



Commission zips through budget hearing

The Seminole County Commission held what was possibly a record budget hearing Thursday.

With last year's hearings lasting four days, and previous budget hearings taking a week or more, Thursday's meeting was over in less than the time planned — in one day.

The meeting got under way 15 minutes late (8:45 a.m.), with the Sheriff's Office, Environmental Services, Administrative Services and Information Technologies scheduled to be heard in the morning hours. Not only were the presentations quicker than had been planned, but the commissioners also heard presentations from Public Works and Planning and Development, scheduled for the afternoon, and ended the

morning session 15 minutes earlier than planned.

The purpose of the budget hearings was to hear specifics from each department, generally on those matters that have to be added to their previously submitted budget. No decisions were to be made. Those will come only after public hearings during the regular commission meetings in September. The department with the most additions

to the previously submitted budget was the sheriff's budget, presented by Sheriff Don Eslinger.

Previously, Sheriff Eslinger had requested \$56,982,270, which had been trimmed to \$56,450,705. Thursday, the sheriff requested additional money. Sheriff Eslinger is now requesting an additional \$314,000.

Fake checks land six in county jail

Six of eight persons accused of being responsible for the manufacturing and passing of counterfeit business checks in Central Florida have been arrested. All eight are residents of Winter Haven in Polk County.

The leader of the group produced counterfeit business checks using the legitimate account numbers of local businesses. Other members of the group would then cash the counterfeit checks, "split" the deposit among them, or deposit them and immediately withdraw the money from the various banks.

The 39 count indictment included charges of racketeering, conspiracy to commit racketeering, grand theft and/or uttering a forged instrument. The investigation by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and the Office of the Statewide Prosecution documented a total fraud loss of \$43,000. Additionally, the investigation revealed that approximately six businesses had been targeted by the organization.

The six persons who have been booked into the Polk County Jail include Catherine Groover, 44, Rhea Franklin, 23, April Howard, 37, Precious Groover, 37, Deborah Wilson, 35, and Ceresia Lewis, 19.

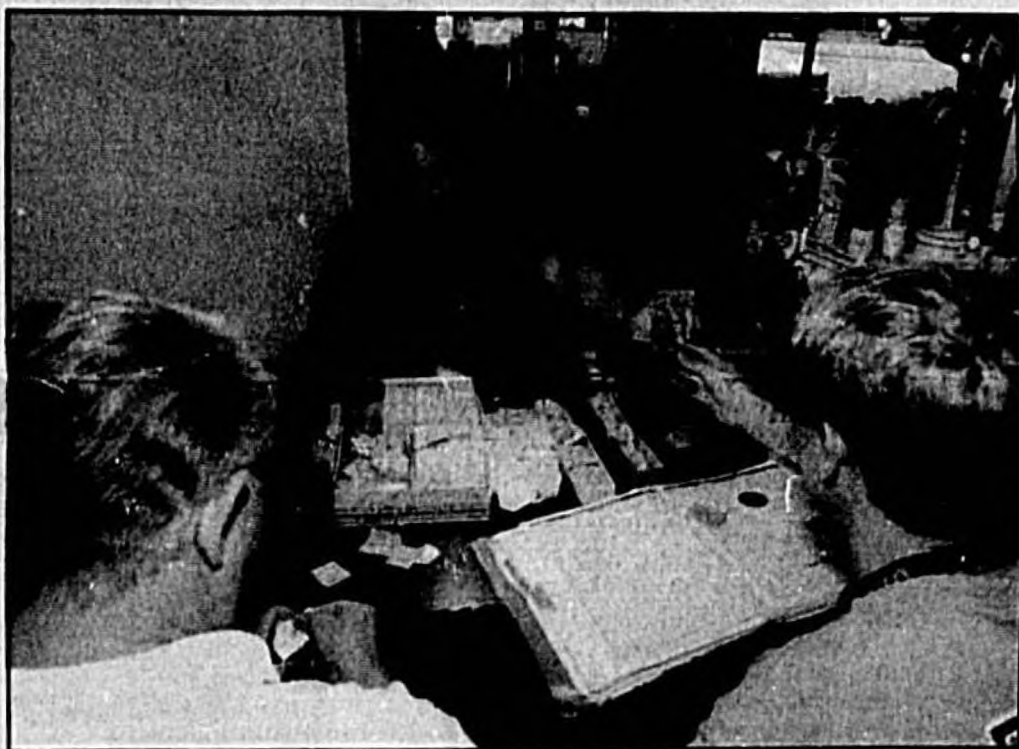
The arrests are the result of lengthy criminal investigations that were conducted through Operation LEGIT (Law Enforcement Getting Identity Thieves). The operation is a statewide taskforce that consists of members of the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, the Florida Highway Patrol and the office of Statewide Prosecution. The taskforce is designed to target major fraud organizations that facilitate their criminal endeavors through identity theft. The investigation is continuing and is expected to result in further indictments and subsequent arrests.

Although initial reports indicate all of the counterfeit activities were in the Polk County area, it may have been spread to other areas of Central Florida.

Sanford's new numismatist loves old money

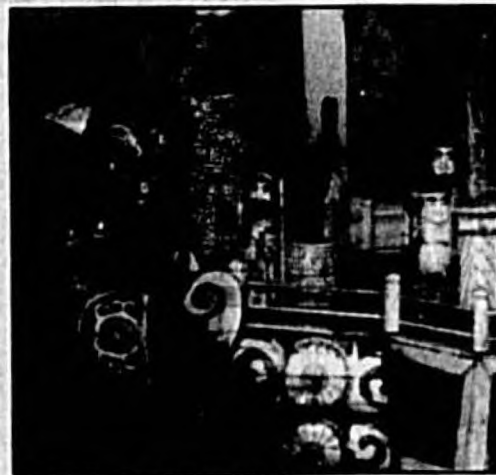

Kenneth Dittmann likes money. In fact, Sanford's newest numismatist doesn't care if it's a nickel or a greenback — if it's got history, he's interested.

Dittmann's downtown store reflects his passion. Inside glass cases, the Stetson graduate showcases some of his latest rare finds. Currency that has been out of circulation for years can be found next to an old gold cameo discovered by chance in someone's attic.

A numismatist by trade, Dittmann deals in coins, currency and estate jewelry. On most days, he can be found buying and selling pieces of history with his regular clients. "That's what I like most about my job,"

Kiwanis establish Weldon memorial

SANFORD — The memory and spirit of Dr. Earl S. Weldon is being kept alive through a new college scholarship created by the Kiwanis Club of Sanford.

Earlier this week, the club presented Seminole Community College President E. Ann McGee with a \$50,000 check in honor of Weldon. The money will be used to establish a scholarship in

Weldon's name, which will help current and future SCC students in their educational endeavors.

"The Kiwanis decided to do this to honor Weldon's service to the Kiwanis and to the community," said Sanford Kiwanis Past President Ron

Weldon, who died in May 2001, was the founding president of SCC. In 1965, the Seminole County School Board selected the 36-year-old Florida native to establish the state's 23rd junior college.

During his tenure as president, Weldon saw the school grow from 600 students to more than 30,000, with 600,000 passing through the college's doors during his 30 years as president.

Weldon, however, was known throughout the area for more than just his academic service. He was an active member in the community and was a 38-year active club member in the Sanford Kiwanis club. He was also board chairman and member of Central Florida Regional Hospital, past president and board member of the Sanford Chamber of Commerce, and a member of the Presidents Council

The staff of The Seminole Herald earned eight awards, including general excellence, in the Florida Press Association's 2001 Better Weekly Newspaper Contest.

Competing in the circulation under 7,000 category, photographer Tommy Vincent, a 28-year veteran of the Herald, won a first-place award in spot news for his picture of an animal control officer capturing a rabid dog.

Vincent also won a third-place award for feature photography for his picture of workers painting the giant flag pole at Memorial Park on the lakefront in Sanford.

Former staff writer Christopher

Patton took home two honors: third place for a feature story detailing the work Seminole County counselors performed in New York City following the Sept. 11 tragedy; and honorable mention in the in-depth reporting category for his articles regarding the problems Sunland Estates residents faced with the development of the Wyndam Place Apartments.

Sports Editor Dean Smith won a third-place award for his story "Dreams do come true" about Sanford natives Tim Raines and Tim Raines Jr. making baseball history by becoming the second father-son duo to play against each other in a Major League game.

Herald staffers won third place in the

special issue category for "The Golden Herald," a week-long, daily publication featuring the athletic feats of senior citizens in the Golden Age Games.

The Herald also won a second-place award for front page layout and third place for general excellence.

"Our staff has worked hard to produce a quality newspaper for the community," said Editor Dan Ping. "These awards are nice, but we can't become complacent. We must continue to improve with every issue to deliver a quality newspaper for the citizens of Seminole County."

Judged by the North Carolina Press Association, the contest received 2,113 entries from 91 Florida newspapers.

**Elect my wife, please:** The curve ball of the week came from the McLain camp — Barbara McLain. The trial balloon floating Around The Clock indicates she's contemplating a run for her husband's District 5 Seminole County Commission seat.

When asked, McLain said, "At this point I'm not ready to make any comment." Doesn't sound like she's ruled it out, does it?

The position may be vacated because Daryl McLain is pondering his own race against Florida Speaker of the House Tom Feeney for the newly created 24th Congressional District.

**Around the Clock** Evidently the McLains believe running against Feeney is not challenging enough.

I'm not sure two campaigns in one family is wise. Daryl McLain is well-known in Seminole County, but if he hopes to beat Feeney, he'll need to spend a lot of time in Orange, Brevard and Volusia counties. In a congressional campaign, that often means being in several places at the same time. Usually the spouse serves as a surrogate at events where the candidate's schedule won't allow him or her to attend. If Barbara is running her own race, she won't be available for that role.

Then there's the "dynasty" factor. The Kennedys and Bushes have made politics the family business, but plenty of voters are suspicious of candidates who trade on the family name. Barbara is certainly capable of being her own woman, but many will assume — fairly or not — that Daryl is pulling the strings. Lurleen Wallace is the classic example. When husband George could not run for governor of Alabama because of term limits in the 1960s, Lurleen took his place on the ballot. She won, but no one believed Lurleen was running the show.

There is an interesting twist to the McLain story. According to Seminole County Elections Supervisor Sandra Goard, if Daryl McLain qualifies to run for congress by July 19, he must also submit an irrevocable resignation for his county commission seat. The vacancy would be filled through the primary and general elections this fall.

But what if he qualifies for congress but doesn't resign from the commission? Goard said that would constitute an "automatic and immediate resignation," and Governor Jeb Bush would appoint someone to fill the vacancy until a new commissioner is elected and sworn in on Nov. 19. Think of the possibilities. McLain qualifies against Feeney, doesn't resign and Bush appoints Barbara McLain, allowing her to run as a quasi-incumbent.

I'm betting the odds are against that, but so far Election 2002 has yielded more than its share of curve balls.

**The Big Mo:** It looks like the city is serious about enacting the Big Mo — as in moratorium on new apartment construction.

City Manager Tony VanDerworp sent a memo to city commissioners seeking approval for the staff to prepare an ordinance creating nine month stoppage on multi-family residential developments, with the possibility of a six month extension.

It will take a couple of weeks before commissioners will discuss the memo. The item is not on Monday's agenda, and the commission will not have a work session because there is an executive session scheduled Monday afternoon for union negotiations.

Mayor Brady Lessard and Mike Skat, chairman of the Planning and Zoning Commission, are discussing other alternatives, which could include incentives (landscaping, help with stormwater retention) to persuade property owners with multi-family zoning to downgrade to a less intense use.

Expect a lot of debate in the next few months concerning apartment development.

An interesting tidbit from VanDerworp's memo is how the character of Sanford will change in the near future. Since 1999, the city has issued development orders for 5,432 apartment units and 2,292 single family lots. When all of those units are built, there will be 1,500 more renter-occupied units than owner-occupied. The city will have a total of 11,707 (53.4 percent) apartment units and 10,181 owner-occupied units (46.5 percent).

That's a lot of apartments, especially when you consider that according to city numbers there were 7,889 owner units (55.4 percent) versus 6,348 renter units (44.6 percent) in the year 2000.

### Drug Arrest

The checks were valued at \$681 and \$411. Mullins was arrested on a charge of uttering a forged instrument.

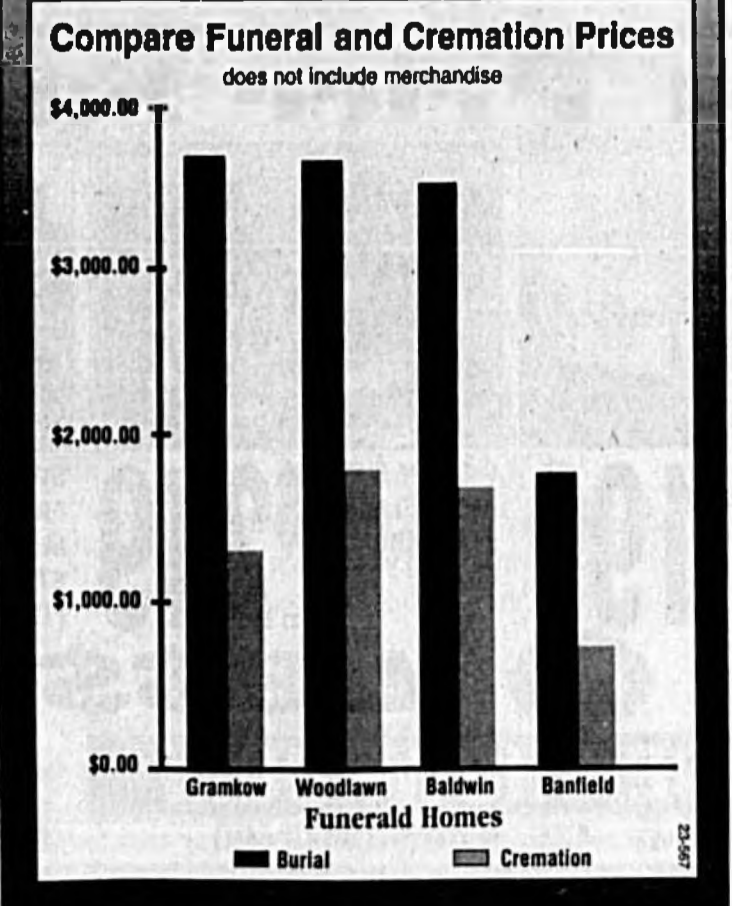

## Well Done

**FCAT scores rank Seminole among the state's elite school systems**

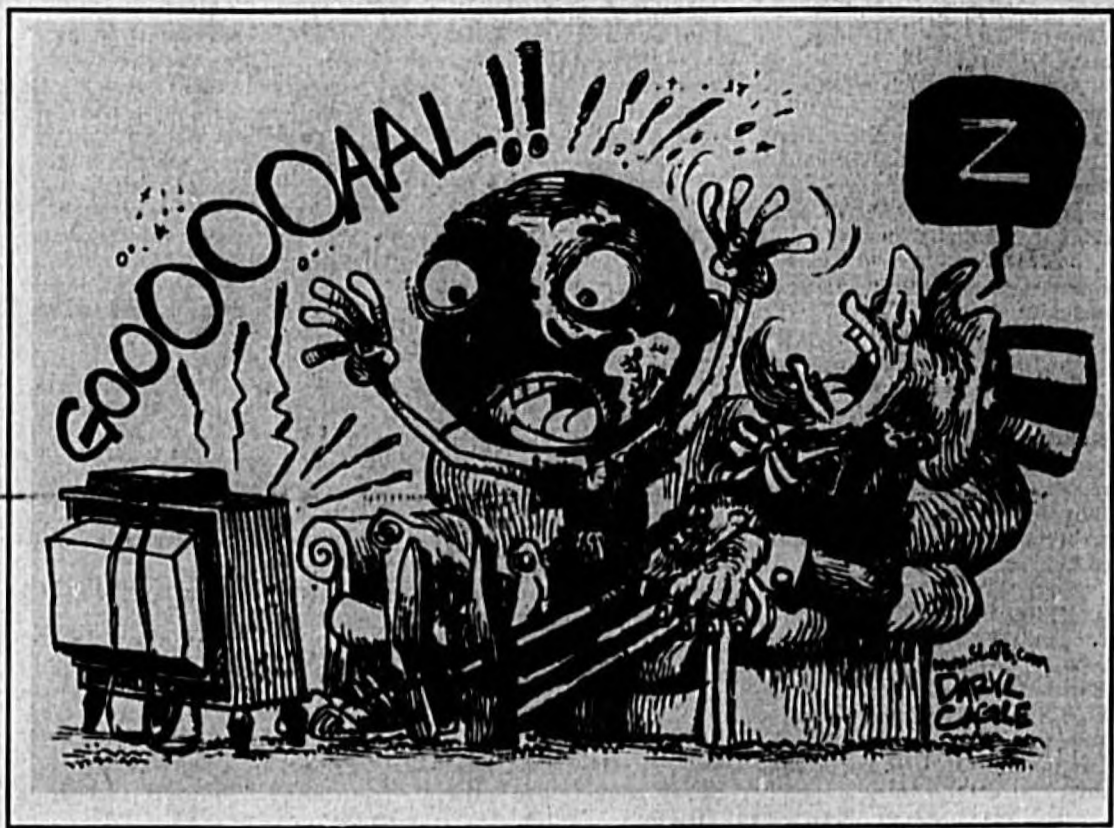
Congratulations are in order for the outstanding Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test (FCAT) scores posted by Seminole County students. Once again, our schools are among the state's elite thanks to the hard work of students, parents, teachers and administrators — each group vital to creating a quality school system.

Here are just a few of the numbers:

- Nearly two-thirds (33 of 51) of the county schools earned an "A" on the FCAT Report Card.
- 81 percent of elementary schools earned either an "A" or "B." That's noteworthy because it indicates Seminole County Schools are doing a good job with the youngest students and providing them with solid learning skills and the motivation to excel academically in future years.
- The success didn't stop at the elementary level — 10 of the county's 11 middle school earned an "A." The eleventh school, Millennium, notched a "B." Sanford Middle earned its "A" after receiving a "C" last year.
- Most impressive of all, only two schools received lower grades than they did last year. Not every school will earn an "A," but every school can improve on their scores. For some, the improvements will be small. Others like Sanford Middle may see big jumps. Whatever the case, it's important that each school continue to show gains.

Not all the news about the FCAT scores is satisfactory. Six schools received "Cs" and one received a "D." The situation is not dire, however. Clearly there is a commitment by the school system to excel. These seven schools still have work to do and will continue to improve. With 44 other schools receiving top grades, administrators know where they need to focus their attention.

Testing has its flaws, but in order to establish standards, there must be some way to measure performance. For now, that measurement is test scores, and Seminole County students continue to pass with flying colors.



## There goes the neighborhood ... to North Carolina

Summer officially started this past Friday afternoon. It's nothing new — happens every year — nothing will change. Our daily rains will not take on a new pattern and the temperatures won't change much. Actually, it's nothing to celebrate — though it does bear a mention. Summer, in the northern hemisphere, begins on June 21, the summer solstice, and continues until Sept. 22, when it becomes fall or autumn.

In the southern hemisphere, winter started Friday. Generally, it's the time of year when the sun is directly over a particular area, thus

giving that place the most sunlight in any given day. At the equator, daylight on June 21 is supposed to be 12 hours eight minutes in length, increasing as one travels north until he reaches the Arctic Circle, where daylight is 24 hours a day.

I recall a visit to Alaska. (Probably many of you have witnessed the same thing). I was in a hotel room in a southern port city, and awoke around 3 a.m. I looked out the window at the harbor and watched the boats pulling in and out. It was like broad daylight. The sun was circling around the horizon and not going

overhead as it does here in Florida. Although it's a common sight for people up there in Alaska, it is a sight I'll never forget.

About the only difference we see in Florida in the summer, and late spring, is the exodus of residents to summer homes up north. We often talk about the Snowbirds who come down here from the north when the snow starts falling.

But, for example, think of the people in such places as North Carolina. There is an area of North Carolina where one will find so many Florida folks, including many I personally know from here in Sanford and Lake Mary, that seeing a Seminole County license tag up there is quite normal.

Our folks stay up there for

six to eight weeks in the summer time, then come back here — where they reunite with people who were their neighbors in North Carolina. It's not just families which go there for the summer — it's often entire neighborhoods.

Our visitors down here dwindle at this time of year. Except for the fact that school is out up there and the children want to visit our attractions, very few folks want to suffer from our heat and the threat of a hurricane or summer rains.

So, for all those who are heading north, have a good summer. For those up north who are coming down here for a vacation, enjoy the summer days of Central Florida and don't judge us by the weather conditions.

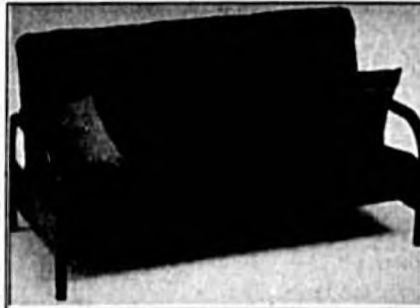

# The Way We Were: Remembering McReynolds Drug Store

My longtime friend Don Knight has done a wonderful thing by helping preserve the history of a beloved Sanford institution, McReynolds Drug Store.

Many of you will remember that Don worked for McReynolds Drug Company

for many years, 1944-53 to be exact.

It was a special experience for him as it was for many others, so he requested memories from those he could remember working there and has compiled those into a booklet.

Approximately 50 former employees were contacted and there were 14 responses. The memories of these span the years 1944-65, and their reminiscences are mostly about the 2500 Sanford Avenue location of the store. Those articles are in the booklet with the following listed with the years of their employment:

Don Knight (1944-53), Dickie and Viola (Skinner) Frank (1944-48); James Manning (1944-49); Beatrice Brown Posey (1950-53); Betty Gatlin Brode (1951-54 and 55-57); Betty J. Earnest Williams (1952-54); Wesley Dees (1952-56); James M. Moys (1954-58); Ashby Jones (1955-65); and Minnie Kennedy (11-years).

Other employees mentioned were Harold Marsh, Watson "Bid" Jennings, Bobby Moye, Virginia Lee, Charles Benton, Richard Phagan, Pat Donahue, Charles Lansing, Clyde Huit, Roscoe Taylor, Jean Gatlin, Paul Hodgins, Mar. Barfield and Mrs. Wallace.

I have used their wonderful memories plus newspaper clippings and interviews with Don Knight to compile a history of sorts on McReynolds Drug Store, a real Sanford institution. It will be in three parts.

There is a special place for McReynolds Drug store in the hearts of all Sanfordites of a certain age, so I hope you will

enjoy going back to "the days of yesteryear" to reminisce about a special place and special man, Dr. A.C. McReynolds.

Most of us knew him as Dr. A.C. McReynolds, Doc McReynolds or Dr. Mac, but his given name was Alfred Clarence McReynolds.

He was a World War II veteran and a graduate of the Atlanta College of Pharmacy. In 1926 he sold his share in a drugstore in Maryville, Tenn. and headed for Florida. After searching, Central Florida he decided to locate in Sanford and opened McReynolds Drug Co. at the corner of Sanford Avenue and 25th Street. He remained there until 1960.

McReynolds was an old-fashioned corner drugstore, complete with curb service, soda fountain, soda jerks, curb hops, merchandise, medications and friendly service.

McReynolds was the place to go for families and teenagers following a special event, after school, on weekends, or to satisfy a yem for a milkshake, cherry coke, chocolate soda or ice cream in a sugar cone. The milkshakes there were the best around and people did come from far and wide to indulge.

Doc McReynolds employed a large number of teenagers during his 42 years as owner and pharmacist of McReynolds. He taught them the business plus many good values. Many of them stated that he was a second father to them.

For 20 years, Doc worked from 7:30 a.m. to 11 p.m., seven days a week without a day off, as it was impossible to hire another druggist. Eventually, Dr. Albert C. Rector was hired about 1946 and during the 1960's, Dr. Gordon Kellett was employed.

In 1960, Sanford Avenue was widened which eliminated the curb service, so the drugstore was moved to 2553 Park Drive. Curb service continued, but only for a short while. McReynolds remained a very busy place and continued to be a favorite hangout for teenagers after school.

From their comments one can tell that his employees respected Doc McReynolds and believed he treated them fairly. Many told how he helped them

out in various ways — loaning a car to one to help her take a driving test, and would stay with another if her ride home were late.

A few of the adjectives used to describe him were considerate, understanding, helpful, flexible, easy going, honest, kind, caring, and a dedicated professional.

Other statements included the following: "He helped build character in his employees." "He was instrumental in helping young people have a pleasant working atmosphere"; "He had an impact on a lot of people's lives"; "He taught us pride in our work and in ourselves"; and "His door was always open for those needing help or advice."

He was described as rarely getting upset, always pleasant, and easy to work for as long as you obeyed his rules.

Doc was credited with getting Viola Skinner and Dickie French together as he would have Dickie ride home with her on their bikes when they worked nights.

Some insights were also given regarding Doc's habits. He smoked El Verson Bouquet cigars held by a small dark brown cigar holder which was firmly clenched between his teeth. There was a special place on a display cabinet where he would put his cigar while waiting on a customer.

When he took a restroom break, he would say, "I'm going to hit the ivory." When a person thanked him, his answer was, "You're as welcome as anyone would be and more than some folks." When sending out for food, he would say that he was going to scarf down something to eat.

Doc loved to listen to the news and his beloved St. Louis Cardinals on a little table radio kept between the cigars. His employees also began to root for the Cardinals.

In the mornings, Doc would do his daily constitution, which he called "polishing the ivory." This would be followed by gargling, eye, ear and nose drops, brushing teeth, etc. Along with these activities some strange noises often.

His employees loved him and the city of Sanford respected him. He was a great man.

## Space weather is topic of Science Center forum

Before rockets and radios, cell phones and satellites, we probably never would have noticed the effects of space storms.

But in today's electrically powered, space-faring world, the greatest space storm of the twenty-second solar maximum rang like a wake-up call. We are now in the midst of another solar maximum, the effects of which are expected to be felt all the way through the year 2004.

As our society grows increasingly dependent on advanced space-based systems for a range of activities, we become more vulnerable to changes in the space environment. Those changes, collectively referred to as "space weather," can damage or destroy spacecraft systems, cause electrical power networks on the ground to fail, and disrupt radio communications.

Come hear Ramon Lopez, author of "Storms from the Sun," talk about the emerging science of space weather at the Orlando Science Center on Saturday, June 22. He will host a discussion at two times: 12:15 and 1:15 p.m.

Daniel to challenge Morris county post

Local businessman Bill Daniel has announced his candidacy for Republican nomination for the Seminole County Commission District 2 race.

He will face incumbent Randy Morris in the Sept. 10 primary election. Daniel is President and operator of Bill's Airboat Adventures, Inc. He was recently awarded the "Best Promotion Idea" award by the Seminole County Convention and Visitors Bureau for his promotion of Seminole County Tourism and his airboat business, which will be featured on television shows.

Daniel said he believes a change is needed on the county commission. He has a background in the construction industry and is noted for his conservation work. He has a balanced outlook on the issues facing the county.

"There are many clear differences between myself and the incumbent," he said. "For one, I will work only for the people. Daniel is nearly a life-long resident of Central Florida,

Most of the money would go toward the hiring of ten new officers; four detention deputies at the jail, four control room monitors at the jail and two deputies for District 4, (the UCF area).

"I'm glad to hear of the two deputies in the UCF area," commented Commission Chairman Daryl McLain, "the people in that area have complained that we need more officers there."

Ealinger observed that with the additional request, his budget would be 7.3 percent higher than last year, rather than 6.8 percent higher than had been anticipated.

In summing up his department's operation, the sheriff pointed out that Seminole County now has the lowest crime rate since 1973, "and I'm certain our operation has a lot to do with it."

Bob Adolphe spoke for the Environmental Services department, asking for two additional senior operators for his department, which would increase his budget request by \$84,796.

Among new projects planned

for this forthcoming fiscal year, he listed installation emergency power at critical well sites and critical liftstations, the rehabilitation of the water system, work on the sewer system, and others.

Jamie Croteau addressed the Administrative Services budget, stressing work which will be needed on some of the county's aging facilities. "Many of our buildings are 20 years old," he said, "and are certainly overdue for maintenance." He added that the county presently has 1.4 million square feet of facilities, at 120 separate locations.

Although scheduled for an afternoon session, Gary Johnson spoke in the morning about the Public Works department. He said he expects the State to come up with more restrictions and demands on the stormwater project, and he expects the needs in that area will increase drastically in the next few years.

During the discussion on the drainage and stormwater issue, Commissioner Dick Van der Weide brought up the suggestion

that the department and the county look into installing sprinkler monitors at various locations, those being required to turn off automatic sprinklers whenever there is a rainfall.

Chairman McLain suggested the county install those monitors at all county locations.

Johnson also spoke of resurfacing projects that had been held back recently, but commented on the need to replace certain stoplights with new mast arms.

Commissioner Malloy objected to that point. "I would rather see resurfacing than fancy new stoplight masts," he said.

Johnson responded that perhaps some of the resurfacing projects could be put back earlier than anticipated, but stressed that the mast arms were more than a beautification matter. "They help in stormwater matters as well."

Cris Grasso spoke on the budget for the Information Technologies Department, reporting that an increase in the budget request would be needed to purchase three vans to replace those which

are old and worn out.

The Planning and Development Department, led by Don Fisher and Dick Foyer, discussed transportation, especially the ADA (Americans with Disability Act). Fisher said all cities within the county are regularly asked to join in the funding, but not all had agreed as yet.

County manager Kevin Grace reported that all cities except Longwood and Winter Springs have tentatively agreed to help the funding. "Longwood has definitely said no," he commented, "and Winter Springs is still making that decision, but I expect they will support it." (Winter Springs City Commission is scheduled to consider the matter at the June 24 commission meeting).

Although there were a number of interested citizens in the audience at the budget hearings, public input will wait until the formal budget hearings in September.

The new budget, as finalized, will take effect at the beginning of the Fiscal Year 2002/03, which will start on October 1 of this year.

## Radio Field Day starts Saturday

It's an annual event and open to the public. Each year, an assortment of Amateur Radio enthusiasts gather at a particular place, and, along with other radio operators throughout North America, and other nations, go into competition to see who can receive various communications from others.

The local event is under the auspices of the Lake Monroe Amateur Radio Society (LMARS) and the Amateur Radio Emergency Services (ARES) consisting of local area operators.

Field Day was designed to test operators' abilities to set up and operate portable stations under emergency conditions.

Last year, over 35,000 amateur radio operators across North America participated in the event.

Norman Lauterette, public information officer for the American radio relay league said the local event, last year, drew over 40 members to the rally, held at Lake Golden Park at the airport. A number of local officials were also on hand.

In 1994, Weldon was awarded the Florida Association of Community College President's Award for Professional Excellence. In May 2001, Weldon received the Leadership Legends Award for his role in the development of higher education and growth in Seminole County. For his dedicated community involvement, he also received posthumously the Mrs. Ralph A. Smith Community Service plaque presented by the Salvation Army

of Seminole County.

According to Jim Barks, who serves on the Kiwanis Scholarship Committee, the money for the Weldon endowment was raised through the club's numerous fund-raisers and memorials made to the club throughout the years. With smart investing, the amount of money has grown to total more than \$100,000.

The 6-foot senior forward, who is headed for the University of South Alabama in Mobile, was the leading scorer for a team that went 28-5 before losing the State Semifinals.

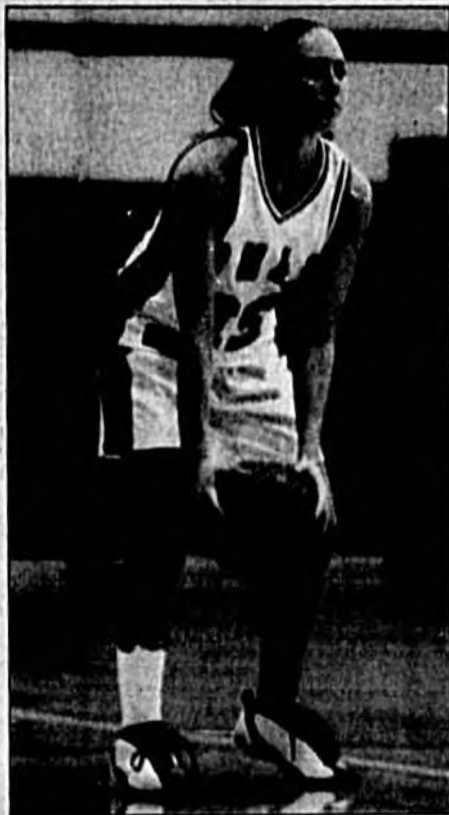
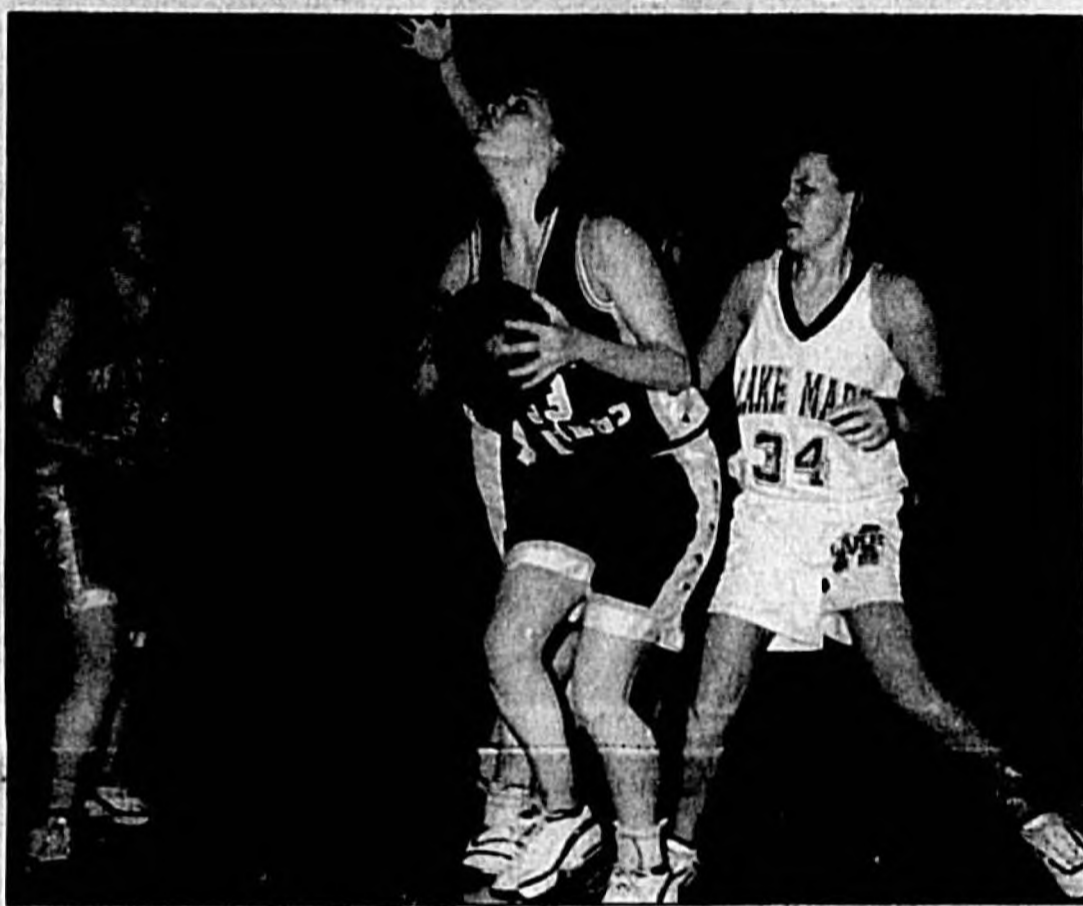
Also earning recognition on Class 5A Honorable Mention list was Winter Springs' starting guards, Missy Guadagnino and Sally Johnston.

## Hidden treasure

*Morgan's Gourmet Café offers old-world charm*

Visitors come to historic downtown Sanford to hunt for treasure in antique shop after antique shop along the quaint, brick-covered, turn-of-the-century main street.

Just walk down the street and the architecture makes you feel as if you have traveled back a hundred years. (Actually, many of the buildings were rebuilt out of brick in 1887 after the big fire. Twenty-three of these quaint downtown structures are on the National Register of Historic Places.)

The real treasure, however, is not to be found in any of the antique shops. The gem of your day of hunting is to find Morgan's Gourmet Café.

Arriving early for a Friday luncheon, the atmosphere was more than charming. The interior reminds you of the restored and renovated restaurants in New Orleans. Antique red brick interior walls, golden-painted, pressed-tin covering the high ceiling and a dark mahogany colored wooden bar just ooze with old-world charm. The brick walls are tastefully covered with photos of old buildings, wines and then

there is that terrific sketch of Don Knotts in his full Barney Fife regalia. Nearby you will immediately see the chalkboard of specials under the green and yellow carved mahi.

We were quickly seated at an intimate window side table overlooking the bricked alley patio that was dotted with wrought iron tables. Living in Florida, I have learned to enjoy

air-conditioning, but the outside patio was quickly filled with antique hunters and a few Seminole County Deputies. (This gorgeous town on the south shore of Lake Monroe, head of the St. Johns River, is the seat of Seminole County and the County Courthouse is just a few blocks away.)

We began to review the menu as the café began to quickly (and I mean quickly) fill up with local business people and tables and tables of antique hunters. There is a distinct classy, yet casual, atmosphere that invites you to relax and enjoy the great gourmet food. Businessmen loosen their ties and antique hunters rest their treasures. The deputies never did seem to totally relax, although they did their

best.

The lunch menu had a tremendous selection of appetizers, "Sanford's Best Salads," pasta dishes, gourmet sandwiches, wraps and desserts. For an appetizer I sampled the Broiled Portabella Mushroom. The melted provolone cheese mixed with the homemade marinara sauce and meaty steaming hot mushroom to deliver a truly tasty beginning. You might also try the Spanakopita, Crab Cakes, Potstickers (with a fantastic Ponzu sauce), or the Roasted Duck Quesadillas. I had the quesadillas on another visit and they were refreshingly different and wonderful.

The appetizer you must try is the Celery City Bread. For the uninitiated, Sanford was one of the nation's largest shippers of vegetables in the early 1900s and was nicknamed Celery City at that time. Now I know it seems odd to rave about a bread appetizer, but you won't think so after you try it. It is a baguette-like bread that is toasted to a delicate crunch and has a soft center and a warm, soft, cheesy herb topping with some special ingredients. The ingredients are a secret, just ask your server. I have discovered them, but will not tell. I can assure you, you will not easily guess them. Just crunch and enjoy.

For an entrée, I sampled the Chicken Picatta. It was tremendous, of course, and just a little different that I had expected. I always enjoy going to Morgan's to try to discover the different ingredients in the classic dishes with an added touch. The Blackened Tuna was great. It was a large piece of yellow fin tuna, that was cooked well on the outside, yet rare on the inside. The Cajun spices were hot enough to mix well with the moist and juicy fish, but not

the usual sear-off-your-taste-buds, crunchy-crust, burnt and spicy blackened shoe leather you sometimes get when you order something "blackened."

Oh, I forgot to tell you that the potato salad that came with the tuna was spectacular. Along with the perfectly cooked, large red-potato pieces, was a nice mixture of mayo, celery and dill pickles. (Yes, pickles. Don't think about it, just enjoy. Be careful if you think the pickle slice on your plate is the same kind. It is not. It is a very spicy surprise.)

The pasta entrees are generous portions of meaty dishes served over linguine and include Shrimp Scampi, Cajun Grouper Alfredo, Chicken Picatta, Shrimp and Portabella Mushroom Marinara and more. The gourmet sandwiches include a Prime Rib sandwich, Crab Cake Sandwich, BLT (double smoked bacon and vine ripened tomato), Certified Black Angus Burger, Smothered Chicken Sandwich (sautéed onions, bell peppers, provolone cheese) and more.

The service has been great on all my visits. Although I suspect I was served a glass of Pinot Grigio instead of Chardonnay on my last visit.

Before ending your meal, you cannot leave until you order the chocolate covered strawberries. The were the largest (seriously, they looked too big to be strawberries), sweetest, most succulent strawberries I have tasted. No kidding.

This was just lunch. Morgan's has a totally different and very gourmet menu for dinner. Luckily for me, that will have to be another story. I will tell you that the times I went for dinner were memorable and there was always a very different special available,

including rabbit, venison or — well you will just have to go.

The owner and head chef, Mike Morgan, loves to cook and is constantly trying new dishes and adding his own personal touches. You will not find the his Ponzu sauce, She-Krab soup, the Celery City Bread, etc. anywhere else but here.

If you like the idea of a chef/owner who runs a hands-on gourmet restaurant, then just look toward the rear of the building. There you will see — in the very small, very crowded kitchen — a serious looking, constantly moving, pony-tailed chef, who is either cooking or directly overseeing every dish that goes on every table in his restaurant. That is Mike Morgan. This is not the snooty, strolling executive chef that saunters around the restaurant asking, "And how is everything today?" This is a driven gourmet chef/owner that thrives on creating and cooking great gourmet meals. His reputation (and name) are on the line with every plate that leaves the kitchen.

He knows that every plate that leaves the kitchen must make a great impression. After eating there, you will know that, too.

Morgan's Gourmet Café is located at 112 East First Street, Sanford. Lunch is served 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Wednesday and 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Thursday through Saturday. Dinner is served 5 to 10 p.m. Thursday through Saturday. The telephone number is 407-688-4745.

The Seminole County Public Schools Pre-K Program is registering children who will be 4 years old on or before Sept. 1, 2002, for the upcoming school year.

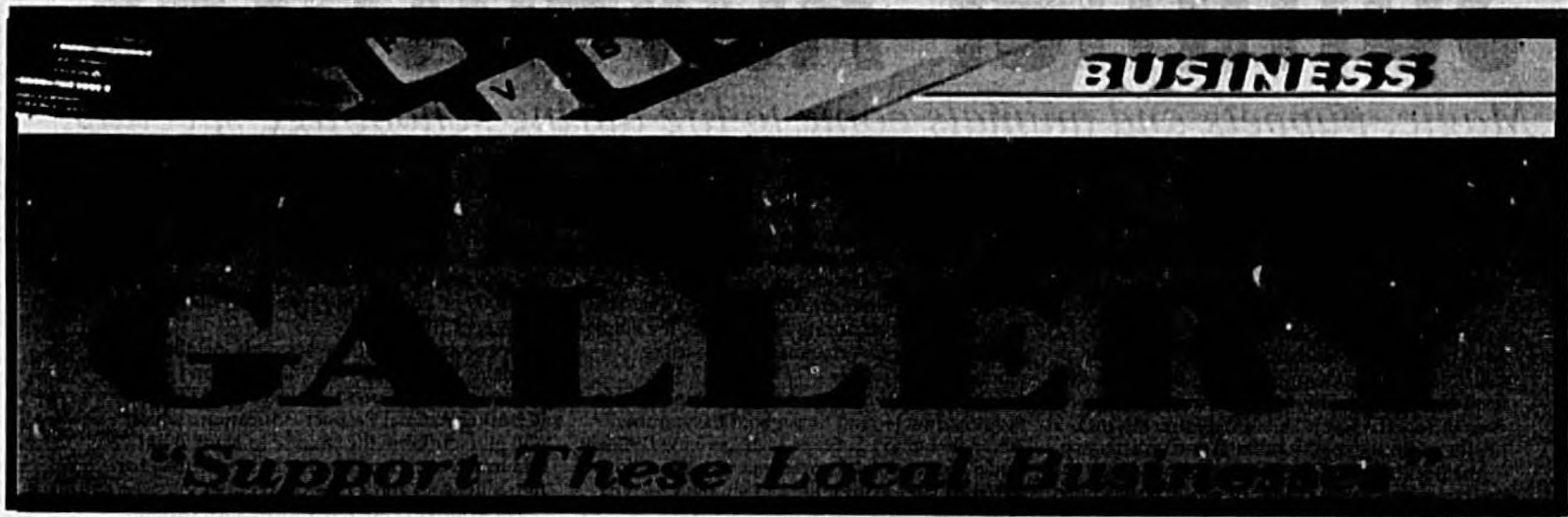
Parents must be working full-time and meet certain income guidelines to qualify for Pre-K services. Families must also reside in Seminole County.

# Fertilization important practice to keep plants healthy and strong

Fertilization is probably the second most important practice that needs to be done to keep your plants growing healthy. It is very important to apply just enough fertilizer to meet the nutritional needs of the plants, but not so much as to encourage excessive growth, or pollute our lakes and waterways with fertilizer-contaminated runoff.

apply to plants in a bed is determined by calculating the area of the bed and then

applying fertilizer at the rate of 1 pound of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of bed area. This calculation is easily done by dividing the nitrogen content into 100, to get the number of pounds of fertilizer to apply per 1,000 square feet.

### Fertilization

Fertilizing plants usually results in growth and production of leaves, stems, branches, and roots. This growth consequently will produce additional maintenance costs and more yard trimmings to be disposed of, so it is necessary to determine if we want our plants to grow. Fertilization is also a way to prevent or correct nutrient deficiencies, as when acid-loving plants are growing in soils with a high pH.

Fertilization is usually desirable when we are trying to establish new plants in the yard. Fertilize after four to six weeks after planting, and then two to three times per year the following three years or so. Established plants should be fertilized twice a year, usually in March and September in Central Florida.

### Amount Of Fertilizer

The amount of fertilizer to

Because the fertilizer recommendations are given on a 1,000 square feet basis, first divide the area of the bed by 1,000. Multiply this result by the pounds of fertilizer needed per 1,000 square feet to get the total amount of fertilizer to apply to the bed. For example, if your bed is 20 feet long and 10 feet wide the area is 200 square feet. If the fertilizer analysis is 10-5-10, the first number is the percentage of nitrogen in the fertilizer.

Divide that number (10) into 100 to obtain the pounds of fertilizer needed to cover 1,000 square feet, which in this case is 10.

Divide the area of the bed, in this case 200 square feet, by 1,000 to obtain the actual area to be covered, which in this case is 0.2. Then multiply 0.2 by the number of pounds of fertilizer needed, which was 10 pounds in our example. The result is 2 pounds of fertilizer needed to cover the entire bed area. Simple?

### What Fertilizer To Use

A complete fertilizer with a ratio of 3:1:2 or 3:1:3, such as 12-4-8 or 15-5-15 are recommended. Fertilizers that are "slow-release", "controlled-release", or "sulfur-coated", have a more extended release period than the readily water-soluble fertilizers.

A well formulated fertilizer should contain 30 to 50 percent of the nitrogen in the water-insoluble or slow-release form. It should also contain 30 to 50 percent of the potassium in the slow-release form. A fertilizer containing magnesium is often needed in most Florida soils.

Water-soluble fertilizers are less expensive than slow-release fertilizers, but water-soluble fertilizers tend to leach quickly through the soil and past the root system.

Water-soluble fertilizers represent a greater risk of water pollution than slow-release fertilizers. Micronutrient deficiencies can be corrected with foliar sprays if deficiencies are not severe.

Deficiencies may be prevented by applying a fertilizer with micronutrients to the soil. For specific plants such as azaleas and camellias, citrus, and palms, specific formulations are available in the market to cover the specific needs of those plants.

### Fertilizer Application

Because of the naturally high oxygen concentration

near the soil surface, a plant's principal feeding roots are usually within the top 10 to 14 inches of soil. Many roots of mulched plants are located just beneath the mulch on the soil surface.

Therefore, the fertilizer should be applied to the surface of the soil or mulch and there is no need to inject or place fertilizer deep in the soil.

Mulches are recommended to promote faster growth of plants by eliminating competition from weeds for water and nutrients.
