(Q)-In regard to college student deferments, is a junior college considered an institution of higher learning? (A)-Yes, if the credits given by the junior college are acceptable toward the granting of a baccalaureate degree by a college, university, or similar institution of learning.

(Q)-What are the limitations, if any, on how long a person can be deferred as an undergraduate college student? (A)-A registrant can be deferred in Class II-S as an undergraduate college student until he satisfies the requirement for his baccalaureate degree if completed within the normal and specified time, fails to pursue satisfactorily a fulltime course of instruction, or becomes 24 years of age, whichever occurs first.

(Q)-Will registrants who become fathers after the new selective service law became effective be deferred in Class (A)-Every case is considered on an individual basis hence an all-inclusive answer cannot

The only change made in eligibility requirements for deferment as a father (Class III-A) under the Military Selective Service Act of 1967, as compared with the former Universal Military Training and Service Act, is the addition of a restriction that registrants who are classified in Class II-S after the new selective service law went into effect (June 30, 1967) shall not be eligible for classification in Class III-A as fathers but may qualify on the basis of hardship to depend-

No matter how you slice it, ham has to be one of the most versatile of all meats. You can serve it for breakfast, lunch or dinner. And since it is delicious cold or hot, it's ideal for summer living. Just think of all the good menus you can plan around one baked ham. First a hot meal. Then with the remaining portions of the meat you can:

sandwiches. Mince or chap it for making sandwiches or stuffing tomatoes. Just add mayonnaise and chopped pickle after you've minced the meet for this type salad filling. Turtle **Egg-Laying** Time

HUTCHINSON ISLAND (AP) The huge loggerhead turtle glided gently through the surf on the crest of a small, rolling wave. She raised her 250 pound bulk above the ebbing water and istened for several minutes before grunting and moving herself onto the dry sand. The weight of the glant turtle forces the edges of her heavy shell into soft flipper skin as she pulls herself along through the sand. Blood often stains the

Experienced turtle watchers come to these beaches, mostly at night, to watch one of nature's most unusual shows on Florida's east coast 25 miles north of Miami. Each year from the first full moon in June until August the sea turtles come ashore to lay






