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Plans for Soup Kitchen continue

SANFORD — Seminole Volunteer Enterprises plans to begin serving dinners as planned in February, despite a lawsuit by seven historic district residents filed against the city this week aimed at reversing a parking variance which allows the non-profit agency to serve meals.

Jean Metts, director of Seminole Volunteer Enterprises, said that the agency will serve at least three meals per week beginning Feb. 14 at the site, located at 407 West Fourth Street within the residential historic district.

Despite lawsuit, Metts plans to open restaurant in Feb. 14

"I'm going to continue to move forward," Metts said. "There are people who need help, and we're going to help them."

Seven residents of Sanford's historic district are filing a lawsuit against the city seeking an injunction prohibiting Sanford from granting an off-street parking waiver

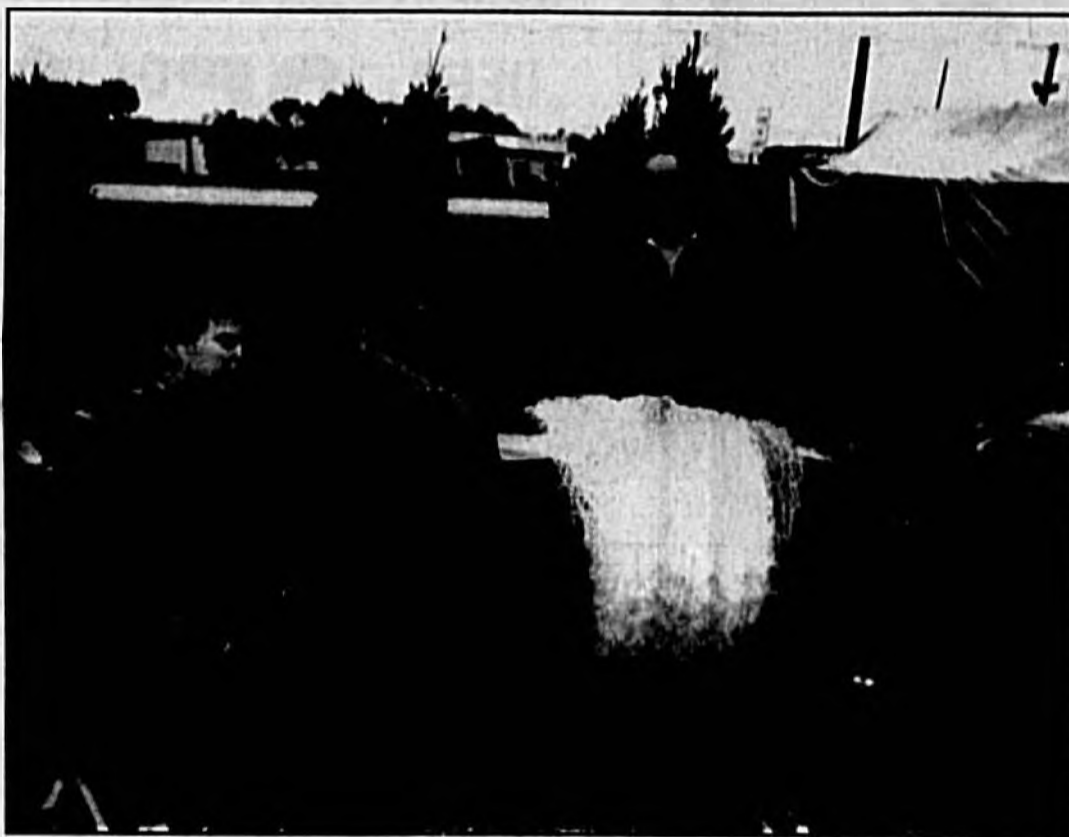
for the free dinner program proposed by Seminole Volunteer Enterprises.

The suit of Kuhn, et al. vs. the City of Sanford was delivered to city officials on Tuesday. However, it has not yet been filed with the Circuit Court in Seminole County, according to Maryanne Morse, clerk of the court.

The complaint, obtained through the city of Sanford, alleges that without an injunction, the value of the plaintiffs' properties will be harmed by the operation of the meal site.

Last minute shoppers fight crowds

SANFORD — 'Tis the season to go shopping.

Sherilyn and Ronald Rogers of Sanford took their grandson to visit Santa Claus on Thursday at the Seminole Towne Center shopping mall in Sanford. Lavee Reids, a tourist from Camden, S.C., also spent part of the day at the mall. Meanwhile, Bill Koerner of Orlando purchased a Christmas Tree at Frost Christmas and Wire in Sanford.

The four shoppers contributed to a Christmas shopping season that, according to retail specialists, is only going to become more hectic today through Sunday.

"Many retailers are expecting a busy Christmas shopping season, especially with the weekend coming," said Lori Elliott, a spokeswoman for the Florida Retail

Federation. "It's now or never at this point. It's been a busy season, and it's expected to become even more busy."

Florida's 1999 total holiday sales during November, December and January are forecast to be 9.8 percent better than last year, reaching \$62 billion, according to a Florida Retail Federation study.

Sherilyn and Ronald Rogers don't need statistics to realize that shopping malls become crowded during the holiday season. They waited in line 45 minutes Thursday afternoon while taking their grandson to see Santa Claus.

"It's been busy, but we've had fun," Sherilyn Rogers said.

Lavee Reids said that she did the majority of her Christmas shopping prior to the holiday season. However, she still went shopping with her husband and two children.

Simmons has big support for his Florida House run

SANFORD — It would seem David Simmons of Longwood not only has friends in all the right places but strategies that might place him in Tallahassee a year from now.

Simmons, 47, is seeking the Florida House of Representatives seat, District 37 set being vacated by Lee Constantine after the Year 2000 because of term limits. He is strongly backed by U.S. Sen. Connie Mack and by the Seminole County Republican Executive Committee.

Mack was one of the many Republican leaders who attended a recent fund-raising party for Simmons at the Sweetwater area of Longwood. More than \$25,000 was raised for Simmons' campaign.

Simmons had served on Mack's Federal Judicial Advisory Committee. U.S. Representative Bill McCollum also attended the event.

The race for Constantine's "open seat" matches Simmons against Larry Strickler. Both are Seminole County Republican activists. District 37 covers the

southwest portion of Seminole County and the northeast portion of Orange County.

Simmons said he intends to do all he can to stop the proliferation of drugs coming into the state of Florida.

"Drugs," he said, "are destroying the fabric of the American society. We must not let our young people destroy their lives."

"This is a most important issue to me. Along with education."

Florida's drug problem, Simmons said, needs constant attention. The keys to keeping drugs away from young people, he said, are education, interdiction and stiff penalties.

"It's just far too easy to get drugs in Central Florida," he said. "The State needs to find ways to get the dealers off the street. If more officers are needed, let's get them."

Simmons said he advocates a

Undercover police sting nets two arrests

LONGWOOD — Two owners of a Longwood grocery store face charges of dealing in stolen property and possession of drugs following an undercover sting operation, authorities said.

On Wednesday, agents from the City-County Investigative Bureau concluded an undercover operation at the R&B Food Mart at 1495 U.S. Highway 17-92 in Longwood.

Store owners, 29-year-old Rachid Boussatta and 40-year-old Abderrafie Boussatta were arrested for dealing in stolen property, possession of cocaine and less than 20 grams of marijuana, and possession of a stolen firearm.

In October, agents sold the two store owners 37 cartons of cigarettes, 40 boxes of camera film with 24 exposures, and 36 boxes of Tylenol Pain reliever tablets that was purported as stolen, according to the arrest

report.

The cigarettes were affixed with tax stamps from Georgia, and the merchandise was sold to the store owners at a fraction of its fair market value, the arrest report said.

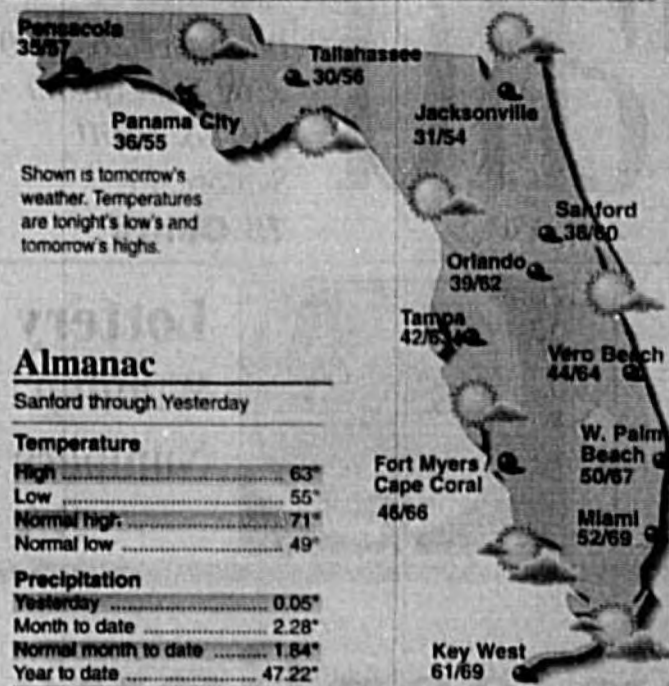
Agents later returned to purchase items that were sold to the store as stolen items. The items were purchased as retail at higher prices. A search warrant was executed Wednesday, and the items were seized.

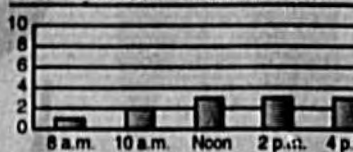

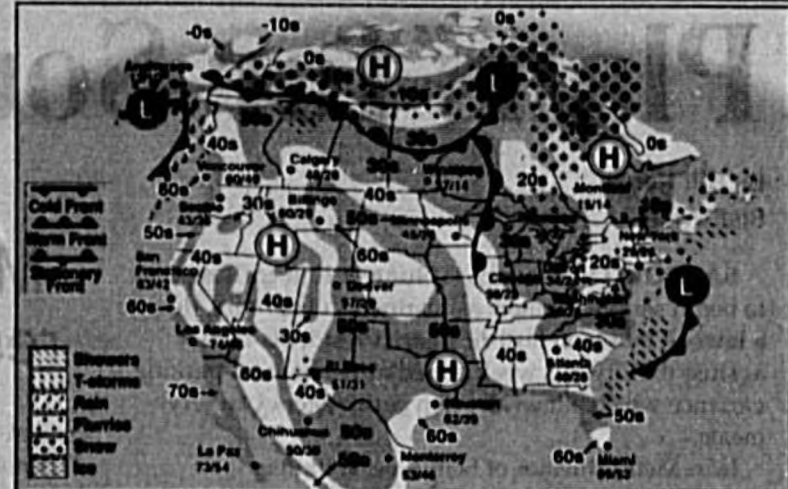

"It's very busy, but we wanted to get out a little bit," Reids said. "We didn't have to do all of our shopping today. It's just another day for us."

Reids may have taken care of her Christmas shopping early, but Koerner still needed to purchase a Christmas Tree on Thursday.

An electrical contract worker, Koerner said that he lacked the time to find a Christmas Tree until this week. He found a 10-foot tree for his wife, Maria, and their four children.

"We looked last night and the night before, and today I got lucky," Koerner said. "I really haven't done much shopping. Last night, I stopped at a couple of places."

According to a Florida Retail Federation study, strong gains are expected to be made during the holiday season in general merchandise and apparel, though catalogue and Internet sales appear to have impacted store-based sales growth in these categories.

The strongest growth is anticipated in the furniture and home-furnishing category.

"With a robust state economy, increasing population, and healthy tourism, Florida will have strong holiday sales and will outpace that of the nation's," said Bill Rustin, president of the Florida Retail Federation.

Apparel is also a popular item, with most Americans purchasing apparel for at least one person on their gift list this holiday season, according to a survey by the International Mass Retail Association.

According to the survey, 77.5 percent of Americans are giving at least one apparel item this Christmas. The number one choice for gifts at 52 percent was casual apparel such as jeans and khakis, followed by lounging apparel such as sweatpants and pajamas, and outerwear, both at 47 percent.

"Apparel is a hot item this Christmas, particularly casual apparel, as well as clothing that appeals to teenage girls," said Robert J. Verdisco, president of

the International Mass Retail Association.

According to the survey, 57 percent of those responding to the survey purchased their apparel at discount department stores, followed by conventional department stores (52.5 percent), outlets (44 percent), specialty stores (43 percent), catalogs (32 percent) and the Internet (11 percent).

Even though the *Seminole Herald* will observe the holiday by publishing the weekend edition today, rather than Christmas Eve, we must also give fond wishes to our counterparts in the other media, including radio and television, where service and entertainment never ceases.



Vermont Supreme Court made mistake

When *Roe vs. Wade* was decided by a 7-2 vote in 1973, U.S. Supreme Court Justice William Rehnquist declared the unconstitutional assault on the unborn an exercise in raw judicial power.

That corrupt judicial seed found its way into last week's ruling by the Vermont Supreme Court that homosexuals have a right to the same presumptions and benefits as heterosexual married couples. As Robert Bork noted in the *Wall Street Journal*, neither the Vermont case nor several other recent state court cases prohibiting school vouchers and the restriction of New York City's pornography trade have any support in the constitutions they invoke. The Vermont court, in violation of the separation of powers, has dictated to the people and their elected legislature a social, legal and moral policy.

As Bork noted, the Vermont court appeared to find legislation an inconvenience to its own vision. One Vermont justice lamented that the plaintiffs would be sent to an "uncertain fate in the political caldron of ... moral debate." To the court, the legislature is an incon-

venience that must be ruled by fiat. Yet, that is how we used to make laws before the courts ascribed to themselves the right to bypass the people.

Without a moral vision and the enforcement of morals at some level, cultures and then nations soon unravel. This is one of history's lessons for those who do not wish to repeat it. The United States refused to admit Utah into the Union until the state repealed its polygamy law. Now, a state supreme court sees marriage as whatever the justices say it is.

Patrick Devlin, a former English judge, wrote a little book some years ago titled "The Enforcement of Morals" (Oxford University Press, 1965). In it he argues that "the moral law of a society is made up from the ideas which members of that society have in common about the right way to live. The association of men and women in wedlock has from time immemorial been of such importance in every society that its regulation has always been a matter of morals."

But what happens when courts, and not citizens, define the morals by which a society lives? Who sets the limits and

by what standard? Divorce has already caused great damage to marriage and to the children of divorced parents.

According to the Census Bureau, there were fewer than 200,000 divorced Americans in 1900. By 1998, that number had risen to 19.4 million. Do we wish to further undermine marriage by declaring homosexual "couples" equal to married, heterosexual couples?

Again, Devlin is helpful: "Since the modern state concerns itself with promoting institutions that are beneficial to society, the legislator has to consider how the law can best be used to help marriage and to discourage alternatives."

Homosexual coupling is not an alternative. Neither is it equal to heterosexual coupling, any more than polygamy is marriage's equal or alternative. In commenting on the Vermont ruling, the *New York Times*, which uncritically shills for all things gay, pointed with pride to Chief Justice Jeffrey Amestoy's opinion that homosexuals "seek nothing more, nor less, than legal protection and security for their avowed commitment to an intimate and lasting relationship."

In fact, they seek quite a bit more. In publications, conventions and speeches, See Thomas, Page 5A

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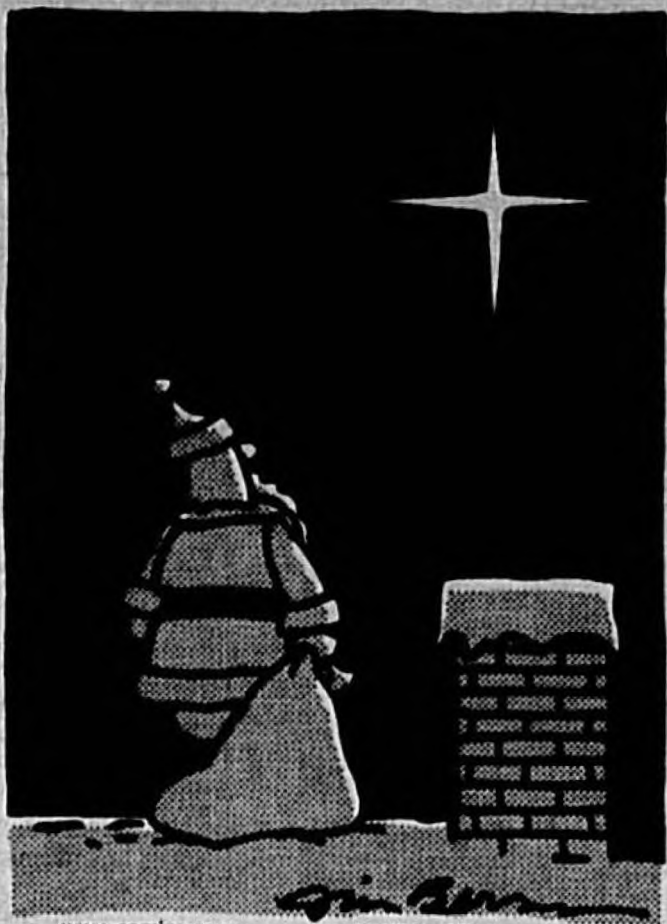

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Seminole County school district now prepared for Y2K to begin

SANFORD — On the night before Christmas this year, not all children have visions of sugar plums dancing in their heads.

Some children dream of the Y2K computer glitch shutting down school computers, losing grade records and causing enough chaos to delay the Jan. 4, 2000 return from the holiday break.

Seminole County school-district officials have bad news for those children who are hoping that computers in the schools will be unable to convert from 1999 to 2000 on New Year's Day.

The school-district has spent more than \$1.5 million replacing computers and up-grading both hardware and software to ensure that computers will be running smoothly when students return to class.

Every system in the school-district that can be effected by

the Y2K computer glitch has passed tests to tell whether the system will convert from 1999 to 2000, said George Kosmac, director of information services for the school-district.

"In general I'd say we're in good shape," Kosmac said. "On the first, second or third of January, we could have some problems with our applications. It's hard to tell with computers, but we should have everything working fine by the fourth when school starts."

The school-district has replaced 2,300 personal computers and 46 telephone systems that were found to not be Y2K compliant. The remaining computers have received upgrades to the software and hardware.

Emergency systems such as fire alarms, elevators, transportation systems, and security systems have all passed tests for Y2K compliance.

"Everything that had a chance of being impacted has been replaced," Kosmac said.

District information services personnel will be working overtime beginning Saturday, Jan. 1. The systems will continue to be monitored through Monday, Jan. 3.

Several members of the school-district's Business Advisory Council with expertise in computer programming volunteered this school year to assist in preparing a plan to prepare for the computer glitch.

"Any effort like this is a coordinated effort," Kosmac said. "They worked with each department to help us develop a detailed working plan of what needs to be replaced."

Since 1996, the school-district has been preparing for the Y2K computer glitch by replacing critical systems such as payroll and finance.

"The development started then, and we really started the big plans of replacing the PC's in January of this year," Kosmac said. "It has not been easy, but we should be in good shape."

Sanford Commission to discuss program Monday

SANFORD — The Sanford City Commission on Monday will discuss whether the city should continue to administer a county-wide home energy assistance program.

On Dec. 13, the Sanford City Commission tabled approval of an agreement with the state to execute the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) for the 2000-2001 fiscal year.

The commission directed

Charles Rowe, director of the city's Community Development Department, to ask the county to participate in the program.

However, the Board of Seminole County Commissioners would need to approve of the county overseeing the program. The Commission has not yet placed the matter on its agenda.

The program serves residents across Seminole County, although data from the city's Community Development Department indicates half of the people participating in the pro-

gram live in Sanford.

Out of 1,244 clients served by the program since the current contract was signed in April, 55 percent or 689 clients were Sanford residents.

Sanford Mayor Larry Dale is opposed to the contract with the state, saying that too much staff time is devoted to operating the program.

"I know that it takes up a lot of our staff time," Dale said. "It is a county program, and the county should be running it."

The city's current contract expires March 31, 2000.

Continued from Page 1A believe activities at the agency will effect homeowners in the historic district.

"We are surrounded by commercial buildings," Metts said. "I don't see how serving a meal here is going to impact anything."

The Sanford City Commission in November granted a parking variance to Seminole Volunteer Enterprises, allowing the non-profit agency to open a meal site that will serve up to 100 needy people in conjunction with existing food distribution programs.

The site does not have parking, according to city records. Without the variance, the city would have required 40 parking spaces for a restaurant capable of serving 100 people.

"In the downtown area, there's no parking anywhere for a restaurant," Metts said.

If the injunction is granted against the city, the commission may be required to reconsider the parking variance.

Whitey Eckstein, one of the

three city commissioners who voted in favor of the variance in November, said the city should not defend against the suit. He said he would like to see Metts prepare the meals on site, then serve the meals at a less controversial location such as the Salvation Army in Sanford.

"The taxpayers should not have to pay for us to defend against this suit," Eckstein said. Metts said she would not consider serving the meals at the Salvation Army, or anywhere other than the agency's location.

"We aren't going to consider changing our plans," Metts said. The plaintiffs in the suit are seeking a permanent injunction prohibiting the city from granting a variance waiving off-street parking requirements for a restaurant at the site.

In addition, the complaint requests the Circuit Court to conduct a trial and declare the City Commission's development order concerning the vari-

ance is inconsistent with the city's comprehensive plan. The complaint also seeks a temporary injunction against the city prohibiting the operation of the restaurant. The complaint asks the Circuit Court to prohibit the city from issuing development orders, occupational licenses or certificates of occupancy at the site.

The Winter Springs law firm of Leffler & Associates is representing the historic district residents in the case. Attorneys for the firm did not return calls regarding the complaint.

The plaintiffs in the complaint include Joe DeSantis of 714 S. Magnolia Ave., Robert Kuhn of 313 Palmetto Ave., David Kelly of 321 Magnolia Ave., Stephen Myers of 718 Oak Ave., Diane Newton of 605 Magnolia Ave., Fred Rogers of 305 Park Ave., and Alexander Then of 1019 Magnolia Ave..

The historic district residents involved in the complaint are under a gag order not to speak about the case, several plaintiffs said.

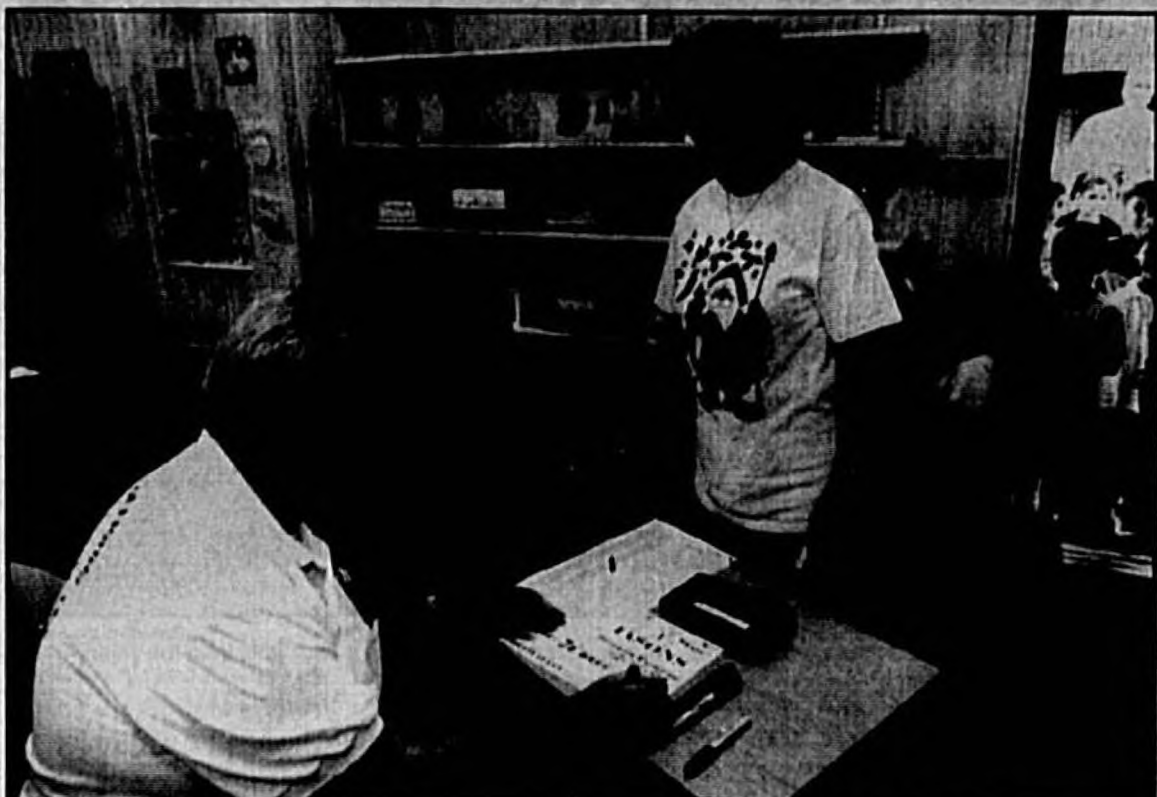

E-mail hoaxes cause havoc on Web

As the number of people using e-mail has skyrocketed, so has the number of hoaxes, rumors and "urban legends" circulating through the ether. Here are just a few:

- Unwary travelers can be tranquilized and have their kidneys stolen. No, says the National Kidney Foundation.

- The government found the AIDS virus on needles planted in pay telephones. Not so, according to the National Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

- There's a vicious new computer virus afoot. Perhaps the oldest and best known is the Good Times hoax, which claimed: "If you get anything called 'Good Times', don't read or download it. It is a virus that will erase your hard drive."

While whoppers like these may seem harmless, heeding or

forwarding them can have damaging consequences. For one thing, if you forward a hoax message or do what it asks, it

means someone else has to spend time dealing with the message. If the hoax involves a major institution, it

could impede other work. The National Kidney Foundation, for example, is concerned that the kidney-theft hoax will affect people's willingness to become organ donors.

For another, you can cause panic. Warning friends about an unfounded threat disrupts their lives and spreads fear.

And for yet another, you'll slow the Internet. Suppose that you forward one message to 15 people, and that each of them forwards it to 15 others, and so on. Just four generations of the process can produce more than 50,000 e-mail messages.

Some hoaxes may warn that an e-mail virus can destroy the contents of your computer. But only a program attached to an e-mail message can do that. That's why you should never open an e-mail attachment unless you're sure you know what it contains.

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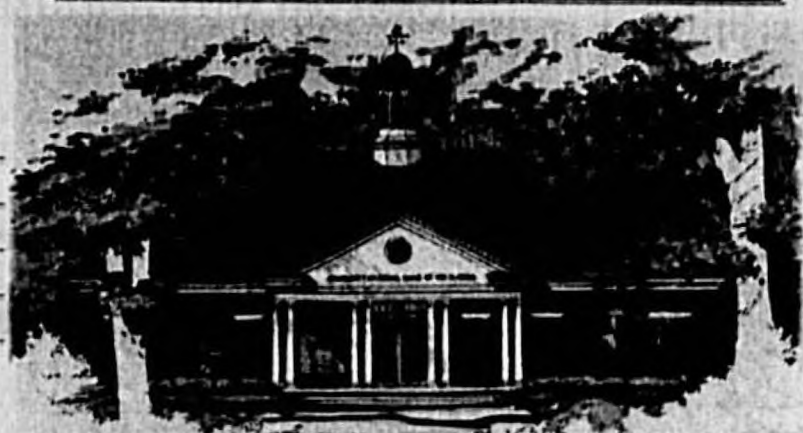

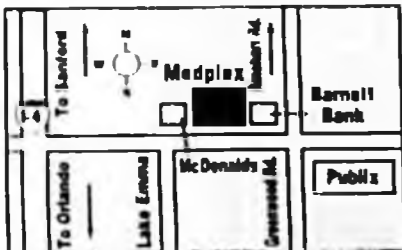

The problem is — if he wanted to come back, I believe I would take him back. Why do I feel like this? Is there something wrong with me? Do I need counseling?

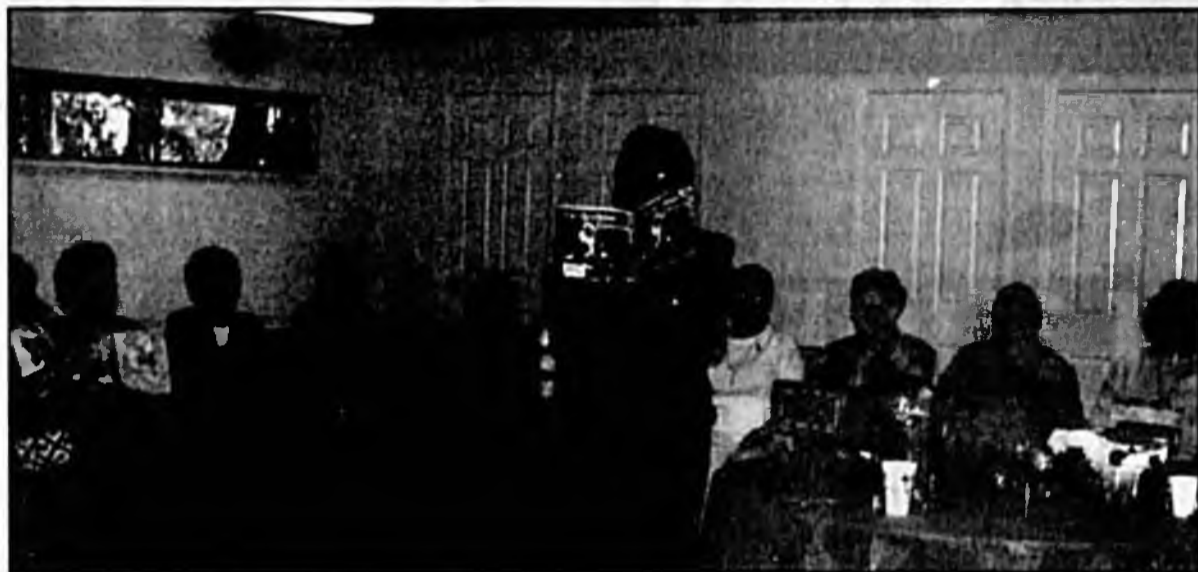
DAZED AND CONFUSED

Ron Dayne tops All-America team

NEW YORK (NEA) - He's billed as "The Great Dayne." His standing in the history of college football is unique.

Ron Dayne, a senior running back for the University of Wisconsin, is the new owner of the NCAA's Division I-A career rushing record of 6,397 yards.

Leading the Big Ten champion Badgers to a 9-2 mark, Dayne ran this season for a total of 1,834 yards and 19

touchdowns, averaging 6.1 yards per carry and 166.73 yards per game.

His four-year total was 118 yards better than the all-time record set last season by Ricky Williams of Texas.

So Dayne has been selected by Newspaper Enterprise Association as the leading figure on its 1999 All-America college football team.

Praising Dayne, a hard hitter at 5-foot-10 and 252 pounds, ABC Sports broadcaster Bob Crise says: "From the waist

down, he's a shifty halfback. But from the waist up, he's a brute of a fullback."

Quarterback Chad Pennington of Marshall and wide receiver Peter Warrick of top-ranked Florida State are key players on the NEA annual. Defensive end Corey Moore of Virginia Tech is No. 1 on the other side of the ball.

Dating from 1915, the annual All-America college football selections issued by NEA are the oldest of any major news organization.

Dayne ended the regular season by gaining 216 yards vs. Iowa. It was the 11th 200-yard rushing game of his career, which tied the all-time record set by Marcus Allen of Southern Cal.

Rivals knew Dayne was coming; He caught only one pass all season.

His ground total this season was surpassed only by TCU's Tomlinson, the country's rushing leader with 1,850 yards. Tomlinson's 406 yards vs. Texas-El Paso was the best in the history of major college football.

Pennington, who led Marshall to an 11-0 mark during the regular season, was tops among big-time quarterbacks in 1999 with 34 touchdown passes. He completed 255 of 370 passes (nearly 70 percent) for 3,515 yards.

He's just the third QB ever to complete 1,000 career passes.

As FSU went 11-0, Warrick caught 71 passes for 934 yards and eight TDs.

On defense, Moore had 17 sacks for 11-0 Virginia Tech.

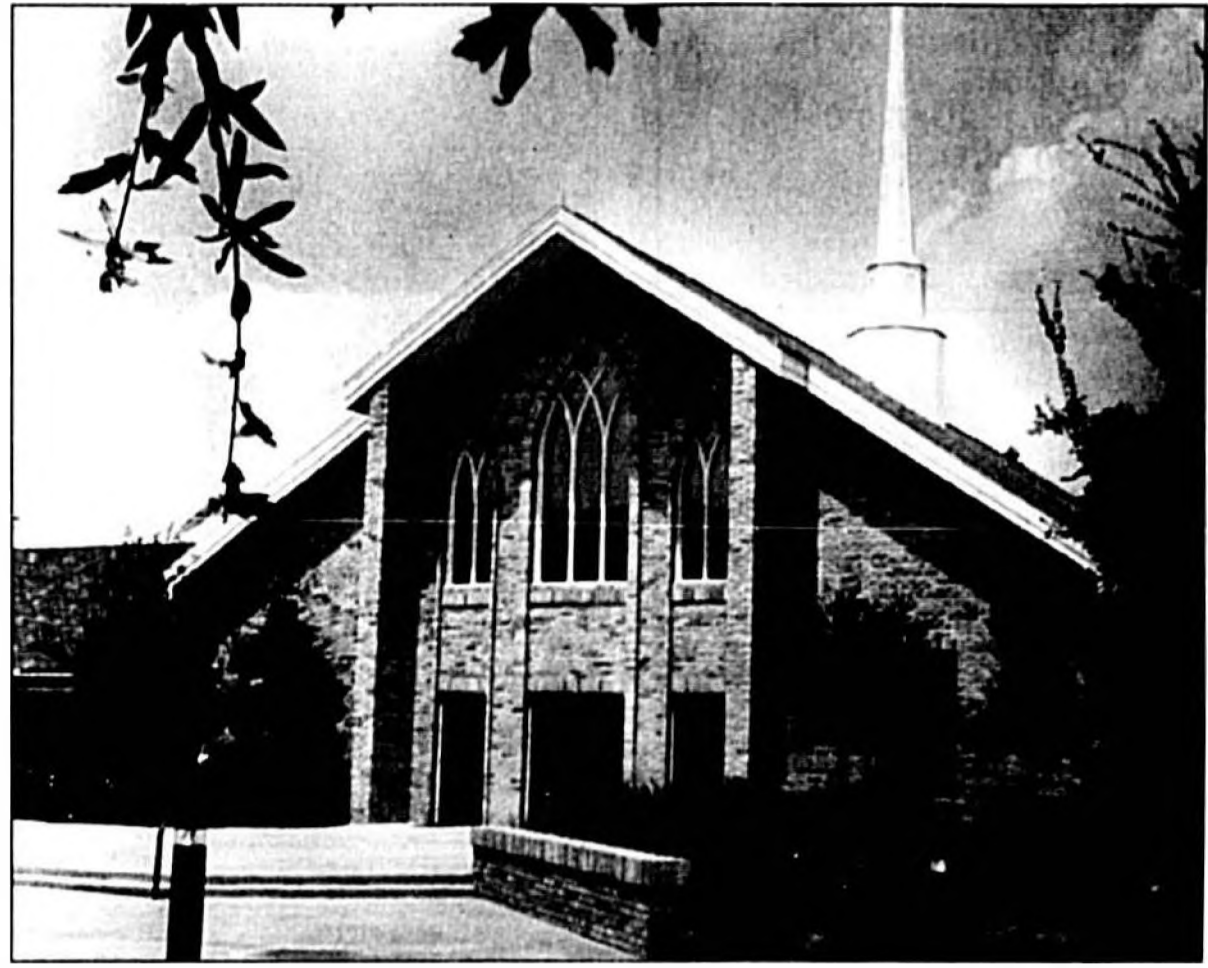

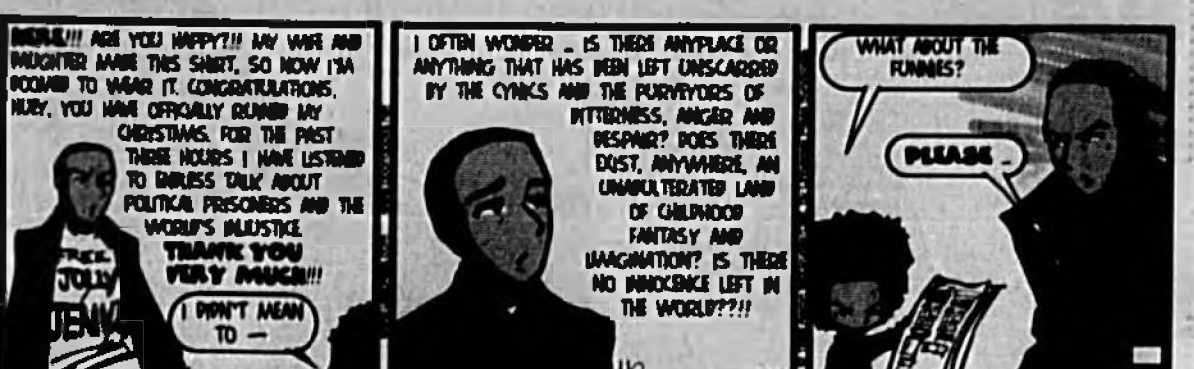

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Win at Bridge

A great piece of declarer-play

In the last two days, I've highlighted a pair of my favorite bidding and defensive deals of the year. To complete the cycle, as baseball commentators like to say, here is a wonderful piece of declarer-play. It was produced by Dick Budd of Maine during the Summer Nationals in San Antonio.

How would you try to make four spades? West leads what you know to be a singleton heart. Apparently West doubled like a man who was confident of the outcome. (That's hard to do at a Nationals, because the auction proceeds silently.)

South won with the heart ace, then led the spade queen. (If you had led the ace and another spade, you would have gone down. West takes his two trump tricks, then exits with the club

king. Even if you win with dummy's ace, discarding your heart loser, and play a diamond to your king, West has two winning defenses: duck, or win and exit with the club queen.)

West returned the club king. However, Budd ruffed in hand, cashed the spade ace, and put West on play with his spade winner. What could West do now? If he tries a low club, declarer would call for dummy's jack and throw both his low red-suit losers on the club winners. If West leads a low diamond, dummy's 10 wins the trick, and South's heart loser evaporates on the club ace. So, West cashed the diamond ace, but Budd was ready — he unblocked the king! This endplayed West again. He had to give two tricks to the dummy, on which South's losers disappeared. Beautiful!

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Doctor Gott

Seek treatment for blackouts

DEAR DR. GOTT: I had a series of events this year that I want to share with you. I'm an active 87-year-old retired dentist. Several months ago, while carrying a chainsaw in my hand, I woke up on the ground. No harm done, fortunately. About a month later, while checking my mailbox, I again found myself on the ground — without warning. Finally, last week, while brushing my teeth, I fainted in the bathroom and sustained a small facial laceration.

When I described these events to my doctor, he looked puzzled and made no comment. What is going on here?

DEAR READER: I am sorry to say that your doctor receives an "F" on his exam; he did not address your problem in an appropriate manner. Your sudden and unannounced episodes are virtually diagnostic of what are called "drop attacks" — patients suddenly faint without

warning, for brief periods. Although there are many causes for such precipitous loss of consciousness, I suspect that your drop attacks are heart-related, given your age.

If the pulse suddenly slows, most people experience lightheadedness or faintness, older folks, however, can pass out without warning.

I remember a typical example of this that I was involved in last month. An 82-year-old woman came to the office with a history almost identical to yours. On exam, she was fine. However, during an outpatient analysis of her pulse rate, she was discovered to have repeated bouts of heart stoppage, lasting up to 10 seconds. Following this, she had a pacemaker implanted and, at last report, was chasing her husband around the kitchen table. Seriously, your symptom should be addressed before you have an accident or suffer serious harm from falling. I urge you to obtain a Holter monitor, a 24-hour analysis of your

pulse rate. This simple and inexpensive test may make the diagnosis. The major disadvantage of the Holter is that your slow pulse may not occur during the recording period. Nonetheless, this is a good first step.

Should your pulse analysis be entirely normal (and I am wrong), you must undergo further testing. Because your doctor stubbed his toe on this one, I advise you to seek a second opinion. Start with an internist and then, if necessary, progress to a cardiologist (for a third opinion). I am so convinced of your diagnosis (called "prolonged asystole") that I doubt these back-up visits will be necessary, however. Regardless of the diagnosis, though, don't delay getting immediate help, before you pass out driving or at the top of your stairs. This condition is potentially serious; don't procrastinate.

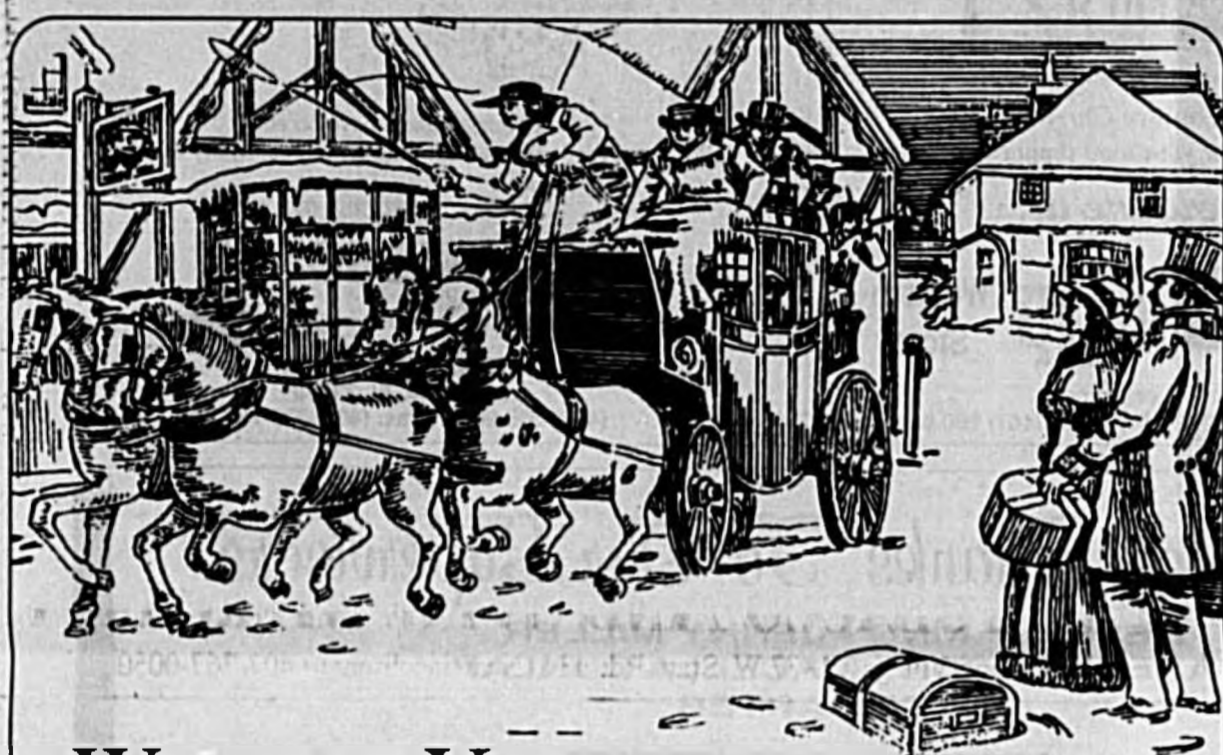

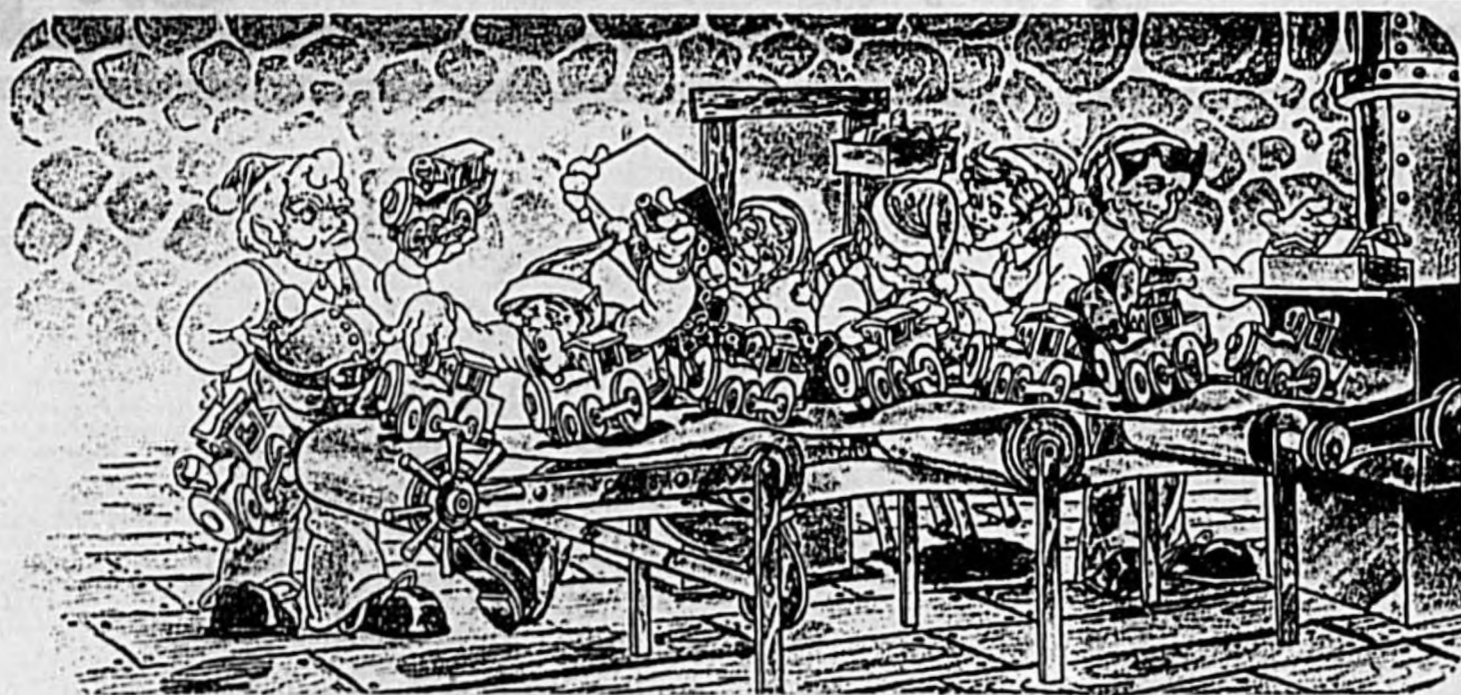


