

Axis Plane Losses Are Reported 50 Percent Higher Than Allied

 WASHINGTON—What has happened to the Luftwaffe? The authoritative British Magazine "Aeroplane" reports that the ratio of Axis losses to United Nations losses has risen steadily and that by the end of May was nearly 50 percent higher—13,744 Axis planes knocked down since war began against 9,358 Allied craft. This did not include operations on the Russian front.

Official figures on operations of the U.S. Eighth Air Force alone (the Eighth is based in Britain) show the first of the year show a widening spread between our and enemy losses: eighteen bomber losses in January against 52 enemy fighters; 23 in April against 144 enemy fighters; 85 in June against 304.

So, obviously, one thing that has happened to the Luftwaffe is that a large part of it has been shot down. Our losses are increasing, too, but this may be taken simply as evidence of our mounting plane production which allows us to throw more and more planes into the offensive. The more we venture, naturally, the more we lose—but we gain more too, whereas the Germans, with their primarily defensive strategy, can do little but lose and lose.

Axis losses however, mean little except in the light of replacements.

Total German and Italian front line planes were estimated at about 12,500 at the start of the year (against the French and British total of 7,700). At the first of this year the Luftwaffe itself was down to about 5,000. "Aeroplane" sets present German bomber strength at about 2,000. Already last January it was

evident that the Germans were hoarding their planes. AP war correspondent Wes Gallagher wrote: "Where 100 Stukas once appeared in central Tunisia, only 15 now appear; where 40 Axis fighters flew, only four fly now."

If the Nazis were hanging on to their planes on the theory they could be better employed when it came to defending Europe, the unexpectedly fast developments in Italy have shown this up as bad strategy. Now the day when virtually all of Germany will be reachable from Italian bases is in sight, and the few more months which the Nazi might have used to build up a bigger reserve have vanished.

It is doubtful that her bomb-riddled factories could have done much more than keep step with losses anyway. It is plainly impossible to make any kind of accurate estimate as to how much Nazi aircraft production has been hamstrung, but it is equally plain that Germany is not going to come anywhere near the 16,000 to 24,000 ships it was estimated she turned out last year.

American-British production this year is planned at about 100,000. Part of this will go against the Japs, but Russian production (Moscow won't say what it is) should make up some of the difference.

Another thing that must be giving Goering fits is the fuel situation. The Ploesti oil refineries in Rumania are a big source of Axis aviation gasoline. We have already given Ploesti a serious setback, and bases in Italy would permit our squadrons to set up a "milk route" to Rumania like the one they flew from England to

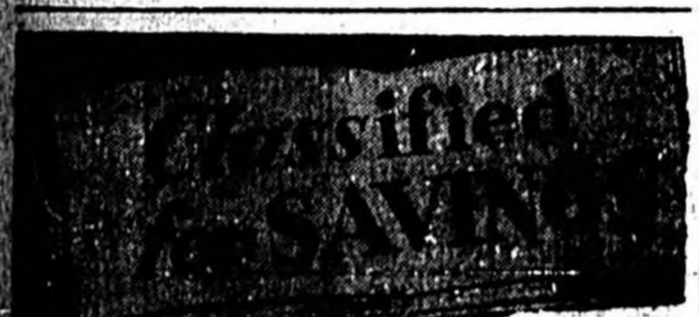

Kiska Is Important Because Of Harbors

 KISKA, consistently bombarded by Allied air power during thirteen and a half months of Japanese occupation and perhaps the next step on the road

to Tokyo, is chiefly important because of its two harbors—large Kiska harbor and the smaller Gertrude Cove. Both are suitable for submarine bases and seaplanes. The main Japanese installations are reported to be located at Kiska Harbor. A landing at Gertrude Cove would make it necessary for an attacking army to take narrow passes and surmount a range of high hills.

Most mountainous of the western Aleutians, gourd-shaped Kiska rises to an elevation of more than 4,000 feet in the north where the Jap replacements are situated. Broad, deep Kiska Harbor, closed to foreign shipping even before the war, is on the lowlying central coast, and is protected by Little Kiska Island which extends across the mouth. The twenty-mile island has been a naval reserve for more than two decades—landings, flights over it and inspection were prohibited. Although it probably went down on the Jap record as one of the first naval bases to fall, it was never defended, and occupied by only a weather observation crew.

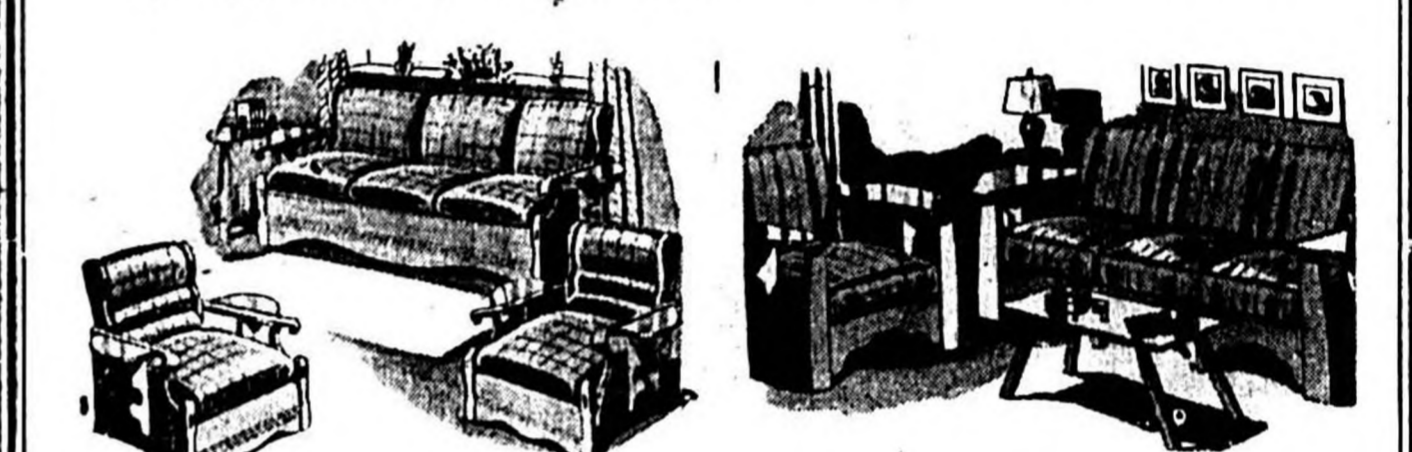

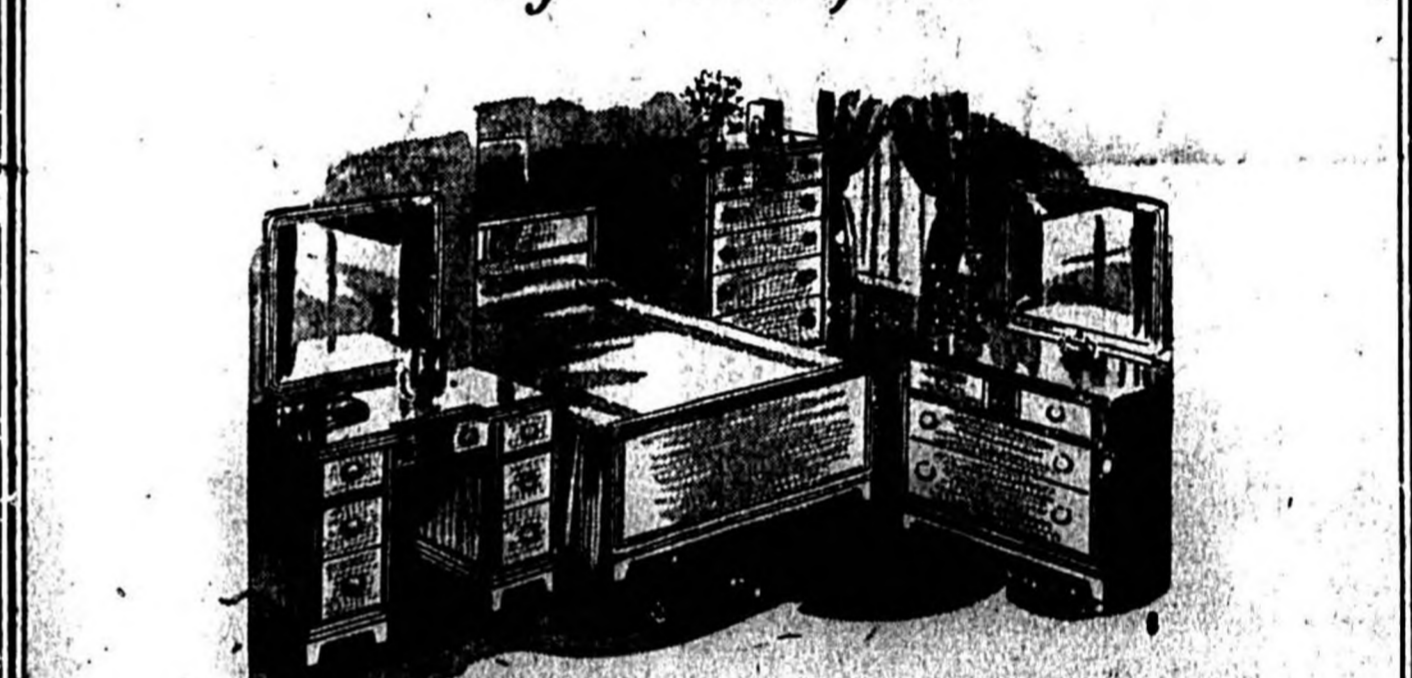

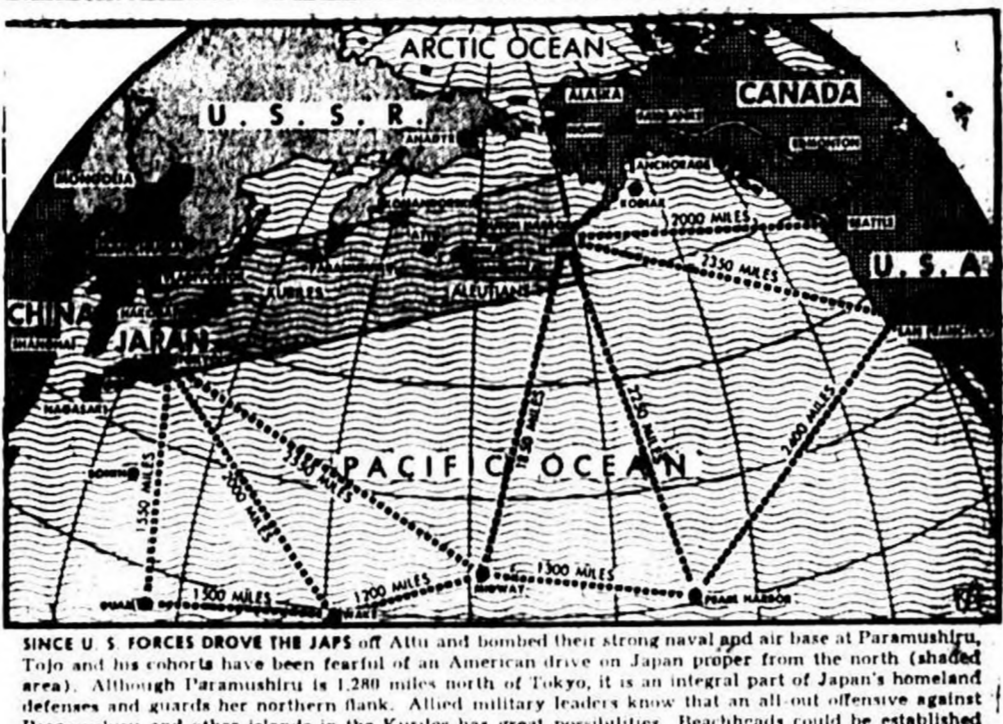

Army Air Force Decides To Give Atlantic City Back To Tourists

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J.—The burke solemnly wagged his head and proclaimed: "We sure will miss the boys."

He thereby summed up the post-Occupation sentiments of the seashore resort that first put salt water taffy and bathing beauties on the map—and which one year ago was invaded by thundering swarms of Uncle Sam's husky neophyte eagles.

Now the Army Air Forces, after putting a quarter-million youths through basic training here, find the schooling emergency sufficiently slackened to give the city back to the tourists. By mid-August the Occupation, with minor exceptions, is expected to be over.

Case History

What's happened is a case history of what may occur wherever the post-Pearl Harbor crisis sends the Axis to the sea. Big towns and big towns for hurry-up quarters. The town looks the same, but there are differences.

Take hotels, for example. The pros and cons concerning them have engendered skirmishing between some hotelmen and War Department officials.

All 17 all-rooms beachfront hostels and 30 other inns, to tally 15,000 rooms—half of the city's facilities—were taken over. Houses with rooms for 800 persons, guests were packed with 4,000 athletic youngsters. Six hundred small hotels were left for civilians.

"Wear and tear on equipment was exceptional," says Alvin Hunsicker, president of the hotelmen's association. For instance, he says bureau tops were given saturated pattern of cigarette burns, walls were battered with muddy boot imprints, floors were scuffed. Fancy plumbing made way for less aesthetic but more practical rows of shower sprinklers unornate wooden stairways burgoned as auxiliary fire escapes on outside walls. Electric washers found new utility as potato mashers for 4,000 hungry mouths.

The mischief wasn't malicious on the part of the warriors, that everyone agrees, and hotels used as officers' clubs came through the Occupation with little damage. But an unofficial estimate is it will cost \$500,000 to rehabilitate—and that's only part of the financial picture.

Hunsicker says that in an ordinary year the 47 hotels would gross \$12,000,000 but War rent payments probably won't exceed \$1,000,000. Convention Hall, pride of the city, which costs \$1,500 a day, went for \$75,000 for the year. Other hotelmen point out that the Occupation cut into two summer seasons at one year's rental. Most of the 10 hotels that returned won't be ready for civilians next month.

The Army puts a different complexion on the situation. Joseph C. Goldborough, project manager of the Corps of Engineers, asserts that "in many respects the property which the Army is returning to its owners after a year of use is in better condition than when the Army took possession."

Claims Adjusted

He adds that at some hostels equipment repairs and additions were made construction strengthened and cleanliness standards maintained in accordance with requirements of the surgeon general.

Appraisers are to adjust damage claims, but hotel furnishings aren't being made new and one spokesman estimates that 75 per cent of any equipment taken over in the Occupation will be a loss. The town businessmen won't forget the boys quickly either.

Frank W. Amatus, executive director of the Chamber of Commerce, cites increased bank clearances, the \$100,000,000 beachfront trade kept up well, thanks. There was, however, a change in trade channels. Two million of the \$1,500,000 monthly Army payroll ended up in bars.

Half the luxury shops—furs, jewelry, art galleries—folded for the duration. Mushrooming in their place were seven post offices, 32 military supply stores, scores of souvenir shops, three minute photograph galleries and rifle ranges.

World War II Is Bringing Medals To Many Women

Communique from the United Women's War Front in Europe: World War II has brought women the same medals for valor and bravery awarded to men.

Yekaterina Tkachenko, a 24-year-old Russian, received the Soviet medal "For Valor" in recognition of her secret work behind enemy lines when she discovered the Germans were preparing to send a detachment against Russian guerrillas, she trudged across difficult mountain country and warned the guerrillas in time. The Germans were repulsed in a fight for which Yekaterina acted as intelligence officer.

Sima Dneprovskaya, a support scout, bettered Yekaterina's medal record by winning two decorations for valor. She was active in capturing an enemy tank, machine gun and valuable military papers on the Leningrad front.

Eight Czechoslovakian women soldiers won top honors in medals from the Soviets for the fight they made beside their men on the eastern front. Two of the Czech women received the "Red Star" and the other six the "Medal for Bravery."

Add to that record the decorations bestowed on British women. The Auxiliary Territorial Service received 24 awards for gallantry. The Women's Auxiliary Air Force got 32 decorations for bravery and the Women's Royal Naval Service chalked up 19 service awards.

Fine, young Yugoslav nurses, serving with guerrilla bands around Kurpanj, have received applause from their countrymen for the independent action they took to save guerrilla lives after a recent battle. When the blood supply in their temporary field hospital ran low, three of the

nurses crawled a mile through mud, past the enemy's forward gun emplacements. There the surprised Nazis into surrender. All the three live Germans, they returned the way they had come. And within a few hours German blood was coursing through the veins of wounded Yugoslavs.

When the second front opens, a thousand Polish women expect to be ready for active service with British troops. They are training now in Scotland in the ranks of the PENTKIN (The Polish Women's Auxiliary Territorial Service), whose name, besides spelling the initials of the organization, little means the stone in a fruit. When the Allied troops enter to follow the Poles, they expect to follow the Polish troops, serve in their posts in field hospitals, care and administration work behind the lines. Some of them may fight with them as the original P.K. did when the Nazis invaded

Poland.

French "Sea Assistants" in England are doing something different in wartime welfare work. They visit ships in port, learn what the crews need, visit their sick wives, trace missing relatives and otherwise try to help solve their personal problems.
