

Only Chocolate Milk For 3 Months

Husband Orders Wife Not To Feed Youngster Who Dies Of Starvation

MIAMI (AP) — A 3-year-old boy whose mother told police he lived on chocolate milk for three months after her husband ordered her not to feed him is dead of starvation and the boy's father is charged with manslaughter, officers said Tuesday.

Dean Nozza was dead on arrival at Variety Children's Hospital Monday night when his father, Michael Nozza, 41, drove him seven blocks from the family home, hospital authorities said.

Nozza was charged with manslaughter after his wife, Lois Jean Nozza, 28, told police her husband ordered her not to feed the child. She said her son had not eaten for three months.

"She said her husband wouldn't allow her to

take the boy to the hospital, and said she was afraid he would beat her and the other children if she did," Duval County Sheriff's Lt. John Esty said.

Police said Nozza "didn't allow the child to be taken to a hospital because he was afraid he would be arrested for child abuse."

Nozza told the hospital staff that Dean "would not drink anything except chocolate milk" and had not eaten for several weeks, said Dr. Robert Lawson, Variety's chief of staff.

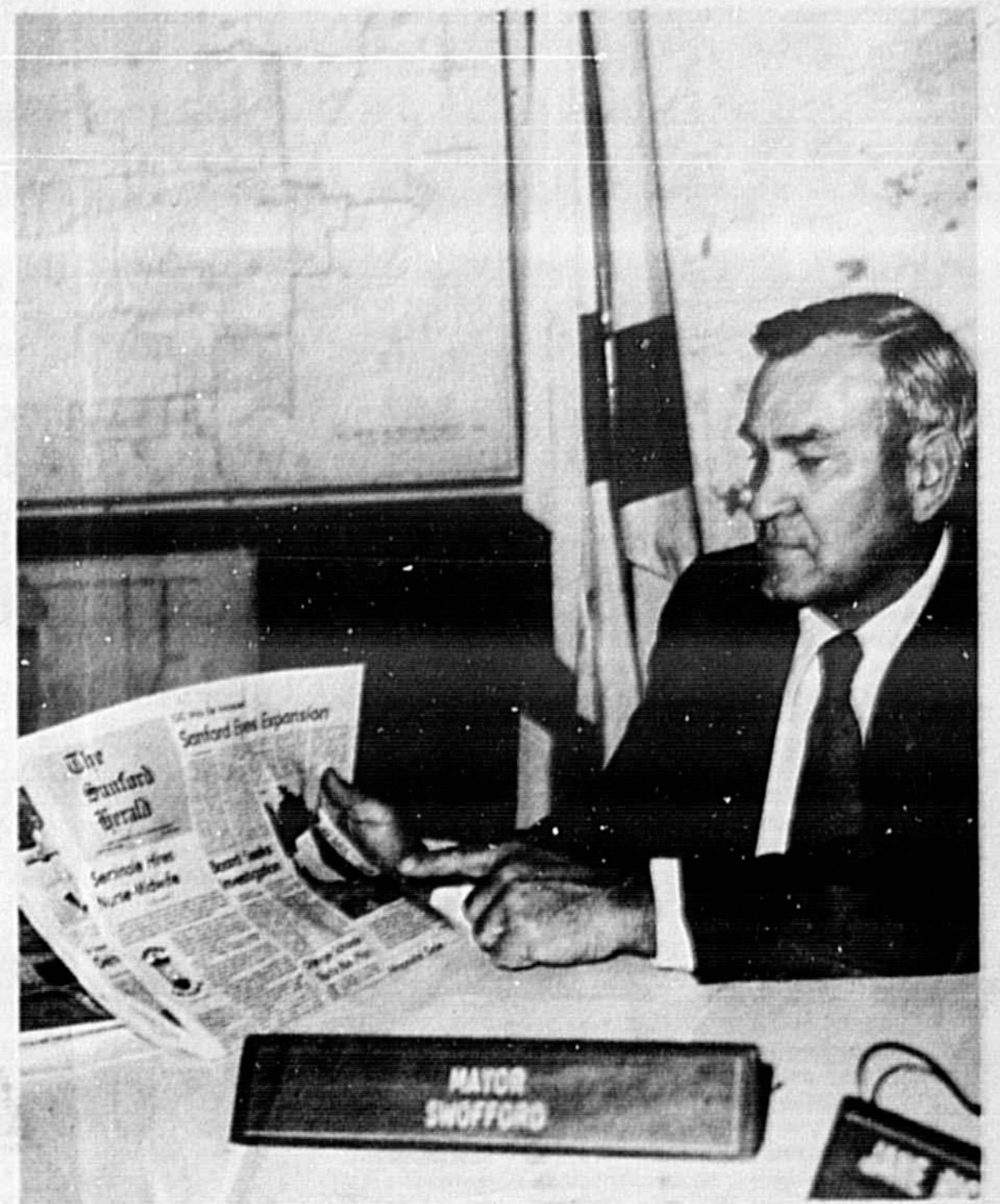
Lawson said Dean "was brought in here dead with evidence of extreme malnutrition." However, he said the admitting physician saw no signs of bruises or fractures on the child. Lawson added the child "could have had a very severe

diarrhea and been fed well," but developed the malnutrition due to his body's "loss of failure to absorb food."

The Nozzas were investigated in 1969, records showed, after authorities received a complaint of child malnutrition. That incident involved another child, police said.

"The interior of that house was filthy with human defecation all over the floor and no furniture," Esty said. "Little Dean slept on a piece of cardboard on the floor with a black raincoat for a cover."

"Two of the children said they hadn't eaten for three days, and officers found only a package of hotdogs and a carton of chocolate milk in the refrigerator," the sheriff's lieutenant said.

Board Approves Program Close Vote On Issue

Seminole County School Board at Tuesday's regular monthly meeting approved a recommendation of Supt. John Angel, which has the effect of accepting the Social Adjustment Program (ESAP) to deal with maladjusted school students under suspension or expulsion from the school system.

On a motion by Dr. Stuart Culpepper and seconded by A. P. Bue Jr., the board voted three-to-two to accept Angel's recommendations, which specified the program, aimed at placing socially unacceptable students in special classrooms, will cost the county no more than what would be obligated for a vehicle to furnish transportation.

Voting with Culpepper and Bue was board chairman A. F. Keeth. Opposing the program were vice chairman Jean Bryant and Ray Slaton.

The program also has the endorsement of the county's Secondary School Principals, who must administer the program.

David Herrmann, ESAP project coordinator with Seminole Community Action, presented an amended version of the social adjustment outline, which listed total \$284,183 costs and included employment of a new Seminole County.

MIAMI (AP)—An X-ray unit designed to scan the interior of suitcases went into operation at Pan American World Airways' departure gates at Miami International Airport Tuesday as the latest addition to an arsenal of anti-hijack screening devices.

Pan Am's equipment will be used to check for weapons inside hand luggage being carried on board flights or, when necessary, to search bags going into the plane's cargo hold.

The X-ray device was implemented as the airlines and law enforcement officials explored other possibilities for detecting weapons or explosives before they could be carried aboard an aircraft.

As Altamonte Waits For Funds Sewer Planning Delayed

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — A representative of the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is to be in Altamonte Springs next Wednesday to discuss the difficulties the city is encountering receiving federal

money for expansion of its main sewer plant.

Until some indication is received by the city that the federal funds will be released for the expansion from 12 million gallons per day capacity plant to a 5.2 million gallon per day one, the city has stopped its consulting engineering firm from proceeding with some \$200,000 worth of planning for the expansion.

Mayor Lawrence Swiford in recommending the delaying action said while one federal agency has approved \$1,318,000 in government grants and loans for sewer lines, the EPA has turned down money for the sewer plant. "Lines in the ground are not much good unless we have a treatment plant," he declared.

The mayor added that the city currently has 2 million gallons of sewer treatment pledged at a 1.2 million gallon per day plant. "We may well have to revoke some building permits," Swiford said.

Pointing to a story in Tuesday's edition of The Sanford Herald, which reported that the Florida Pollution Control Board has called for a congressional investigation of the EPA, Swiford said the city is not getting cooperation from that body.

He continued that quite a few developments will be affected in the city. Many developers, he said, have purchased land, received mortgage funding, are paying interest on loans and the city acted in good faith in pledging sewer service.

"If this (the problem with the federal) water quality plan," he stated, "Altamonte has phased out several (privately-operated) package plants."

To other business to do with the municipal utility system, the city delayed action on bids for Douglas Avenue sewer extensions and lift station.

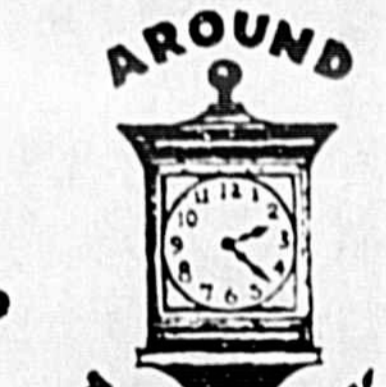

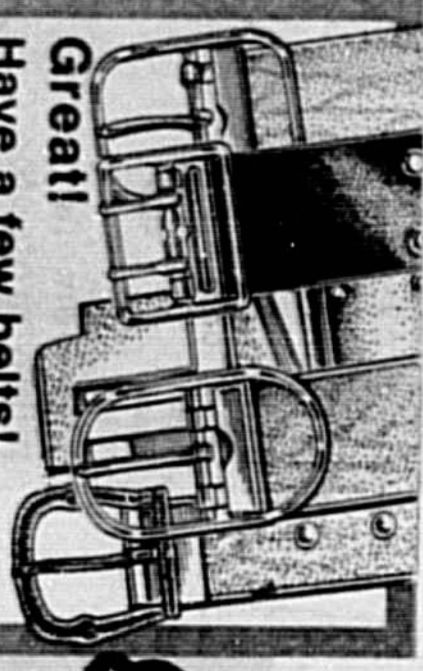

Jim Nabors' Favorite

When not out-of-town appearing in concerts, TV's Jim Nabors likes to entertain friends in his Bel-Air, Calif., home. Often he and his mother, Mrs. Mavis Nabors, share cooking honors. However, Mrs. Nabors presides over the regular kitchen in the sprawling mansion while Jim prefers to whip up specialties in a new 100-point-equipped kitchen adjacent to the ramp room. The Nabors rarely go in for

fancy dishes and a favorite of the household is an asparagus casserole, made from a family recipe.

ASPARAGUS CASSEROLE
1 bunch (or 1 can) young asparagus
2 boiled eggs
2 cups grated cheese
1 1/2-cup cream of mushroom soup undiluted
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/2 stick butter
2 tablespoons flour

Cook asparagus until tender, being careful not to overcook. Drain and hold the liquid. In a separate saucepan, melt the butter, add flour and then add the mushroom soup and grated cheese and simmer until cheese is melted. When the sauce is ready, in a skillet arrange alternate layers of asparagus and sauce. Sprinkle the top with bread crumbs and heat at 325 degrees until the crumbs are brown.

Gingerbread Pudding

Cooks who like to give a new twist to packaged gingerbread may be interested in the following recipe. Here the gingerbread mix is made with mince-meat and the dessert is served with a creamed cling peach sauce that also uses mince-meat.

GINGERBREAD PUDDING
1 package (14 1/2 ounces) gingerbread mix
1/2 cup ready-to-use mince-meat
Peach Sauce, see below

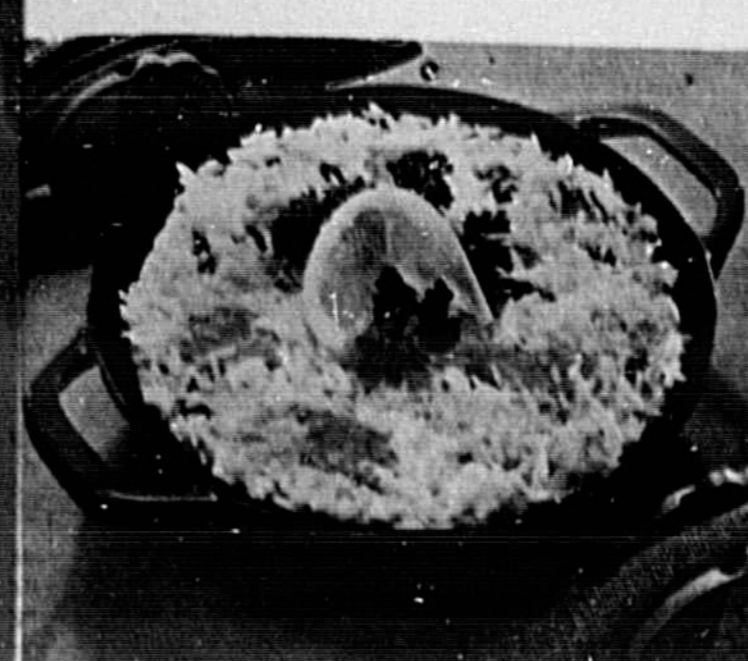
Prepare gingerbread according to directions on package. Before turning into pan, gently fold in mince-meat. Bake according to directions. Serve hot with warm Peach Sauce.

PEACH SAUCE
1 can (1 pound, 13 ounces) cling peach slices
1/4 cup sugar
1 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1 tablespoon lemon juice
2 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup ready-to-use mince-meat

Drain peaches, reserving syrup. In a medium saucepan thoroughly stir together the sugar, cornstarch and salt. Gradually stir in reserved peach syrup, keeping smooth. Cook over moderate heat, stirring constantly, until clear and thickened. Add lemon rind, lemon juice and mince-meat. Serve warm over gingerbread. Makes 8 to 12 servings.

Note: A topping of whipped cream may be added if desired.

If you want to roast almonds after blanching, place the nuts one deep in a shallow baking pan. Heat the nuts in a 375-degree oven until lightly brown — this may take as long as 20 minutes. Stir the nuts a couple of times during the roasting to prevent scorching.

Seafood Casseroles For Variety, Economy

Casseroles are one answer to high meat prices. But there comes a time when the home-maker reaches the end of her repertoire of ground meat casseroles. Then is the time to turn to seafood casseroles for interesting variety, as well as economy.

Seafood, just as ground meat, can be "stretched" to make a little go a long way. The two "puff" casseroles which follow are easy to prepare and offer good nutrition, as well as good eating. One, Lemony Fish Puff, combines flaked cooked fish with rice, milk and eggs. Shrimp-Cheese Puff stretches a can of shrimp with protein-rich eggs, milk, cheese and bread. Mustard, thyme and onion bolsters taste appeal.

LEMONY FISH PUFF (6 servings)
2 cups flaked cooked cod or haddock (white fish)
2 cups cooked rice
1 cup milk
1/4 cup fresh squeezed lemon juice
3 tablespoons melted butter or margarine
1 teaspoon fresh grated lemon peel
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
4 eggs, separated
2 tablespoons chopped pimiento

Combine fish, rice, milk, lemon juice, butter, lemon peel, salt and pepper. Beat egg yolks. Stir into fish mixture. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold into fish mixture along with the chopped pimiento. Pour into greased 1 1/2-quart casserole dish. Bake at 375 degrees F. for 30 minutes.

SHRIMP-CHEESE PUFF
6 to 8 slices firm-textured bread
5 eggs
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
1/4 teaspoon thyme
One-sixteenth teaspoon white pepper
1 1/2 cups homogenized milk
1 1/2 cups shredded sharp cheddar cheese

Cut bread in 1/4-inch cubes to measure 6 cups. Beat eggs with seasonings. Add milk and pour over bread. Let stand five minutes. Add cheese, onion and shrimp; mix lightly. Turn into a buttered 7 x 11 x 1 1/2 inch baking pan; sprinkle with paprika. Bake below oven center, in moderately slow oven (325 degrees F.) 35 minutes until set in center. Let stand five minutes then cut into squares (or spoon out) to serve. Makes six to eight servings.

Variation: Omit shrimp from "cheese puff" and serve the squares with Shrimp Sauce. To make sauce, melt 2 tablespoons butter and blend in 2 tablespoons flour. Stir in 1 1/2 cups homogenized milk; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1/4 teaspoon each dry mustard and dill weed. Cook, stirring, until sauce boils and thickens. Stir in 1/2 cup lemon juice and 1/4 cup (1/4 oz.) can drained shrimp; drain. Heat a few minutes longer. Makes two cups sauce.
