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Eisenhower Urges Free Nation Unity In Jaycee Address

Defends Reduction In Air Force's Budget

MINNEAPOLIS, (AP) — President Eisenhower today all the free nations of the world must stand together in the "total defense" against Communism. He declared the United States, even though the strongest nation on earth, cannot make our own decisions, fight and stand as only we ourselves may choose.

"There is no such thing as a partial unity. That is a contradiction in terms," Eisenhower said in a speech prepared for the National Junior Chamber of Commerce.

The President also took occasion to defend his controversial cut in the Truman administration's Air Force budget, declaring his program will mean "fewer planes in the sky, more planes in fact more swiftly and less expensively."

In pointed words, Eisenhower declared that the insistence of his critics on "magic numbers" is an apparent reference to those insisting on a 113,000 wind air force is "not reasonable."

The President named no names in today's speech, but he did mean this country should "go it alone" but rather that the United States should form an alliance with Britain and other free nations to fight Communism in Asia actively.

Eisenhower hammered on the theme that unity with Allies of the free world is necessary the globe over.

"The initial struggle let us never forget it calls for a total defense. As there is no weapon too small, no area too remote to be ignored, no ally too distant to be forgotten, no ally too far to be forgotten. All of us have learned first from the onslaught of Nazi aggression, then from Communist aggression, that all free nations must stand together, or they shall fall separately."

C. Of C. Receives Report On Move For New People

A report on the trip to Detroit which he and Merv Oster made in connection with bringing retired automobile workers to Seminole County was made at last night's meeting of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce by Manasse Breckenridge.

"We were advised by top officials that quite a few of their retired persons, who own homes, would be the ideal ones to come here since they can make their own financial arrangements," Mr. Breckenridge declared.

The leaders of the retirement groups offered high caliber, well-planned programs and material before organized groups of the people here.

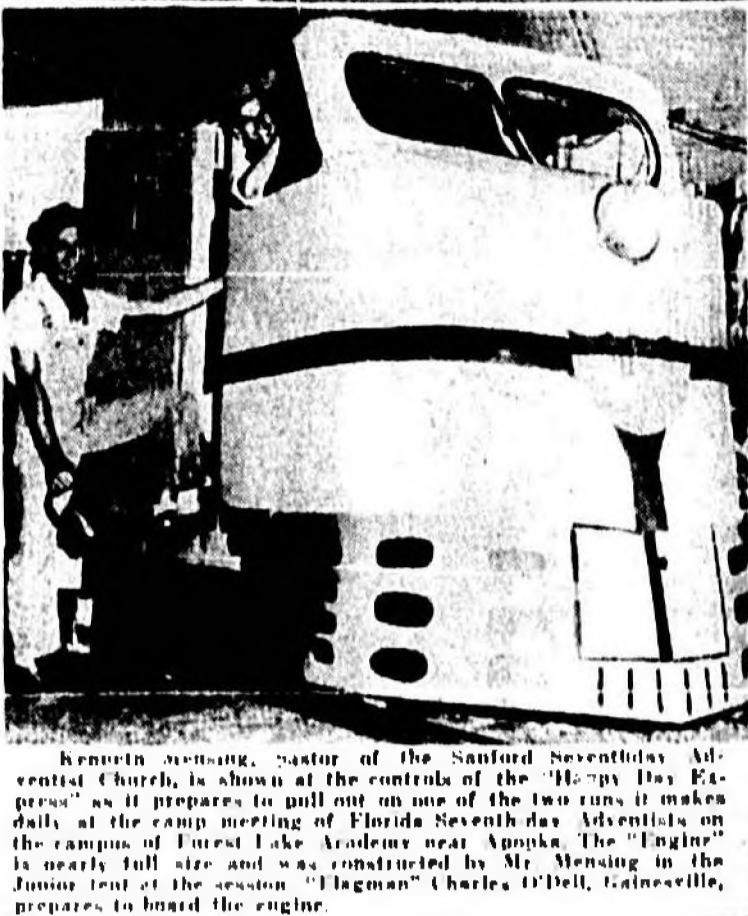
Directors approved a request by Mr. Breckenridge that he be permitted to attend the tenth annual session of the southeastern Institute for Chamber executives and staff members at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill from June 21 to 27. Report On Canal To Coast Made By Breckenridge

The Sanford Titusville Canal project to provide a navigational and flood control channel connecting the St. Johns and Indian rivers is under study, both by the Corps of Engineers and the State Legislature's Interim Committee on Inland Waterways.

Manasse Breckenridge, executive director of the Florida Agricultural Experiment Station with offices in Titusville, explained the functions of the 20-mile canal at the Kiwanis meeting of the Kiwanis Club.

He was introduced by John Wilson, chairman of the Agricultural Experiment Station, who was formerly associated with the speaker in Belle Glade.

In Breckenridge pointed out several of the recent shortages by the state agency which have materially assisted farmers in the Central Florida area. He added that a more diversified crop program in this region would be very beneficial.

"By the year 1955, it is estimated that there will be 19,000,000 people in the United States," he said. "There appears to be very little virgin land left to be used for farming, so it is going to be necessary to have an increase in yield per acre of all crops."

He spoke of quick freeze which has paralyzed the citrus industry but which at the same time has wiped out the English pea crop in Florida.

Because citrus is a bulky crop and must be crispy it is to be expected that it will be difficult to transport. Lettuce and cabbage fall into the same category.

He showed, though, how quick freeze has developed into a big (Continued on Page Four)

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Truce Within Week Looms Amid Discord

Korean Youths Shout "Yankees Go Home"

PANSUNGJONG, (AP) — United Nations and Communist truce negotiations — their way only — but finished today handed staff of their job of putting a Korean armistice into final form, then to proceed indefinitely.

All signs still pointed to a cease-fire within the week, but these developments clouded the picture.

A spokesman for a syndicate of South Korean newspapers announced that the Communist government had rejected the United Nations proposal for a truce.

South Korean leaders refused to accept the Communist proposal for a truce, and instead demanded a complete withdrawal of United Nations troops from the peninsula.

Details of what went on at a plenary session at Pansungjong, presumably completed, were not disclosed, but the truce work.

After 45 minutes, they resumed a Communist request subject to all by other side.

Truce level officers, then, as usual in the time of a truce, and reportedly sent to work on a cease-fire, but were held back by separate Allied and Communist troops.

They met for an hour and a half, then adjourned until tomorrow.

Meanwhile, thousands of Korean youths snaked through Seoul streets in apparently well-organized demonstrations.

"Yankees go home" they chanted on U. N. and U. S. buildings, but were held back by military police.

In Washington, the Swiss move forward reportedly made it plain to the Swiss legation that it hoped Switzerland would recognize U. N. authorities.

U. S. authorities feared that an unqualified recognition of the Communist government would be a blow to the morale of the United States.

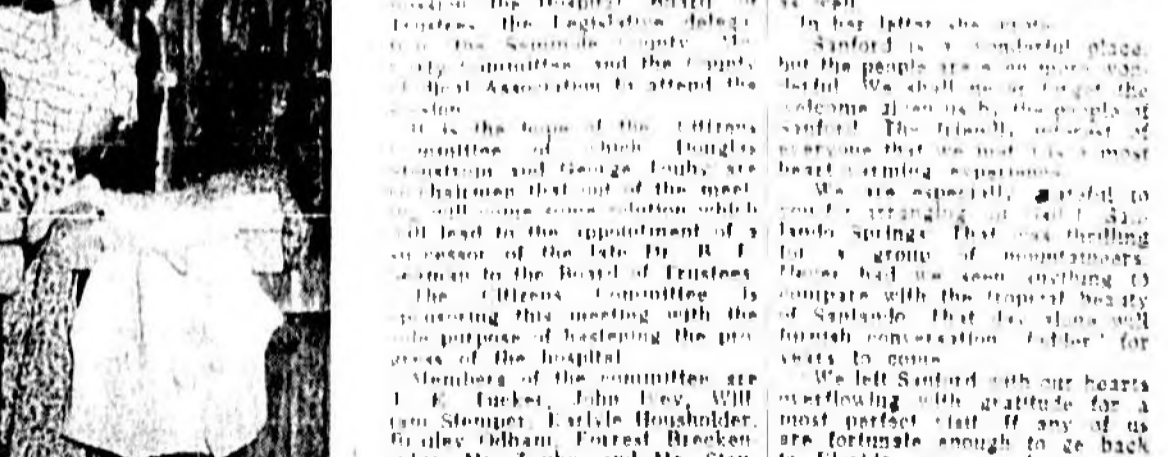
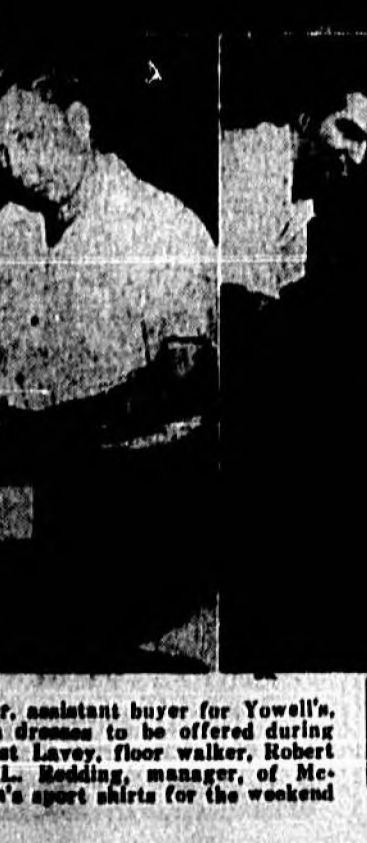

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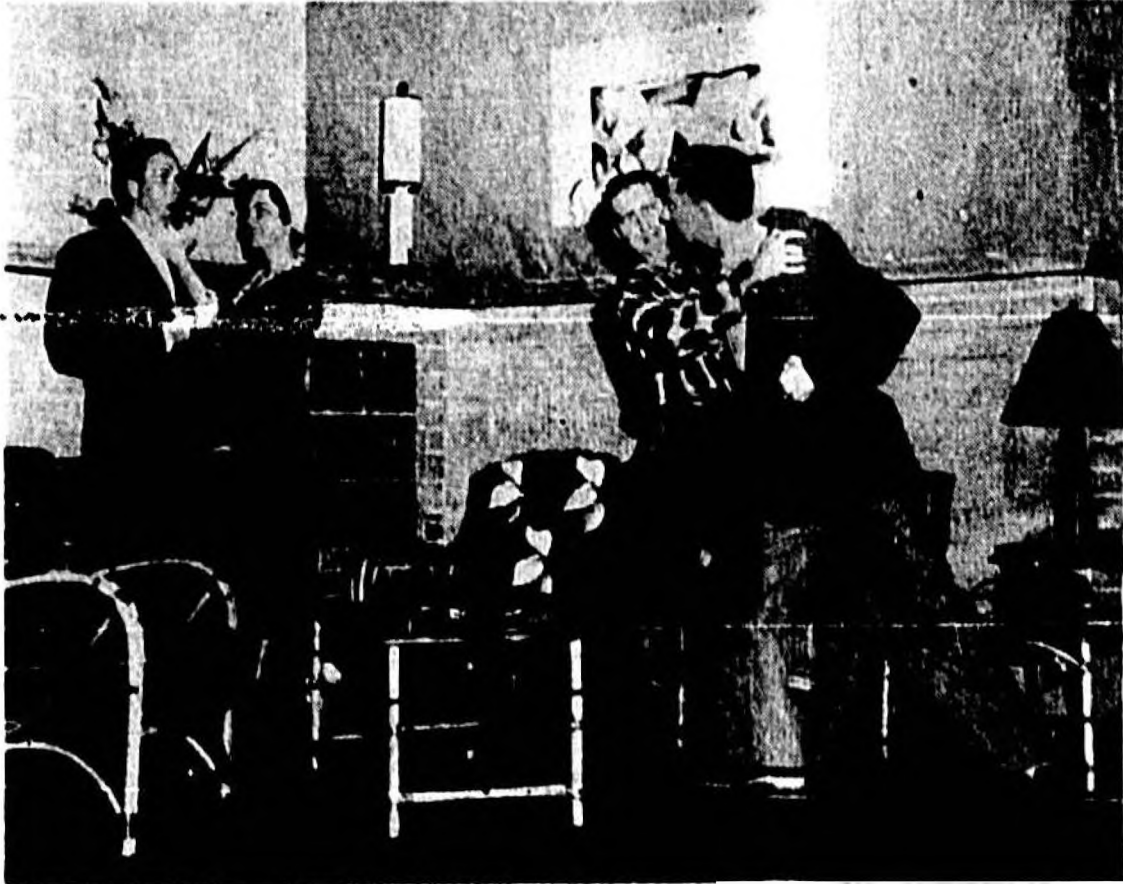

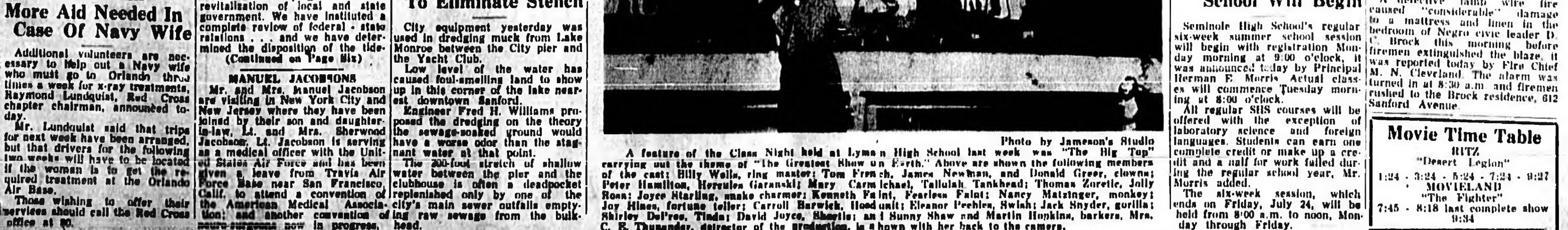
