Khomeini Levels Warning At U.S.

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI) — Muslim students held dozens of American hostages inside the U.S. Embassy today demanding that the United States hand over the shah. Other students stormed the British Embassy in an apparent attempt to take control.

Khomeini warned the United States of "another course of action" if the shah was not handed over to Iran for Islamic justice and the ayatollah's son entered the U.S. Embassy today to ward cheering from the occupying students.

Students sympathetic to the Tehran invaders also seized U.S. consulates in Shiraz and Tabriz, in northwestern Iran, that were closed after the shah's regime was overthrown last February.

In Tehran hundreds of Muslim students holding at least 59 Americans seized during a takeover of the U.S. Embassy Sunday vowed today to occupy the compound until the United States returns the deposed shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi, now in a New York hospital where he is being treated for cancer.

Witnesses said about 50 students moved into the British Embassy late today only hours after the state radio broadcast a statement by Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini accusing Britain of sheltering former prime minister Shapur Bakhtiar.

Khomeini also denounced Britain in his speech to insurance company employees in an audience in the Muslim holy city of Qom.

He said Britain must hand over to Iran the shah's last premier, Bakhtiar. But a British Embassy spokesman said Bakhtiar was not in Britain.

"If they do not hand over these traitors or at least expel them from their country," Khomeini said in a reference to the exiled shah and Bakhtiar, "we shall have another course of action."

Less than four hours after Khomeini made his demand, Iranian students moved into the British Embassy in Tehran.

Witnesses said about 40 armed government guardsmen had entered the British Embassy premises and were negotiating with the students.

Iran's oil minister Ali Akbar Moinefar said today he would cut off crude oil supplies to the United States if ordered to do so by Khomeini, the state radio reported.

The fate of a group of American and Iranian hostages held for the second day in the U.S. Embassy, including at least 59 U.S. citizens, was unknown. The students, who seized the building in a battle with Marine guards, vowed not to surrender until the shah is returned to Iran.

Almad Khomeini, the 46-year-old son of the ayatollah, swept into the embassy amid wild cheering by the more than 10,000 demonstrators and students, many of them teen-age girls wearing the black anklelength veil.

In Qom, the Islamic Religious School threw its "full support" behind the students, telling them, "You have not occupied this place but, rather, you have recaptured it from the invaders."

Khomeini also gave tacit approval to the embassy takeover, calling the compound "a center of spying and massing on the street and revolutionary guards and police the second since Sunday's takeover, as they chanted,

"Khomeini struggles, Carter trembles." "Give us the shah," and "Death to America, death to Carter."

In remarks broadcast today by the state radio, the Islamic leader denounced the United States for giving the shah permission to seek cancer treatment in New York.

The students stormed the compound Sunday morning and a spokesman for the group said they fought for three hours with U.S. Marine guards, who responded with tear gas, before taking control and seizing the hostages.

A student spokesman told the students said the students were holding about 90 Americans and 10 Iranians hostages. In Washington, a State Department spokesman said late Sunday there were probably 59 Americans being held, but added, "We can't be precise."

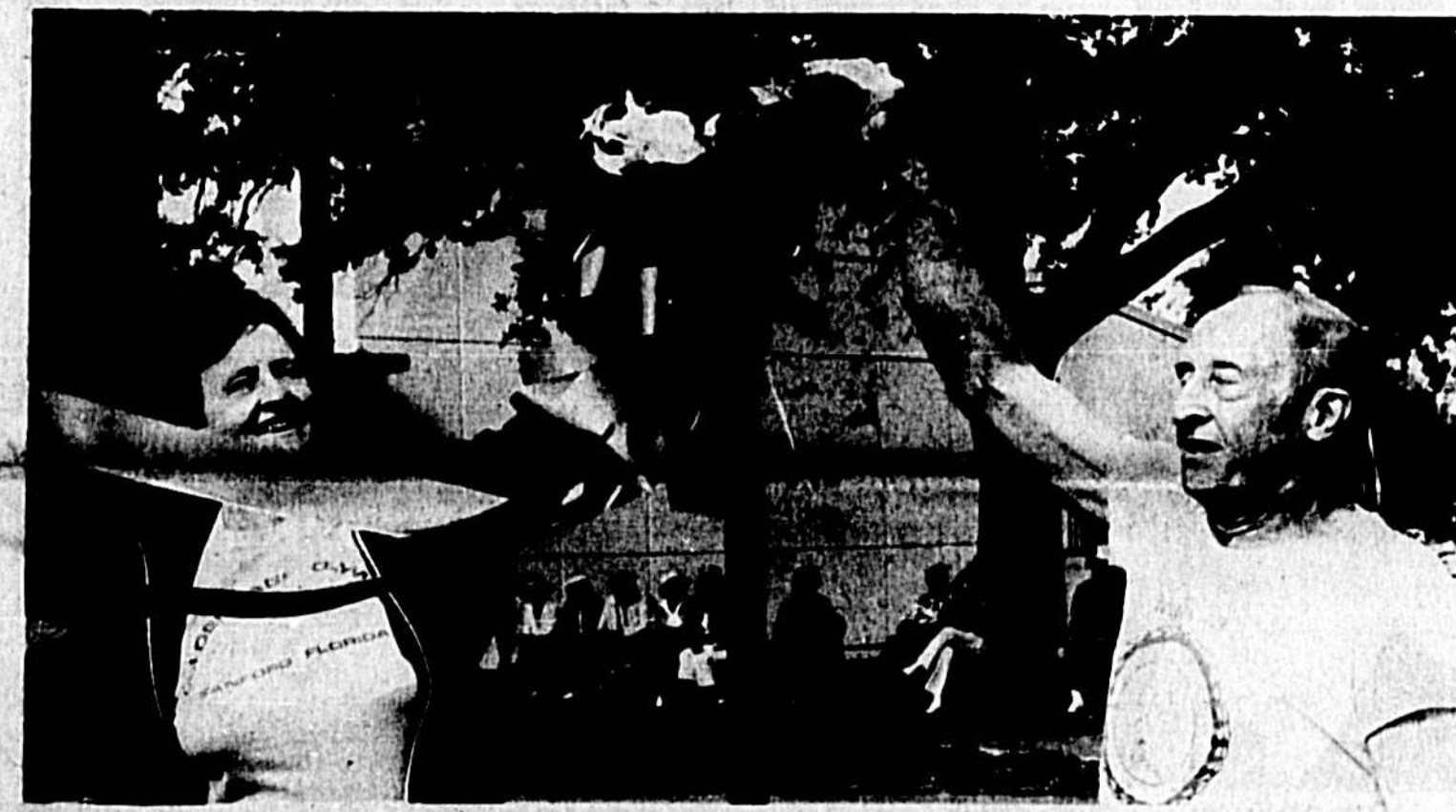
No names were released, but diplomatic sources said chief of mission and charge d'affaires Bruce Laingen was not inside when the embassy was attacked.

Outside the embassy compound today, demonstrators massed on the street and revolutionary guards and police patrolling the area were reinforced.

Golden Age Olympics Begins 5th Year

The 5th Annual Golden Age Olympics was off to a running start this morning in spite of a slight delay in lighting the Olympic torch.

A brisk breeze off Lake Monroe kept last year's track and field champions Harriett Boyd of Sanford and Orin Graff of Daytona Beach from lighting their torches with matches. Undaunted they ran onto the Civic Center, where several hundred people were gathered for the ceremonies, and a

match tossed into the gas burner did the trick, and the Olympic flame burned once more.

The annual event for senior citizens 55 and older will run through Saturday and is co-sponsored by the city of Sanford and the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce.

Music for the event was provided by the German Band of Daytona Community College under the direction of Burton Burgess, also known as "Gus, the Bugmeister," and the Star-Spangled Banner was sung by Shirley Ryan, choir director

for Lake Mary Baptist Church. Stella Taylor of Fort Lauderdale, this year's honorary celebrity chairperson was introduced by Dan Moss, manager of Zayre Department Store, which is sponsoring her stay here. Moss said although she had swum from St. Petersburg to Tampa in Florida, the Nile River and the English Channel twice, she faced the greatest challenge of her career when she swam Lake Monroe on Thursday."

Ms. Taylor had trained hard for the 70-hour, three-day swim from Cuba in October, but it had to be called off because conditions were not right. She said she is now looking forward to her next big swim next May from Marathon to Freeport, Bahamas sponsored by the Bahamas News Bureau. A school teacher, Ms. Taylor also said she is considering a Gasparilla Swim from St. Petersburg to Tampa in Tampa Bay. A two-way swim of the English Channel may also be in the offing next year she said.

Welcome speeches were also made by State Rep. Bob Hallaway, Sanford Mayor Lee P. Moore, and Official Hostess Edith Harrison.

Altamonte Springs, Winter Springs To Elect Officials

Elections Tuesday In Area Cities

Less than 1,000 Altamonte Springs' 7,375 registered voters are expected to go to the city's three polling places Tuesday to elect two persons to the city council.

City Clerk Phyllis Jordahl predicted the 50 percent turnout of voters. The three polling places are located at the civic center for those living south of State Route 68 and east of U.S. 17, at the intersection of 54 and north of SR 68 and at the Spring Oaks Community Center for those living west of 54.

Candidates are Marian Morris and Doreen Vickers, incumbent, for the District 3 commission seat and Jim Thompson for the District 4 post.

Mrs. Thomson, 65, of 609 Hawthorne Drive, is making her first bid for public office. A former waitress of the city,

she is originally from Illinois and Wisconsin. She and her husband, Guy, have four children. Their youngest, Guy, 8, lives at home and attends the Palm Springs Christian School.

Advocating a strong mayor form of government, Mrs. Thomson is for "anything to alleviate the traffic problems on SR 68." She has been active in homeowners associations and a parent-teacher organization in the past.

Mrs. Vickers, 44, is completing her first term on the city commission. A resident of Altamonte Springs for the past 15 years, she and her husband David have two daughters and live at 770 Florida Boulevard.

Their daughters Elizabeth, 25, and Rosalind, 18, are both students at the University of Mississippi.

A member of "Young Women," Mrs. Vickers is a homemaker.

Encephalitis Program

Seminole County officials have taken steps to prepare for an outbreak of mosquito-borne St. Louis Encephalitis, should one occur.

A countywide surveillance program, begun in 1977, watches for the disease and monitors the number of mosquitoes capable of transmitting it.

To be prepared in the event it is determined that St. Louis Encephalitis, epidemic in Florida in 1977, is a threat to the citizens of the county, these steps have been taken, according to County Commissioner Bob French:

1. A contract has been negotiated with an aircraft spraying firm to begin spraying any and all areas of the county deemed necessary within 12 to 24 hours following authorization.

2. Arrangements have been made with the Florida office of Entomology to transfer equipment and manpower from organized mosquito control districts to aid in controlling the mosquito. County personnel have visited neighboring coastal counties which have extensive programs to determine equipment availability and approximate cost to the county for assistance.

If an emergency situation should occur in the county, U.S. Air Force planes can be obtained for mosquito spraying, French said.

"Seminole County does not have an on-going mosquito spray program," he reported, "however, we have the plans and resources available to act if the threat of mosquito-borne disease should occur."

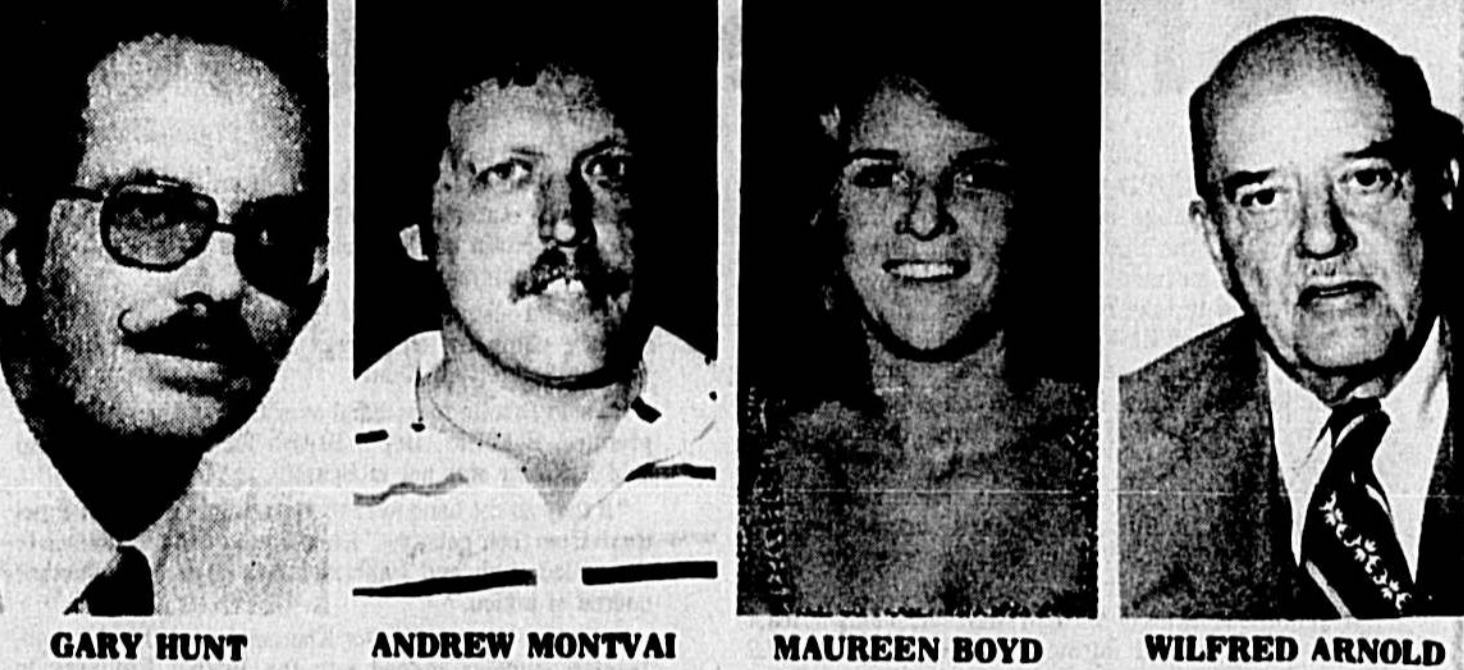

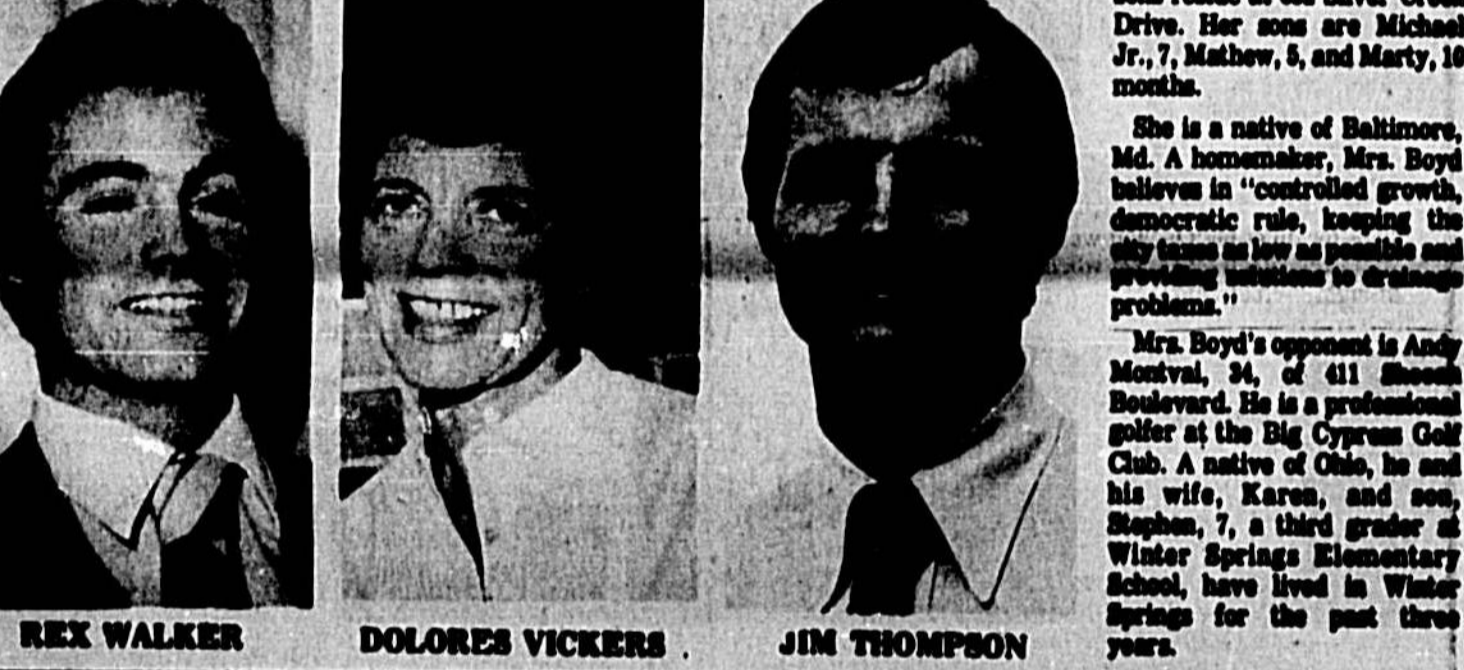

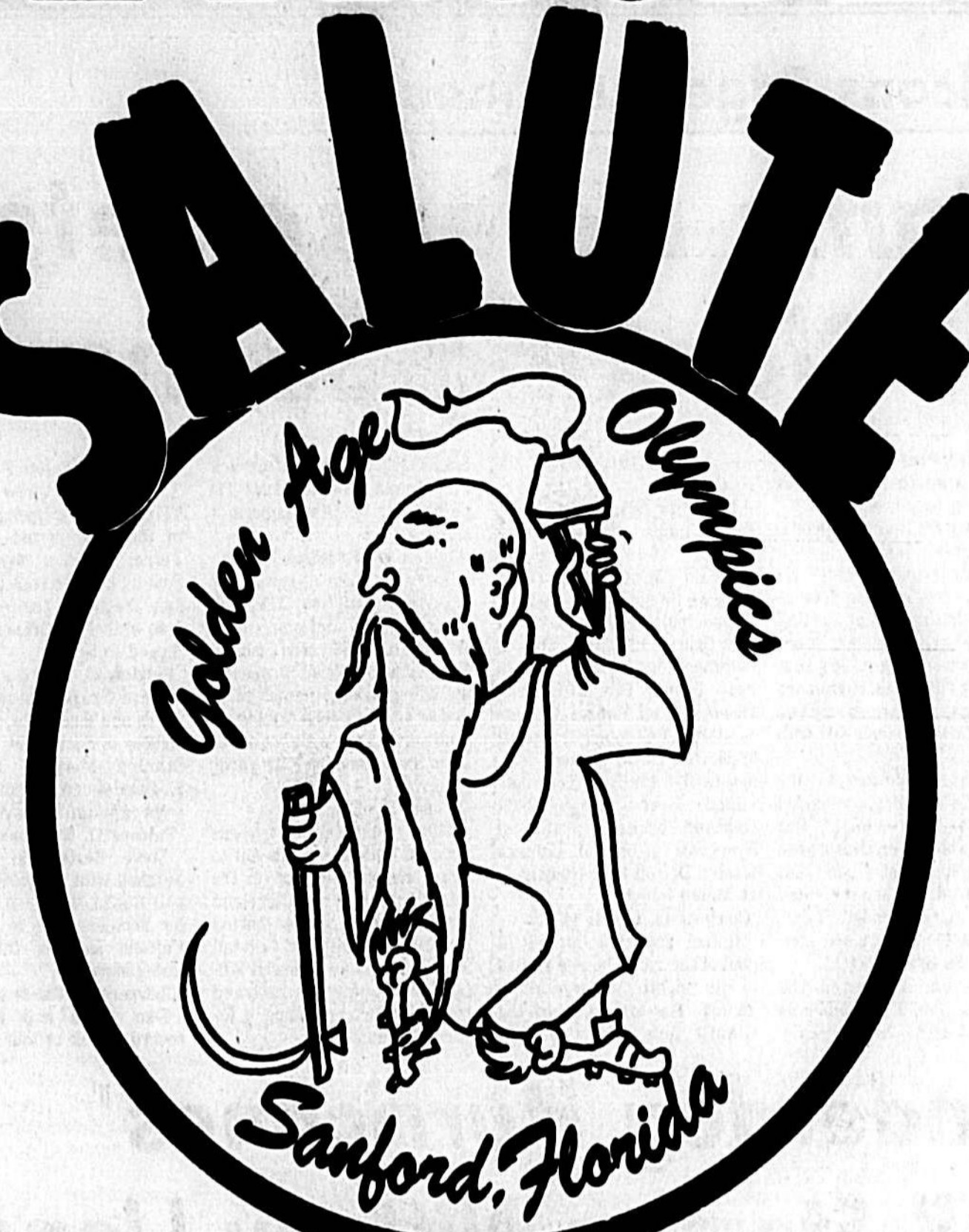

Presidential Candidate Bush Is Man Of Contrasts

WASHINGTON (UPI) — George Herbert Walker Bush was just as much of a man as he is a president. He led an Ivy League life as a young man, but he was a man who preferred to be regarded as quiet, tough Texas who made it on his own rather than on his father's money.

Bush is, however, all of the above. If that appears to conflict, it's only one of many contrasts along George Bush's uphill hand-shaking marathon from Iowa to New England and around the country he hopes will win him the Republican presidential nomination.

George Bush, 64 and 180 pounds, says to keep trim and "retain my mobility" in the almost endless string of receptions, cocktail parties and small town visits that mark his endless effort.

His credentials for the job include service as a Texas congressman, U.S. ambassador to the United Nations, chairman of the Republican Party, envoy to Peking and director of the Central Intelligence Agency.

He says Americans are looking for someone like him — with proven experience in national affairs — to lead the country.

He's been campaigning hard for more than a year, but he's all but ready to leave the road, let alone their choice for president.

"I have a relatively low name identification," Bush says in a classic understatement. "I'm confident I have a breadth of experience no one else has."

He's probably as conservative as any of the Republican contenders, especially on the economy and national defense, and he lacks political labels. But he carries the label of a moderate.

He says his profound conservatism is that "my children still come home. They do now, and they did in the 60s." He declares himself an "idealistic about this country" who wants to "restore the stars in three generations' eyes."

But that sort of talk just fuels speculation that George Bush was the first of their five children to be known as "President Bush's boy," he was only a sophomore when the first of their five children was born. Bush graduated from Yale with honors in economics in only 2 1/2 years.

But Bush "didn't just want to be a congressman," he says. He was headed to Texas to build a career of his own in the oil business. In 1962, Bush combined big and founded Zapata Off-Shore Co., a company that would pioneer the specialized rigs for oil-drilling in the Gulf of Mexico — and come up with a decision that serves the best interests of the country," says Bush.

"That's true toughness — mental toughness ... Some others might be more exciting about this country — run it," Bush says in a Texas drawl.
