Lead Changes Again Cards Clip Cubs

The St. Louis Cardinals, once again perched atop the National League, are also bidding fair to lead the league in nonchalance.

The Cards opened a critical three-game series with the remarkable Chicago Cubs Tuesday night with both teams tied for the league lead. A brilliant relay play from center field to the plate transformed Ted Savage from the potential Chicago tying run to the final out in a 6-3 St. Louis victory.

And how did the Cardinals react? Calmly, to the least.

"Maxie (shortstop Dal Maxvill) told me to throw so I threw," said Julian Javier, who relayed the ball in from second, with an authentic shrug. "I wasn't surprised."

"I didn't think it was such a great play," yawned catcher Tim McCarver, who made the throw. "I mean the ball was right there so what's the big deal?"

In other less nerve-wracking National League action Tuesday night, Philadelphia pounded Houston 12-5, San Francisco edged New York 5-4, Atlanta edged Cincinnati 1-0 and Los Angeles beat Pittsburgh 3-1.

Rich Allen carried Philadelphia's hit stick, pounding out four hits—including his 12th homer—driving in four runs, scoring three and stealing two bases. Jimunning got his 19th victory.

Jesus Alon's bases-loaded single in the bottom of the ninth won the game for San Francisco after the Mets had tied the game in the top of the inning on John Sullivan's two-run single and Larry Stan's homer in the mound, which scored a run.

Pat Jarvis hurled a two-hitter.

'We'd Do It Again'

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Everybody said third base coach Pete Reiser made the right call when he sent Ted Savage home in the ninth inning.

"I think they'd do the same thing over again," said Bobby Tolan, whose throw from the outfield to relay man Julian Javier helped nail Savage at the plate and preserved the Cardinals' 4-3 victory over the Cubs Tuesday night.

"It looks bad now but it was a good play," Tolan said. "The Cubs went into the ninth on the short end of a 4-2 score. Enzo Banks singled to lead off the inning and Savage, pitching for Clarence Jones, was hit by a pitch. Ron Willis came in and got the first two outs."

Then Al Spangler came up with the count at 3 and 2 and lined a solid single to center. Banks scored from second and Savage steamed homeward.

Tolan fired to Javier and the second baseman turned and threw to Tim McCarver at the plate.

"Maxie told me to throw home, so I threw," Javier shrugged, as if the game hadn't meant sole possession of first place to the Cardinals. "When I threw at the plate, I was a little nervous, so I knew I had a lot of time. I wasn't surprised when he tried to go home."

Neither was McCarver, who couldn't understand what all the fuss was about. "I didn't think it was such a great play. I mean the ball was right there so what's the big deal?"

And Pete Reiser wasn't about to have second thoughts on the call.

"We've gotten a few this year in the same situation when the throw has gotten away," Reiser said. "We've been during the infielders and the outfielders all year. We just didn't make it this time. Manager Leo Durocher of the Cubs agreed. 'I would have done the same thing Reiser did. The throw didn't have to be there. It could have been bad.'"

The 4900-pound star quarterback for the New York Jets of the American Football League strained a tendon in his left knee in an NFL training camp at Peekskill, N.Y., Tuesday.

He hopes of winning the AFL championship will be jolted.

In 1966, his second as a pro QB, the 202-pound Namath turned in the league's best performance by completing 232 of 471 passes for 3,279 yards, including 19 TD passes. He had 11 interceptions.

The Jets' training camp at Peekskill, N.Y., Tuesday and Wednesday were re-instituted.

OTTAWA (AP) — An unexpected reception awaited President Charles de Gaulle in Canada's capital today following a visit from Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson and mounting protests over his support for Quebec separatists.

No matter how you slice it, ham has to be one of the most versatile of all meats. You can serve it for breakfast, lunch or dinner. And since it is delicious cold or hot, it's ideal for summer living. Just think of all the good menus you can plan around one baked ham. First a hot meal. Then with the remaining portions of the meat you can:
 Slice it thin for breakfast or sandwiches.
 Mince or chop it for making sand-wiches or stuffing tomatoes. Just add mayonnaise and chopped pickle after you've minced the meat for this type salad filling.
 Cut it into very thin, long (julienne) strips to add to tossed salad. Or cut the ham, cheese and any other cold meats to place atop shredded lettuce for chef's salad. Serve with your favorite dressing.
 Make appetizers with thinly sliced ham, American cheese and party rye bread. Spread the bread with mustard (the kind with horseradish is best for this), mayonnaise and a bit of butter. If you want hot snacks, pop the miniature sandwiches in the oven to warm.
 Or place cubes of ham on toothpicks for dipping into a sauce made of mustard, mayonnaise and horseradish. You'll have to taste and test as you mix for the sauce. Use a cup of mayonnaise, half a cup of mustard and a tablespoon of horseradish. You might not like it that hot!
 And for excellent flavor in vegetable dishes and soups, save your ham bone, fat and juices. Freeze several pieces of fat and meat in a small plastic bag to be used later. From a whole ham you'll probably have enough of these pieces to make about five flavor-packs. Add the fat, meat pieces or juices to green beans, summer squash, lima beans or black-eye peas as they cook. They're also delicious . . . as is the ham bone . . . for making soups.

It's In The Bag - Paper Bag, That Is

NEW YORK (AP) — The fun's in the bag — the paper bag — this summer. Paper bikinis, paper surf jackets, paper hats, paper culottes, paper sandals—even paper wedding gowns and paper gray flannel suits. Temporary fashion has sent the nation on a wastebasket binge.

"Paper is in now," said Melvin E. Dinsley, president of Lord & Taylor, the New York-based department store chain. "Only time will tell if it is a fad. If designing keeps good, it will be lasting."

"The whole area has begun to expand like crazy," said a spokesman for Kimberly-Stevens Corp., a major supplier of paper-type material which is 92 per cent cellulose and 7 per cent nylon.

Americans spent \$3.5 million on paper clothes last year when the first paper togery was introduced. This summer the paper caper is bigger than ever. Designs are more elaborate, prints are colorful.

By 1968, paper will account for 25 per cent of the apparel business, predicts Oliver James Sterling, 36, a former Texas oil man.

Sterling set up shop just this past year and now has six plants turning out 15,000 to 20,000 items a day — items like cow-collared catkins, ruffled mini-dresses, pant suits, evening culottes and tortoise shell strapped evening dresses — all made from paper.

The newest item is a double-breasted suit for men, to sell for about \$12. "It looks like gray flannel," he says. "It should be great for businessmen and conventions."

It began almost inadvertently last year when Scott Paper Co. offered a paper A-line dress for \$1 to promote its colored tissues. It was swamped with orders for 500,000 dresses.

Since then department stores across the country have opened paper boutiques, and dozens of designers and manufacturers have jumped in. Paper prints now are sold by the yard.

There are matching bed spreads and curtains, chests of drawers. In dining rooms, whimsical lampshades, mirrors, chairs and a 7-foot daisy 540 — all made from paper — at Paper Place, Inc., the Brooklyn department store. Abraham & Straus opened this spring.

Turtle Egg-Laying Time

BUTCHERSON ISLAND (AP) — The huge loggerhead turtle glided gently through the surf on the crest of a small, rolling wave. She raised her 250 pound bulk above the ebbing water and inhaled for several minutes before grunting and moving herself onto the dry sand.

The weight of the giant turtle forced the edges of her scaly shell into wet flipper skin as she pulled herself along through the sand. Blood often stains the path.

Experienced turtle watchers come to these beaches, mostly at night, to watch one of nature's most unusual shows on Florida's east coast 25 miles north of Miami.

Each year from the first full moon in June until August the sea turtles come a shore to lay their eggs.

Rarely giant trunkback turtles weighing up to 2,000 pounds are spotted.

Turtles dig a nest with rear flippers, scooping the sand out with alternate strokes. It takes about 20 minutes for her to dig a hole two feet deep and enlarged at the bottom.

With mournful sighs the big loggerhead begins laying eggs. She cries. During 30 minutes she will lay 100 to 130 white, leathery eggs ranging in size from a golf ball to a tennis ball.

The eggs are soft and yield to pressure but don't break like a chicken egg.

Although the turtles won't quite arrange if there is noise or activity, once they begin laying eggs they are apparently oblivious to disturbances or commotion around them.

Afterward, the turtle covers the nest with sand and sprints to the sea. It takes seven weeks for the eggs to hatch and they never see their mother.

Some turtle watchers believe the loggerheads find a nesting place can be helpful in predicting how severe the coming hurricane season will be.

If the turtles pick a spot far from the ocean, terrible hurricanes may be expected, goes the legend. The theory is that the turtles put their nest safely beyond the reach of the waves from a stormy sea.

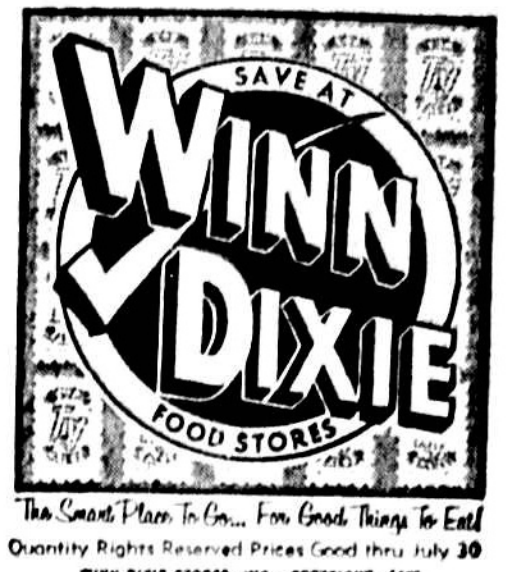
