

Axis Plane Losses Are Reported 50 Percent Higher Than Allied

WASHINGTON. What has happened to the Luftwaffe?

The authoritative British Magazine "Aeroplane" reports that the rate of Axis losses to United Nations losses has risen steadily and that by the end of May was nearly 50 percent higher—18,744 Axis planes knocked down since war began against 3,656 Allied aircraft. This did not include operations on the Russian front.

Official figures on operations of the U.S. Eighth Air Force alone (the Eighth is based in Britain) since the first of the year show a widening spread between our and enemy losses: eighteen bombers downed; Japanese against 52 American fighters; 29 downed April against 144 enemy fighters; 86 in June against 304.

So obviously, one thing that has happened to the Luftwaffe is that a large part of it has been shot down. Our losses are increasing, too, but may be taken almost as evidence of our mounting plane production, which allows us to throw more and more planes into the offensive. The more we venture, naturally, the more we lose—but we gain more, too, whereas the Germans, with their primarily defensive strategy, have little but loss and little Axis losses, however, in Hitler's air except in the light of replacements.

Total German and Italian front line planes were estimated at about 12,500 at the start of the war (against the French and British total of 7,700). At the start this year the Luftwaffe's total was down to about 5,000. "Aeroplane" sets present Nazi bomber strength at about 2,000. Already last January it was

evident that the Germans were hoarding their planes. AP war correspondent W. S. Gallagher wrote: "Where 100 Stukas once appeared in central Tunisia, only 15 now appear; where 40 Axis fighters flew, only four fly now."

If the Nazis were hanging on to their planes on the theory they could be better employed when it came to defending Europe, the unexpectedly fast developments in Italy have shown this up as bad strategy. Now the day when virtually all of Germany will be reachable from Italian bases is in sight, and the few more months which the Nazi might have used to turn up a bigger reserve have vanished.

It is doubtful that her bomb-riddled factories could have done much more than keep step with losses anyway. It is plainly impossible to make any kind of accurate estimate as to how much Nazi aircraft production has been halting, but it is equally plain that Germany is not likely to come anywhere near the 18,000 to 24,000 ships it was estimated she turned out last year.

American-British production this year is planned at about 100,000. Part of this will go against tanks, but American production (Moscow won't say what it is) should make up some of the difference.

Another thing that must be giving Goering fits is the fuel situation. The Ploesti oil refineries in Romania are a big source of Axis aviation gasoline. We have already given Ploesti a serious setback. The British should permit our squadrons to set up a "milk route" to Romania like the one they flew from England to

The Germans have already admitted Allied air superiority in certain localities and there seems to be no doubt that they are losing the air war. Perhaps right now there is debate in high places in Berlin over whether it would be wise to sue for peace and use the remaining German planes and tanks, submarines and factories—as political weapons at the peace table rather than as military weapons in a losing fight. The counter-argument, by the Nazis, would be that they are in the soup anyway and might as well take a chance on fighting it out.







Visit Is Made By Churchill To Hyde Park

President And Prime Minister Confer 3 Days Preparatory To Quebec Meeting

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16. (AP)—President Roosevelt returned to Washington today after a conference with Prime Minister Churchill and the White House said he would join the war conferences in Quebec "this week."

QUEBEC, Aug. 16. (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill was back in Quebec today after a three-day visit with President Roosevelt at Hyde Park and the American Chief Executive is expected here shortly for the opening of their war strategy conference.

Allied military strategy for Europe presumably occupies the top spot among all matters the Allied leaders must examine. Other points apparently slated for consideration include the conduct of the war in the Pacific and immediate and long range political problems.

President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill conferred for three days at the President's Hyde Park, N.Y., home.

The two Allied leaders issued a joint statement Saturday on results of the anti-submarine campaign against the Axis during the past month.

Mr. Roosevelt, in his statement, simply "reassured" Churchill "that they had met in advance of their scheduled major talks with Allied staff chiefs in Quebec this week."

No Hint Given

No hint was given as to the nature of the Roosevelt-Churchill talks, but it was believed doubtful that it was much time to discuss military or political matters at this early stage. Their "informal discussions were nevertheless of international significance."

The prime minister of Great Britain, with his daughter, has been visiting the President and Mrs. Roosevelt at Hyde Park for three days and has now returned to Quebec," the announcement said.

The President is returning to Washington but he will join the two Allies in Quebec this week.

President Churchill's daughter, Mary, a subaltern in the British army women's auxiliary, heightened the likelihood that the visit was primarily social. Nothing was said of the whereabouts of Mrs. Churchill, who also accompanied the prime minister to Canada.

Information Sought On Game Resources

The Commission, he added, is required by law to establish these rules and regulations at least 60 days prior to the date on which they go into effect, and for this reason will be soon, due to time and travel limitations, be unable to do so.







Hendricks Is Main Speaker At Luncheon

Tells Kiwanians Of Dangers Facing Nation Now And In Post - War World

We have thousands of communists in our government in Washington and the American people, and particularly the American Legion, had better think what is going to happen to our country if these communists are not kicked out of our government, Representative Leo Hendricks told Sanford Kiwanians and their guests at a luncheon presided over by President G.D. Workman at the Mayfair Hotel today.

Declaring against both isolationism and entangling alliances for America in the Post-war world, Representative Hendricks said this country should sign no peace which interfered in any way with our having a large standing Army and Navy "strong enough for us to tell any nation in the world with aggressive designs against another to stay out of her neighbor's backyard."

Introduced by Mayor Ed Higgins who said that Representative Hendricks has always been of great assistance on all local projects, the Congressman declared he would speak on the Post-War America and the Post-war World, and if he was accused of repeating history, he was willing to accept that charge and it would be remembered.

Mentioning the Atlantic Charter and the Four Freedoms, Representative Hendricks said that "The United States cannot guarantee the Four Freedoms" and "neither can any combination of nations without interfering in the internal affairs of other nations."

"We cannot give freedom of speech to Russia," he said. "With our intervening in the internal affairs of Russia, we are giving freedom from want without interfering in their internal policies."

"There are some in Washington," he said, "who would make of the Atlantic Charter a worldwide WPA. Henry Wallace, Harry Hopkins and Wendell Willkie are pushing it, and they will be the whole world's collisions freedom from want and freedom of speech, when the most we can hope to give them is freedom from fear from aggression with out."

"They would also have us adopt a hush-hush attitude toward Russia and Russia's internal affairs and might be offended if we told the truth about Russia. The fact is that Stalin is just as much a dictator as Hitler is, or Mussolini was, and has no use whatever for democracy in government."

"I would say to Stalin: You have fought a great war and we are with you in it. We will help you defend your rights if you offend us, but we will collaborate with you in world affairs. But we do not like communism and we will do everything we can to get rid of communism in the United States. Stalin would understand that and he would like it."
