It is not beyond the range of prospects that Tru-jillo's political heirs may use this stunning event as a new excuse to take the Dominican people toward Comnew excuse to take the munist totalitarianism.


munist totalitarianism. One of the ironles of Trujillo's last months in power was his sudden turning in that direction after long pears in the Facist mold. It was proof, if any be need-ed, that at the foundation totalitarianism uses ideology largely as a weapon and a lever. The late dictator's switch, evidenced by a propa-ganda bombardment of Communist solgans, came after he was quarantined diplomatically by the United States and many other members of the Organization of Ameri-can States. It appeared to be pure revence.

There were indications indeed, that the move ac-tually was producing a quiet concert with Fidel Castro in Cubs, though earlier the two dictators had 'traded in-vasions" and seemed the worst of enemies. No one likes to see assassination employed in poli-tical warfare but alight sympathy will be found for Tru-jillo among free men. Not only had his own regime be-come repressive in the extreme, but he had many times trafficked in plots against Democratic leaders in Vene-suels and other Latin lands. He was a confirmed ex-worter of trouble. porter of trouble.

porter of trouble. Free nations like to belive that change spells op-portunity and progress. But in an unhealthy political society such as prevails in the Dominican Republic, change can spell danger. No alternative of Democratic leadership looms in prospect. Repression has been carried on too long. Neither the trained men nor the means of gaining power

are at hand.

are at hand. On the other side, no successors to Trujillo can hope to match, at least at the outset, the confident inde-pendence with which he pursued his ugly course. Like Castre they are likely to look for friends. This could be another compulsion pushing them toward the totalitar-inniam of Moscow and Peiping. Trujillo's violent death has removed an evil figure from the scene. It has not yet given promise of good things to come for the long-suffering Dominican people.





TAMPA (UPI) - Former, Ka Klux Klan Grand Dragon Bill Hendrix said today a meeting of the "Consolidated Ku Klux Klan" would be held Saturday night at Brandon, where "we are taking off the kid gloves and powder puffs."

Hendrix said he would speak at the meeting, called to consolidate "all right-wing groups into a fight against communiam." He said the organization would accept Catholics and any minister approved by the National Christian College. Hendrix said the Rev. Ores Potito, of the Church of Christ Christian here and in St. Petersburg, would also speak at the meeting. Hendrix said he would represent the National Independent Baptists.

The meeting will mark a return to the Klan arena for Hendriz, who lives at Oldsmar just northwest of here. Hendrix withdrew from Klan work some weeks age after announcing he saw no way to resist school integration except through violence.



Easy On Water, Mayor Urges

The Sanford water supply is being taxed to the Mimit and Mayor Joe Baker urged today that residents ease off on non-essential use of water, especially in the late afternoons.

The long dry spell has increased lawn and plant watering and other uses of water to the point where a new record was set Monday for city consumption. Baker issued this plea to residents:

"Monday, water use in the City of Sanford hit new high with the 24-hour consumption of 8.250 .-517 gallons. The high usage was evident in several areas of the city because of a severe water pressure

drop. This factor became noticeable between 4 p. m. in the afternoon and 8 p. m.

"This is the usual period of highest household consumption, and added to this is the additional demand for lawn and garden watering.

"An additional well has been drilled at the city well field, however, it will be approximately 30 days before it can be tied into the production system. The water plant personnel are maintaining maximum safe pressure on the system.

The people are asked to co-operate by spreading their use of water throughout the day, and to refrain from all but necessary household uses during this critical period of from 4 p. m. to 8 p. m."


