Hall Of Fame On Moon

The moon belongs to everyone. Not only doas the song say so, but it's guaranteed by international treaty.

Thus the world shares a common problem -naming the thousands of new craters that have been, and remain to be, discovered on that rocky neighbor. Photographs by Russian and American spacecraft reveal there may be upwards of 100,000 craters on the hidden side of the moon.

In 1967, the Soviets petitioned the Interna-tional Astronomical Union for approval of names it had given 150 craters. In keeping with modern international agreement, the names were those of deceased (Russian) scientists, dating back to the termal engineer, Pulsenov, who flourished in the 18th century.

That still leaves a lot of cruters and other nar features unnamed, and one astronomen thinks we are going to run out of deceased scientists before we run out of moon. Dr. I. M. Levitt, director of the Fels Plan-

phia, recommends that the names of dead asronauts - both American and Russian - be accepted for lunar nomenclature. Later, living astronants and other men associated with space exploration could be honored, as well as fiving scientists like Salk and Babin who have performed outstanding services to mankind. It sounds like a good idea, something like a celestial Nobel Prize, without the money. Our only suggestion is that just as the Nobel Prize is not limited to scientific achievement, neither should the lunar laurels.
