# Deputies nab teen for Heathrow burglaries

**HEATHROW** — A suspect in several recent burglaries in Heathrow has been taken into custody.

According to Steve Olson, Public Information Officer with the Seminole County Sheriff's Department, Christopher Adams, 15, has been charged with three counts of burglary to a conveyance and four counts of burglary to a

residence. The crimes are felonies.

Olson said the break-ins primarily occurred since July 20, although one residential burglary occurred in March. In most of the cases, nothing of high dollar value was reported missing. Cars were rummaged through during three vehicle burglaries. In two of the four home burglaries, it also appears the suspect went through women's lingerie items in the dresser drawer.

After residents reported the crimes to

the sheriff's department, a canvass of the neighborhood was accomplished. It was discovered that, during several of the burglaries, a 16 to 18 year old male suspect, with blonde-brown, closely-cropped hair was seen in the area. A crime alert was subsequently sent to residents in the area as well as Heathrow security.

Wednesday night, Heathrow security came in contact with a teenager matching the description. The guard reportedly questioned the suspect, obtained his vital

information, and forwarded the results to the sheriff's District 3 office in Lake Mary Thursday morning.

Investigator Neal Fowler followed up by visiting Christopher Adams' home. Fowler said Adams reportedly admitted to committing the crimes and pointed out the places where he reportedly committed the burglaries. He was then arrested and processed at the Juvenile Assessment

## Teen-ager learns his Peas & Quieties

British teen becomes an expert on American veggies while working at Baggs Produce

**SANFORD** — At first, Ben Mabey said he didn't know his American

peas. "They're the toughest," he said. "There are so many varieties. I had trouble telling one pea from another."

Mabey, a native of Great Britain, is 17, and learning more about peas

He works 10 hours each day

at Elmer Baggs Produce stand at the corner of 25th Street and Sanford Avenue.

One day, English-born Mabey says, he will be a marine biologist. Right now he's deep into cabbage, lettuce, tomatoes, potatoes, avocados, sweet onions, squash, plums, bananas and cantaloupes. He sells a lot of boiled peanuts, too.

"I've worked for Mr. Baggs for three summers," Mabey said. "I have little or no problems identifying produce now. I charged a fellow \$3,000 for tomatoes a couple of years ago. He started to walk away, said that was too expensive. I

## Second worker dies from cave-in

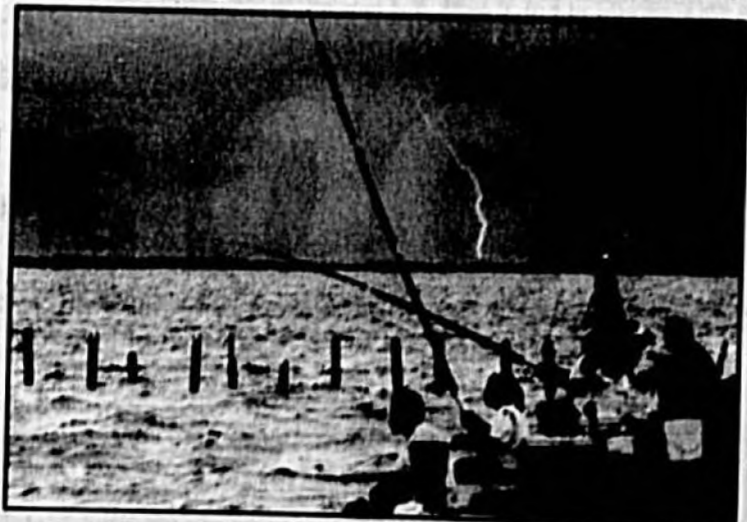
**SANFORD** — The second death following Tuesday morning's trench cave-in has been reported.

Keith Creason, 22, of Auburndale, died at Central Florida Regional Hospital Wednesday evening, where he had been on life support since being admitted.

The cave-in occurred at the construction site on W. Airport Boulevard, where the extension of the GreeneWay is underway including the bridge over Airport Blvd. Creason, and Andrew Horne, 25, of Lake Hamilton, who died at the scene, were employed by Scarborough Civil Corporation, a subcontractor for the project.

Creason and Horne were buried when dirt surrounding an excavation collapsed over them. An investigation is underway by OSHA to determine if the contractor was negligent in following safety precautions.

## County road meeting for CR-15 is Aug. 15

Seminole County Engineering Division has scheduled a third Public Involvement Meeting Thursday, Aug. 10.

The purpose of the meeting is to discuss recommended alignment of County Road 15, to be presented to the Board of County Commissioners for approval.

The area, specifically, is Monroe Road, between CR-46

(West First Street) to U.S. 17-92 on the Lake Monroe lakefront.

According to Jerry Matthews, principal coordinator for the Seminole County Engineering Division, plans at present call for widening the road, possibly to four lanes. "At this meeting we'll be looking into the four-laning and realignment which would probably be included in the work," he said.

## Sanford man dies in moped crash

**SANFORD** — Casey Burgess, Jr., 64, of Ridgewood Avenue, Sanford, was killed Thursday, when the motorbike he was riding, collided with an truck.

The incident occurred on Country Club Road at approximately 11:45 a.m.

Burgess was not wearing a helmet. According to Sanford Police spokesperson Cleo Cohen, "Moped riders have never been required to wear a helmet."

According to Sanford police officer Thomas McCall, who filed the report, both the motorbike and truck were heading west when the truck slowed to turn into a driveway at 2300 Country Club Road. Although police said Burgess reportedly

attempted to swerve around the truck, he struck the drivers side rear corner.

Burgess was declared dead at

the scene. The driver of the truck was uninjured.

## Praying for friends is a positive thing

There's an old song that goes, "Accentuate the Positive, Eliminate the Negative and Deal with Mr. In between."

I'm thinking about the words to that song as I scan through the latest "The First World" newsletter from the First Baptist Church of Sanford. A number of the church's congregation are on the pastor's prayer list.

Ernie Butler, a Sanford Optimist, has heart problems. Ernie and Maude Butler are dearly in

love with each other and have many, many friends prepared to pray for them. The Butlers were accentuating the positive and eliminating the negative before it was a song.

Bill Craig is on the church's prayer list, also.

For more than 10 years, Bill Craig not only cared for his wife Emma after her near fatal stroke, but became the president of the Central Florida

those who have either had strokes or been stroke caretakers.

Through his efforts — and those of Emma Craig — lives, families and marriages have been saved. The Craigs have helped others pull themselves together in time of crisis. Some of the stroke recoveries are truly miraculous.

I accompanied the Craigs to Tampa several years ago to attend an American Heart Association seminar that addressed the lack of knowledge people had concerning strokes. Jacquelyn Townsend, a former Miss America, was one

of the speakers. She had a stroke less than six years after winning her crown in Atlantic City. She was not able to speak after the stroke. Therapy helped her regain some of her speech years later.

"The key is getting people to want to come to a Strokes meeting, getting them to want to get better," Craig said. "It's very difficult when you are afraid to talk because the words don't come out right or when you can't walk," he said.

Craig takes delight when he talks about the Voices of Victory singers. Some, he said, may not be able to talk after having had

a stroke, but they are able to sing. When they lift their voices in songs of praise, it is as if God helps produce the most beautiful results.

It seemed appropriate that in the same First Baptist of Sanford newsletter with the prayer list was the story about a little girl who asked her mother one Sunday if it was true that "God is bigger than we are, and that He lives within us."

Yes, the mother replied, both statements were true.

"If God is bigger than us and He lives in us, wouldn't He show through?" the girl concluded.

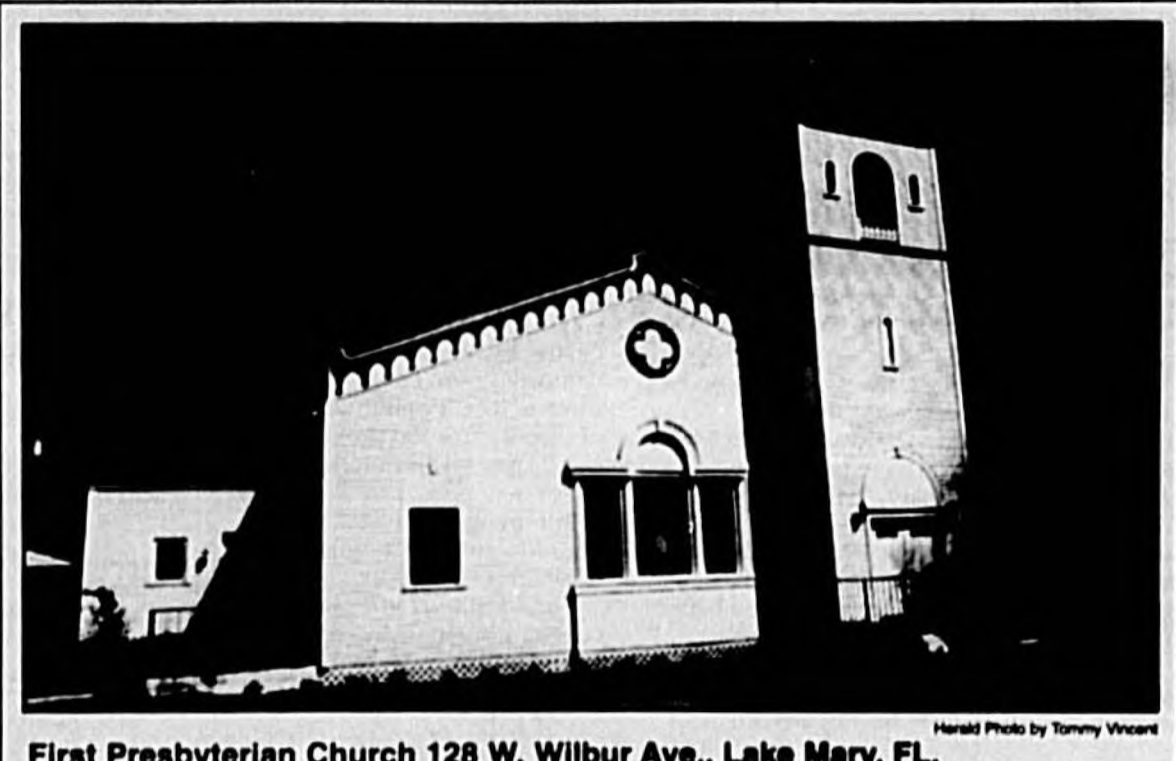

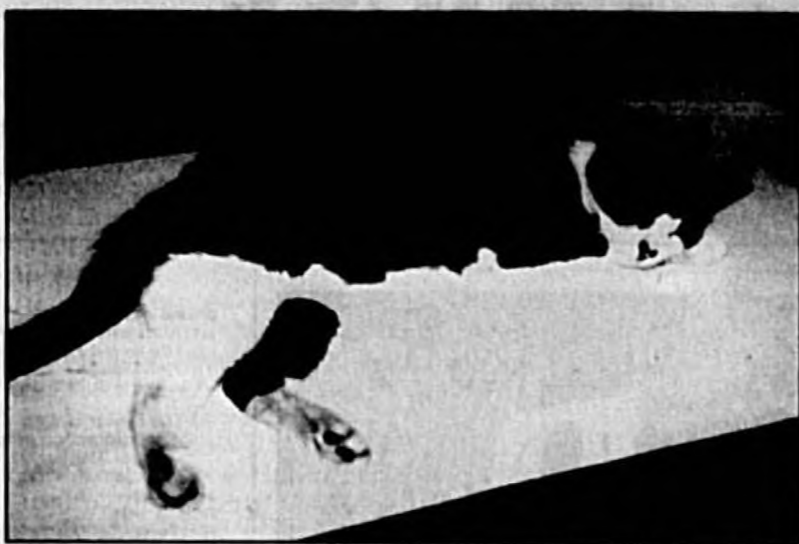

The Florida Legislature recently removed the requirement that motorcyclists wear helmets. The change however, only pertains to motorcycles, and only if the cyclist has at least \$10,000 insurance.

"I understand from the officer on the scene that (Burgess') head injury was extremely severe," Cohen said. "It was an ugly scene. A helmet would have certainly reduced the severity of the injury."

"Whether it would have made a difference between life and death is hard to say,"

Cohen added. "If his face hit the rear of the truck, it may have been a fatality even if he was wearing a helmet."

Cohen said officers are expecting an increase in this type of traffic fatality.

"With the changes in the law, you're probably going to see more motorcycle fatalities," Cohen said. "Helmets almost always reduce the severity of the accident."

A traffic homicide investigation into the incident has been turned over to police investigator David Morgenstern

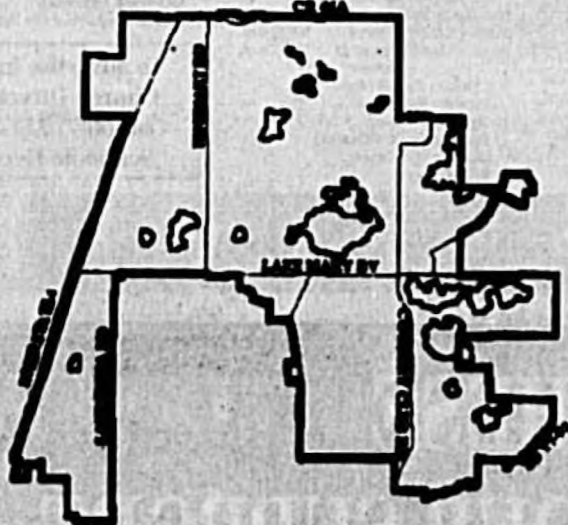

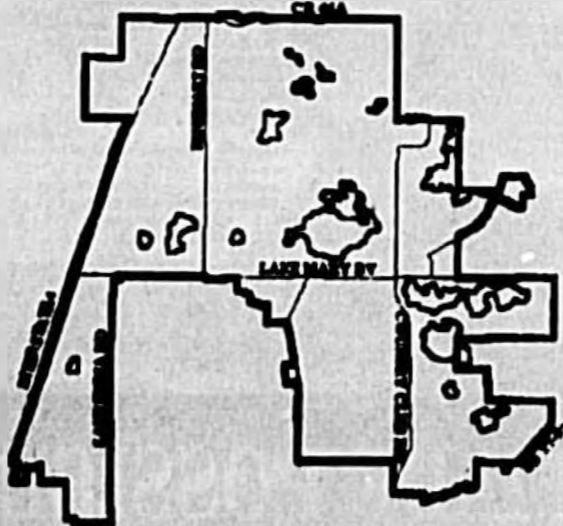

Movie Review

# X-Men: Too many superheroes, not enough stratagem

Fans of the hugely popular "X-Men" Marvel comic book series (created by Stan Lee in 1963 — and featured in cameo performance as a hot dog vendor) will happily find a lion's share of the comic's historical minutiae defining the group of persecuted genetic mutants in, what promises to be, the first of several "X-Men" movies. But the movie fails to adequately fulfill the comic book's dark/edgy tone and there are tedious scenes of exposition with no conflict, and that don't move the story forward. Even "X-Men's" ambitious special effects and super-action fight sequences drag when they should soar because of clunky dialogue and awkward editing. There are however a few flashy scenes that redeem the price of admission. Hollywood's bumpy journey to bringing comic book characters to life on the big screen may be improving, but only by degrees.

Still, "X-Men" does a handy job of juggling its numerous heroes and villains. On the telepathic Professor Charles Xavier's (Patrick Stewart — "Dune") good guy team is Dr. Jean Grey (Famke Janssen — "The Faculty"), a telepathic and telekinetic object of desire for fellow mutants, Cyclops (James Marsden — "Disturbing Behavior") and Wolverine (Hugh Jackman). James Marsden bears the stamp of being "X-Men's" only miscast actor due to his inability to overcome the demands of acting with the encumbrance of sunglasses. Cyclops fires beams of energy from his eyes when they are uncovered, but Marsden never animates his character's tortured soul, so that what comes across on the screen is more like human furniture than individual identity. Storm (Halle Berry "Bulworth") can control local atmospheric conditions at a whim, while newcomer Rogue (Anna Paquin — "The Piano") fumbles with her unintentional chastity belt of

draining the life out of anyone she touches. Rogue's particular genetic mutation provides an outlandish metaphorical love scene with Wolverine, who receives a kiss equal to ten orgasms. Whew.

Wolverine (Hugh Jackman) gets special attention as the story's confrontational and oversexed protagonist. Wolverine has Freddie Kruger styled steel claws that eject from between his knuckles like giant switchblades thanks to a metal alloy grafted onto his entire skeleton. Jackman's feature-film debut establishes a ferocious screen presence for the Australian actor that should

make him an obvious choice for a new generation of action films. Bad guy leader of the evil Brotherhood of Mutants, and Holocaust escapee Magneto (Ian McKellen — "Apt Pupil") has telekinetic powers to

control magnetic forces. Magneto's wayward band of mutants include the gigantic primal man, Sabertooth (Tyler Mane — U.W.F. Wrestler), the 20-foot tongue lashing Toad (Ray Park — "Sleepy Hollow"), and slinky metamorph Mystique (Rebecca Romijn-Stamos — "Boomerang").

Mutants are outcasts from society because they are differ-

ent. Magneto wants to convert all world-leaders to mutants with the use of force, while Xavier runs a special school for mutants in Westchester County to help the adapt and direct the mutants' special skills toward peaceful ends. If Malcolm X versus the Reverend Martin Luther King springs to mind in the inherent theme, remember the comic did originate in the '60s.

While the "X-Men" story is set in modern-day New York and Washington, D.C., it doesn't possess enough contemporary thematic vibrancy to give the filmmakers and actors anything more than a cardboard cut-out of colorful action/drama. "X-Men" director Bryan Singer ("The Usual Suspects") is capable of perfectly capturing uncomfortable unity between candor and duplicity, as he did in "Apt Pupil" (1998) but one can feel in the lapses of pacing, the here he is constantly searching for some nonexistent anchor of social-political import that

could take the movie to a level of, say, "Robocop" or "Starship Troopers."

One critical component to the "X-Man" story revolves around a McCarthy-like Senator (Bruce Davison — "Grace of My Heart") who wants all "known mutants" to be registered.

The sub-plot doesn't work because it's just not the way politics or smear campaigns are run anymore. Instead of delving into current politics the way Stan Lee did when he created the comic, the writers rely instead on an out-dated national and global picture that ignores a wealth of narrative fuel from vast issues like the Russian Mafia's, and the World Bank's, stranglehold on individuals through economic repression.

That may seem like high-falutin concept stuff in relation to comic book characters, but it's consistent with the level of seriousness that "X-Men" fans exude in their interest to the comic.

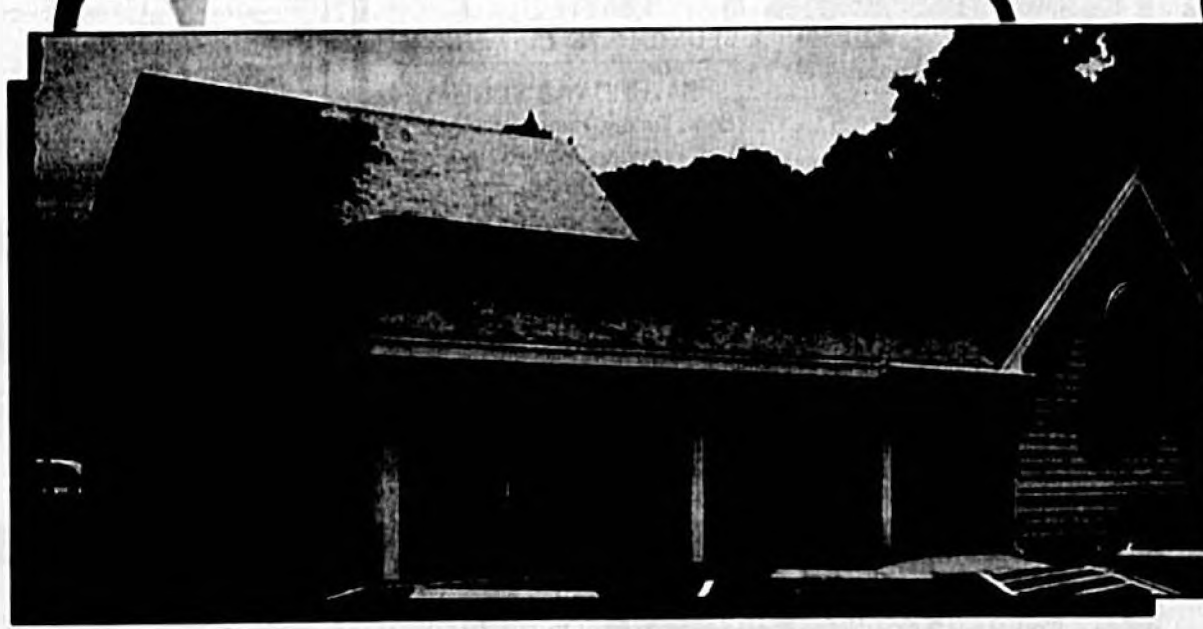

LAKE MARY - With the 2000-2001 school year set to start in a little over a week, the Seminole Athletic Conference cross country teams are making preparations to start official practice.

- 8:35 a.m. - 13-to-15 Boys Race - three miles.
- 9:10 a.m. - 16-to-18 Girls Race - three miles.
- 9:45 a.m. - 16-to-18 Boys Race - three miles.

- 10:20 a.m. - 9-and-Under - one mile; and 19-and-Over - three miles.

All first place runners will receive medals with the top 5 in the 12-under age groups and the 19-and over age groups receiving ribbons.

The top 10 in each of the 13-15 and 16-18 races will receive medals with places 11-25 receiving ribbons.

The top two teams in the 13-15 and 16-18 races receive championship and runner-up trophies.

ALBANY, N.Y. - Quarterback

Connell Maynor connected on a 20-yard pass to Wide receiver/Defensive back Bret Cooper on the final play of the game to give the Orlando Predators a 61-59 victory over the Albany Firebirds at the Pepsi Arena Sunday (July 23) afternoon.

With the victory, the Southern Division champion Predators (11-3) also clinched the No. 2 seed for the 2000 AFL playoffs. The Predators will receive a first-round bye and could play two home playoff games. Their first playoff game will be on Thursday, August 3rd at 8 p.m. at the T.D. Waterhouse Centre.

In a rematch of last year's Arena Bowl Championship, Albany made the game interesting with a 28-point run to take a 59-55

lead on a 45-yard touchdown pass from Mike Pawlawski to Greg Hopkins with 21 seconds to go.

The Predators started their game-winning drive on their own nine-yard line, but Maynor hit Cooper for a 21-yard pickup.

After two straight incompletions, including one that Cooper reached back and got his hands on, but could not hold, Orlando used its final timeout with three seconds left. Head coach Jay Gruden wanted to spread open the middle of the field for Cooper to make the winning catch.

Like clockwork the Albany safety moved to his left, allowing Cooper, running a skinny post pattern, to grab the winning touchdown, stunning the Firebirds' crowd of 11,133.

"We never gave up," said Maynor, who completed 16 of 31 passes for 223 yards and five

touchdowns. "We knew if we ran the skinny the guy would cheat over. It was desperation and we got it."

Early on it looked like the Predators were going to run away with their 11th victory of the season. They took a 20-0 lead after the first quarter and a 41-17 edge at the half.

Things looked even better when Mike Osuna scored his first rushing touchdown of the season on the final play of the third quarter, giving the Predators a 55-31 lead.

But from there it almost fell apart.

Pawlawski, who threw six touchdown passes, led the charge with two touchdown passes and a three-yard scramble that cut Orlando's lead to 55-53 with 2:07 to play.

The Predators had a chance to put the game away on its next possession, but kicker David Cool missed a 49-yard field goal.

## Miracle struggles

SACRAMENTO, Calif. - Ruthie Bolton-Holfield scored 18 of her 24 points in the second half and reserve Lady Hardmon had a career-high 18 points to help fuel a late surge as the Sacramento Monarchs handed the Orlando Miracle their fourth straight loss, 73-66, at Arco Arena Thursday night.

Bolton-Holfield made five three-pointers and keyed a 9-0 run late in the game that helped Sacramento (17-10), which has won two in a row and four of five, to move into a virtual tie with Phoenix for third place in the Western Conference.

Hardmon, one of the WNBA's original 18 allocated players who was acquired in a trade with Utah in 1998, picked up the slack for reigning WNBA Most Valuable Player Yolanda Griffith, who scored only nine points, none in the second half.

Nykeisha Sales kept the Miracle (14-12) close, breaking her own team-record by hitting seven three-pointers and finishing with 25 points.

Orlando has dropped six of its last seven games and is now tied with Cleveland for third place in the Eastern Conference.

Tangela Smith scored 10 points and Griffith grabbed 11 rebounds for the Monarchs, while Ticha Penicheiro, who leads the league in assists, dished out 13 assists, one short of her season high. She also had seven points, eight rebounds and five steals.

In the first half, Sacramento, which never trailed in the game, attacked Orlando inside. Griffith scored nine points and Hardmon added seven as the Monarchs built an 18-point lead before settling for a 34-21 halftime bulge.

A layup by Bolton-Holfield opened the second half before the Miracle began their comeback. Adrienne Johnson hit a pair of three-pointers and Sales and Shannon Johnson sank one each before a bucket by Taj McWilliams cut the deficit to 45-44 with 12:35 to play.

Orlando continued to battle and tied the score at 50-50 with 9:21 remaining, the first time the game had been tied since it was 3-3 in the first minute of the game, on a shot from close range by McWilliams.

Sales tied the game for the final time at 55-55 with 6:25 remaining, but then the Monarchs ran off nine straight points. Penicheiro put Sacramento ahead for good with a driving layup.

Bolton-Holfield followed with a jumper from the corner, Hardmon converted off the fast-break and Bolton-Holfield made a three-pointer, giving the Monarchs a 64-55 lead with 2:52 left. The Miracle got no closer than four points thereafter.

Adrienne Johnson hit four three-pointers and finished with
