TAFT RALLIES AFTER PASSING RESTFUL NIGHT

Ex-President, Former Chief Justice Given Better Chance For Surviving Sickness

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—(AP)—William Howard Taft, III at his home here, slept all of last night and upon waking about 8 A. M. this morning greeted those who this bedside with a cheerful "good morning."

A moment after this greeting the former chief justice of the United States dropped off to sleep again. The all-night sleep was described at the Taft home as "the best sleep he has had in a long time."

Because of the restful night none of the doctors were summoned after they left shortly after midnight.

The only person entering or leaving the home since were nurses; the day nurse going on duty and the night nurse leaving for her home. The one departing declined to say anything about the distinguished patient.

W. O. Russell, Aged 47, Is Dead After 6-Week's Illness

W. O. Russell, aged 47, died at his residence here at 12:10 A. M. after having suffered with a high fever and other symptoms for several weeks. He was buried at 10:30 A. M. at the First Methodist Church, 1014 North View Cemetery.

Mr. Russell was born in Lake City, and at an early age moved with his parents to Ocala, where he lived for four years. Until the time of his illness, he was considered to be in excellent health, and was a member of the local representative.

1930 To Have 500,000 More Cars Than 1929

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—(AP)—John N. Willys, chairman of the Willys-Knight automobile company, today said that the industry now expects to produce 500,000 more automobiles in 1930 than in the previous year.

Willys was accompanied to the White House by Senator Ross of Ohio. The manufacture of cars would be as good as the rebound point of profits as it was last year because the depression decline allowed the stock market which had caused drastic cuts in overhead charges.

8 Firemen Are Hurt In New York Blazes

All were injured in a fire at 175 West 11th St. The most seriously injured were Nicholas DiLuzo, 25, with a fractured skull and Charles Hoffman, 40, fractured ribs and contusions. Hoffman was caught in the collapse of a window frame extending to the Ebbets Hotel at 175 West 11th St. Hoffman's condition is critical. The other seven firemen were less seriously injured in the same collision. The fire at 175 West 11th St. was extinguished with 1500 lbs. of dynamite, and 1500 lbs. of dynamite were used to clear the debris.

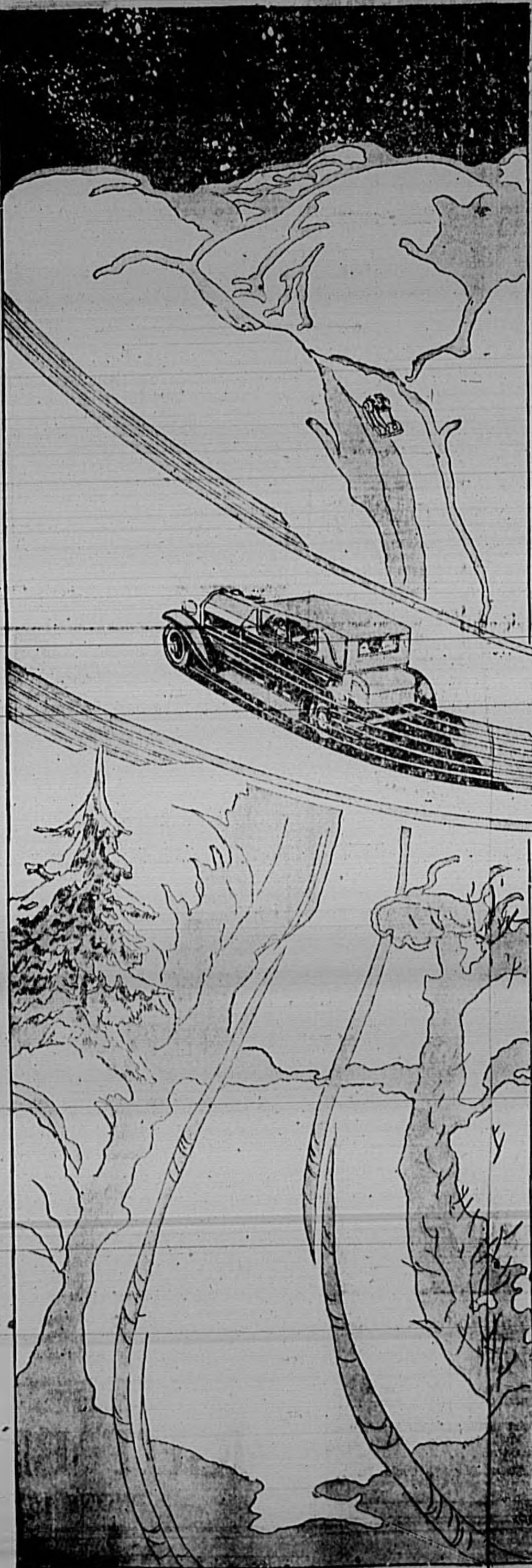
