## Seven Persons Burn To Death In Auto Crash

### Fourth Of July Celebrated With Heavy Travel But Few Accidental Deaths

MARIENVILLE, July 5, (AP)—Seven persons were burned to death, another killed and two seriously injured yesterday in a head on collision of two out-of-state automobiles three miles south of this town, state police reported.

Both cars—one from New York and the other from Ohio—burst into flames with the impact of the crash, trapping the seven persons in the New York automobile and burning their bodies beyond recognition. In general, Americans, celebrating the second wartime Fourth of July set an all-time high in holiday travel but due to gas rationing and no fireworks set a new low in holiday deaths and accidents.

Except for a few freak twists, Sunday, July 4 brought no more deaths than a normal Sunday, early reports indicated.

Travel Facilities Taxed While railway, bus and airline facilities groan under the heaviest passenger load in their histories, the Office of Defense Transportation warned workers that the return travel jam would be even worse, and urged all who could to start home before Monday night.

Transcontinental railway, bus and airline terminals were almost deserted Sunday and employees took a breathing spell before the coming of the homeward trek set in.

Love Raped One holiday death was that of a Detroit wife, who worked at a factory in the same war plant where her husband works night. She was raped and killed her husband by their holiday.

A Kalamazoo, Mich., girl was killed when a beam of brass bolted through her head.

At Oakland, Calif., a boy was killed in a bicycle accident.

A 58-year-old New York man was burned to death when a fire started at a cigarette factory.

Seven persons were killed in Ohio in automobile accidents.

Two persons died in traffic accidents in Iowa and four died in traffic accidents.

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## Wilson Reports Market Sales Of Over \$20,000,000

### Twice As Much Business Done On Some Crops As Last Year

JACKSONVILLE, July 5, (Special)—"I'm reporting to Nathan Mayo, commissioner of Agriculture, that the State Farm Market, which he created in 1938, has done a record business this year."

"Sales of fruits, vegetables and nuts this year totaled nearly sixteen million dollars as compared with \$9,968,007 last year," Mr. Wilson said.

"State markets at Live Oak and Lake City are preparing for the opening auction date tentatively set for July 27. This is the same date on which they opened last year but is about a week earlier than has been customary in former years."

We expect that we will be granted sufficient increase in our quota to provide for the increased demand," he said.

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## Polish Chief Said Killed In Plane Wreck

### German Offensive In Belgorod Area Of Russian Front Is Smashed By Soviet

LONDON, July 5, (AP)—The Polish government in exile announced today that Premier Wladyslaw Sikorski had been killed in an accident but the exact details of the accident were not given. Observers presumed he was en route from the Middle East, where he recently visited the Polish forces in Britain and that he was the victim of an air crash.

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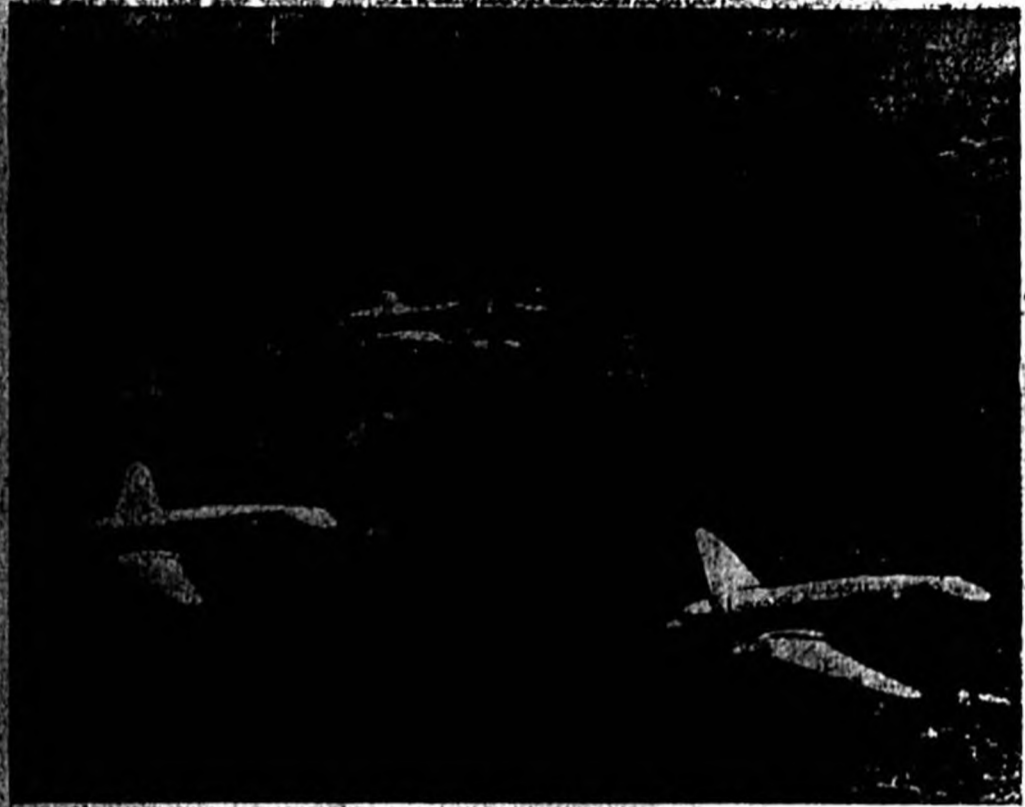

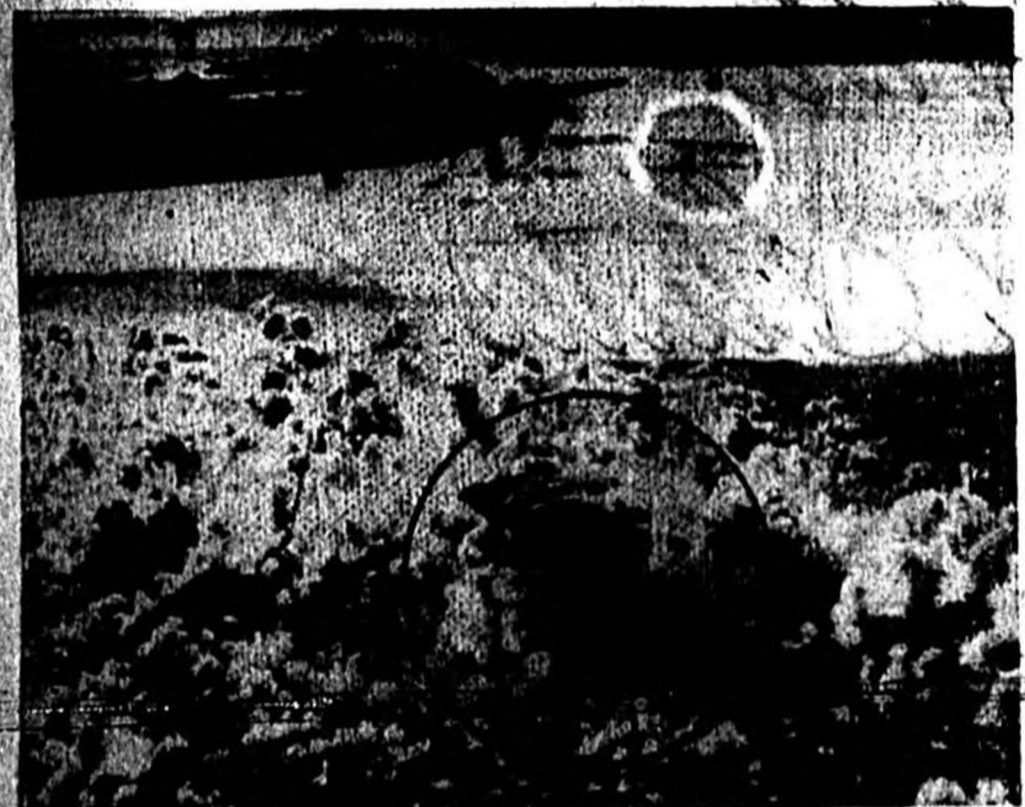

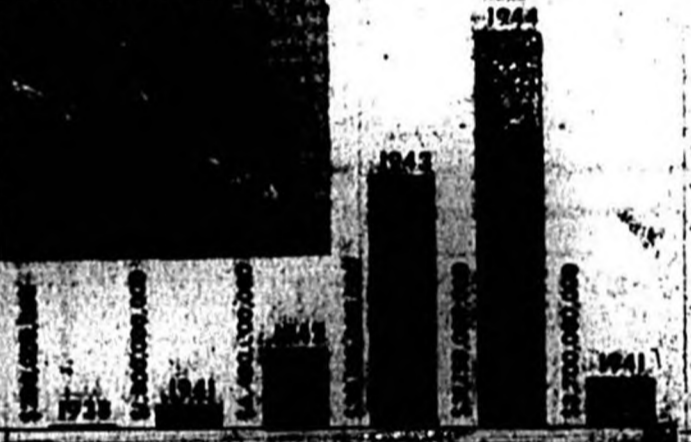

WAR has given birth to a new industrial force in America—a force that has put even the great pre-war automobile industry to shame for dollar volume of business and rapid growth. This new phenomenon is the aircraft industry, which in 1942 will produce planes to the value of \$21,150,000,000, an astronomical figure when compared with its own dollar volume for the year 1935, a mere \$240,000,000. Automobile production, which so profoundly influenced every part of American life, all its institutions, technology, marketing practices and distribution patterns, reached its all-time high in 1941 with a dollar volume of \$1,700,000,000. ### Price Ceilings On Cigarettes Fixed By Federal OPA

A. B. Peterson, secretary of the Seminole County Price and Rationing Board today released the rules and regulations as recently compiled by the OPA district office in Jacksonville in relation to prices on cigarettes, and price ceilings governing sales.

Cigarette prices are controlled by the OPA regulation which fixes the selling price as the maximum charged for such a commodity during March 1942 by each individual seller, he pointed out.

Since the State has levied a three cent tax on sales of packages of 10 cigarettes, each seller he added must add after July 1 charge for each brand of cigarettes, no more than the charge in March 1942, plus the amount of State and Federal taxes which will then total 3 1/2 cents per package. This may be additional 1/2 cent.

For example, he pointed out, cigarettes sold by a dealer in March 1942 for 15 cents a package of 10 cigarettes for 20 cents will now cost for no more than 15 cents a package or two packages for 30 cents.

Vending machines operated on a 15 cent basis and will sell 20 cents but must either rebate a penny on each package or, other means (usually matches).

A change in price of 25 cents charged for the package of cigarettes, constitutes a violation and should be reported, he said, all legal penalties of 15 cents, imposed in March 1942, some other charges for these brands.

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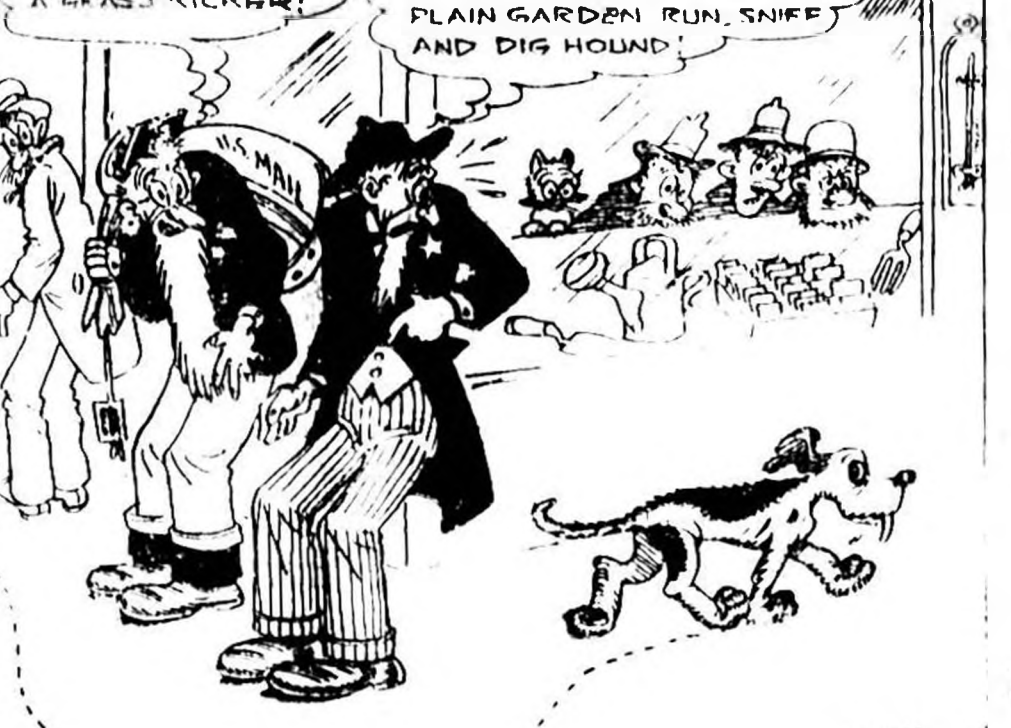
