TAFT RALLIES AFTER PASSING RESTFUL NIGHT

Ex-President, Former Chief Justice Given Better Chance For Surviving Sickness

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—(AP)—William Howard Taft, III at his home here, slept all of last night and upon waking about 8 A. M. this morning greeted those who this bedside with a cheerful "good morning."

A moment after this greeting the former chief justice of the United States dropped off to sleep again. The all-night sleep was described at the Taft home as "the best sleep he has had in a long time."

Because of the restful night none of the doctors were summoned after they left shortly after midnight.

The only person entering or leaving the home since were nurses; the day nurse going on duty and the night nurse leaving for her home. The one departing declined to say anything about the distinguished patient.

It was believed the long sleep had restored some of the strength lost by Mr. Taft on his trip here from Asheville, North Carolina, where he had been resting for three weeks. He reached the Capital early yesterday morning and during the day his condition became worse. During yesterday afternoon his doctor described the situation as "critical."

W. O. Russell, Aged 47, Is Dead After 6-Week's Illness

W. O. Russell, aged 47, died at his residence here at 12:10 A. M. today after having suffered with a long illness for six weeks. He was buried at 2 P. M. at the First Methodist Church, 1014 North View Cemetery.

Mr. Russell was born in Lake City, and at an early age moved with his parents to Ocala, where he lived and worked until the time of his illness, which began in a dry goods company, of which he was the local representative.

1930 To Have 500,000 More Cars Than 1929

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—(AP)—John N. Willys, chairman of the board of the Willys-Knight Company, said today that the company now expects to produce 500,000 more automobiles in 1930 than in the previous year.


