had earlier this year. I live on a landlocked lake, and it has taken over two-thirds of my back lawn. I have a gazebo, surrounded by roses, that is completely out in the lake.

The city of Deltona (I'm in the city limits) is doing some things to alleviate some of the larger lakes, but there is no way they will do anything for me and my neighbors, so I guess I'll just have to grin and bear it. At least it doesn't take me as long as it used to, to mow the back lawn.

They have often said about weather, "Everyone talks about it, but no one can do anything about it." A truer statement cannot be made.

The best we can do is, when looking for a new home, double-check the flood plains, and buy a home on high ground, keeping in mind the approaching roadways as well, to prevent them from keeping you away from your driveway.

If your home is already in a flood prone area, get flood insurance. Most homeowners insurance does NOT cover flooding. Double check your policy — you may be surprised.

The one thing to worry about is — if we have severe rain in the next few months and a hurricane comes up — we'll be in a heap of trouble.

Sorry folks, there is nothing we can do about the amount of rainfall we have or don't have. And I guess, as this is a personal column, there should be some words of advice I should give out. This is one major case when that just can't be done — but we should keep our eyes out and be cautious at all times.

What did the prime minister know and when did he know it?

When I left Washington a few days ago, most Americans seemed generally unconcerned that our soldiers and spies had found no WMD, the weapons of mass destruction that were supposed to be the reason for going to war in Iraq. After all, we won easily, and we were finding mass graves that certainly proved Saddam Hussein was a homicidal monster.

So, in the United States, President Bush is more popular than ever. What a difference an ocean makes. In Great Britain, there is a frenzy over the missing WMD, and some members of his own Labor Party are saying that Prime Minister Tony Blair's government could fall over his "lying" to the nation and even to his own ministers.

This is some of what you see on a newstand in this old university town:

The tabloid *Daily Mail*: "Tony Blair's Private War" ... "He built case for war around three big deceits" ... "If Blair did mislead us, he must go."

The moderate *Financial*

Times: "Angry MPs to Press Blair on Iraq Weapons — The allegations that we were misled into war are more serious than Watergate."

The conservative *Sunday Times*: "LIE ANOTHER DAY — Have our intelligence services become the puppets of a lying government?"

The moderate-to-liberal *Independent*: "Revealed: How Blair used discredited WMD 'evidence' ... 'We were duped into war. Even the Americans admit it.' ... 'No, Mr. Blair, you won't get away with it this time.'"

The leftist *Guardian*: "Blair lied to Cabinet and made secret war pact with U.S." ... "Weapons are not all that is missing. The spooks have failed to track down Saddam and Bin Laden."

The conservative *Daily Telegraph*: "We were misled. We were deceived."

I could go on — and the British are. The story so far is that the country's intelligence agencies are leaking stories contending that the prime min-

ister and his men forced them to eliminate their judgment that Saddam Hussein was not an imminent threat to anyone before the British released a 50-page intelligence report — used both here and in the United States — to justify the invasion of Iraq by the English-speaking alliance.

The greatest distortion, those sources say, was Blair's declaration that Iraq could activate chemical, biological and nuclear weapons within 45 minutes. Blair's own ministers and former ministers (two resigned as the war began) are saying that he had already secretly agreed to back President Bush on going to war, and then lied to them about that. The most important call for a full government investigation of those charges is not from any newspaper but from Blair's resigned foreign secretary, Robin Cook.

An American equivalent of what is happening here might be this: CIA Director George Tenet being identified as the source of stories saying President Bush made up intelligence in his public declarations of war; Secretary of State

Colin Powell resigning and demanding a full inquiry into Bush's road to war; and Republicans in Congress calling for the impeachment of Bush for misleading the nation.

Anti-Americanism is suddenly exploding in the land we consider our last old partner. "The world's most odious partnership" is the headline over Peter McKay's full-page column in the *Daily Mail*. Often pro-American, McKay now talks of "the awful Bush." He wrote last Monday: "Do we need U.S. bases? No. Aren't they there to protect us? No. They exist to protect America. Would America accept European bases on its soil?"

Is this Blairgate? I don't know. The prime minister rushed home from a foreign trip to promise new proof that Iraq had or has WMD. I doubt he will be believed. The lies and deceptions that led up to this war are cracking our last old European alliance. President Bush may really believe that we have to attack Iran or Syria, but if we do it, we will be all alone.

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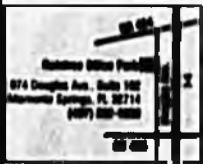
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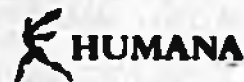
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Seminole County 4-H team takes top national prize in competition

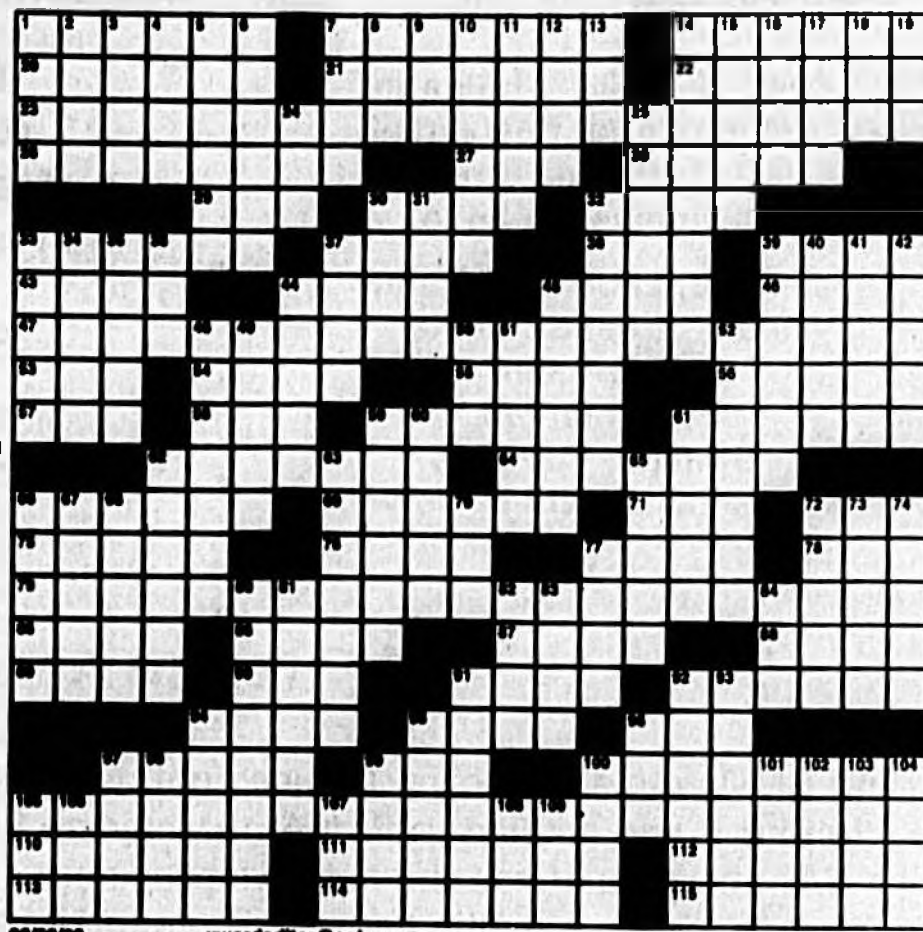

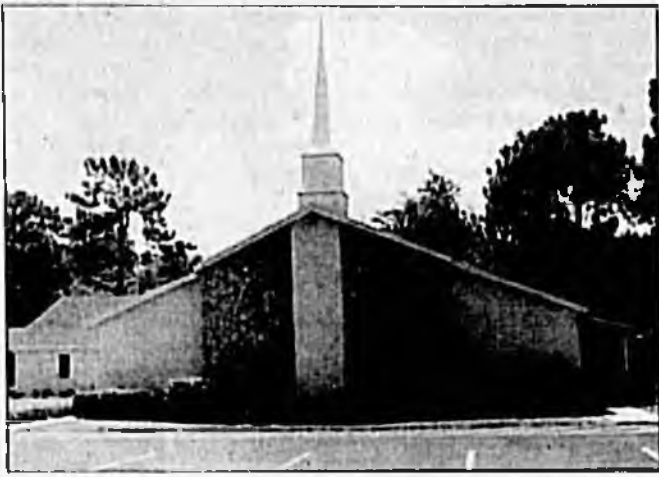

Oviedo and Trinity Prep won two awards, including top overall, while Lake Brantley, Lake Howell, Lake Mary, Lyman, Orangewood Christian and Winter Springs all finished in the Top 25 in at least one category in the final 2002-03 Dodge Sunshine Cup FHSAA Floyd E. Lay All-Sports Awards point standings.

While it was probably the smallest number of area players taken in several years, four of the six fairly early, between picks 465 and 907.

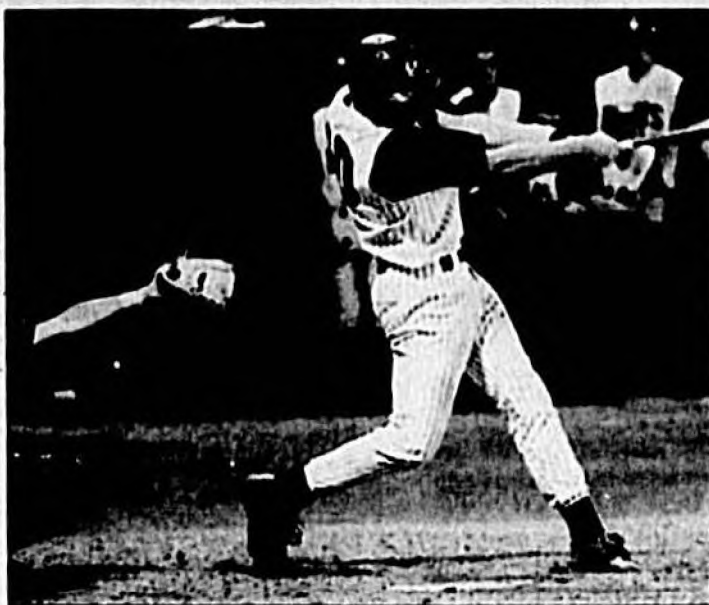
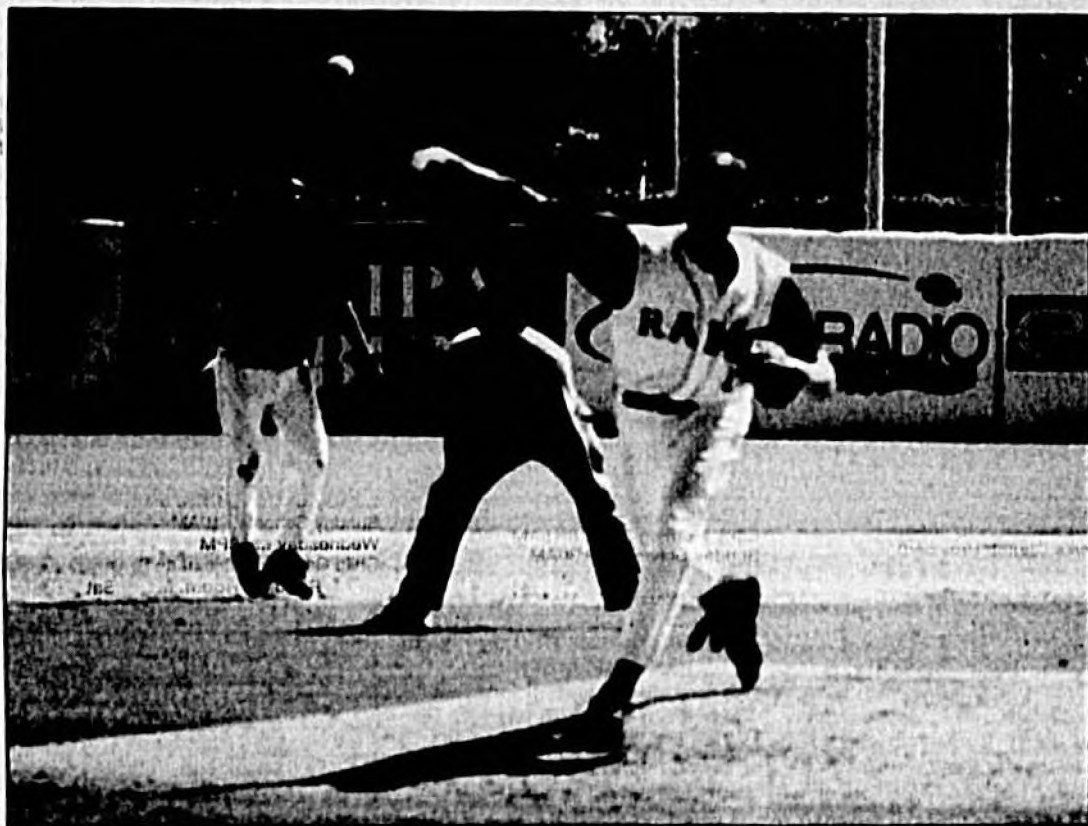
The highest local selected was former Lake Brantley star Justin Harris, now the starting shortstop for the University of South Carolina.

Next to go was Orangewood Christian standout Justin Meier. The 6-foot-6 pitcher/first baseman was taken in the 21st round (pick 609) by the Milwaukee Brewers.

The University of Central Florida signee was just 4-4 with a save this season, but struck out 94 in 56 innings and had a 2.00 ERA in leading the Rams to the Class A State Semifinals.

Fish are active on East Coast

The fishing in the Indian River and Mosquito Lagoon have been very active the past week.

The redfish have been a little picky at times, but will eat when they are not pushed too hard.

An increase in trolling motor use has been seen lately and this method can stress out redfish. It is okay to use the trolling motor if you keep it on low speed and keep the speed constant.

If you do move a school of reds turn off the motor and pole or anchor. If you are patient the fish will come to you.

There have been schools of redfish all over Mosquito Lagoon and the Indian River flats. Most of the redfish have been eating live shrimp, mullet and frozen mullet. If you find a happy school of fish they will take soft jerk baits. I was able to land a couple of 11-pound reds on Rip Tides new five inch Flats Chub.

Trout have been hitting well on live pigfish. They are also attacking topwater baits and soft jerkbaits early. As the sun rises switch over to 1/8 ounce jigs with a Rip Tide three inch mullet in sandperch with a chartreuse tail.

Look for trout on the flats early and then move to a water depth between 3-5 foot. Good luck and don't forget sunscreen and drink plenty of water.

the Rinker-Stenstrom Field turf for a deuce with the Brevard Stars starting at 11 a.m. on Saturday.

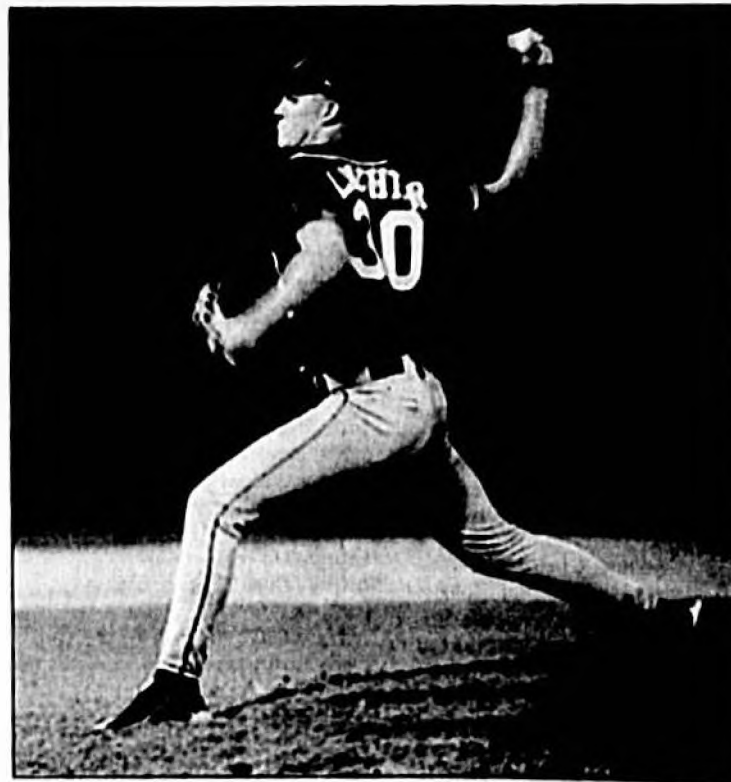

Two of the Seminole Athletic Conference's top players went in the 30th round as Lake Mary's Austin Pride went No. 882 to the Kansas City Royals and Lake Brantley's Jon Venters went No. 907 to the Atlanta Braves.

Pride, who was selected as a catcher but has played at both first base and in the outfield, was one of the main reasons for the Rams' amazing success the past three years and was also a major cog for the Sanford Post 53 team that won the State Tournament the past two seasons. He has also signed with UCF.

Venters, a lefthanded pitcher/outfielder, was a star quarterback for the Patriots and the ace of the pitching staff and leading hitter the past two seasons for coach Mike Smith's highly successful squad.

The final two local selections both have ties to the Longwood Babe Ruth program.

Stetson junior Chris Westervelt (Batesville, Ark.) was selected in the 40th round (pick 1202) by the Oakland A's.

Westervelt was a member of the World Champion Longwood Prep team, coached by his father, back in the early 90's and also played freshmen baseball at Lake Mary before moving to Arkansas.

A 5-11, 204-pound catcher, he is a career .333 hitter with 24 home runs and 79 RBI for the Hatters. He missed a good portion of this season with a shoulder injury after hitting .403 with a school record-tying 18 home runs and 46 RBI last year. He was a second-team All-America selection and the Atlantic Sun Conference Player of the Year.

The final local taken was Bishop Moore shortstop Travis Kalin in the 43rd round (pick 1286) by the Minnesota Twins.

Kalin, who was also a star wide receiver for the Hornets, grew up in the Longwood leagues.

In other local draft news, Stetson had four other players besides Westervelt selected in 2003 Major League Baseball Amateur Draft, the most Hatters ever picked in one draft.

Senior right-handed pitcher Von David Stertzbach was selected in the ninth round by the World Champion Anaheim Angels.

One of the all-time greats at UCF, Stertzbach finished his career ranked among the school's all-time leaders in strikeouts (231/6th) and appearances (80/2nd). In 2003, Stertzbach split time between the starting rotation and the

bullpen, ending his season with a 4-5 record including a 4.43 ERA. In four years at UCF, Stertzbach was 12-6 with a 4.02 ERA in 214.2 innings pitched.

Senior Ryan Bear was a 30th-round selection by the Florida Marlins.

A 2003 Verizon Academic All-America first team selection and first team A-Sun pick, Bear had a spectacular season for the Golden Knights hitting .390 with 20 doubles, five triples, five home runs and 36 RBI in 56 games.

Senior David Torres went in the 47th round to the New York Mets.

Torres played just one season for UCF and finished the 2003 campaign 1-0 with a 2.45 ERA. In four appearances and 7.1 innings, Torres fanned seven batters.

His story is an amazing one as he tried out for the team at UCF three times before finally making the club as a senior.

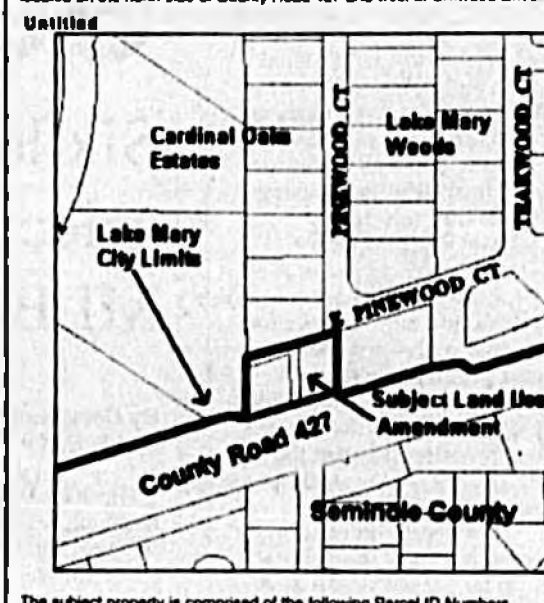

Naval Air Station Sanford History

'40s



In November 1942, Naval Air Station Sanford was commissioned to meet the country's need for additional naval aviation training facilities.



By the end of World War II, the U.S. Navy no longer needed the additional training facility. The station was decommissioned and turned over to the city. In 1947, the New York Giants constructed eight baseball fields at the station to use for their spring farm teams.



At the start of the Korean War in the early 1950s, the air station reactivated. In 1967, the Sanford station was one of the first to receive a squadron of A3D Skywarriors, which were replaced in the early 1960s.



In 1968, Congress closed the Sanford base for the final time and returned the airport back to the city.



The Sanford Industrial Commission was established to promote the industrial aspects of the airport. In 1970, the City Department of Aviation replaced the commission, and all administrative and operational control was taken over by the city.



In 1971, the City of Sanford, by legislative act, created the Sanford Airport Authority, a dependent special district.

2000



In 2000, the Sanford Airport Memorial Committee formed with the objective of obtaining a historic U.S. Navy aircraft and erecting a monument that would serve as a reminder to the community of the airport's military history.

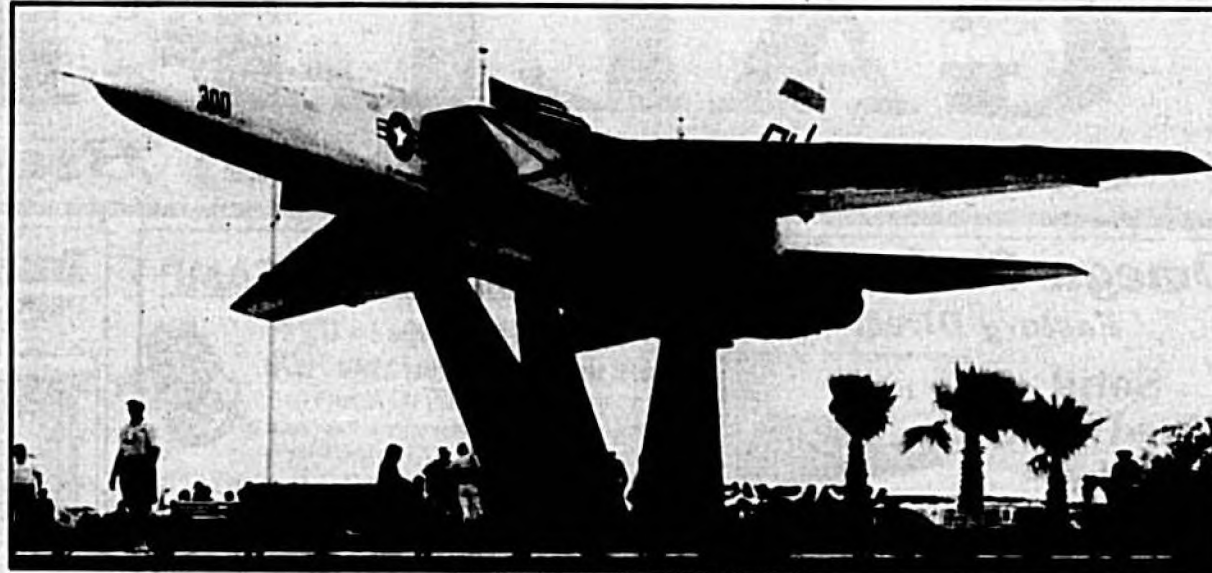


In 2001, the committee acquired the Vigilante from the National Museum of Naval Aviation in Pensacola.

Stetson's Corner: Night Watch — man needed

Welcome to Stetson's Corner, where weekly we hope to share a bit of what is good about the town of Geneva. This column is dedicated to a man who did the same — Deputy Sheriff Gene "Stetson" Gregory, who was killed in the line of duty July 8, 1998 in the place he was sworn to protect, but which could not protect him. Geneva will never be the same because of Deputy Gregory...it will be better.

As promised, I've included a bit of Geneva history in this week's column.

Looking back is a good way to keep the present (and the future) in perspective. The following 'tidbits' describing life in the settlement of Ocoola, Florida come from Mary (Riley) Henderson—the first child born in Ocoola on January 2, 1921...

"What was it like living in Ocoola? Our lives were ruled by the sawmill, and we were there to keep it alive and healthy. A whistle blew to keep us all in step with things. The first came in early morning — time to get up — another when it was time to go to work — another at lunchtime — and then one to go back to work. Ahhh! At last the quitting whistle blew!

"In return we were supplied and equipped with many conveniences: Electricity in all the homes. The mill produced its own. The lights were blinked at night when it was time to go to bed — then OUT! They did not come back on 'til the wake-up whistle blew. Running water and flush toilets in the homes. Did we bathe in the brown water? Yes! Did we drink it? No! But we had the best drinking water in all of the world. We hauled it from (where else but) Geneva. Thanks Geneva! We had white picket fences and St. Augustine lawns. We had wooden sidewalks — boards, nails and bare feet — what a combination! Stubbed toes, splinters and nail scrapes! We cooked on kerosene stoves, and even tried a kerosene refrigerator, which as kinda' temperamental. We kept warm with kerosene heaters and fireplaces. The ice truck delivered ice to our door. The night watchman watched

over us all at nighttime. We had washerwomen come do the laundry for us — nine people produced lots of it! All the homes on Main Street had telephone service. You could listen in on everyone's calls — kept us up with the news that way. We had a switchboard in Geneva run by Mrs. Lindsey, and could make long distance calls. We went fishing with bamboo poles, and had the whole St. Johns River to ourselves, catching brim, catfish and shiners. Muscles and angleworms were our bait. The older boys had wooden boats with oars or 'kickers' or both which took them on exploration trips up and down the St. Johns River. We picked blackberries and huckleberries — alert for rattlesnakes all the time. We went arrowhead hunting. Parlor games like "spin the bottle" and "gossip" were played in each other's homes. There were always checker games in progress everywhere. We kept up with the world around us with the "Florida Times Union," "Saturday Evening Post," "Literary Digest," and the "Almanac."

"We were aware that others were here before us. There were those v-scarred pine trees with ceramic pots nailed to them, but the pitch was never gathered. Indian mounds, pottery shards, and arrowheads spoke of others who lived here and fished these waters and hunted these forests. Yes — we were named after Indian Chief Ocoola."

The settlement of Ocoola was located on the St. Johns River along what is now East Ocoola Road in Geneva. Much history has taken place there indeed. In fact, an historical marker placed at East Ocoola Road and Ocoola Fish Camp Road offered much information about the early settlers and Native Americans who once lived here.

Unfortunately, this marker was recently stolen. Even more unfortunate is the fact that this is the second time in the six years that I have lived (a stone's throw from that marker) here that this valuable link to our past has been removed. Anyone with information about the disap-

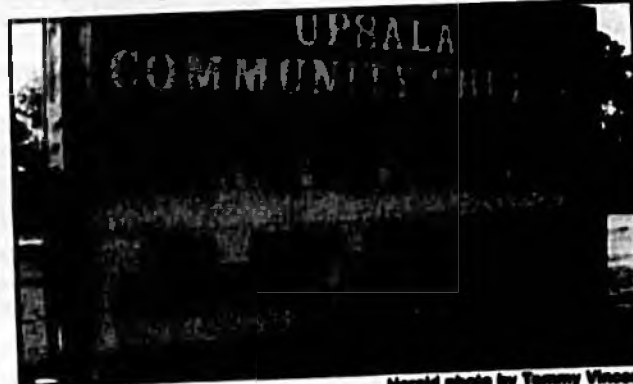

Disadvantaged children can overcome early hardship

QUESTION: Last week you talked about why some kids with every advantage and opportunity seem to turn out bad, while others raised in terrible homes become pillars in the community. You cited the life of David Hernandez as an example. What happened to him?

DR. DOBSON: Given his beginning, how can we explain the man that Dave Hernandez became? He graduated near the top of his class in high school and was granted a scholarship to college. Again, he earned high marks and four years later entered Loma Linda University School of Medicine. Once more, he scored in the top 10 percent of his class and continued in a residency in obstetrics and gynecology. Eventually, he served as a professor of OB/GYN at both Loma Linda University and the University of Southern California medical schools. Then at the peak of his career, his life began to unravel.

I'll never forget the day Dr. Hernandez called me. He had just been released from the hospital following a battery of laboratory tests. The diagnosis? Sclerosing cholangitis, a liver disorder that was invariably fatal at that time. We lost this fine husband, father and friend six years later at the age of 43. I loved him like a brother,

and I still miss him today.

Again, I ask, how could such discipline and genius come from these infertile circumstances? Who would have thought that this deprived Mexican boy sitting out there in the dirt would someday become one the most loved and respected surgeons of his era? Where did the motivation originate? He had no books, took no educational trips, knew no scholars. Yet he reached for the sky. Why did it happen to David Hernandez and not the youngster with every advantage and opportunity?

Why have so many children of prominent and loving parents grown up in ideal circumstances, only to reject it all for the streets of Atlanta, San Francisco or New York? Good answers are simply not available. It apparently comes down to this: God chooses to use individuals in unique ways. Beyond that mysterious relationship, we must simply conclude that some kids seem born to make it and others are determined to fail.

Two things are clear to me from this understanding. First, parents have been far too quick to take the credit or blame for the way their children turn out. Those with bright, young superstars stick out their chests and say, "Look what we accomplished." Those with twisted and irresponsible kids wonder, "Where did we go wrong?" Well, neither is entirely accurate. No one would deny that parents play an important role in the development and training of their children, but they are only part of the formula from which a young adult is assembled.

Second, behavioral scientists have been far too simplistic in their explanation of human behavior. We are more than the aggregate of our experiences. We are more than the quality of our nutrition. We are more than our genetic heritage. We are more than our biochemistry. And certainly, we are more than our parents' influence. God has created us as unique individuals, capable of independent and rational thought that is not attributable to any source. That is what makes the task of parenting so challenging and rewarding.

Ginger: The spice that grows underground

Ginger is a perennial plant whose underground rhizomes are used as a flavoring agent. It produces well from Homestead to Pensacola.

The plant grows from thick, white, tuberous, underground rhizomes that are very aromatic and is native to Taiwan and Haiti. It has been grown for centuries in the Caribbean islands and China where it is used locally for medicine and in cooking. It is marketed in United States mostly in a powdered and candied form.

Gardeners report growing ginger satisfactorily for home use throughout the state.

Description

True ginger can be distinguished by its shorter stalks, which are 2 to 3 feet high, with narrow, flat, pointed leaf blades about 1 foot long, producing yellow-green flowers with purple tips growing in dense spikes. It produces plump, strongly aromatic rhizomes that are used mainly as food flavoring.

True ginger is often confused with related plants grown as

ornamentals in Florida, such as the butterfly ginger, shell flower and the pinecone ginger.

The roots of all ginger's are edible and have varying degrees of hotness, like peppers.

Culture

Ginger does best in partial to complete shade. In full sun, the leaves are brown-tipped and the plants grow poorly. Most good garden soils are adequate

for growing ginger, including sands, if sufficiently supplied with nutrients and moisture.

Soil should be 8 inches deep and contain a mixture of sand and cow manure, or other suitable organic mixture. Ginger is started from rhizome (root) cuttings rather than from seed. The tuberous root, called a hand, can be purchased in grocery stores, nurseries or health food stores.

In selecting fresh ginger for planting, choose a fat, full hand with well-defined eyes. The eyes resemble those of a potato and are easy to detect. It is best to cut the rhizomes into pieces 1 to 1 1/2 inches long, each contain-

ing at least one eye. Cut the rhizome pieces a few days ahead of planting to allow the cut surfaces to dry, reducing chances of rotting. In a well-prepared bed, insert each piece and cover with about 1 inch of soil. Space them 15 inches in the row and 15 inches between the row.

Early in the spring is the best time to plant. All ginger's are heavy feeders, they should be fertilized with a good, all-purpose formula monthly during their growing season, and should be watered regularly. Ginger will produce new rhizomes but no seeds where summers are warm and last five to eight months.

Ginger will tolerate temperatures in the low 20s without serious damage. It will come back each spring with the return of warm weather if frozen back during the winter months.

Harvesting and Use

To harvest, dig rhizomes in the fall or when the tops have died down. Tops of the plants will die back 9 to 11 months after planting for a natural dormancy. Allow rhizomes to dry in the shade for about a week.

In Jamaica, the rhizomes are peeled, washed, and sun-dried. Since ginger is a major spice, it has many uses as a food, flavoring, and medicinal product. Candied ginger is peeled, boiled, soaked in syrup, and then rolled in sugar.

Ginger is the source of flavoring for our gingerbread and Ginger Ale. It has been a staple in Chinese cooking for centuries. Ginger tea is considered a mild and safe stimulant as long as one drinks only a cup or two a day. The leaves and cone-like flowerheads can be used in flower arrangements.

Ornamental Ginger Pinecone ginger or lanolin lily is about 5 or 6 feet tall, produces deep red cones by Christmas.

Butterfly ginger lily grows around 3 to 6 feet tall, with wonderfully fragrant flowers. The blossoms are edible and have a ginger-mint flavor.

DEAR ABBY: Our daughter "Jill" is a 19-year-old college freshman. She recently revealed in a friend's Web diary that she had "chugged" an entire pitcher of beer and had to be carried to her dorm room, where her roommate (also drunk) made her drink water until she threw up. "First time drunk," she wrote — then ended with the chilling words, "... and I can't wait to do it again."

Needless to say, my wife and I are extremely worried about Jill's binge drinking. Our problem is that the diary is supposed to be off-limits for my wife and me. DEAR PARENTS: You cannot ignore this and hope it will go away. Speak to your daughter and don't apologize. I'm sad to say that binge drinking is a real problem on many college campuses. Let Jill know the alarm that her disclosure has caused you. Assure her of your love and support, and inform her in a nonjudgmental and non-threatening way that you expect her to obey the law and protect her own safety and well-being.

Binge drinking among college students has very serious health and safety implications. Alcohol poisoning can

be fatal, and girls who get blind drunk make themselves vulnerable to sexual assault. Your daughter is on the verge of adulthood, and she needs to be equipped to make mature, responsible decisions about things that could affect her health and her future.

Arm yourselves with factual information about the potential health, safety and legal consequences of binge drinking. The

Chocolate Chocolate Chip Ice Cream

Classic Neuchâtel Fondue

Serves 4 to 6

- 1 clove garlic
- 1 cup dry white wine
- 10 ounces Emmentaler cheese, diced or shredded
- 10 ounces Gruyère cheese, diced or shredded
- 1 1/2 potato flour or cornstarch (corn flour) mixed with 1/4 cup kirsch
- 1/4 teaspoon ground white pepper
- Pinch of freshly grated nutmeg

• Crusty bread, cut into cubes, for serving

Rub a medium heavy saucepan with garlic. Either discard garlic pieces or finely chop them and add to the saucepan. Place pot over medium-high heat, add wine and bring just to a boil. Immediately reduce heat to

low, and add cheese, stirring slowly in a figure-eight pattern until cheese is just melted. It should melt very slowly — for about five minutes — otherwise, cheese may become stringy and tough. Add potato flour or cornstarch mixture, pepper and nutmeg to the cheese mixture. Simmer for about two minutes more. The fondue should gently sputter, not boil.

Pour the fondue into a warmed fondue pot and serve immediately.

At the table, guests should take several cubes of bread onto their plates, skewer one with a fork and dip it into the pot, twirling gently to prevent drips.

Eat directly from the fork.



Zucchini Strata

Zucchini Strata

Serves 6

- 4 beaten eggs
- 1 cup packaged pancake mix
- 1/2 cup parmesan cheese
- 1 tsp. oregano
- 1 tsp. seasoned salt or stock powder
- 1/2 cup low cholesterol oil
- 1 small chopped onion
- 3 cups thinly sliced zucchini
- 2 lbs. chopped parsley
- Clove crushed garlic

Combine pancake mix, cheese, oregano, salt and pepper in a bowl. Add oil and eggs.

Fold through remaining vegetables. Spread evenly into a greased loaf pan or 8-inch round cake pan.

Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes until golden brown and firm in the center. Cool for 10 minutes.

Turn out and slice. Serve with green salad and crusty bread.

Chocolate Chocolate Chip Ice Cream

Yields: 2 quarts

- 1 package (12-oz.) Nestlé Toll House Semi-Sweet Chocolate Morsels, divided
- 1 can (14-oz.) Carnation Sweetened Condensed Milk
- 4 cups half and half
- 1 tablespoon vanilla extract

Heat 1 cup morsels and sweetened condensed milk in large, heavy-duty saucepan over medium heat, stirring constantly for 2 to 3 minutes until morsels are melted. Remove from heat. Gradually stir in half-and-half and vanilla extract.

Pour into ice cream maker. Freeze according to manufacturer's directions. Coarsely chop remaining morsels and add halfway through freezing.

Freezer Method:

Pour prepared ice cream mixture into 13 x 9-inch baking pan. Freeze for 2 hours or until almost firm. Spoon into large mixer bowl; beat until smooth but still frozen. Stir in chopped morsels. Return to pan; cover tightly. Freeze for 6 hours or overnight until firm.

Roasted Hazelnut Butter

Roast 4 oz. fresh hazelnuts in 400 degree oven for 10 minutes. Remove skin from nuts and coarsely chop them. Mix nuts and 1/4 tsp. lemon zest with 1/2 cup (1 stick) unsalted and softened butter until well-combined.

Banana Foster Butter

Whip together 1/2 cup (1 stick) unsalted and softened butter, 1/2 large mashed banana, 1/2 tsp. cinnamon, 2 tbsp. brown sugar and 1/2 tsp. banana liqueur until completely blended.

Apple-Cinnamon Butter

Add 2 oz. dried apple, 1/2 tsp. cinnamon, 1 tbsp. brown sugar to 1/2 cup (1 stick) unsalted and softened butter. Mix all ingredients in food processor until well-combined.
