Orange Growers OK Tax Act

Aim: Stabilized Market

LAKELAND, Fla. (AP) — The controversial orange stabilization act of Florida, which would allow the state to tax oranges five cents a box, passed a referendum of producers and processors by a wide margin, the Florida Citrus Commission announced today.

The act was carried by a vote of 93.3 per cent of growers and 85.1 per cent of processors. The commission unanimously voted to put the act into force beginning Feb. 1, a delay caused by concern over a pending lawsuit attacking the constitutionality of the act.

The act would involve a five-cent tax on all boxes of round oranges delivered into primary channels of trade. Revenue would be used for development of a school cafeteria market.

Citrusmen hoped to avoid market glut such as the damaging one of 1964-67 when more than 160 million boxes of oranges were produced and prices fell to all-shockingly low.

"The growers have spoken loudly and clearly that they want to prepare for the future, and we will," said Robert W. Rutledge, executive director of Florida Citrus Mutual, a 15,000-grower cooperative.

The vote showed 2,960 individual growers in favor of the act and 435 against. Votes cast in blocks by co-ops, 2,873 were for and 23 against.

Among processors, 30 voted for the measure and five were against.

The act was scheduled for implementation Feb. 1, but the commission on grounds it was unlawful delegation of authority by the Legislature.

 A difference of opinion over whether the new Sanford Nursing Home and Convalescent Center, 500 Melonville Avenue, has been designated by the State Cabinet to participate in an estimated \$25 million project to house senior patients earlier in the week, rather than confine them in a state hospital.

Dr. W. D. Rogers, director of state mental health division, said today in a long distance telephone interview from Tallahassee the new facility has "not been so designated" and "could not or would not say this until ascertaining the feelings of local welfare and county agencies presently involved with providing for such patients."

This statement contradicted a published account today which stated the designation was made this week by State Cabinet.

Rogers flatly denied this and stated to designation would be made until the aforementioned criteria had been met.

This consisted mostly of local conditions involving all nursing homes, which he said "could also participate in the program — not just one home alone."

Rogers said, "Welfare pays only \$120 monthly toward patient's care and this is not what the state designation is about. This was the reason the center was built," when asked about the state designation.

County Judge Wallace Hall and County Welfare Director Abby Boyd said they had not been contacted concerning the state designation for the center.

Judge Hall replied to "The Herald's" question with, "I don't know anything about it and have not heard anything."

Mrs. Boyd said she knew nothing of the designation and added she had not been asked about her views.

Mrs. Mary Simpson, state welfare supervisor for adults, said she had heard about the program and was told to "watch the papers for news."

Jones said State Rep. William P. Anderson would speak at the annual opening of the Sanford Center at 8 p.m. Sunday.

GI Death Toll Drops

SAIGON (AP) — The year 1968 ended with the lowest number of GI deaths in the war since the bombing of North Vietnam, since the U.S. Command reported today. But the number of South Vietnamese dead was the highest in three months, indicating an increasing part in the war by the Saigon government troops.

The reported total of enemy dead was as usual, above 2,000 and five times the allied total.

Communications today reflected the recent change of nature of the war — small, widely scattered ground actions, the uncovering of more enemy supply dumps, and the shelling of allied positions coupled with 113 air-raid attacks.

The death of 113 American servicemen Christmas week was the lowest in 19 weeks. South Vietnamese losses in the same week were 279 dead, the highest in 12 weeks, while 2,133 Viet Cong and North Vietnamese were reported killed.

The casualty report covered the Christmas truce period, and the figures indicated the cease-fire was only nominally observed.

The cease-fire declared by the Viet Cong command for New Year's ended early today, and shortly after two American bases and one South Vietnamese post were shelled.

Newsmen were not permitted to talk to any of them. However, the U.S. Command revised its earlier report that said Rowe was freed by troops of South Vietnam's 21st Infantry Division. A spokesman said Rowe heard the roar of American helicopters supporting South Vietnamese troops in the Mekong Delta. "Overpowered an armed enemy guard and escaped." He fled to an open area and was picked up by a helicopter crew.

A Special Forces adviser to South Vietnam said Rowe had been listed as missing in action since his unit suffered heavy casualties in an ambush in the delta on Oct. 29, 1964.

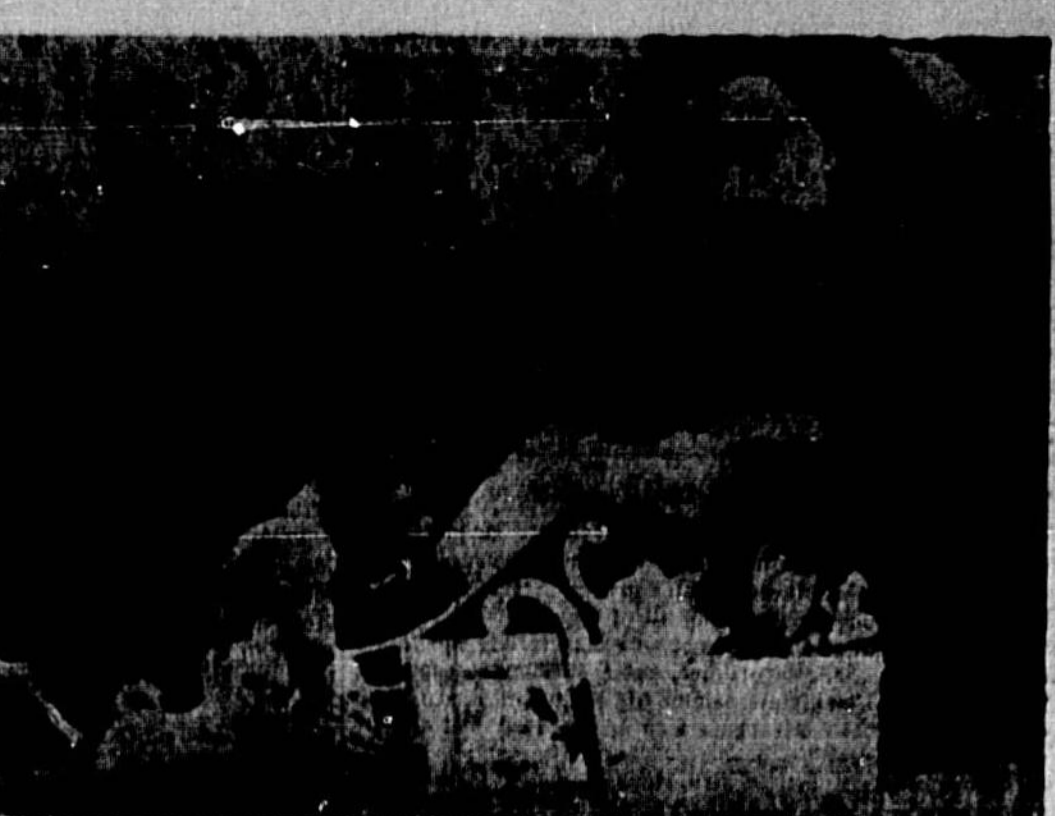

NEW YORK—(NEA)—In 1947, Christian Dior staged the most staggering fashion revolution since 1825, when the knee-length skirt first made its appearance. And he just about depleted clothing budgets here and in Europe. He dropped the hemline to the ankle, and nearly overnight everyone who couldn't afford a new wardrobe looked helplessly out of things.

Fashion reflects the changing mood of the times and looking through a picture book of costumes from over the years is like reading a history of the people and how they lived.

Dior's New Look came in an aftermath of World War II. Women were tired of rationing, shortages, uniforms and a certain respectability in dress. In part, to overcome restrictions on fabrics and lines. They were ripe for a change from padded shoulders, long jackets and short, straight skirts.

Dior's close-fitting top, softly rounded shoulders and hips and swirling, full skirts that fell to the ankle spelled new appealing femininity.

"I made them look like women instead of boys," he is quoted as having proclaimed. "They had been so serious for so long."

And the New Look was taken to the heart of every daily and Jane and copied by every designer. It turned up everywhere from custom lines to bargain basement racks. It lasted for about 10 years, with hemlines going up just a few inches as time went by.

Then in 1960 the world of fashion took over and swinging went by the wayside. Of necessity, to preserve the modishness of the hemline, the length of skirts and

Fever--A Friend As Well As A Foe

Just what does a child's fever mean?

When the mouth temperature is taken and the thermometer's red line climbs above the 98.6 degree arrow, a mother may have cause for concern.

That's understandable, for the child's fevered brow and flushed face are signs that something could be wrong. Actually, fever can be friend as well as foe. It's the body's early warning system. It's also one condition that can almost always be relieved.

The body's temperature is not constant. During any 24-hour period, it has several ups and downs from the 98.6 degree norm. It is generally at low—usually 97 degrees or a bit lower—during the early morning hours.

This is because the circulation of our blood slows down while we sleep. By late afternoon or early evening, with the day's activity, it may go up to about 99.6 degrees.

The body's heating system is very similar to that in your own home. The body, like a furnace, burns fuel which, in this case, is food that is burned primarily in muscle tissue.

This generated heat is then distributed through a vast network of blood vessels in the same way the furnace's heat is sent out through the house through a system of pipes.

Like a house, too, the body is insulated. The insulation is a layer of fat under the skin.

The body likewise has a "thermostat." It is located in the hypothalamus, a part of the brain. This thermostat goes into action once there's an infection or outbreak of disease.

When a hand, for instance, becomes infected and inflamed, you will notice it gets either hot or that place. This is a

Home Hints

Knitwear Notes
When buying sweaters and knitwear, good construction means they will hold up longer with proper care. Full-fashioned garments are knit in shape and have the "finished" marks at the seams. Cut and sewn garments are cut from a flat fabric and sewn together. This process is less expensive than full-fashioned and usually the garment doesn't fit as well. Closer knit holds the shape better than loose knits unless the latter have been lined or specially treated. In buying knits look for round loops. Knits with elongated loops tend to stretch, shrink and generally lose their shape in cleaning.

Prevent Wrinkles
Always remove wash-and-wear garments from dryer as soon as the drying cycle is completed. If allowed to stay in the dryer they will become wrinkled.
