PEACE CORPS ANNIVERSARY: It was 20 years ago this week President John F. Kennedy proposed what became known as the Peace Corps at Ann Arbor, Mich. There have been some changes made. Among other things, the Peace Corps once boasted 12,000 American volunteers working in 85 countries. Now, it has half that number in 61 countries. Washingtonbased Peace Corps Director Richard Celeste talked about the changes: "The Peace Corps is not as visible people say, 'Oh, the Peace Corps — is that still alive?' "In answer, Celeste said that in 1960 the Peace Corps believed it could change the world. Now the approach is more practical: "Let's roll up our sleeves

Then there's height — the taller candidate has won in 18 of the last 19 elections. The exception was 1976 when shorter Carter beat taller Gerald Ford. Reagan is 4 inches taller than Carter.

The county commission has proposed that the state purchase the 1,500 acre Spring Hammock between Lake Jessup and Big Tree Park near County Road 427. The property has been offered to the state for \$1.2 million. The county has said the property should be preserved for environmental reasons. The resolution on the pari-mutuel wagering facilities says

the pre-emption of city laws may "thwart the constitutional and statutory concents of home rule in the state." The resolution notes that due to the vagueness of the law the legislative intent may be interpreted to exempt not only the reconstruction and renovation of existing pari-mutuel facilities but also the exemption from local control of new parimutuel wagering facilities not previously in existence in the

The resolution requests the Division of Pari-Mutuel Wagering of the state Department of Business Regulations and the Florida Pari-Mutuel Commission not to Issue any permits or licenses for racing days in Seminole County until the Legislature clarifies the status of new pari-mutuel facilities and whether or not such capital improvements are exempt from local regulations.

gradually increased the flock "This is not a peighborhood squabble," Lewis said. "It's a matter of a person who wants no part of zoning laws for her own special interest. She wants goats and will get them no matter who she steps on." Mrs. Morris contends that her goats are pets, not livestock

and therefore do not fall under the county ordinance. And she aid they are "odorless" goats. But her neighbors, 36 of whom had their names attached to a petition addressed to the state prosecutor's office, say the goats are farm-type animals whose presence has devalued their property, presented a health hazard and caused a noise nuisance, among other things. "Someone has to face up to ramifications of this thing." Lewis said. "Channel 9 plays her up big but won't give us 10

Lewis said the media has often taken Mrs. Morris' side describing the goats as odorless and stating that her property s a one-acre site. Lewis said Mrs. Morris has two lots - each 85- by 150-feet totaling 25,500 square feet. The Seminole County Property Appraiser's office confirmed this Tuesday. "An acre is 43,560 feet," Lewis said.

Lewis and the other residents have asked the Seminole County tax collector to waive their increase in property taxes and reassess the area at agricultural rates rather than residential (R-1AA) as it is now being assessed. 

His secret is a small motor attached to a metallic solar collector. The motor works off the heat trapped by the collector to produce electricity which is then stored for later use inside a heavily insulated energy cube, much like a battery. Fellow, who obtained a \$5,000 grant from the experimental model provides enough electricity to

provide half his household power on a cloudy day.

"It's eminently practical. You don't have to find the

fuel, refine it, truck it or dispose of it," Fellows said. Grant To Aid Home Design JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (UPI) - The Florida Solar Energy Center will use a \$405,000 federal research grant to develop a house design that will allow Floridians to cut back drastically on their use of air

The research will focus on home designs that take advantage of natural ventilation to reduce the time when electricically-powered cooling is necessary, said project manager Subrato Chandra.

Sanford Tables Request For Lowered Utility Fee

The request of Harcar Aluminum for a reduction of the \$26,400 utility connection fee for its planned new plant in the Hunt Industrial Park was tabled by the Sanford City Commission Monday night. The three commissioners present - Eddie Keith, David Farr and Julian Stenstrom - delayed a decision on the request

until Mayor Lee P. Moore and Commissioner John Morris can Ken Sanden of Harcar asked the city for the special consideration, saying the firm believes a \$5,000 connection fee would be more fair in view of the firm's plans to build the 240,000 square-foot facility and to bring its number of employees up from 200 to 300. He also said that the Harcar will be

using \$500 worth of water monthly.

City Manager Warren Knowles said connection fees, sometimes called impact fees, applies to new homes - in fact, all new construction. "How can you reduce the fee for a business when you charge homeowners?" Knowles asked. The city manager said the fees go toward maintenance of the city's wells, plants and treatment. "It is an impact-type fee so that existing customers do not have to pay additional costs" because of new construction, he said.

Keith urged tabling the request until the full commission

Local Private Eye Keeps Tabs On Cults

*Way International, the world's largest religious cult, would like to see Ted "Doc" Brannen dead. Two mafia families consider Brannen a "pain in their side." Brannen's unpopularity doesn't bother him. He is a private investigator who specialized in religious cults and organized

Brannen works for the Investigation Agency which will soon open an office in Sanford. Not only is Brannen the head of the Sanford office, but he is in charge of the Eastern Seaboard branch, which covers the area between Cocoa Beach and New Jersey to South Carolina. The Investigation Agency, known nationwide, has 172

agents. The Sanford office will have four undercover agents besides Brannen. The Sanford number is 323-7183. Brannen said they will cover anything from a divorce case to getting someone out of a religious cult. Brannen, 35, originally from Georgia, hasn't always wanted to be a policeman. "I got into it by chance," Brannen said. "When I was in

Vietnam, I was a military policeman. I became one because the military said the first 500 men will be military police." After serving time in Vietnam, Brannen came back to the states anxious to marry his childhood sweetheart. "We went to New York City to visit some relatives. We were coming out of a resturant and the mafia killed my girlfriend. They had mistaken her for someone else." Brannen has been after organized crime ever since.

Brannen, who was the Lousiana state champion in karate in 1974-75, spent 18 months working undercover in Way Inter-"Way International is the biggest organization in the world," said the investigator. "And it is the most dangerous cult in the

"The mafia won't kill one of their own, but if Way International finds out someone is trying to get one of their members, they will do one of three things. The organization will either hide their member, get them out of the country, or kill

In order to get people out of the religious cult, Brannen oined the organization. "Way International believes in the perfection of man," Often we would have to fast, sometimes for weeks and do a lot of

"I worked from 8 to 11 a.m. as an auditor for the cult. From 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. I attended religious seminars. Then from 2 to and personally smuggled 15 people out including a 9-year-old B p.m., I was put in a room with about three other people to boy, who had been in the cult since he was five.

"After about six months, I would ask Brenda to come into the cult. Why? The cult brainwashes their members and keeps them drugged," he said. When the cult found out Brannen was an undercover

they were ready to kill him on the spot. I was at work, when two men came in and one hit me and said, 'You're a damn cop,' " Brannen said. "I knew I had been Brannen used his karate skills to get out of that dangerous situation and ran to a local gas station to call his wife.

"I didn't know it, but two of my agents were within three blocks of the station." As Brannen's fellow agents were coming from one direction, cult members were closing in on the other. "I just jumped in the car. It was close."

While Brannen was in the cult, he pulled 47 people out of it "This kid could quote passages from religious magazines,

For six weeks after he escaped from the cult, Brannen was "One morning about 2 a.m., we got a phone call. Brend answered and was told 'your husband will be killed by 8 a.m.' found out that the cult had put a \$50,000 bounty on my head They wanted me killed.

After traveling all over the U.S., Brannen finally return the boy to his mother. Brannen, himself, had to be deprogrammed and detoxified before he could return to work. "The layman on the street doesn't realize how big the cults are," said Brannen. "They like the young and educated people According to Brannen, there are religious cults in this area,

but he said the company didn't set up an office in Sanford because of the cults. "As far as the mafia, some of the biggest leaders live in F Lauderdale," Brannen said. What does Brenda think of her husband's dangerous life "I'm used to it now, but when we were first married, I would be nervous until he came home," she said. As a precaution, Brannen taught his wife karate so she could

Brenda now travels with Brannen as his secretary. "There's never a dull moment," she said of their lift



Doak S. Campbell Stadium resembles a group of Saturn rockets immediately after liftoff. "After watching the Florida State films, the noise is the least of our worries," the Boston College coach said Tuesday. "This is a tremendous challenge, but we seem to

respond well to challenges." Boston College, 2-3, journeys to Tallahassee for the first time for an evening encounter with the No. 7 ranked Seminoles. Florida State is one point away from an undefeated season (a 10-9 loss to Miami.) And the last two weeks they have beaten Nebraska (18-14 on the road) and Pitt 36-22, each being the No. 3 ranked team at the time. "As good as Florida State is, and playing before a large crowd at their home field, we are really looking forward to this game. I didn't think anyone could score against Pitt. thought maybe Pitt would give up 36 points this year. But we'll be ready to play," Chlebek said.

The Eagles one shining moment this season came when it upset then 14th-ranked Stanford 30-13. The victory loomed more impressive when Stanford beat Oklahoma the ollowing weekend.
