William Green Dies Of Heart Attack At 81

President Of American Federation Of Labor Had Lengthy Career As Unionist

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—William Green, president of the A. F. of L., died of a heart attack today at his home in Coshocton, O. The A. F. of L. announced.

Green was 81.

It was the second death of a major labor leader within a month. Philip Murray, head of the rival C. I. O., collapsed and died at San Francisco Nov. 17.

Green was born in Coshocton March 3, 1871, the son of a coal miner.

He was working in the Ohio mines before he was out of grade school and was a full-fledged miner by the time he was 18.

Green first turned to politics and served a term in the Ohio Senate. Then he went into union activity, pioneering in the field of national organization.

At 33, he had become president of the Ohio district mine workers union.

He advanced to secretary-treasurer of the American Federation of Labor in 1912, and became president of the union when Samuel Gompers died in 1924.

The A. F. of L. had been in falling health for years, and his widow, Jennie, 82, has had ill health for five years. They had five daughters and one son.

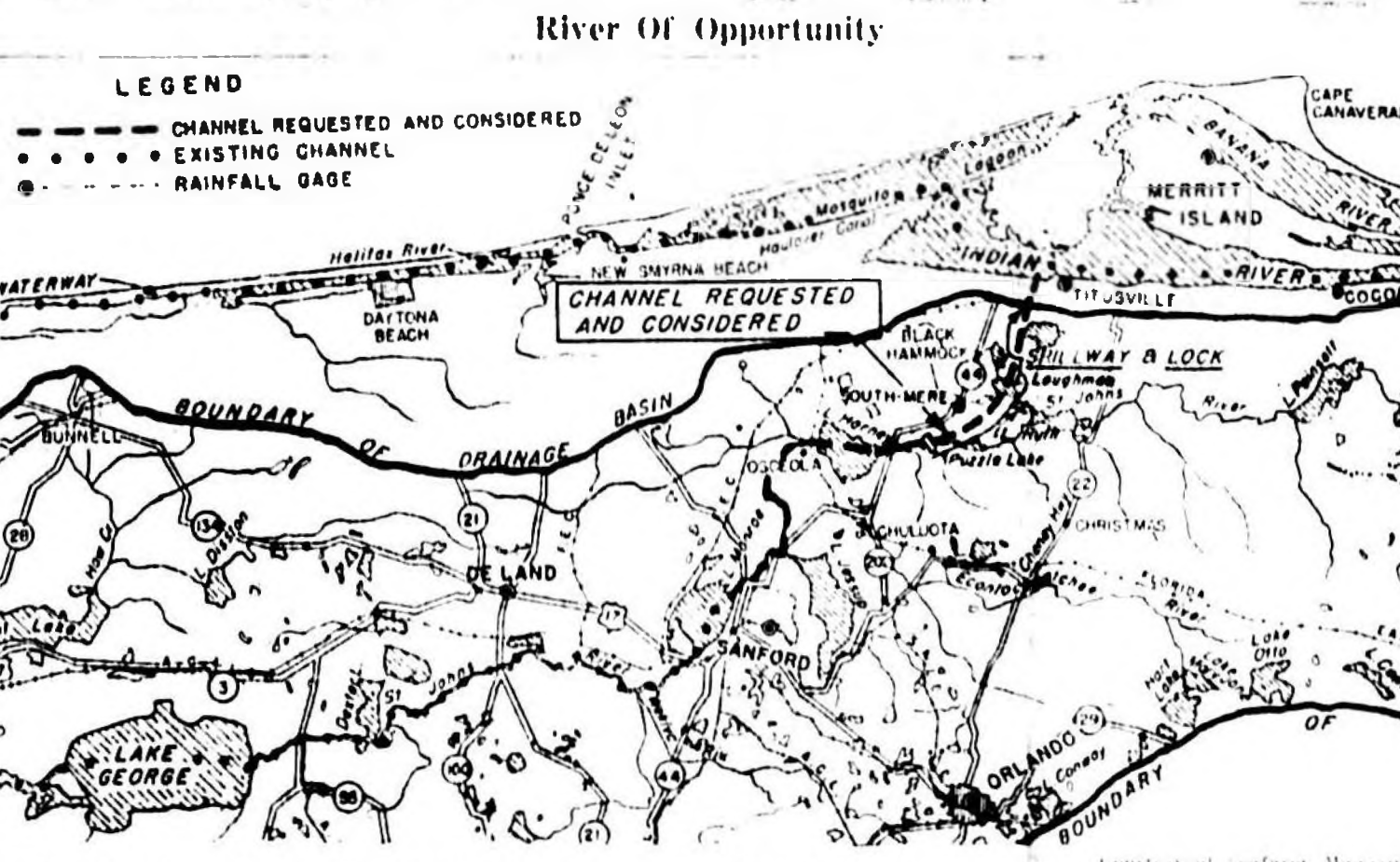

W.D. Upshaw, Former Visitor, Dies At 86

William D. Upshaw, 86, author, lecturer and preacher who as a congressman won the sobriquet "driest of the drys," died today in Glendale, California.

Mr. Upshaw had been a frequent visitor in Sanford and spent one winter at the Fellowship Farm where the Sanford Naval Air Station is now located. He gave several lectures at Sanford churches during his stay here.

He went to Congress in 1919 from Georgia as a Democrat and served eight years. In 1922 he polled 80,000 votes as the Prohibition party's presidential candidate.

For years a lecturer in schools and churches on the "evils of liquor," he became an ordained Baptist minister at 79 and conducted his attack on alcohol from the pulpit on mission tours.

Progress Of St. Johns-Indian River Canal Project Is Related

"River of Opportunity" may be the motto of the St. Johns-Indian River Improvement Committee organized at Sanford July 29 to promote the Sanford Titusville navigation canal and other waterway projects in Central Florida.

Urged on by a keynote address by George W. Gibbs, the meeting, attended by about 75 persons from up and down the St. Johns basin and the Indian River shores, set their sights on the goal and developed a firm course of action to achieve it. Earl Brown, the De Land exhibitor and promoter, was elected to serve as temporary president of the group.

The meeting provided answers to two great questions. What will the Sanford Titusville canal do for Central Florida? And how can we get it started?

The Corps of Engineers has directed its studies of the canal project along the lines of a multi-purpose waterway serving the needs of navigation, recreational boating, flood control and water stabilization. Complexity of the problem has been largely responsible for the tortuous delays in the studies.

Navigating a few years prior to World War II, the Jacksonville district engineer estimated savings in cost of moving freight between Sanford and the Indian River via the proposed canal at \$25,000 annually. This was at a time when Central Florida was largely an agricultural land. Industries have since begun to move into the territory. Rail transportation costs have virtually doubled during the intervening years and the savings to be effected by water transportation have increased proportionately. It can be assumed that still greater use will be made of water transportation in the future.

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Capt. Mellon Killed In Bloody Indian Battle On Lake Monroe

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the third of a series of articles by Mrs. J. M. Walker on the battle of Lake Monroe. In this article Mrs. Walker describes the attack on Fort Mellon by a band of Seminoles.

In December 1839, Camp Monroe was established by Col. Fort Mellon on the north bank of the beautiful lake which bears that name. (1832 Note) About twenty miles from the mouth of the lake, the post was occupied by two companies of artillery, four companies of dragoons and some Creek Indians. The chief, King Phillip and his son, Conowhee, made an attack upon the post with 100 Seminoles, on Feb. 8, 1837.

The late Maj. Sydney Herbert Lancy, the gifted military writer who obtained data from the War Department in 1877, describes the battle as follows:

"By MRS. J. M. WALKER

arrived at Camp Monroe, Feb. 8, 1837 and although ranking officer, he did not take command, but took immediate steps to fortify the place against attack from Indians, then in the vicinity. He was none too soon as the attack came early in the morning. The Indians made a desperate assault led by brave Indian chiefs.

Republican politics at the G.I. convention he was an aspirant for the nomination but switched his votes to Eisenhower to give the general the nomination on the first ballot.

Brownell was a long-time right hand man of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York.

Before the convention he was announced Eisenhower conferred with Senator H. Alexander Smith of New Jersey who said the general was only going to Korea and will not visit Japan or any other countries.

Smith said he understood Eisenhower's specific purpose in going to Korea are to talk with the commanders of the Eighth Army and to see President Rhee of the Republic of Korea.

Eisenhower was working his way through a heavy schedule of callers today. In addition to Sen. Smith he talked with:

1. Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge of Massachusetts, his liaison man in Washington with the fading Democratic administration, who said "there is still a lot to do" in the Republican examination of various executive branches of the federal government.

2. George Meany, secretary-treasurer of the American Federation of Labor, who said he had a "nice pleasant talk". The AFL supported Eisenhower's Democratic opponent, Gov. Adlai Stevenson.

Reporters surmised that Meany came bearing the olive branch of peace.

3. Claude Vardaman, chairman of the Alabama State Central Republican Committee, who said they discussed the importance of building up the two-party system in the South.

4. Sen. William Knowland of California, who said he had "no comment whatever on that" when he was asked if he is going to be leader of the Senate in the 83rd Congress.

Meanwhile Eisenhower appeared to be hastening his plans to leave for Korea.

temporarily Allied field troops humiliated the enemy and Allied forces recaptured the positions without opposition.

On the Central Front, southeast of Capitul Hill, 175 Chinese hit an Allied outpost early today and engaged U. N. defenders in hand-to-hand fighting. The battle raged for three hours until Eighth Army troops brought up reinforcements and the Chinese broke contact at 5:30 a. m. and withdrew.

Light bombers of the U. S. Fifth Air Force hunted trucks a second successive night and reported destruction of 173 Communist supply vehicles on main routes in North Korea. This raised to 350 the total of vehicles knocked out in two nights.

DEALER CONVICTED

TAMPA (AP)—A Federal Court jury Thursday convicted Harry Hamilton, St. Petersburg used car dealer, of crossing a state line with a stolen car and selling it.

Hamilton insisted he did not know the car was stolen, but admitted selling it under an assumed name after driving it from Tampa to Mobile.

He said he did not get a cent out of the deal and that the whole affair was planned by his business partner, Ward Kah.

Kah, who pleaded guilty, was fined \$500 and placed on extended probation. Ward's sentencing was deferred.

**Citizens Advised On
Garbage Collection**

Local residents who wish to have special garbage pick-up service at their homes, as provided under a recent amendment to a City ordinance, should register at the City Clerk's office before Dec. 1, Tom Lemon, City Manager, said today.

The amendment, which becomes effective Dec. 1, provides the special service at a cost of \$1 per month to parties having no alleys near their residences where regular pick-ups may be made by the City.

Mr. Lemon said that December will be covered through the paying of \$1 by Dec. 1 by those desiring the service, but that the payment of \$12 will be required by Jan. 1 to cover next year. He stated the payment of the entire year would dispense with extra work which would be involved in smaller payments.

Payment of the fee should be made to the City Tax Collector, who will deposit the funds to the general revenues of the City, for use of the Garbage and Trash Department. The fee shall be payable for each single-family dwelling unit requiring such service and shall be paid by the occupant of the unit.

Free service by the City is provided residences with adjoining alleys. Also no charge will be made for pick-up charge if residents desire to leave containers at front yards, where alleys are not available.

"This board of trustees if appointed, consisting as it does of a doctor (Dr. Seaman) who has had prior experience in the construction of a hospital, and an accountant-manager, (Mr. Evans) with wide business experience in handling the financial affairs of one of the county's largest firms; an attorney, (Mr. Wilson) who is closely related with the legal affairs of the Fish Estate; and two successful businessmen, one with extensive experience in construction and the other with acknowledged organizational ability, (Mr. Hutchison and General Hutchison) would have the necessary attributes to assure the people of Seminole County of effective handling of the problem of constructing a hospital in Seminole County at the earliest possible time."

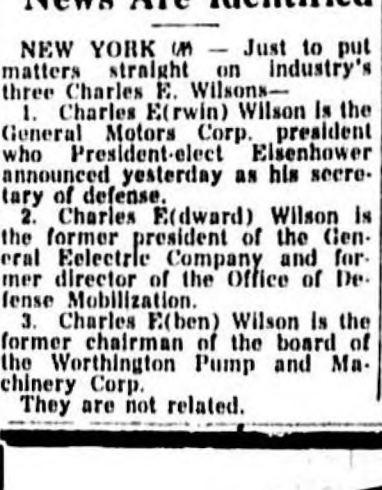

tenant levees and flood control works would create an annual increase of \$25,000 in crop production. This estimate was a conservative figure derived from the gross production of \$3,050,000 in the area.

Estimated increase in value of cattle was \$74,000, based on the same formula.

These figures have since changed appreciably, though the district engineer has not yet released his latest estimates. Citrus and truck production in Central Florida is rising greatly, and the cattle industry of Central Florida is recognized as one of the fastest growing enterprises in the state.

Water Stabilization: Theory behind the \$28,000,000 Central and Southern Florida Flood Control Project is the stabilization of water conditions, holding back floods during the wet season, clearing waters during the dry season. Value of restraining floodwater is indicated in estimates of increased crop and cattle production, as well as protection of houses, buildings, roads and utilities.

The value of holding the water for gradual release during dry seasons lies in protecting the underground water table, maintaining levels of water in wells and preventing infiltration of salt water through the ground.

**Violations Of Civil
Rights Are Charged**

TAMPA (AP)—The U. S. district attorney here has revived charges of civil rights violations against a former state prison camp head to get the case before the U. S. Supreme Court.

Herkert S. Phillips filed a new information Thursday accusing L. P. Jones, former head of the Phillips prison camp, of beating prisoners and depriving them of their civil rights.

Judge W. J. Barker recently quashed a federal grand jury indictment similarly charging Jones, ruling the federal government had no right to interfere with state prisons.

Phillips said the new information was filed as a legal move to get the U. S. Supreme Court to rule on the constitutional issues. He said it more sharply points up the facts at issue and will enable the Supreme Court to grasp the fundamental questions.

The improvement committee recognized the following steps for action:

1. The Sanford-Titusville navigation canal project must be welded to the huge Central and Southern Florida Flood Control District. Virtually all the canal at route is included in the district territory. Flood control district commissioners and engineers have accepted sponsorship of the canal works and suggested that they be presented to Congress as a modification of the currently authorized project.

This can be done at the next session of Congress.

2. The Florida State Legislature will be asked in 1953 to extend the flood control boundaries a few miles to include the entire canal route south of Sanford.

3. The St. Johns Indian River improvement projects should receive priority in construction. Engineers commence preparation of a Definite Project Report (DPR) on the Sanford-Titusville multipurpose project as part of the Central and Southern Florida Flood Control Project for which funds are available. The Corps of Engineers has recently discovered that data obtained in several previous surveys by other agencies can be correlated with their own data to save considerable expense and time.

4. The Improvement Association can assist the engineers by explaining the value of the project to the public.

**Accidental Arrest
Of Mobster Opens
Lurid Crime Trail**

LOS ANGELES (AP)—With deadpan mobster Leonard C. Mocerri accidentally in custody, police today sought answers to unsolved gangland executions dating from liquor bootlegging days to the modern Mafia.

"The nation's most wanted triggerman" was the tall given 45-year-old Leonard the Lip by Capt. J. E. Hamilton of the Los Angeles police intelligence unit.

He'd given officers the slip 20 years since indictment on four mob killings in Toledo, O., dating from 1931 to 1933. Officers think there might be some recent chapters such as the Bugsy Siegel murder, the killing of Mickey Cohen's attorney Sammy Hummel and the double slaying of Tony Brancato and Tony Trumbina in Hollywood a couple year back.

Detroit police also want to ask some questions concerning the demise of hoodlum Jack George whose body was found stuffed in an automobile trunk.

Right now police here seek Mocerri's ballet dancing wife, Margaret, who dropped from sight coincident with her hubby's arrest.

Backtracking to the Mocerri apartment in Hollywood, where he had been since May under the name of Leonard C. Mocerri, police officers, who had been plagued for some time by someone using slugs in that particular phone.

Later through fingerprints police discovered whom they had in custody, and also found some papers with names, addresses and telephone numbers.

From there the list of those brought in for questioning reads like an underworld Who's Who.

**Niagara Face-Lifting
Is Under Discussion**

TORONTO, Ont. (AP)—A joint U. S.-Canadian commission proposes to give Niagara Falls a face-lifting. It wants the famous waterfall to look more beautiful with less water.

Details of the project were disclosed yesterday to Canadian and U. S. parks and power officials by the International Joint Commission. The plans will be submitted to the two governments if approved quickly work could be started early next year and completed in 1955.

The commission's plans, developed after two years study by engineers, call for a control dam 1,550 feet long built from the Canadian side a mile above the falls. They also propose dredging the Niagara River bottom just above the brink of the horse-shoe falls.

The commission claims the project would reduce the present speed with which the river is eating away the brink of the falls and would make possible two van tage points on each tip of the horse-shoe from which an unobstructed view of the falls could be obtained. No estimate of the cost was announced.

"He first relaxed her for about 10 minutes," said the surgeon who performed the operation. "She was perfectly relaxed when he awoke her."

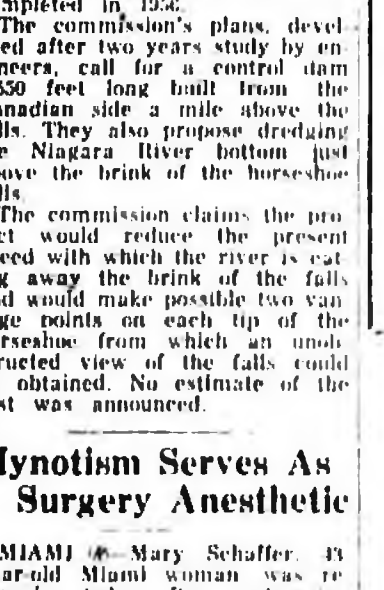
COMMITTEE TO REPORT
