FBI Infiltrated

Ku Klux Klan

WASHINGTON (AP) - The FBI ran a covert, 10-year operation to disrupt the Ku Klux Klan by distributing anonymous postcards and cartoons, forming a phony anti-Klan committee and planting anti-Klan articles in the news media, according to newly disclosed FBI

The operation against the Klan and other so-called "white hate groups" such as the National States Rights party and the American Nazi party, was described in 125 pages of FBI files turned over Friday to reporters who petitioned for them under the Freedom of Information Act nine months ago.

The files provided the first public glimpse of the counterintelligence program, called Cointelpro by the FBI, against white hate groups. The FBI previously was forced to disclose documents dealing with operations against the Socialist Workers party and other leftist

SCLC Proposes Tax Hike

ANNISTON, Ala. (AP) - Higher taxes on alcohol and tobacco have been proposed by the Southern Christian Leadership Conference to help the "poor and minorities who live in our urban and rural ghettoes, barrios and

Friday, unanimously approved a resolution calling for the increased taxes, which it said would raise an additional \$14 billion to \$30 billion.

The resolution suggested that the federal revenue sharing program be replaced with a federal takeover of 90 per cent to 100 per cent funding of housing and job training programs and of medicaid with the new taxes used for

Bronfman Ransom Received

NEW YORK (AP) - The kidnapers of Samuel Bronf man 2nd reportedly have received all or part of a \$4.5 million ransom, but there still is no indication when or if the 21-yearold whisky heir, now missing one week, will be returned to his family.

The Daily News said in today's editions that the victim's father, Edgar Bronfman, reportedly was in contact again Friday by telephone with his son's abductors and there were indications all or part of the kidnap ransom, a record in this country, had been paid.

However, a spokesman at the Bronfman family's FBIguarded, Tudor-style mansion in Yorktown Heights, N.Y., refused to comment on either report.

Steak Smell Nauseating?

WASHINGTON (AP) - For some people, the smell of a steak grilling on a charcoal fire is nauseating, or not even there. For some, the taste of that steak can make them ill. Or perhaps they cannot taste it at all. Problems of taste and smell may afflict 2 million Americans, according to Dr. Robert L. Henkin, head of

Georgetown University's Center for Molecular Nutrition and Sensory Disorders. For thousands of patients, it is better known as the taste and smell clinic. "It's easy to sympathize with the patient who has cancer," but not always with someone who cannot taste

the flavor of food or smell a fragrance, Henkin said during an interview Friday.

SALT Solution Appears Remote

Discussions between the President of the United States of America and the leader of the Soviet Union, such as the five hours of talks between Mr. Ford and Leonid Brezhnev at Helsinki, are becoming ritualistic in strategic arms limitation talks.

President Nixon and Brezhnev had such a preagreement meeting in Moscow in May, 1972, when the first SALT agreement was signed, and again in Washington in June of 1973 when they simply agreed to agree in the future. In 1974 President Ford went to Vladivostok to

sign yet more SALT documents which limited the number of missiles that each nation could deploy to 2,400 of which 1,320 could have multiple warheads. All of these have generated optimism, a feeling that sincere and significant curbs would be placed on the vehicles that transport the world's doomsday weapons.

After Helsinki the article of faith is that the United States and the Soviet Union will proceed to a formal treaty which places significant and enforceable limits on strategic missiles, but we wouldn't be on it. The world, and particularly the United States, is a different place than it was in 1972. And the major factor that is different is the growing opinion of the American people that the

Fidelity is the key word in the SALT discussions and up to now American people have been more or less willing to accept the good intentions of the Russians. However, like trying to control emissions on automobiles, the first 80 per cent of the SALT talks, as difficult and time consuming as they were, were by far the easiest. The last 20 per cent will be the hardest because the United States and the Soviet Union are moving from broad generalities to specifics.

As we understand it, the main obstacle to another formal SALT agreement, scheduled this year in Washington, is that the Soviet Union wants us to take them at their word when they say that their huge SS-18 missiles have the number of warheads they say they have, or that their 150kiloton underground tests are for peaceful purposes. They are unwilling to permit on-site in-

Judging from American public opinion, the U.S. negotiators can settle for nothing less than onsite examination. The most dramatic example of the shift in American thinking came during the ceremonial visit by President Ford to Helsinki to sign European Security Conference documents that were not even binding upon us. Americans opposed the trip - and the signature too - because they want to see some evidences of good faith by the Soviet Union.

Until that happens we expect that the SALT discussions by the heads of state will remain largely ceremonial and the safe-guards against nuclear war will be as remote as ever.

Secret Slush Funds

The Federal Election Commission has adopted a regulation to treat secret congressional slush funds just like campaign funds. That would mean they would have to be reported and would be subject to limitations on contributions and ex-

Congress can reject the regulation by a majority vote in both houses. Otherwise it will become effective automatically in

Any attempt to nullify the new rule should be nipped in the These so-called "office funds" have been controversial and questionable since the discovery of the famous Nixon fund in

They have been used to supplement regular allowances for office expenses, pay for travel and newsletters, and hire extra staff members. The funds are raised quietly by contributions from businessmen, unions, corporations and others interested in furthering a congressman's or senator's political career.

There have certainly been legitimate funds of this type but the

included among the 97 which will be identified in the south. Instead, most letters mailed here will carry mailed bearing that town's postmark. an Orlando postmark, because that's where the

on the postmark include Fort Lauderdale, Gainesville, Jacksonville, Lakeland, Miami, Panama City, Pensacola, Tallahassee and Tampa. Government Tilting At Windmills

The government is going to spend \$147,800 to find out if people would mind having windmills as neighbors.

That's the amount of a grant which the National Science Foundation and the Energy Research and Development Administration have made to the University of Illinois' Survey Research Laboratory for a year-long study of public reactions to windmills in five areas across the country, ranging from the heavily settled East Coast to the plains of Kansas to the Pacific

The windmills in question are not the picturesque Dutch type, nor the once numerous farm windmills. Modern, high-efficiency windmills capable of contributing to the nation's energy budget would have wheels or vanes 75 to 100 feet in diameter mounted on slender towers 100 to 250 feet high. For maximum efficiency they would have to be located in large numbers and occupy highly prominent positions.

"Whether the public will accept such modification of the landscape will be a major deciding factor in whether plans for using the wind to generate electrical energy can be im-plemented," says Prof. Robert Ferber, director of the laboratory. For a lot less than \$147,800, we can tell the

Asked by newsmen on his arrival about reports from Israel and Egypt that he would resume shuttle diplomacy next week, Kissinger replied: "We have been making progress during a week of in-

tensive negotiations, but we haven't really settled it finely





Oh, yeah, Ralph? How's about a victory? Houk and his Detroit Tigers could be excused if they replied: "What's a victory?" After all, going 19 games without one might tend to dull the senses a bit.

His Music: Baseball; **Now Fame**

COOPERSTOWN, N.Y. (AP) - William Julius Johnson never became much of a trombone player. A different sound, the infectious melody of baseball, caught his ear. "The street I was living on faced the playground," said the

75-year-old Johnson of his boyhood days in Snow Hill, Md. "I'd be trying to practice my trombone, but I'd hear the other kids yelling, 'Slide! Slide!' and I'd just have to put it down. "Notes and baseball just don't mix."

So with a hand-me-down glove gift from his father, young William started a career that led right to the Hall of Fame. He'll be honored there Monday as the sixth man selected by

the Committee on the Negro Leagues. "The glove, well, it was raggedy as an old mop. It wasn't much bigger than the gloves people wore in the winter to keep their hands warm. Kids at that time didn't have such a

thing as a glove. "Baseballs cost a nickle - a 'nickle rock' they called it and a better ball cost a quarter. After a bunch of us would form a team, we'd buy a ball. You could play nine innings with it if it didn't get wet."

You could play nine innings with a white man as your teammate - something that didn't happen in the major

"When we'd play in the playground, it didn't matter if you were White or Negro, as long as you wanted to play. Saturdays were the big games. Saturdays it would be White vs. Negro," he recalled by phone from his Maryland home. "I asked Connie Mack once why they didn't have Negroes

in the major leagues. He said there were just too many of us to come in all at once." So it was a Negro League career that brought fame to

Johnson, a smooth third baseman. "All the records show is that I hit .300," he says. "The team secretary was driving the bus most of the time, and a lot of records didn't get down or The bus brought Johnson's barnstorming teams to places




Dr. Sara Irrgang spends much of her time gazing through a microscope in the pathology laboratory (Herald Photo by Bill Vincent.)





Exactly what tax breaks does Uncle Sam allow on the expenses of the transfer of a residence? Since my employer is bearing the expense of my transfer from Orlando to Easton, Delaware, will I be able to realize any tax benefits?

Dear Mr. Paulsen. Moving expenses may be deducted from your grcss income only if the change in residence is caused by a change in the location of your employment. Whether your new job is with the

same firm or a different one is of no importance. In order to make any deductions, certain criteria must be met. The new location of your job must require you to travel at least 50 miles farther than if you had not moved and the move must occur within one year of the date on which you begin fulltime work at the new location. Furthermore, you must work in the new location for at least 39 weeks of the first 12 months following the move. Self employed persons must work at the new location for at least 78 weeks, of which 39 must be during the 12 month period following the move.

You may deduct the entire amount charged by the moving company as well as any expenses incurred in traveling from the old location to the new one. The deduction of traveling expenses is allowable for only one trip although family members need not travel together or at the same time. You may deduct, up to a total of \$1,000, the cost of round-trip househunting trips and meals and lodging in temporary quarters for up to 30 consecutive days in the new location while awaiting availability of the new residence but only after having obtained employment. You may add to this \$1,000 figure, but not to exceed \$2,500, expenses incurred in the sale of the old house and the purchase of a new one. These would include advertising expense, sales commissions, attorney and legal fees, appraisal fees, points, escrow fees and state transfer

In asnwer to your specific question, you may deduct all eligible expenses except for those which you do not pay or are reimbursed for.

Is there any particular advantage in purchasing insurance from the carrier for loss and damage which may occur in a move when my homeowner's policy contains a physical transfer

Read the transfer clause carefully. Most homeowner's policies with this clause cover only total losses, which almost

never happen while household goods are in transit. The carrier's insurance, however, covers any and all losses. no matter how small, up to the total value which you declare.
