Great Stinnes Industrial Enterprises Are Declared To Be Almost Bankrupt

NEW YORK, June 6.—The great
machine built up by Hugo Stinnes
German magnate, has shown signs
of tottering. Carried on by heirs
through the famous "family coun-
cil" which he organized, the Stinnes
concern has nevertheless felt the
lack of money. Fearing its col-
lapse, Berlin advises say a group
of German banks have decided to
loan the firm 40,000,000 marks. The
banks were impelled by fear that
collapse of the great machine
would have effect on the economic
life of the country.

Net Bankrupt, It Report.
BERLIN, June 6.—The Stinnes
enterprises are not bankrupt. A
credit of \$15,000,000 was granted
by the German bank Friday at the
behest of the elder Stinnes, which
takes the industrial empire out of
its temporary difficulties.

Failure to Live Up to Ver-
sailles Treaty Shown In
Note Sent to Berlin; Reduc-
tion of Army Commanded

LONDON, June 6.—Germany's
failure to carry out the disarma-
ment requirements of the Versaille
treaty, were outlined in detail
in the note that the allied powers
have presented to the German gov-
ernment, the text of which was
made public here Friday. The note
was handed to Chancellor Luther
in Berlin yesterday by Baron
Albrecht, the British ambassador,
representing the council of ambassa-
dors.

Germany must comply with an
extensive list of rectifications and
demands before the disarmament
obligations of the peace treaty are
considered fulfilled, justifying con-
tinuation of evacuation with the
first or Cologne zone of occupa-
tion in accordance with the Ver-
sailles pact and the withdrawal of
the allied control commission.

Could Reconstitute Army.
After referring to previous com-
munications and the report of the
control commission which estab-
lished Germany's shortcomings the
note states the allied governments
"consider it of capital importance
to place in the foreground of their
attention that the defaults unless
promptly rectified would in the ag-
gregate enable the German govern-
ment eventually to reconstitute an
army modeled on the principle of
a nation in arms."

MARTIN CALLS EXTRA SESSION OF LAWMAKERS

NEW LEGISLATURE CONVENED AT
10 O'CLOCK THIS MORNING
TO CONSIDER APPROPRIATION
BILL NOW BEFORE THE SENATE

Martin Speech Comes
Just Before Midnight

Predict Special Session Will
Not Consume Allotted Time;
Will Finish In A Few Days

TALLAHASSEE, June 6.—Governor
John W. Martin last night called
a special session of the Flori-
da legislature to convene today at
10 o'clock.

The governor appeared in person
before a joint session of the two
houses at 11:15 p. m. and read his
proclamation, in which he set forth
as reasons for the action that the
legislature of 1925 "has failed to
pass and enact into law a statute
providing adequate appropriations
for the conduct of the state govern-
ment for the biennium beginning
July 1, 1925, and ending June 30,
1927; and has failed to provide for
raising revenue sufficient to defray
the expenses of the state for the
next two years as is mandatorily
required by section 2, article 9,
of the state constitution."

His action in calling the special
session was taken when it became
apparent that there was no chance
of the passage of the general ap-
propriations bill, which received
approval of the lower house at 9
o'clock after which it was sent to
the senate. There the members
declined to adopt a cloture rule
limiting debate on the measure,
many contending that the measure
was of too great importance to
pass it hurriedly. It then became
evident that the upper house would
not be able to dispose of the bill
prior to time of adjournment since
the bill is of such importance that
the bunch of messages sent to the
senate by the house was the tax
levy bill containing a provision
cutting the levy for tick eradication
work from one-half to one-eighth
of a mill.

Secretary Davis Postpones
Western Trip to Arrange
Meeting of Trade Heads;
Miami Work Being Held Up

WASHINGTON, June 6.—Be-
cause the dispute between the
bricklayers and plasterers over
jurisdiction, which last May tied
up \$25,000,000 of new buildings,

country, Secretary of Labor
James J. Davis has abandoned a
Western trip in order to bring a-

MEETING FAVORS BURTON PLEA TO BAN POISON GAS

U. S. Delegate Wins Arms Del-
egates' Favor of Abolishing
Gas; Warfare May Be Hu-
manized at Special Meet

GENEVA, June 6.—Thrilled by
eloquent appeals from Representa-
tive Theodore E. Burton, head of
the American delegation to the
conference on traffic in arms, and
Paul Boncour, France, the confer-
ence at a memorable session Fri-
day night went on record in favor
of the immediate framing of a spe-
cial protocol by which the use of
asphyxiating gas in war time
hereforth will be outlawed.

Offers Special Parley.
American initiative, courage and
enthusiasm made the decision possi-
ble. Mr. Burton laid stress on the
urgency of doing something defi-
nite now to register condemnation
of the barbarous poison gas war-
fare, but he said that if this was
found impossible he was authorized
to announce that the president of
the United States would be glad
to extend an invitation for the con-
vocation of a special conference in
Washington.

250,000 CHINESE NOW ON STRIKE OVER SHANGHAI

20,000 Students Spread
Anti-Foreign Feeling
In Hankow; \$1,500
Marines Land In City

Peking Parades Are
Noisy But Peaceful

Washington Realizes
General Warfare Is
Meaning of Trouble

SHANGHAI, June 6.—The
Chinese strike is spreading to
the French concessions and
it was estimated today that
250,000 were on a strike
throughout the city.

Approximately 1500 ma-
rines and blue jackets have
been landed and advised from
Hankow say 20,000 students
there are spreading anti-foreign
propaganda.

Noisy But Peaceful
PEKING, June 6.—Student
parades and demonstrations, noisy
but peaceful continued today and
expression of anti-foreign feeling
was confined to the wearing of
several foreign owned rickshaws
and to shouting "Fight for liberty!
Buy Cott Japanese Goods."

TIENSIN, China, June 6.—
Chang Tso Lin, war Lord of North-
east China, was advised by the
Civil governor here to ignore the
Peking government if attempts
were made by those in authority
through mob violence to modify
local precaution against violence.
This move aligns a general change
with those attempting to maintain
order in China.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—Infor-
mation from authentic sources of
the swift approach in China of
general warfare which promises to
dwarf present disturbances in
Shanghai, Canton and Changsha, is
in the hands of the Washington
government.

The support of this information
which also has reached The Associ-
ated Press, is that a clash for
military mastery in China is im-
pending. Whether it will come im-
mediately, on the heels of the trou-
ble in the coastal regions, or break
later is held problematical but au-
thorities on the ground declare it
is inevitable.

Chang Tso Lin, Manchurian war
lord, with his force of 200,000 men,
and Fong Yu Hsing, with a fol-
lowing of 175,000, are being watch-
ed by observers. Friction between
them already has developed to the
point where armed struggle may be
precipitated at the least provoca-
tion.

Japan May Aid Chang.
Chang has the sympathy and
probably some form of substantial
aid from Japan. Feng, the so-called
Christian general, admittedly is
receiving active and material as-
sistance from soviet Russia. Un-
questioned sources have reported a
continuous supply of arms, rifles,
machine guns and ammunition to
be reaching Feng's troops from
Moscow and Urga, through Mongo-
lia, which largely is under soviet
domination.

Feng already has withdrawn
from Peking, which he took in
1924 by a coup executed while he
was a subordinate commander of
the Chihli military party, then
headed by Wu Pei Fu, who was
driven out of the political picture
in China because of Feng's de-
fection. There has been no open clash
yet between the forces of Chang
and Feng, but observers on the
ground have been predicting for
months that it must come, and re-
cent direct reports indicate that
the outbreak of hostilities cannot be
long delayed.

Soviet Propaganda.
In view of those circumstances,
the disturbances in Shanghai and
elsewhere precipitated by Chinese
students, the only central objective
of which is the stripping of special
rights from foreigners in China,

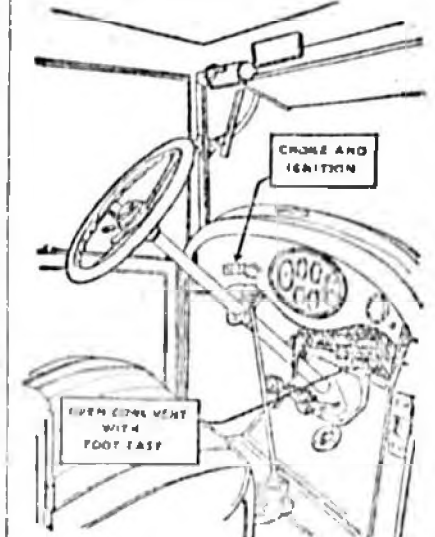
