### Down Payments Create Problems

The people who have been telling you over and over again that home appreciation is on the rise apparently know what they Look at these figures:

Statistics show that homes in Florida appreciated at the rate of 14 per cent during 1973.

The prognosticators are saying that right now homes in Florida are appreciating at the fantastic rate of 20 per cent per

In simple math this means that a house worth \$25,000 in 1972 was worth \$28,500 by the end of 1973 and by the end of 1974 it'll be

This goes for existing homes as well as those under construction. A home that could have been built for \$25,000 in 1972 will

cost \$34,200 before this year is over. Further, we're not trying to be "we told you so's," but again the experts who predicted last Fall that interest rates would drop around January but go back up in April also knew what they were talking about. That's exactly what happened.

Interest rates did start downward in January. However, the demand for money apparently exceeded the supply and large banking institutions around the nation start upping prime rates and its now up to 10 per cent and better. And, just as sure as day follows night, these hikes are being reflected in mortgage interest rates. Some home loans closed in Seminole last week went as high Where will it all lead to?

#### Landmark Housing Bill

The Senate has passed a measure which Senator John Sparkan (D-Ala.) called a "landmark housing bill." He said it was a consolidation act designed to bring together housing programs and community development programs. Sparkman explained, in a speech before the annual

legislative conference of the National Association of Realtors, that existing Federal Housing Administration (FHA) programs would be converted to two basic housing programs for low income families — a home ownership program and a rental program. However, others have said that the measure passed by "

Senate is not workable because there is no way to administ, the programs. The people who say this are those who feel HA has had and should continue to have a major role in assising people of moderate means in obtaining adequate housing. Those people who need subsidization programs ought to get assistance from the department of Housing and Urban

Development (HUD). FHA, they feel, should be cuminated from HUD's scope of activities. The Senate bill contained a number of provisions not asked for by the Nixon Administration and the measure could be in for rough sledding when it hits the House of Representatives.

Evidence of this is an opinion rendered by James T. Lynn, During his appearance before the legislative conference of the National Association of Realtors Lynn said he was disap-

pointed in the Senate bill because, for one thing, it contained proposals which principally returned to subsidized new housing similiar to the 235 program on which the Administration placed a moratorium in January of 1973. Lynn brought out one very interesting thought in his address

to the Realtors. He said the private money market must be tapped to a much greater extend to provide more mortgage credit. He recommended mortgage interest tax credits. These would provide institutions with investible assets and a tax credit on the interest they receive from funds invested in residential mortgages - starting with one per cent when 10 per cent of assets are so invested, ranging up to 3.5 per cent when as much as 70 per cent or more of their funds are in mortgages.

Lynn also recommended FHA be revitalized by allowing the interest rate to rise and fall with the market.

## Question Box

Real Estate

I had my home listed with a local real estate office. Over a weekend it was shown by four different salesmen. Shortly before noon on the following Monday the real estate broker brought me contracts signed by two different buyers. Both offers, neither which met my asking price, were different. I didn't ask him but I wondered why he brought both contracts to me?-Mrs. HKW

First, because it's the law. Secondly, if he were a Realtor it was because of the law and the Realtor's Code of Etnics. You are entitled to choose which offer you wish to accept, or choose none of them if none met your asking price. Also, the highest offer might not have been your best offer perhaps because of any terms that may have been included in the contract. Everyone's tax situation is different, too. When a real estate broker receives an offer on any property you listed with him he must convey the offer to you. You have three alternatives: You may accept the offer, reject the offer, or counter. Your broker might advise you what to do but the final decision is yours and yours alone as to whether or not you execute one of those contracts.

We have purchased a new home. We have not sold our old home. In fact, we haven't even put it on the market. We are trying to decide whether to keep it and rent it or go ahead and sell it. What is the rental market in Sanford right now?-Mr. and Mrs.

Dear Mr. and Mrs. PLJ:

The same as it has been for the past year or two. People by the hundreds are looking for rentals. You can rent it even if you put an outlandish price on it but we advise against that. You're only asking for trouble when you do. If they've got the money, people will pay anything to get off the street and into a home. When they complete moving in the first thing they'll do is start to find something more reasonable. So, if you decide to rent your home, put a reasonable figure on it, get the first and last month in advance, ask for a reasonable security deposit, and chances are you'll find a tenant who will stay. But let me warn you that when you rent your property you'll lose your homestead exemption the following year. And, you'd better ask enough to cover that plus repairs you'll have to make. Today the renter expects the landlord to keep everything in tip-top operating condition, and if the landlord doesn't want his property to deterioriate he'd better keep It up. And one service call from a repairman can keep you from bre, king even on your investment for one or several months.

Several months ago we purchased a home and assumed the mortgage on the property from the previous owner. Recently when my husband and I were calculating our income tax return we noticed that part of our payment each month includes an MIP charge. We wrote to the mortgage company and a representative of the firm informed us by mail that it was for the mortgage insurance premium. Does this mean that if my husband passed away the mortgage would be paid off and the house free and





A she became more immersed in training horses, so Sheila read about the various techniques used in reforming horses with vicious and dangerous habits. She was still a 15-year-old schoolgri when she launched into a project which would carry her through 15 more challenging years.

An intimate understanding of a horse's personality is the key to dealing with a problem horse, explains Sheila. Few horses are naturally vicious, she stresses. Like children who go satray because their parents don't handle them right, so a horse will develop bad habits if its owner treats it without sympathy or understanding.

A horse which is sensitive or nervous will react badly to an over-demanding master, just as a strong-willed or stubborn horse will take advantage of poor handling.
